Paris May 11.—The French cabinet, at a meeting today, instructed Minister of Justice l'Hopiteau to open proceedings against the General Federation of Labor with a view to the dissolution of the organization, which has been supporting the strike of the French railwaymen by calling other strikes.

WILLIAM D. HOWELLS, "DEAN OF AMERICAN LETTERS," IS DEAD

Famous Novelist Expires At His Home in New York.

EFFECTS OF INFLUENZA

Never Fully Recovered From Disease Contracted in the South.

New York, May 11.—William Dean Howells, the novellst, died here today.

Mr. Howells returned a few weeks ago from Savannah, Ga., where he had spent the winter. While in the south, Mr. Howells was stricken with influenza, and never had fully recovered from its and never had fully recovered from its With Mr. Howells at the time of his With Mr. Howells at the time of his death, which occurred shortly after midnight, were his daughter, Mildred, and son, William Mead, both of this city. Besides them, he is survived by two sisters, Mrs. Achille Frechette, a translator for the Canadian House of Commons, and Miss Aurelia Howells, also of Ottawa, and a brother, S. D. Howells, of Washington.

The late William Dean Howells was known as "the dean of American let-ters." Beginning his first book, "Poems of Two Friends," just before the Amer-ican Civil War, Mr. Howells had com-pleted and published more than 71 vol-umes at the time of his death, besides acting editor of various publications, crossing the ocean eighteen times in search of material for his novels and writing essays, criticisms and maga-

ine articles.
Born in Martin's Ferry, Ohio, in 1837, the served his literary apprenticeship as a composer, reporter and editor of his father's newspaper. When 23 years old, he traveled to Boston to make the acquaintance of Longfellow, Hawthorne, Emerson, Holmes and Lowell. EMPLOYMENT IN ONTARIO

Slight Decrease in Placements for Week Ending May 1.

The employment service of the de-partment of labor for the province of ontario reports a slight increase in placements for the week ending May 1. Placements within zone numbered 2.107; those transferred from one provincial zone to another 241, and those transferred to other provincial and those ransferred to other provinces 46, making a total of 2,394. During the precedng week the numbers were, respectively, 2,133, 219, and 55, making a total of 2,407. Activity was again strong in of 2.407. Activity was again strong in general laboring, with 872 placements, in lumbering with 317, and in agriculture with 159. Placements in the building trades fell from 170 to 116.



BRIGADIER BAUGH

lembers Were Persecuted, *Even in This City, in the Early Days.

In his lecture at the Salvation Army Citadel on Monday night, Brigadier-General Baugh recounted many experiences the army had in its pioneer days. and told how the workers were persecuted throughout the country, some of the persecutions taking place in the city of London. He did not state the date, but said that when he first came here the army was barred by the police from holding open meetings.

"At one time there were 20 of the men

the army in Castle Carter because since. they were holding open meetings," he said. "When that incident took place Rev. Dr. Wilson of Kingston, who had been relieved of his charge in that city by his bishop, came and offered to beat the drum for the parade, while these men were in jail."

General Baugh, who was converted some 56 years ago, related some of his experiences in England before coming to this country. He said that he started out as a boy of ten, and in a few years. to this country. He said that he started out as a boy of ten, and in a few years became a convert and worked for the army. At the time he was converted he was in Salisbury in Wiltshire when he noticed a sign, stating that two girls, Rose Clapham and Jane Smith, would sing in a variety theatre on Sun-day night. 



TORONTO, May 10.—The head office of the United Farmers of Ontario and the father of the present Ontario Government is out to kill its own baby over the superannuation bill. A letter went forth today to the U. F. O. clubs in Ontario asking that they request their members in the House to oppose the bill which gives superannuation to the civil servants.

The letter is signed by J. J. Morrison, the secretary and big man of the U. F. O.







Debs has been offered his freedom, it is said, if he would renounce certain statements he is credited with having made, but Debs, whatever may be the merits or demerits of his political philosophy, is not the type of man who will change his mind. Whether he is of the individual martyr type or whether he believes it best that he himself should suffer for the cause of "the truth," as he sees it, is perhaps a debatable point. There can be no doubt, however, that many men with far more radical economic viewpoints are at liberty, while the mild-mannered Debs may possibly die in prison, such is the state of his health, before his supwill have an opportunity to vote on his election

To the anarchist, the communist, and the syndicalist, socialism is a stupid, tedious, and ridiculously slow-working scheme of effecting social betterment. Communists, syndicalists and communistic anarchists believe in direct action as symbolized in the general strike and industrial mass action to hasten the changed conditions they desire. The Socialist-Labor party works to hasten the day of workingclass supremacy by uniting the workers tentatively into industrial unions.

But the old-line, slow, patient, ballot-box Socialists repudiate all these methods, and their leader, Eugene Debs, lies in prison. And so much into disrepute has Debs come because of his alleged reactionary and obsolete methods of world redemption, that thousands of genuine "reds," neither better nor worse than the Bolsheviki of Russia, communists, industrial unionists and direct actionists of all types, say "Let him stay there; serves him right." That's why there has not been and will not be any general strike to effect Debs' release from prison. The straight-line political socialists of which Debs was the type, did not encourage general strikes nor other forms of direct action. Debs is not and never was a "red" in the exact modern meaning of the term. He is a political actionist pure and simple.

The communist party, despite all the activities of the federal officers in sending hundreds and thousands to jail is admitted to be spreading rapidly by subterranean means of propaganda. The Socialist-Labor party in the United States preserved a certain respectability by sticking close to orthodox Marxian doctrine in theory and keeping still in practice, although it won the distinction of being outlawed in Canada, where the Socialist-Democratic party, corwas allowed a certain amount of leniency. Even twenty-five or thirty years ago the country was filled with them .. woodlands were a carpet of color; yellow dog's tooth violets, drooping beliflowers and dainty little "ladies and gentlemen" bloomed in the fence corners, and every sunny woods border was pink, in spring, with cheery little "spring beauties." Today for miles about every city and town, and even for a considerable distance about the villages, only the exceptionally persistent species and the less attracsuccessfully made. The ends of the Empire tive for gathering are to be found. To find a clump "ladies and gentlemen" or beliflowers is an event.
