#### TORONTO AND NIAGARA POWER

The Toronto board of control has been staggered by an independent report on the Niagara power scheme, or that part of it relating to local distribution. The hydro-electric commission reported that the cost of a local plant, capable of distributing all the electricity needed for power and light in the city, estimated at 33,772 horsepower. would cost \$2,463,411, while a plant sapable of delivering 12,439 horsepower, sufficient for street lighting and strictly municipal purposes, would cost \$1,-\$51,582. These figures were based on a system largely of overhead distribation except in the central portions of

The Toronto board of control thought It would be prudent to check these figures, and instructed a firm of engineers to make a separate investigation. These engineers have reported that one system would cost \$4,290,000, while a more complete system, providing for a greater area of underground wires, would cost \$5,200,000. The Globe says that "inasmuch as the controllers had calculated on \$2,000,-900 as the likely outside price, or possibly \$2,500,000, the figures of the special engineers have caused them considerable disappointment." The surprise is the greater because the head of this firm of engineers, Mr. Cecil Smith, was the engineer of the hydro-electric commission.

The controllers are now said to be disposed to negotiate with the Toronto graft, and has left scarcely a whole Electric Company to ascertain if a pane of glass in his own premises. compromise might be reached, which would save the city a large expediture for a distribution plant, and at the same time reduce the price of electrical energy. The main object, is to provide cheap light and power, whether by public regulation or public-ownership. The people are not concerned about theories if they can get results.

#### TO MAKE DRY LAND OF THE ZUYDER ZEE.

[November Technical World.] Little Holland, with its 5,000,000 people living safely behind their wave-washed dykes, is about to make a new conquest from its old enemy, the ocean. Already Dutch engineers have begun the tremendons task which will result in turning the Zuyder Zee into 1,400 square miles of dry land. Where of old the great Dutch war fleets gathered, where now 4,000 fishermen sink their nets, there will rise happy villages, broad pastures, poplar-bordered roads and sleepy canals-new farms and nomes for 50,000 Dutchmen. The task to be undertaken is a tremendous one. It will cost nearly \$76,000,000. In return the Government expects to secure annual rentals of more than \$5,000,000 from those who occupy and till the hard-won ground. The Zuyder Zee has occupied a most prominent place in Dutch history. On its shores are the ancient towns of Medemblik, Hoorn, Harderwyck, Norden and Enk-

suizen, under whose walls the Dutch fleets used to lie at anchor in the days when Holland disputed with England the supremacy of the seas. It seems peculiarly appropriate, now that Holland has turned from the ways of war to the paths of peace, that she should win in a great fight with the sea-a fight that has continued throughout hundreds of years-attaining victory only by ceaseless vizilance and flerce endeavor. #### VEILED LADY WANTED

Mysterious Woman Who Sold Sultan of Morocco's Diamond.

Londin, Nov. 13.-Mohammed Tazi, who was sent to Paris to raise money on the jewels of the Sultan of Morocco, confided several articles of the collection, including a diamond necklace worth £6,000, to a jeweler to the Rue de la Paix. While in the keeping of the latter the necklace was stolen, without the thieves leaving the slightest clue to their identity.

In his despair, Mohammed Tazi invoked the assistance of the Government, and the affair was placed in the hands of two of M. Hamard's shrewdest detectives. As a result of their researches, the missing necklace has been found, though not in the condition in which its custodian last saw it. After its disappearance, it passed

into the hands of some receiver, who broke the necklace into half a dozen pieces. These were recovered one by one at the shops of different dealers. The pendant was composed of a magnificent single-stone diamond, which had been removed from its setting, and sold separately. The hunt for this diamond was a long one, and for time was fruitless; but now the dealer into whose hands it had come has handed it to the police, explaining that it had been sild to him by a woman who was thickly veiled. The mysterious vendor gave a name and address that proved to be fictitious.

He said: "Watered stock to the probable amount of \$25,-000,000 or \$30,000,000 was issued. Mr. Walsh, through employes, voted the stock to himself. He then sold this stock to the banks, taking the money Mariposa Grove, California, is a manifold to build up his private enterprises. All centenarian. Baobab trees of Africa have of the stock so sold by Mr. Walsh was practically valueless. It was also the practice of Mr. Walsh to make loans to one of his companies, and then sell the bonds of that company to the banks. These bonds were practically worthless."

The state auditor's office yesterday, says the Minneapolis Journal, paid bounty claims on 1,021 full-grown wolves and 951 cubs. The amount paid out was \$9,721 50, and in this fiscal year about \$30,000 has been paid out on such claims. Marshall County made the biggest showing, with \$1,620 paid, and claims for \$132 50 from Hennepin County were honored. The present bounty is \$7 50 for grown wolves and \$3 for cubs.

The hospital trust met yesterday afternoon in the mayor's office, and decided that after Dec. 1, no graduate nurses will be allowed to take cases in Victoria Hospital. 


