



Toronto Police Need Permiss To Attend Theatre or Movies

TORONTO, Oct. 25.—"The green book"—the new rules and regulations for the direction of the Toronto police, as revised and amended by Chief of Police Dickson—was sent out from police headquarters today to all ranks.

"The rules and regulations as they were are practically obsolete," the chief stated. The new book replaces the red book which was drawn up thirty-one years ago.

In instructions to patrol sergeants the book states: In instructions to patrol sergeants the book states:
"They shall not enter public bouses or houses of entertainment, nor
permit their constables to do so, except in the actual execution of duty,
or to make observations or investigation in the line of duty.

"They must not permit undue familiarity on the part of constables

doing duty under them."

Pertaining to constables the book says:

"Constables are not to attend theatres, racetracks, or other places of amusement, even in plain clothes, without obtaining leave to do so.
"Constables neglecting to avail themselves of the time at their dis-"Constables neglecting to avail themselves of the time at their dis-posal for rest and sleep, and spending a large portion of their time in walking about the streets, are to be reported to the chief constable." "Constables urging persons unconnected with the police to interfere with the commissioners or chief constable with respect to transfer or other duties, will be considered guilty of disobedience of orders.
"Matrons," says the book, "must when on duty, be neatly and respect-

ably dressed in modest attire. 'Any members of the force found entering public houses, except on duty, or found frequenting shops where spirits are sold, or drinking there, or who purchase spirits from unlicensed persons, are liable to dismissal.

"Any constable may be remo ved from service by dismissal or otherwise without assigning any reason."

Closing the Mines.

Claiming that it is impossible to pay the wages demanded by miners, Roy M. Wolvin, president of the British Empire Steel Corporation, states the mines in the east may be closed for the winter. These include the properties worked by the Dominion Steel Corporation and the Nova Scotia Steel and Coal Company, both of which are included in the Empire Steel Corporation. The operation of the various steel mills and blast furnaces owned by the same corporation is also involved.

Such a move would be serious for the eastern section of the Dominion. Not only is coal mining one of the basic industries there, but the taking out of iron ore from the deposits off the coast of Newfoundland is also an undertaking of no mean dimensions.

The steel and coal business Nova Scotia has not been in a healthy state since the conclusion of the war. The bringing about of the British Empire Steel Corporation was spoiled in the first attempt by the impression of some of the promoters that there was to be a very large amount of stock available for lines, coal, iron ore, steel, shipbuilding, etc., have been carried on tion. at low ebb. The world market has ties that had been built up by years people. of dispute between the Scotia and Dominion companies, whose submarine properties in many cases

There is no reason to doubt that British authorities. Mr. Wolvin states a very real case when he says it is impossible for the corporation to operate on a successful basis against present costs, and present costs are made up largely of the pay of the miners.

Whether the corporation is so capitalized that it cannot earn on the basis of reasonable returns, we are not prepared to state, although it must be admitted there has been no mad rush for the stock of the British Empire Steel Corporation since it was placed on the market It recently received a large order for rails from the Dominion Government, but that may have been given with a view to keeping the steel mills busy until after the general election.

If Mr. Wolvin knows that a lower wage will bring enough business to keep the mines going, he will have formidable argument that cannot be ignored.

"Unthinkable."

t may be urged that President Harding's Yorktown declaration that another break in the "peaceful and friendly relations between United States and Great Britain is unthinkable," is merely the warming over of a stock speech-that there is no new thought in it-no definite program-merely a pleasing remark to fit the occasion.

These two great nations need men who have sense and sincerity enough to make just such statements, no matter if they are 100 years old.


Judgment has been handed out in the suit brought by Charles E. Campbell against the Vancouver Sun. The charge was made that certain extravagant amounts were paid to complainant for his property, taken over by the Government.

With that phase of the case w are not at the moment concerned but there were certain essential points made that define quite clearly the length to which a news paper can go in making charges and comments about people, incidents and things in general.

Mr. Justice Morrison, in his charge to the jury, spoke at length on the liberties the press might take in such discussions. Some of the points he made were:

"Everybody has a right to comment on a matter of public interest and this, I find, is a matter of public interest. A man may comment very strongly, but he must comment on the facts.

"Everybody has a right to comment on the acts of a man if the



subject matter is one of public interest.

"Now that is a privilege, gentlemen of the jury, that I am sure none of us wish to see curtailed, and that is the attitude of the defendant in this case, that, actuated by a sense of duty to the public he exercised the privilege of criticising what he called the acts of the plaintiff in a public or quasi or semi-public manner in dealing with governmental department or with the government of the day. He contends that that is a matter of fair comment and fair criticism."
