"Our party has been formed to support the republic, to further democratic reforms on a Socialistic, economic basis and to furnish a rallying point for the middle classes and keep them from falling into the power of the reactionaries. The party will, naturally, oppose Bolshevism with all means at its command. HOOVER WILL BE SUPREME DICTATOR

Plan To Go Before War Council For Final Ratification.

Press.)—The plan for the appointment of Herbert C. 


ILLUSTRATION OF STEEL VAULT DOOR IN-STALLED IN HURON & ERIE BUILDING





INFLUENZA HAS LATER DANGERS

Particular Care Needed When Patient Is Convalescent. Says Expert.

The influenza convalescent who has The influenza convalescent who has apparently recovered from the disease and is yet in a strangely weak and depressed condition should be the object of particular care, according to Dr. Louis I. Harris, director of the Bureau of Preventable Diseases of the New York Health Department. In the opinion of Dr. Harris the after care of the influenza patient is most important. The co-operation of the patient, coupled with the willingness to see that the weakness and depression are a part of the illness, though coming after the of the illness, though coming after the disease itself has spent its force, is a big factor in effecting a complete return to full health. On the other hand, the determination to ignore this debilitated condition and to fight against it,

will, Dr. Harris says, frequently bring serious consequences upon the patient.

After Effects Bad.

"The subject of the after effects of influenza," said Dr. Harris, "is one of particular interest to the scientist at the present time. "First, and perhaps the most mo-mentous condition to be considered is

the striking depression, mental, nervous, and physical, complained of by most patients. Those attacked by the disease with moderate severity are almost alway afflicted with this depression, which should be recognized and dealt with.

Those who have had mild cases of the epidemic are little affected by depression, and their quick return to health and strength gives rise to the belief that influenza is trivial. On the contrary, influenza in its after effects is anything but trivial, and calls for the application of rules of common sense and sanitation which are the fruit of years of experience.

"Tonic treatment, well-chosen diet, and great care in not becoming overtired or allowing the body to be chilled. are necessary. Eggs may be eaten, but not more than two a day, for the average adult. Of course, it must be remembered that in many cases, this disease tends to direct its force against the kideeys, and therefore we instruct patients to avoid eating a great amount of neat, eggs, or beef extracts. Eggs, soft boiled, poached, or beaten, raw, are advisable in limited number. The raw eggs should always be well agitated be-

When Good Food Is Bad. "With milk and eggs as a foundation, the patient should eat good nourishing food, including meat, fish, and vegetables, simply prepared. Frying, for instance, is out of the question. Good food prepared in an unassimilable manner becomes bad food; especially is this to be noted in cases of convalescence from influenza, for the disease often manifests itself in vomiting, and in intestinal and gastric disturbances, and it is important not to weaken the digestive function by the eating of poorly-prepared food, or even the best of food in ill-advised quantities. The quantita-tive distribution of foodstuffs should be so adjusted as not to overtax the stomach, but the patient should eat gener-



WANT MINERAL **SURVEY TO PUT** CANADA AHEAD

Ontario. Boards of Trade Ask For It.

EMPLOY RETURNED MEN Also Want Provision for Soldiers to Settle in This

District.

Immediately after the closing of the first convention of Western Ontario United Boards of Trade yesterday afternoon the directors appointed met for the purpose of electing officers for the coming year from their num-

ber.

Maclure Sclanders, commissioner of the Border Chamber of Commerce. One, termed by Mr. Dunn of Chatham, as probably the most important of the convention, proposed that the United Boards of Trade of Western Ontario respectfully suggest to the Dominion Government that serious consideration be given to the feasibility of making a comprehensive mineral survey of the country, thus affording employment at suitable remuneration to returned soldiers, and looking to provision for the development of the enormous mineral resources of Canada to help pay the war debt, etc.

Mr. Sclanders stated that to his knowledge, no real geological survey has been made of Canada, and that

knowledge, no real geological survey has been made of Canada, and that nearly all the geological information obtainable from the Government is "God has given us in Canada mos

"God has given us in Canada most tremendous mineral wealth," he said, "yet we depend largely for our raw materials upon the United States. Our country could supply the whole world with minerals for a million years to come, and we have sufficient for the empire for all time. What we want to do is to look after them and develop them. velop them.

"Whereas it seems highly probable that many of our returned soldiers may not incline to revert to their former sedentary occupations, but would prefer a freer outdoor life, such as employment in connection with the above suggested prospecting survey;
"Therefore, be it resolved by this convetion of the United Boards of Trade of Western Ontario, that it be respectfully suggested to the Dominion Government that serious consideration be given to the feasibility of affording employment at suitable remuneration, to returned soldiers in the work of a thoroughly comprehensive mineral survey of this country; that such returned men be first equipped with a short theoretical course in mineralogy, and thereafter sent into the field under experienced prospectors, and divided into groups to each of which certain specified territory would be allotted; and, further, that some plan be devised whereby the discovery of every important mineral deposit would reflect to the pecuniary advantage, by bonus or otherwise as might be arranged, of its discoverer and of the prospector in charge of his group."

Settlement on Land.

The second resolution, dealing with the question of settlement of soldiers on the land and financial assistance available for them from the Government, was prompted by the fact that under the soldiers' settlement act of 1917 the Dominion Government can only make loans on first mortage security to the


