WITH THE PACKERS

Former Has Secret Service Men Preparing Another Damning Report—Latter Say They Don't Care.
Washington, D.C., June 10.—President Roosevelt has Government employes busily at work in the preparation of another report attacking the packing houses of Chicago, and this report will be sent to Congress in a short time if action on the meat inspection legislation is delayed.
Under the orders of the president two secret service men were detached from their duty of detecting counterfeiters and sent to Chicago to collect information regarding the use of preservatives and coloring matter in packing house products and methods in the preparation of canned and putrid foods. These agents have been in Chicago several weeks. They have been very hard at work and have collected twenty-two affidavits bearing on the subject the president ordered to be investigated. These affidavits come, for the most part, from former employes of the stock yards and packing houses. The packers profess to be utterly indifferent to what the president does.

MORE DAMAGE BY THE STORM

Highgate, Muirkirk and Oxford Visited by the Cyclone
NO ONE SERIOUSLY HURT
Highgate, June 11.—The havoc wrought by Friday's tornado in this village and vicinity will amount into the thousands of dollars. The following is a summarized list of the incidents of the storm in this section:
Joseph Reynolds struck through a fill. The fluid ran down the small of his back, giving Joe a sensation much like as if he were being pricked all over with a huge wire brush. He was not seriously hurt, and will recover.
Goldie Milling Co.'s smoketack blown down. Sheds damaged.
Roof taken off John Lee's house. Windmill also blown down.
William Forsythe's barn blown down.
Hector Gosnell's barn blown off foundation and partially unroofed.
William Taylor's barn badly damaged. Charles Scott's barn unroofed.
Sam Gosnell's barn completely demolished. Barn on back of farm unroofed.
J. W. Baley's barn blown down. Horses taken out afterwards uninjured.
Agricultural building completely demolished. Building is a mass of ruins.
Highgate school house, No. 6, unroofed and badly damaged.
Highgate town hall unroofed.
Methodist Church chimneys down and sheds demolished.
Victoria Hotel roof damaged.
Mrs. Pomeroy's stable demolished. Windows blown in, in Molsen's Bank.
Windows blown in and goods damaged in the following places of business: William Sheppy, John Foeter, John Tolson and E. Beattie.
Leslie McLaren's kitchen and sheds demolished.
Barns and sheds belonging to Frank Phoenix blown down and badly wrecked.
F. Atkinson's barn unroofed and wash blown down.
Muirkirk, June 11.—The storm hit this place on Friday with terrible violence. The front door of the post office was wrenched off its hinges and hurled into the middle of the roadway.
Orford Township, June 11.—Rail fences in this township were flattened. Hardly any frame without evidence of the storm. Orchards uprooted. Windmills blown down. No one seriously hurt.

DEATH'S CALL

Death claimed a respected Maple City citizen yesterday in the person of Miss Mary Mills, who passed away at 4:20 in the morning. The deceased had been ailing for some time, and bore her suffering with true Christian fortitude.
The funeral members of her family survive her: Miss Jennie, of this city; Mrs. James Fleming, of Dresden, and ex-Licence Inspector Mills, of Chatham Township.
The funeral will take place to-morrow afternoon from the late residence of the deceased on Elizabeth street, to Riverside Cemetery, Louisville. Rev. Mr. Hoyt will officiate.

DEATH STOPS WEDDING.

Wm. Walker, Guelph, Who Failed to Appear at His Wedding, Found Dead.
Guelph, June 11.—The lifeless body of William Walker, who was to have been married to Miss Mary Smith on Wednesday last, but who disappeared shortly before the hour set for the wedding ceremony, was found floating in the River Speed, near Goldie's mills, Friday. He had committed suicide. The deed is attributed to the fact that he had been laboring under mental depression for some time past and the excitement attendant upon the wedding no doubt intensified his weakness.
Three years ago he was to have been married, but failed to appear for the ceremony, returning a few days later in a state of mental collapse.
Coroner Dr. Robinson is holding an inquest.

30,000 TERRY MATINEE.

That Amount Expected From Tuesday's Jubilee Performance.
London, June 11.—The principal feature of the Ellen Terry matinee at Drury Lane to-morrow will be the first act of "Much Ado About Nothing." In this twenty-three members of the Terry family will take part. They are, besides Miss Terry, her three brothers, two sisters, two of her own children, three grandchildren, eleven nephews and nieces and one nephew by marriage.
Seats have been sold to the extent of nearly £5,000. A few stalls at five guineas each and single seats in boxes at four guineas still remain unsold. It is expected that a total of £6,000 will be realized. Over 400 artists will take part in the performance, and it is expected that there will be 3,000 persons in the audience. The performance will commence at 12:30 o'clock.
