-The Governing Committee of the Cincinnati, U.S., Fire Underwriters' Association, has again advanced rates. -Work hais begun on a new corn oil mill at Decatur, III. It will cost $\$ 200,000$, will make 125 barrels of oil and use the germs of 32,000 bushels of corn daily. It will be the largest corn oil mill in the country. It is being erected by the Pratt Cereal Mill Company, which has developed an entirely new process that extracts practically all of the oil from the corn germs.
C. L. Collins, receiver of the Michigan Manufacturers' Mutual Fire Insurance Co., has been given permission by the Circuit Court to sue the policy holders in the concern for $\$ 50,000$, which is needed to clear up the outstanding liabilities of the company. Many of the wealthy Saginaw Valley lumbermen will be among the defendants in this suit.
-The projected South Shore railway will, it is stated, start from Quebec and end at the mouth of the French River, on Georgian Bay, at the northeast angle of Lake Huron. The road will practically follow a straight line, and be 440 miles in length, 335 of which will be in the province of Quebec and 115 in that of Ontario. At the mouth of the French River it will connect with navigation on Lakes Huron, Michigan and Superior.

-Messrs. Thomas J. Drummond and Edgar M. -The Russian Government have undertaken the completion of a great petroleum pipe line from the oil wells of Baku on the Caspian Sea to the port of Batum on the Black Sea, a distance of about 550 miles, following the axis of the Caucasus range of mountains. Several years may be required to finish the work, but when the line is in operation it will be capable of transporting $625,000,000$ gallons a year, and the intention is to compete in the world's markets with American petroleum.
-The Boas-Felsen Company is the name of a new joint stock company which announces that it will apply for incorporation. The object of the association is to manufacture and deal in mantles, cloaks, blouses, skirts and ladies' wear generally. The applicants are: Messrs. Aaron B. Boas, Morres Felsen, Melvin H. Davis, merchants; Bernard Boas, clerk; and Bendix A. Boas, gentleman, all of the city of Montreal. The capital stock of the company is placed at $\$ 25,000$, divided into 250 shares of one hundred dollars each.
-Representatives of the Southwestern Traction Company, says a London, Ont., letter, met the Westminster Township Council on the 5th instant, and secured the right to operate a line through the township for a period of fifty years. The by-law passed by the Council exempts the company from taxation. The line is to be laid on the Wharncliffe road to Lambeth, thence to Delaware Village. The by-law permitting the construction of the road in Delaware Township has not yet been passed. It is said to be the intention of the company to continue the line to Glencoe.

-Asked whether the disposal by Signor Marconi of the patent rights for his wireless system in the United States would prejudicially affect Canadian interests, Hon. W. S. Fielding replied in the negative. The Minister said that some such possibility had been anticipated, and in order to meet it a provision had been inserted in the agreemen between Mr. Marconi and the Canadian Government, stipulating that in the event of the rates for commercial messages from the United States being reduced below 10 cents a word, the reduction should apply also to Canada.

ments on the proper use of oil, style of burners, combination of oil with steam or heated air, etc. It has been found that under many conditions oil is cheaper by at least 40 per cent. than coal.
-Fanning Island, a little coral reef in the South Pacific, is to be the resting place for the English submarine cable which will run from British Columbia to Australia, according to the Tribune's San Francisco special. On the island, which is 1,800 miles south of Hawaii, the English Cable Company, will establish its mid-ocean station, expending about $\$ 125,000$ there for buildings and equipment. Besides the usual buildings, there will be a large reservoir for catching rain water. The walls of these buildings will be made of coral, covered with cement.
-Louis Kauffield, a glass manufacturer of Matthews, Delaware County, Ind., after experiments covering two years, announces that he has solved the mystery of making malleable glass, long considered one of the lost arts. The manufactured product is not sensitive to sudden changes of heat and cold, and may be moulded very much after the manner of iron. Glass manufacturers who have admitted to some of the experiments and who tested the finisbed product in various ways say that Kauffield has certainly succeeded in bringing out a product that is new to the trade, and when applied to all kinds of glazsware may revolutionize the business of glassmaking.
-Ten new steamers of the Union-Castle Mail Steamship Company will soon be plying between New York and the ports of South Africa. One of these ships, the Corfe Castle, has already sailed for the African coast. It is the intention of the company to have one ship leave New York each week and to cut down the sailing time between New York and Cape Town to twenty-one days. A most unusual cargo is being taken on by the Corfe Castle. Instead
of filling the ship with the ordinary commodities that have hitherto gone to South African ports, she is being loaded with pianos, organs, clocks, prepared drinks, and various articles of household equipment.
-Natural gas, of which England was generally supposed to be deficient, has been discovered and put to practical purposes in the village of Heathfield, Sussex. The opera-

It is manifest, it adds, that this change alone fully justifies the proposed large reduction in rates, and it is reasonable to hope that when experience is gained a still further reduction will be possible. It would be difficult to exaggerate the importance of such a reduction, in its bearings on social and commercial intercourse between Canada and Great Britain. The power house will be equipped with two generating sets, each having 400 horse-power high-speed engines. The machine shops will also be operated electrically, also several hoisting equipments. In the shale mines of the company electricity will also be used, seven motors of various sizes having been ordered. In addition to drainage, ventilation will also be done by electrically-propelled fans. special advertising car with photographs of beautiful views on the Georgian Bay and Muskoka Lakes to all the principal cities in the Western and Southern States. The Northern Navigation Company is also making an effort to induce tourists from the West to come Canadawards this summer, and is going to put on a new line of steamers between Parry Sound and the West. The Canada Atlantic line of grain steamers between Parry Sound and Chicago is this season to carry passengers. This new feature in transportation will no doubt attract a great many tourists from Chicago and Western cities.
-The British Board of Trade's March returns show that British imports from Canada increased as follows during the past three months: Cattle, £27,000; wheat, £55,000; flour, £ 50,000 ; bacon, £ 14,000 ; hams, £ 24,000 ; butter, £33,000 ; sawn wood, $£ 12,000$. During the same periorl British imports from Canada decreased as follows: Sheep and lambs, $£ 4,000$; oats, $£ 60,000$; peas, $£ 19,000$; cheese, $£ 22$,000 ; eggs, $£ 12,000$; hewn wood, $£ 8,000$. The imports of canned salmon totalled, £145,000; those of lobster totalled, $£ 8,000$. British exports to Canada increased as follows: Wool, $£ 2,000$; cotton piece goods, £ 44,000 ; linen piece goods, $£ 3,000$; silk, $£ 7,000$; woollen tisisues, $£ 31,000$; worsted tissues, $£ 38,000$; carpets, $£ 5,000$; hardware, £ $£, 000$; pig iron, $£ 3,000$; bar iron, iron sheets, and boiler plates, £ 5,000 ; galvanized sheets, $£ 10,000$; tin plates, $£ 26,000$; cast and wrought iron, $£ 2,000$; unwrought steel $£ 22.000$; unwrought tin ,£2,000; haberdashery, £11,000. British exports to Canada decreased as follows: Spirits, £16;000; jute piece goods, $£ 1,000$. Rails totalled $£ 20,000$. Wearing apparel and slops, waterproofed, totalled $£ 9,00$ ); not waterproofed, £ $75,000$.
-A numerous and representative deputation from Parry Sound, Ont., waited upon the acting Minister of Public Works recently, and asked for a grant for the construction of public docks, which are estimated to cost about $\$ 25,000$. The construction of the dockis involves the expropriation by the Government of the land now occupied by the Parry Sound Lumber Company and the Beatty estate, and the assumption of water lots owned by the Dominion but deeded to these companies. The deputation set forth the great need of the new docks, owing to the rapid growth of the town and the fact that the present docks have fallen out of repair by reason of the disputed title. The whole matter was gone into with the Ministers, who promised to give it serious consideration, and left the deputation hopeful that the request will be granted. The deputation then appealed to the Postmaster-General to have the mails for Parry Sound, which are now carried by the Canada Atlantic to Rose Point, three miles distanf from the

town, transferred at James Bay Junction to the James Bay Railway, which is running into Parry Sound. Mr. Mulock seemed to regard the application with favor. Subsequently the deputation waited upon Hon. A. G. Blair, and asked for a subsidy of $\$ 3,200$ a mile in aid of the extension of the James Bay Railway from French River, a point to which the line is at present bonused, to Sudbury, a distance of 35 miles. There connection will be had with the C.P.R. and the distance to Toronto shortened by eighty miles. Parry Sound will also be brought within 125 miles of Toronto, instead of 206, as at present. The proposed line will open up a district timbered with all kinds of hardwoods and possessing fine stretches of land well suited for agricultural purposes.
-Our correspondent at Petrolia, Ont., writes: Mr. J. H. Fairbanks has donated to the town for market purposes two lots each $40 \times 160$ feet on south side of main street and bounding the market on north, thus extending the market to main street. He has also offered to sell the town 100 x 160 feet on east side of the donation for the sum of $\$ 8,200$ which is considered a low price and very generous offer. The town council have decided to accept the offer and have instructed the town clerk to prepare a by-law to be submitted to the people empowering them to issue debentures for the necessary amount.-The new hotel, "Fletcher House," is now completed and furnished and is a great improvement on the old building formerly occupying the corner. We now boast of three first-clasls brick hotels, viz., Hotel Iroquois, O'Leary Bros., proprietors; Tecumseh House, by W. Flannagan, and Fletcher House, by E. D. Fletcher. The smaller ones are Anderson House by Thos. Eddes and Johnston House, by Thos. Carmichael.-The Petrolea Packing Company, with authorized capital of $\$ 150,000$, of which $\$ 100,000$ has been subscribed, has commenced building operations. The Milner Wagon Works Co., with a subscribed capital of $\$ 50,500$, have received their charter from the Government and will commence the erection of necessary buildings at once; the company will start with a capacity of 10 wagons per day.-The erection of the new creamery will be commenced in May or perhaps sooner. This will be the largest and best equipped creamery in the province. The gentlemen behind this enterprise never do things by halves.-At a meeting of the council of the Board of Trade held March 31st, it was learned that the G.T.R. Co. intend erecting a new passenger depot in the near future, and that the MC.R.R. Co. intend building an extension of the Eddyville branch through to Dresden, a distance of about eight miles, thus connecting with the Huron and Erie going south through Chatham to Rondeau, which should prove a great convenience to the packing industry of our town in securing the hog product.

## A DEPLORABLE RUMOUR.

"Lord! Lord! how this world is given to lying." The exclamation of Falstaff is often recalled when we hear rumours that bear on their very face the stamp of some manufacturer of falsehoods. One of these mendacities which was peculiarly atrocious by its slandering the dead and cruelly lacerating the feelings of the bereaved, has been the "town-talk" of this city and other places in Canada. The rumour in question forced its way into the columns of a section of the Press in this city. Every English journal ignored the story out of respect to the family affected. But, perhaps, it is better to let full 'pablicity be given to such rumours, as then their authenticity becomes widely challenged and all the evidence capable of being adduced in their disproof is certain to be brought out. It is safer for foul humours to be drawn out to the surface than for them to go on circulating internally and spreading poison through the system.

The case in question was a story, that a well known citizen, the son of a distinguished ecclesiastic, whose tragic death by burning was so lamented some time ago, was still alive and residing in retreat in Mexico. It was stated circumstantially, that a letter had been found in the desk of a deceased friend, which was written to him by this citizen, whose death and burial was believed to have taken place last winter. The story was backed up by gossip respecting the movements of the family, which, by perverse and cruel ingenuity, were made to give colour to the main rumour.
Naturally, the insurance companies, that had paid policies on the life of the person alleged to be alive, made the most exhaustive investigation into the circumstances of the death, the evidences of it adduced at an inquest, and the subsequent incidents out of which the rumour in question might have been given currency. The result was, that not a tittle of evidence could be found to throw even the faintest shadow of doubt upon the facts that, (1) the person in question was burnt to death; (2) that, a portion of his remains was found in the ashes of the house wherein he was burnt; (3) that, such remains were sufficient to identify the victim of the fire; (4) that, he had arranged to have the company with him on the fatal night of a prominent citizen, who, at the last moment, was unable to take the trip; (5) that, every moment of his time, up to near midnight, of the day preceding the night of the fire was spent with those who knew him intimately; (6) that, no such letter as was talked about had ever been found; (7) that, since the night of the fire, not
a trace of the person in question had ever been found, except a portion of his body, which though almost wholly calcined, could be identified by the dimensions of the remains.

What is to be said of one who set afloat such a wicked, cruel, lying rumour. Some one person must have concocted this slander of the dead, this brutal attack upon the tenderest, the most sacred sensibilities of the bereaved. Whoever is guilty of this inhuman deed should guard his secret well; for, whoever might recognise him as its perpetrator, would shun him as a leper.

## THE CHINESE WAR DEBT.

A little money and a little land given by the nation which, apparently, has plenty of both, as a speedy way of restoring peace and keeping the throne inhabited as befcre, may not be an unwise mode of settlement, even though enacted by a people of whom the great majority of the rest of mankind are somehow wont to think slightingly. Were all wars to be settled on that score, in proportion to the wealth, extent, or resources of the inferior combatant, such prolongings as are now hindering to some extent the progress of industry would long ago have given place to, not only a restoration of commercial and pastoral life, but to conditions admitting of the payment to the conquerors of what they should exact as their dues.
Had the Chinese people persisted in fighting as well as "running away," and had adopted the same tactics as are being so successfully employed by the inhabitants of the Philippines and South Africa it is safe to say that the greatest war would now be at the point where, happily, peace again prevails.
The conditions affecting the distribution of the Chinese indemnity seem to be so imperfectly understood that it may be worth while recapitulating the details of its origin and the character of the service instituted in connection with it. It was on May 1, of last year, that the Commission appointed by the diplomatic corps to study the question of the payment of indemnities to be demanded from China reported as the approximate amount of the claim of the Powers the sum of $£ 65,000$,000 , or $415,000,000$ Haikwan taels, at the then rate of exchange. Making allowance for further disbursements likely to be made by the Powers before the end of the priod of occupation, says our New York namesake, Mr. Rockhill, the American Plenipotentiary, got his colleagues to agree that the first step to be taken was to inform the Chinese Plenipotentiaries that the losses and disbursements of the various powers approximated £67,000,000 sterling, and to ask what measures they proposed taking for the payment of this sum. By the end of May the Commission on Indemnities was able to present a list of the sums asked by the various Powers computed up to the first of July, and calculated in Haikwan taels at the rate of exchange of April 1, 1901. The aggregates of these were as follows, in the order of their magniture:Russia, 133,316,000 Haikwan taels; Germany, $91,287,043$; trance, $75,779,250$; Great Britain, $51,664,029$; Japan, $35,577,577$; United States, $34,072,500$; Italy, $27,113,927$; Belgium, 8,607,750; Austria-Hungary, 3,979,520; Netherlands, 800,000 ; Spain, $388,055.22$; total, 462,585,651.22.

The demands of Spain and the Netherlands were abmitted in Haikwan taels, and the odd 22 tael cents : the Spanish claim is due to an exact figuring on the private
claims presented. The claims of the other Powers were made in the currency of the country; that of the United States being for a lump sum of $\$ 25,000,000$, including both private and governmental claims. In every other case except that of Belgium the private claims were separately stated, those of Russia being for $78,000,000$ roubles, or about 30 per cent. of the total amount claimed. The stated amounts of the private claims aggregated about 129,000,000 Haikwan taels. In presenting this statement the Commission remarked that since, according to unofficial information, the sum of $4,000,000$ taels figures on the lists of two legations, and since the claims of societies and private individuals in the case of most of the legations are put down without any count being taken of probable or even certain reductions, the Commission ou Indemnities is of opinion that the sum of $450,000,000$ Haikwan taels will not be exceeded up to the first of July, 1901.

Simultaneously with this anonuncement, an Imperial edict was received by Prince Ching and Li Hung Chang agreeing to pay an indemnity of $450,000,000$ taels and 4 per cent. interest as the maximum of the sum which China acknowedges she owes the Powers. After the essential question had been settled of providing the means to make this very prompt decision of the Throne effective, the representatives of the Powers were ready to sign the protocol. This instrument provides that the service of the debt shall take place at Shanghai through a commission of bankers, in which each Power shall be represented by a delegate, and which shall be authorized to receive the amount of interest and amortization which shall be paid to it by the Chinese authorities. The Chinese Government has already delivered to the Doyen of the diplomatic corps at Pekin a bond for the lump suin of $450,000,000$ taels, and this is to be converted into fractional bonds through the agency of the Bankers' Commission. As will be observed from recent telegrams, the work of the Commission has not proceeded entirely without friction. These two conditions, however, are plainly set forth in the protocol: 1. That the proceeds of the revenues assigned as security for the indemnity are to be paid monthly. 2. That interest on the indemnity is to be paid semi-annually and the amortization annually, either in gold or in silver, at the rates of exchange current on the dates on which the different payments fall due; that is, on the dates indicated in the pro-tocol-the first of July and the first of January of each year. Obviously, the total monthly payments to be received from the Chinese Government by the Commission must be sufficient to provide one-twelfth of the annual service, in gold, at the rates fixed by the Commission. So long as this condition is complied with the Commission is entitled to assume that the spirit of the obligation under Article VI. of the peace protocol has been fulfilled, and that no further responsibility rests with it either as to the yield of the revenue pledged or the sources of the money received. Th first difficulty encountered by the Commission appears to have been in regard to the exact amounts to be apportioned among the various Powers. It is understood that a provisional ${ }^{\circ}$ scale of distribution was determined on as follows:Russia, 29 per cent.; Germany, 20 per cent.; France, 15 4-5 per cent.; Great Britain, 11 per cent.; Japan 7 9-10 per cent.; United States, 7 per cent.; Italy, 6 per cent.; Belgium, 2 per cent.; Austria-Hungary, 1 per cent.; Netherlands, 0.20 per cent.; and Spain, 0.10 per cent. The extreme variety of interests here represented cannot be said to promise entire harmony of action, and the equal-
ity of voice and influence possessed by the representatives of the smaller Powers entitled to only an insignificant fraction of the indemnity cannot be called a businesslike arrangement. But it is a natural consequence of the exiraordinary situation which was created by events in $\mathrm{Pe}-$ kin in the summer of 1900 , and since the solution of the very knotty problem of satisfying the legitimate demands of all the Powers has been much more satisfactory than most people expected, it may fairly be hoped that the work of the International Bankers' Commission will be more smoothly conducted than at present seems probable.

## CECIL RHODES.

The personality of the late Cecil Rhodes is occupying so much of personal attention throughout the Empire, that we need offer no apology for reproducing the following sketch written to the order of the London Spectator, where it appears, and which it commends for its moderate and statesmanlike tone. The writer, who signs himself "Oxoniensis," was probably a fellow collegian:
The death of Cecil Rhodes in his forty-ninth year removes by far the most interesting figure in South African politics. At an age when an English barrister would be a rising junior, and a home politician might, if he were lucky, look for minor office, Mr. Rhodes was Premier of Cape Colony. It is hardly too much to say that he was the first Colonial politician who became really known to the British public, who touched their imagination. He is the first subject of the Crown-for we can hardly call Prince Rupert a British subject-to give his name as an official title to a portion of the Empire. He was the first rich man in South Africa to value wealth merely as an instrument towards the realisation of political ideas. In many ways it would be easy to show that he was unlike his predecessors and contemporaries. It is, however, very difficult for one who, starting with every wish to admire Mr. Rhodes's political career, felt compelled, after a somewhat close examination of South African politics, to criticise him very freely, now to do justice, and no more than justice, to the very remarkable man whom the Empire has lost.
Rather too much was written during his lifetime on Mr. Rhodes's idiosyncrasies. The line between political interest and vulgar curiosity is at times ill-defined, and amongst Mr. Rhodes's admirers were some who possessed neither taste nor judgment. We were told a great deal about his manner of life, his ways of speech,-much that was trivial, several things that were inaccurate. To take a small instance: a certain school in England had made up its mind that Mr. Rhodes was an enemy to the natives in South Africa. This notion was quite unfounded, but in order to insist upon its. falsity some of Mr. Rhodes's friends racked their brains to demonstrate his love for the Kaffir. Thus we read in "personal reminiscences" contributed by Dr. Jameson to a Life of Cecil Rhodes published in 1897 that "in his house near Cape 'Town there are no white men or women servants; his servants are all native boys." A few days before he read this statement the present writer had been admitted to Groot Schuur by an unmistakably English footman. But it was exactly the kind of statement to influence foolish people in England, and it is amazing that when there was so much of importance that could be said accurately.
in favour of Mr. Rhodes, his supporters should have had recourse to imaginary trivialities. Such tactics create a revulsion of feeling in people who happen to know the facts. I quote what was evidently a slip of the memory in one of Mr. Rhodes's real friends, but it would not be hard to cite many deliberately misleading statements by less reputable men. He was, in fact, unhappy on the whole in his entourage. He had a few intimate friends, but, like Sir Robert Walpole, he seemed as a rule unable to find worthy subordinates.
It is quite impossible to enter into his political life, but one may be allowed to dwell upon one or two aspects or episodes in some detail. The two governing factors in the policy of an English Cape Colonist are, of course, the view he takes of the Dutch and the view he takes of the native. Now, as regards the Dutch, the miserable Raid, with all its recklessness and double-dealing, has probably to a great extent obscured Mr. Rhodes's real attitude. I believe that its permanent monument will be found in the creation of Rhodesia. Rhodesia is the only province in South Africa which has been founded by agreement between the two nationalities. Of course the South African Republic was opposed to it altogether from the first. But the Cape Dutch gave hearty support to the northern development, and when Mashonaland had been secured Dutchmen as well as Englishmen from all parts of South Africa entered the new province, and later on fought side by side against the Matabele. This was a very remarkable event. The Transvaal War in 1881 had aroused great enthusiasm amongst the Dutch in the Colony for the Boers, and it is probably safe to say that but for Mr. Rhodes's steady work the Cape Dutch would have been glad to see the North handed over to the South African Republic. As events turned out, Mr. Rhodes argued with success that the North was the heritage of the Cape. While he was extending the British Empire towards the Zambesi he was kept in office at Cape Town by Dutch voters. Ten years before, any one would have believed this impossible. Up to 1895 he was on excellent terms with the Orange Free State. He was able to draw that Republic into a Customs Convention and a railway agreement. But Dutch support was not to be had for nothing, and the bargain practically was that if the Cape Dutch co-operated in the extension of British dominions, they might have the internal affairs of Cape Colony managed very much as they wished. This tacit bargain was deeply resented by the English of the Eastern Province and Natal. Mr. Rhodes was believed to be the servant of the Bond. That is the real explanation of much of the enthusiasm which he aroused among English Colonials after 1895. They were so delighted to find that, after all, he was "all right" in his feelings towards Krugerism that they were willing to overlook much and to forget much. Very few people at home realise the absolute despondency into which loyal Englishmen had fallen after the Majuba surrender. England, apparently, not only did not care for their interests, she was indifferent to the disgrace of her arms and the repudiation of her pledges. What was a little skirmish, an unimportant modification of boundaries, to the British voter, was something very different to men in South Africa. Hence they were not in a mood to give full weight to consideràtions which some of us think more important than immediate successes when they saw an Englishman of great ability ranged definitely on the English side in a struggle which they believed inevitable. Mr. Rhodes entered public life very soon after 1881, but he certainly had no
deliberate purpose of revenge. He tried to make the Transvaal, like the Free State, a partner in his scheme of gradual federation. But he really had nothing to offer President Kruger. To an obstinate man who disliked and despised the English, who believed that an all-Dutch South Africa was possible in the near future, it was not very tempting to be allowed a junior partnersiip in a Confederation consolidated under the British flag. Mr. Rhodes was willing to give up Swaziland, and an outlet to the ocean; President Kruger would give notling in return. Mr. Rhodes was very much in the position of a great American financier who must either compel a rival to amalgamate, or smash him. But he had absolutely no racial animus. He liked the Dutch, up to a point he understood them marvellously (though in 1895 he certainly overestimated his own influence with them). He had a good deal of sympathy with men who were perpetually being called stupid and backward and narrowminded by ignoramuses fresh from England. We breed a terrible number of people to whom every language but English is gibberish, all foreign customs silly, and we have sent a good many of them to South Africa from time to time. In the free atmosphere of Colonial life men who would be to some extent kept in their places at home can and do expatiate freely. Mr. Rhodes knew that if you want to persuade a man to adopt better methods of farming, or to form sounder ideas of civic duty, you will not command success by telling him that he is a fool and cumbers the ground. There is a curious little book, "With Rhodes to Mashonaland," by a Dutch Member of the Cape Assembly, Mr. De Waal, which reveals unconsciously how and why Mr. Rhodes could do so much with the Dutch. They liked him so much, they trusted him so entirely, that his action in 1895 was felt by many of them as treachery unparalleled in history.
As regards the natives, Mr. Rhodes's views were certainly not those of Exeter Hall; but as certainly they were not those of Cortes or Pizarro, as some would have us believe. Perhaps they were not unlike Carlyle's view's of the black man. He knew from experience what a: utter farce the Kaffir franchise in Cape Colony has been, and he knew, as stay-at-home people do not, how very often a Kaffir may be justly described as "half devil and half child." But in his Glen Grey Act he made the first statesmanlike attempt to turn the Kaffir into a decent citizen.

So far I have tried to give some account of Mr. Rhodes as a factor in the local polities of South Africa. But he was interested in the British Empire as no South African? politician before him had been interested. To put things concisely, the great difference between Mr. Rhodes and many men with whom he had to work was that he had been to Oxford, and they had not; his brothers were officers in the Army, and theirs were not. He had close links with home, and he was probably more interested in the British Empire as a whole than in its South African Colonies, whither the accident of ill-health had led him: Of course he became to a great extent absorbed in Af-rica,-so absorbed that he chose for the execution of his Johannesburg schemes a moment at which our relations with the United States were dangerously strained. But he remained a keen observer of home affairs. His very exceptional position brought him into personal contact with men who are mere names to most Colonial politicians. He even attempted, as we know, to interfere in home politics; he contributed to Nationalist funds, subscribing to the support of a party that had preached
sedition and countenanced crime on the understanding that henceforth they would become Federalists instead of Separatists; he contributed to Liberal funds on an unauthorised assurance that Liberals would be good Imperialists. On the other hand, his legitimate influence probably counted for something in the retention of Uganda. He hoped to link North and South Africa by railway and telegraph lines, and the conception appealed to the public mind. He persuaded the De Beers Corporation, a purely financial syndicate, to help British expansion, and he came to the assistance of the British Central Africa Protectorate when the Imperial Government was lukewarm.

He went to Oxford later than most men, after some experience of the very unacademic life of Kimberley, and he was never at a public school. His masterfulness was therefore unchecked by some of the factors which mould most Englishmen of his class. Perhaps an old public school boy would have got on better with Sir Charles Warren in 1885, with Colonel Kekewich in 1900. A man with a higher sense of legality woald have shown more ecnsideration for Portugal twelve years ago. The Portuguese were in his way; he did not dislike or denounce them, they were playing legitimately for their hand,but they were, as Lord Byron said to his wife, damnably in his way.

Of the financial side of his career I am not competent to speak. Finance and politics are closely interwoven in Scuth Africa. Mines and railways, in normal times, occupy four-fifths of of the attention of the local Legislatures. Undoubtedly Mr. Rhodes's great wealth, added to his abilities, gave him something of the position of an American "boss" as well as the ordinary position of a political leader. But it is to be remembered that his wealth saved him from all danger of becoming a professional politician,-a class unpleasantly numerous in some parts of the Empire. It was of no direct concern to his pocket whether he was in or out of office. He made his money fairly at the diamond-fields, where he proved himself a better man of business than some very sharp and very shady practitioners. Inevitably he saw much of the seamy side of finance, and acquired undesirable hangers-on. It was a doubtful blessing for the Cape that its Premier was so intimately concerned with financial enterprises both within and outside its territories. He inspired a curious confidence in his fellow-men; chronic grumblers who cursed the Chartered Company and all its works cheered him when he spoke to them in Rhodesia. He was no orator, but he knew what he wished to say, and he said it. Unfortunate pawns crushed in the great game believed that "Rhodes would make it all right," and sometimes at least he was able to restore the balance upset by some of his satellites.

Mr. Rhodes was generous to all deserving public causes. He stands out at the Cape as a rich man who was completely unostentatious, indifferent to luxury, and always ready to support philanthropic and educational endeavours. He recognised the necessity of a teaching University for South Africa, and at one time he wished to build a College modelled exactly on the lines of Oriel. In his visits to Oxford he was probably seen at his best; he was genuinely interested in the progress of his old College,and he could talk delightfully to undergraduates. He did not think much of political economy, but he appreciated the educational value of the school of Literae Humaniores. "Practical" as he was, he cared genuinely for the things of the mind. The archaeological discoveries in Rhodesia fascinated him. He was keenly alive to the
charm of the past; he treasured the picturesque old Dutch architecture that lingers in and round Cape Town, and he encouraged-one might really say initiated-interest in the genealogical records of the Cape Dutch, of 'whom some spring from great families in Holland and France. His park under the slopes of Table Mountain was open to the public, and his collection of live animals is the only "Zoo" in the Colony.
It is with great misgivings that I venture to attempt this very slight account of Cecil Rhodes. I met him only twice, some years ago, for an hour or so, but the impression of his talk remains vivid. I have, however, had occasion to study carefully his political career, and I trust that, knowing myself merely an insignificant critic of one who has played such a great part in affairs, I have kept some sense of perspective. It is certain that there will be an outburst of blind eulogy which will do the dead man no service. To the best of my power I have written at his death nothing that I could not have written during his life.

## FRANCE'S FOREIGN TRADE.

The summary of returns of French foreign trade during the first two months of this year shows a remarkable inerease in the exports in comparison with those of the corresponding period of 1901 . The total amount was 691,565,000 francs, against $588,457,000$ franes last year, the difference being $103,108,000$ francs, or $171 / 2$ per cent. Rather more than fifty million francs of it falls under the head of raw materials, of which silk and wool constitute the principal items of export from France. The rest of the increase occurs in the category of manufactures. Until the fuller statistics are published it is hardly possible to form a distinct conjecture as to the particulars of this expansion, but much of it consists of silk goods sent to the United States and general manufactures to the French colonies. The exports of silk and woollen goods to Great Britain from France have fallen off appreciably in the last two months. The following are the figures for the two months.

## DOMINION FINANCES

The financial statement of the Dominion for the nine months, ending March 31 , shows the revenue to be $\$ 41$,351,818 , an increase of $\$ 3,433,801$ over last year. The ordinary expenditure was $\$ 30,914,135$, an increase of $\$ 2,286$,522. On capital account there was expended $\$ 8,837,457$, an increase of over one million dollars as compared with last year. The statement for the month of March was very satisfactory. There was an increase of over half a million dollars in the revenue, and a decrease of over $\$ 100$,000 in the ordinary expenditure; on capital the expenditure was only $\$ 482,579$, as against $\$ 1,175,671$ for March, 1901 , or a decrease of nearly $\$ 700,000$.

## FARM CROPS.

American farmers seeded last winter $32,000,000$ acres of winter wheat, an area $4,000,000$ acres in excess of that which they had reaped in the summer. This great planting, far surpassing any other in the history of American farming, will offset the damage done to the wheat crop by the long drought of the fall and winter, and careful inquiry in the wheat producing states gives reason to believe that the crop of this year will be as large as, if not a trifle larger, than the record-making erop of last year, despite all the losses that have been suffered. Washington authorities announced in December that the condition of winter wheat was 86.7 per cent., and with $32,000,000$ acreage, this would have meant a crop approaching $458,000,000$ bushels, against from $400,000,000$ to $425,000,000$ bushels harvested last year. All hope for such a huge yield has, however, passed. The drought of the fall and early winter had even then damaged the prospects very noticeably. As against the 86.70 per cent. which represented the condition then, December, 1900, showed 91.7 per cent. and December, 1899, showed the same figure. Kansas has lost 1,000,000 acres of the $5,883,000$ acres with which it started
the season, and Oklahoma, Texas and Kentucky have also lost. The condition for all these states is low, Kansas being given as only 70, as against 105 last year. The condition of the whole Pacific Coast is ideal, and Missouri, Illinois, and Nebraska all promise high yields. Missouri's acreage has increased by 800,000 acres.

## AN AUTOMOBILE FOR WAR.

A cable announces that the British War Office is experimenting with motor war cars. Simms' motor war car, equipped with armor plates and a number of guns, and described as a sort of a land battleship, was made to his order by Messrs. Vickers, Sons \& Maxim. The frame of the car is rectangular and of heavy steel. The car supports a maximum load of twelve tons. Its over-all dimensions are 17 feet by 6.2 feet, and its engine is of sixteen estimated horse power. It has a four-cylinder hydrocarbine engine of the Dalmer type. The fuel is petroleum, and the store tank enables it to cover two hundred miles without replenishing. It has four rates of speed, one and a half miles, three, five and nine miles per hour, which can be increased by 25 per cent. by an accelerator. The ear is driven and steered by one man.
The frame is entirely enveloped in Vickers steel six millimetrees thick. This screen is a crinoline-shaped ram fore and aft. The extreme length of the armor is 28 feet. The beam is 8 feet, and the height 10 feet. The cars are constructed for use both on railways and open roads. The one which the War Office inspector examined carried two Maxim guns and one pompom, and ran pactically without noise. Its one drawback can be easily rectified. It is that the men on board are not sheltered.

## CANADIAN PROSPECTS BRIGHT.

A shrewd observer stated some fifteen years ago that the Canadian North-West would show rapid gains in population immediately the States directly to the south got fairly well peopled. This has not only come to pass but the very people who helped fill those States are -many of them-now seeking homes across the Canadian border, seeing that if they wait a few years more the price of land may be greatly advanced, if not entirely taken up. The following correspondence from Winnipeg to the Globe, we reprint, seeing in it a fair estimate of conditions as they present themselves to the man who looks out upon the broad, fertile prairie lands and sees in their near future the granary of the world's wheat supply
"With time and myself there are two of us," said Philip U. of Spain, as he looked abroad over the world, watching the fruition of his great projects of empire. With time and myself there are ten of us, is the mental attitude of the western Canadian to-day. Looking out upon the City of Winnipeg, the nerve centre of the west, one can see on every hand evidence of this belief in the strength that time will bring. Great mercantile blocks, newly completed, some not yet finished, break the skyline in all directions; streets are so wide that the car tracks are like narrow bands, and the cars that would bulk so largely on an Eastern thoroughfare seem dwarfed and diminutive. In the stores there is buying on an unprecedented scale, the turnover of some of the larger merchants being almost upon a Christmas holiday basis. Everywhere expansion, everywhere hope. Not the hope that chases that most elusive of all bubbles, a boom in town lots. Winnipeg has seen bubbles of that variety burst and wants no second lesson. The pendulum is swinging rather the other way, for a business man said to-day that he was under the necessity of sending his family east for the summer because he could not rent a suitable house, and the early completion of a new one was an unlikely event owing to the scarcity of labor.

Not the hope that every steamer that touches at Halifax or St. John and later at Montreal during the immigration season will bring hundreds of new settlers from the motherland and continental Europe. The volume of intending settlers from across the Atlantic is steadily growing, it is true, and the sources are constantly expanding. On the desk of the Commissioner of Immigration, I find to-day -for example-telegrams announcing the approach of some "mixed lots," as they say in the office. "Ex Tunisian," runs a message, " 340 English, 16 Scotch, 15 Trish, 9 French, 5 Galicians, 9 Swedes, 17 Norwegians, 19 Finns, 4 Danes." Truly a mixed lot. We passed them on a siding at White River yesterday, and their costumes proclaimed the wide diversity of their origin. Another message tells
of the coming of over 200 Scotch, who landed from the Sardinian.
The stream is growing, and at least 7,000 from the British Isles will arrive this season, and a much larger number, how many cannot yet be well estimated, from the continent. But it is not by these that the west hopes to make good its claim to greatness, welcome as they are. For the most part these immigrants are, like Abraham, going out, "not knowing whither they go," but with faith that the new world will afford them a home. Ninety per cent. have no relatives in Canada, and a very large proportion are not in a position to take up homesteads at once. The department does much to smooth the rough places for them. Representative farmers, the Boards of Trade in the smaller towns, and the Government agents are on the lookout for men wanted, and hundreds are thus provided for. The wages for the new and inexperienced are from $\$ 8$ to $\$ 10$ a month, and very soon the men, if of the right stamp, make their own way. The Ontario contingent, composed of farmers, who are very largely homesteaders, is rather less than usual this spring, the buoyant condition of things there providing an opening in the towns for the boys who will not stay on the farm.

The hope of the Canadian west to-day is not in growth from within nor in the transatlantic sources of population. All eyes are turned to the south. The land-hunger of the American, the master passion that, after he had firmly estabished himself on the Atlantic seaboard at Charleston, and Annapolis, at New York and in New England three centuries ago, sent him into the wods of Maine, up the Hudson, across the Alleghanies, and finally, in the greatest migratory rush of history, over the plains of the mid-west, is again upon him, and Alberta and Assiniboia look like a satisfactory meal. Assinboia has fifty-eight million acres, with a fairly large proportion of first-rate wheat land. Alberta is an empire 500 miles by 300 in extent.

A large meal, somebody says, even for the land-hungry American. A large meal, no doubt, but the gentleman at the table has an appetite of no mean sort. Just think for a moment of some of his former achievements; of l)aio and Iowa and Missouri and Illinois and Kansas and Nebraska, and then of the last great meal, Minnesota and the Dakotas. As for Oklahoma, that was but a light iunch taken at the counter.
He has nothing left in his own larder worth sitting down to, and he is hungry again. An American who said he had been picking up a few improved farms around Winnipeg us a little personal investment said to-day that there were in Iowa alone, according to the 1900 census, 350,000 rented farms, and that the rush itno Canada could in no way be stayed. The most significant sign of the times is the formation of great syndicates of American capitalists, who are buying land in blocks to sell again to intending set-

tlers in their own States. The business is what is known as "quick turn," the profit being from $\$ 1$ to $\$ 2$ an acre.
Perhaps the section in which for the moment there is most activity and into which the rush will be greatest this season is that on the Soo line, between Estevan and Moose Jaw, in southeastern Assiniboia. This line comes up from St. Paul, through North Dakota, and is the first west of the Manitoba boundary, along which there are large tracts of vacant land. The first inkling of the influx was given by the purchase of 200,000 acres along the line by the Am-erican-Canadian Land Company of Minneapolis. The next was the withdrawal of the C.P.R. land maps and the issue of new ones. It is 167 miles from North Portal at the boundary to Moose Jaw. A land map, issued on July 24, 1901, by the C.P.R., showed that the company's lands were for sale at $\$ 3$ per acre, with the exception of three or four sections adjacent to the stations. A map of January 15,1902 , shows the land marked from $\$ 4$ to $\$ 7$ per acre, the ruling quotation being $\$ 6.25$. A map of March 5th, 1902, shows no price at all, which means that the price is now a matter of individual bargaining.
It must be remembered that the country now spoken of is very sparsely settled, and that accommodation for the incoming land buyer is of the most primitive condition. The Department of Immigration is doing everything possible to aid the settlers. At Estevan tents have been erected to shelter them. At Halbrite, 109 miles south of Moose Jaw, where a Winnipeg syndicate is pushing the sale of 170,000 acres of land, tents, and stoves, etc., are provided. At Miestone, where the big American land syndicate is operating, there are also temporary shelters, while Moose Jaw itself, although boasting a fine hotel, has its accommodation enlarged by a huge circus tent 82 by 42 feet. At all these stations, and as many more, it is already known that there will be hundreds of arrivals this summer, the immigrants in almost all cases being practical farmers, bringing their stock and implements. The settlements will run out probably over twenty miles on each side of the track. That this is not an excessive distance is quite evident when it is remembered that on the Calgary \& Edmonton line in Alberta homestead entries have recently been made as much as 61 miles east of the railway. In the case of the settlers on the Soo line to the east there may be a disposition to spread out far enough to get within range of the projected extension from Arcola to Regina,
through what I was told to-day is a most fertile part of the Territory.

It is interesting to hear the man on the street discuss the size of the American invasion this year. Listening to some of the more enthusiastic, one would imagine that the whole seventy-five millions were moving down on us like one of the Rocky Mountain glaciers. Even men otherwise sane talk of 200,000 . "That," said the Commissioner of Immigration, "is all nonsense, and I tell people so who say it. I know what it means to handle 1,000 people, and the men who talk of a migration in such numbers do not. Last year we had 18,000 immigrants, the bulk of them 9. ing direct upon their own farms. This year all our agents report at least double the number coming, so it is safe to estimate 36,000 American citizens as settlers in 1902. Even in January, when there were two feet of snow on the ground, 630 American citizens came in, and in February there were 930 . For March the total would be about 4,000 , perhaps more, and the rush is beginning now."
These figures are sufficiently remarkable to attract attention, without destroying their value by exaggeration. They furnish a series of propositions in mathematics that railway builders, elevator men, merchants, and those engaged in industrial enterprise are trying to solve. How shall the grain in these great new sections be hauled out, where stored, and by whom marketed; Where will hese settlers get their implements, their thoroughbred stock, such of them as go in for mixed farming, and where their general supplies? We may be very sure that the manufacturers and merchants of the northwestern States will follow them up and seek to retain their trade, tariff or no tariff. Here is a problem for the manufacturers of the east. Winnipeg will do all it can to sell them Canadian goods commercially as well as geographically. In woollens, in boots and shoes, in fine imported dry goods, our position is safe, but the implement manufacturer and the hardware man must fight for this market. It is worth fighting for, and the fight should begin now by putting before the newcomers the best implements that can be manufactured. The tariff alone will not do the trick, and it will be folly to charge all the tariff will permit. That is not how new markets are won. The 18,000 of last year become the 36,000 of this year, and the stream is only beginning to flow. Wait till it cuts a channel for itself.

By the way, we have looked on Manitoba as peculiarly

our own offspring, and so it is. Ontario's dominance, however, is passing away, and the west of ten years hence will be peopled largely by the native-born and the American. One of the best things we in Ontario can do for the strengthening of Canadian nationality is to wipe out that north shore as it stands to-day. We must get behind that frowning face turned to Lake Superior and settle irp the great clay belt toward James Bay. North of the C.P. R. track there are said to be $16,000,000$ acres of good land and spruce forests illimitable. In those forbidding shore ranges there is probably copper and iron ore enough to make the region more famous than Montana and the Mesaba range of Minnesota.

Ontario can do much to keep the new generation in the west in touch with old Canada by bending every energy to the exploration and settlement of this great intervening. space that remains to-day, except for the daring work of the railway engineers, much as it was when the first white man coasted around its repelling headlands.

## CHEMICALS

A Manchester, Eng., review of the chemical trade for the month of March is as follows: "We cannot report any improvement. Business has been slow and disappointing both as to quantity and results. The markets seem to be waiting an indefinite something to instil life into them, and for the moment it is difficult to determine from what point the impetus is to come. The quietness is intensified by the Easter holidays, towards which consumers have been working for the reduction of stocks or by the most restricted of buying. It may reasonably be expected there will be a little spurt presently, if only to replace supplies, but there is no promise of anything beyond this so long as the staple trades are themselves suffering from slackness of demand. In the meantime, the spring is now far advanced, and manufacturers are finding greater difficulty and some inconvenience in contractors postponing deliveries due to them or else reselling these deliveries, to the general weakness of values. An interesting function during ing the month was the semi-public exhibition of the plant of the Electrolytic Company for the making of bleach, bicarbonate of soda, and soda crystals, at Middlewich. There was a concrete opinion among those present-expert or
otherwise - that the process was at once the most simple, efficient and economical yet invented. In the shipping branch there is also a lack of improvement which the late reversions of rates has rather intensified. The export figures for bleaching materials and sulphate of copper in their marked decreases are by no means compensated for by the increase in soda compounds. On the other hand, the imports of chemicals show an increase, notwithstanding that the ice-bound conditions of some of the northern European ports interfered with trade.
Bleaching powder has commanded a steady attention. but without animation, makens being engaged on contract orders mostly. Caustic sodas of the higher strength are in fair demand. The lower strengths, on the other hand, are rather difficult to sell, and prices seem to depend upon the exigencies of the seller. Ammonia soda is une anged. Sulphate of copper has been in very limited request, eonsidering the time of the year. Still, stocks are low, as nakers have only provided for orders actually booked. Su?phate of iron has a steady enquiry. Chlorates have been neglected. Coal tar products are heavily depressed all round, with the single exception of pitch, which is sought for Sulphate of ammonia and nitrate of soda are dearer and fairly active, both for prompt and forward delivery. Bichromates, prussiates, lead products, acetate of lime, and wood naphthas are very moderately enquired for. Arsenic is in quiet demand, with a tendency to lower prices.

## DATRY PRODUCE.

A private London circular, date 27 th ult., treating of the dairy produce situation, says: Butter.-There has been a slowness in demand due to the near approach of the holidays, which, coinciding with the end of the month, has added to the causes retarding business. After Easter more trade is expected. There is a further fall to be recorded in New Zealand butter, of which choicest is now standing at 104 s to 106 s per ewt., the bulk of the sales being at 106s; finest makes 100 s to 102 s . A further illustration of the peculiar position of the Colonial butter market is shown by this continued fall in values while Danish is rising weekly. Three weeks ago Danish and New Zealand were alike in price. In London to-day Danish is 114 s and New alike in price. In London to-day Damis, the other rising

week by week. The Papanui arrived to-day from New Zealand with about 30,000 boxes of butter on board, but will not commence discharging before next Tuesday morning.

Although the Danish market has been improving for the last three weeks, the Official Quotation remains unchanged. Last week a large amount of Siberian butter arrived, but it is stated that this is an accumulation caused by an accidental difficulty of transit, and not the actual opening of the new season, which will not be for some weeks. The Department of Agriculture has issued a preliminary statement of the estimated crops of the United Kingdom for 1901, and from this it appears that the shortage of hay from permanent pastures was about $1,724,000$ tons in Great Britain, and 415,000 tons in Ireland, making a total of 2,139,000 tons.

Cheese.-There a good fair demand for cheese, both Canadian and New Zealand, Choicest quality of Canadian is selling at 55 s to 56 s per ewt., and finest at 52 s to 53 s , but relatively these are not such good value as choicest. New Zealand cheese of choicest brands first Government grade brings 54 s and finest brands of second Government grade 50s to 52s. Corresponding week last year choicest Canadian was quoted at 46 s to 48 s and finest at 44 s to 45 s .

## THE LINEN TRADE.

There has not been any expansion of demand for linens of any description during the past week. Sellers report that orders coming forward, although on a moderate scale, are taken at full market price, and little trouble has been found in securing these prices. The market has shown no material change in prices locally so far as goods on hand are concerned, but the constantly upward tendeney of foreign markets makes it somewhat difficult to do business for forward delivery.

The foreign markets continue to combat against the scarcity of raw material. Manufacturers who would be willing to run a full product are not always able to do so, and according to the latest advices the output of both yarns and linen fabrics is being somewhat curtailed on that account. The prospects are for a short production this year, and unless the demand should be tempered in accordance therewith importers are unable to see how prices here can be kept from advancing. At present the goods 'affected the most are low and medium grade aamasks, crashes and housekeeping goods. Agents report that on new orders cabled abroad advances have been demanded and paid for these goods.
Meanwhile goods on hand are selling by importers at about previous prices. It seems to be the intention of some to hold over good lots as leaders for next season, as jobbers realize that they will wot be able to replace their precent stocks at old prices.

## THE PHILIPPINES-U.S. TARIFF.

The Directors of The Merchants' Association of New York, at their recent meeting, among other things, considered the subject of a reduction in the Philippine tariff on exports from the Philippines to the United States and on goods going from the United States to the Philippines. They adopted a resolution on this subject expressing the hope that a liberal reduction would bring about better commercial relations and lead to the pacification of the Island, and authorized the President to appoint a committee of three to take such action as might be deemed best looking toward the reduction desired. The Directors also discussed the subject of taxation, and adopted the following resolutions: "Resolved, That the Committee on City Conditions investigate the system of taxation now in force in this State and city and report what action should be

Asiatic markets have also been characterized this week by a firmer tone and an increase of activity. A cable from Canton reported free buying for American and European account on a basis of Mexican dollars 840 for extra As, and advising that 250 bales had been contracted for. Mail advices just to hand from Shanghai confirm that forward contracts in steam filatures new season's silks amount to over 600 bales on the basis of 810 taels for Kaee Chong No. 1. Cables from Yokohama report the market more active and prices firmer on the basis of 910 Mexican dollars for filatures Kaimeisha and 920 Mexican dollars for re-reels, No. 1, five-chop girls.

-Canada's revenue continues to climb steadily upwards. For the nine months ending March 31 it amounted to $\$ 41$,351,818 , an increase of $\$ 3,433,801$ over the same period of last year. For the month of March only the receipts were $\$ 4,785,210$, or nearly half a million more than for the same month of 1901. The ordinary expenditure reached a total of $\$ 30,914,135$, which was $\$ 10,347,683$ less than the ordinary receipts, but $\$ 2,286,000$ more than the disbursements of the preceding nine months. The expenditure for the month, however, is $\$ 115,698$ less than it was a year ago. The total capital expenditure for the nine months was $\$ 8,837,451$, which reduces the surplus in ordinary receipts over ordinary revenue to $\$ 1,600,000$. The capital expenditure for the nine months increased by $\$ 1,536,000$ over that of 1901 . For the month of March, however, there is a decrease of $\$ 693$, 000 . The following are the details of the revenue for the nine months:

-London cables of the 8th inst. advise that a special order was issued on that date to the customs staffs of all the ports of the United Kingdom, forbidding them to issue the usual order for entry to all vessels carrying free goods. This applies not only to timber, but to all cargoes at present free of duty. The customs authorities are reticent on the subject of this comprehensive regulation, but the general character of the order is believed to be intended to ensure secrecy regarding the intentions of the Chancellor of the Exchequer, Sir Michael Hicks-Beach. That his budget proposals will be unusually important, is indicated by the fact announced in the House of Commons by the Government leader, A. J. Balfour, that the budget will occupy the House both Thursday and Friday. Mr. Balfour's announcement that the budget will be debated for two days is regarded as indlicating a very controversial budget. All kinds of rumors are afloat but according to the best opinions the Chancellor of the Exchequer, Sir Michael Hicks-Beach, will not depart from his traditional free trade policy. The war expenditure is estimated at $£ 40,000,000$, as against $£ 60,000,000$ last year, while the grant to the New South African colonies is only $£ 1,800,000$, as against $£ 6,000,000$ last year. Altogether Sir Michael Hicks-Beach
has to meet an estimated expenditure of $£ 171,000,000$, as against $£ 197,000,000$ last year. It is expected that the Chancellor will endeavor to raise $£ 6,000,000$ by additional taxation, bringing the revenue, roughly speaking, up to $£ 150,000,000$, and that he will provide the remainder by a loan for the interest on which he may possibly tap the resources of the Transvaal. A rumor is current that besides timber, iron ore will also be taxed.
-A Berlin dispatch istates that the Government has been placed in a most awkward position, on the prohibition of the importation of meat treated with boracic acid by a recent declaration of the Society for the Protection of the Interests of the German Chemical Industry, that the Government did not consult the Imperial Health Council. This body, composed of eminent specialists from all parts of Germany, is advisory to the Imperial health office. The Government's statement in the North German Gazette, recently, affirms that the council was unanimously for prohibition. It now appears, according to the chemical society, that the matter was never brought before the council. A prominent member of the council informed the Imperial Secretary of State for the Interior, Count Von PosadowskyWehner, prior to the publication of the statement in the North German Gazette, that he was surprised that so important a step had been taken without consulting the council, which was decidedly against prohibition.
-A Brockville, Ont., letter states that Messrs. A. D. Dowd, G. E. Smith, and G. E. Sleeper, of Boston, Mass., and John Carson, Kingston, who are interested in the construction of the electric railway from Toronto to Cornwall, were in town this week looking over the proposed route. These gentlemen represent between $\$ 6,000,000$ and $\$ 8,000$,000 of capital, which is behind the scheme, and the object of this trip is to get a general idea of the route to be traversed, ascertalin the feeling of the people towards the line and satisfy themselves as to its prospects and possibilities. They were very much encouraged with what they have seen and heard, and it is the intention to commence construction as soon as possible. It is hoped to have some portions of the line in operation next fall.

-A despatch from Bagdad says that an Australian millionaire has obtained an important concession to work the oil belt in Southern and South-Western Persia. Surveying has begun for a pipe line 360 miles long from Kerkah Valley to Mohammerah. The oil is believed to be purer than the Russian and to be in abundant quantity. There are, however, drawbacks to the enterprise, not only in the climate, badly unsettled country and wild tribes, but in possible international complications. The belt follows the Kerkah Valley to beyond Bushire, and the starting point of the pipe is at Kasrishirin, in Zohab. The latter is disputed territory on the Turko-Persian boundary, which has never been demarcated. Moreover, this enterprise will create rivalry to the Russian industry which supplies most of the oil in the Southern Persia and Gulf regions.
-A London cable of the 7th instant reports that extraordinary meetings were held on that date of the Metropolitan Railway Company and the Oldbury Waggon Company at Birmingham, to consider a proposal for amalgamation with the Ashbury Waggon Company, of Manchester, and other companies. The idea of the new proposal is to form something in the nature of a trust among railway waggon builders, of which these companies are the chief in England. Mr. Hodgkinson, who presided, pointed out that they were threatened with serious American and German competition. The Americans were already extensively supplying dining and drawing room cars and tram cars in this country, and they now contemplated either starting carriage building works in that district or acquiring existing works, as the nucleus of a great Anglo-American combination. Mr. Hodgkinson announced that the capital of the new amalgamated company would be $£ 972,000$. The average profit of the concerns affected had been during the past three years, $£ 124,000$ per year. This was sufficient to pay an addition of 10 per cent. upon the capital to give the company a margin of $£ 53,000$.

- London advices state that arrangements have been consummated for the purpose of combining the interests of several of the large British manufacturers of passenger.
and freight cars, both for railroad and tramway use. Agreements are said to have been signed by which six companies, comprising the Metropolitan, Brown, Marshall \& Co., the Oldbury, the Ashbury and two other Manchester companies are amalgamated. As to the histories of the concerns, the Metropolitan was registered in 1886 with a capital of $\$ 750,000$; Brown, Marshall \& Co., was floated in 1897 with a capital of $\$ 500,000$, and was a reconstruction of a company of the same name; the Oldbury Co. is the oldest of the English midland concerns, having been registered in 1886 with a capital of $\$ 700,000$. Each of the companies paid a dividend of 15 per cent. last year.

Industrial enterprise has plenty of room to expand in the Philippines. A Washington letter states that responding to a resolution of inquiry the Secretary of War sent to the Senate a communication giving information concerning steam railroads in the Philippine Islands. He says that there is only one line of importance in the islands, from Manila to Dagupan; but there is a steam tramway from Manila to Malabon, via Calcoocan and also two short private lines connecting coal mines in the island of Cebu with the coast. He also mentions that before their surrender of the sovereignty of the Philippines the Spaniards had begun the construction of a military line from Iligan to Lake Lanao, in the Island of Mindanao, but that they sold the material.
-The winding up of the National Cigar Company of Toronto is asked for by Alexander Livingston, the President of the company. The company was incorporated in June, 1898, with a capital stock of $\$ 20,000$ in 200 shares of $\$ 100$ each, of which 76 were paid up. The petitioner states that the liabilities are about $\$ 5,500$ and assets $\$ 3,000$, and he alleges that A. C. McGregor, who was practically the manager of the company, left Toronto last February, ostensibly for Kingston, but the petitioner states that he has since learned he went to the United States. From November, 1900, to 1901, the business of the company showed a deficiency of $\$ 1,282$, and last February the factory at 11 Francis street was closed up.

-At a recent special meeting of the directors of the Michigan Central Railroad Company it was voted to execute a mortgage with the Guarantee Trust Company for $\$ 18,000,000$. The new bonds will be at the rate of $31 / 2$ per cent. and will run fifty years. It is intended to use $\$ 10$,000,000 of this issue to refund bonds of the Michigan Central which mature on May 1. Of these maturing bonds about $\$ 8,000,000$ now bear 7 per cent. interest and $\$ 2,000,0005$ per cent. interest, so that the saving on this operation will be over $\$ 300,000$ yearly. The remaining $\$ 8,000,000$ of the new bonds are to be held subject to future betterments and enlargements as the Board of Directors may determine. The Michigan Central for the year ending December 31st, 1901, showed net earnings of $\$ 3,756,000$, which after rentals and dividends at the rate of 4 per cent. left the surplus for the year of about $\$ 237,000$, this being an increase of about $\$ 230$,000 for the year. For some time past all betterments and improvements to the road have been charged to operating expenses, which accounts in part for the small surplus, left after dividends of 4 per cent. per annum on its $\$ 18,738,000$ capital stock, which is all of one class. Of this amount over $\$ 16,600,000$ is owned by the New York Central \& Hudson River Railroad Company.
-The list of creditors of Messrs. Cadieux \& Derome, stationers ,etc., Montreal, referred to in last issue, bas been filed. There are 177 creditors, the total amount reaching nearly $\$ 100,000$. The assets consist of stock in trade and fixtures of the firm's place of business, and some real estate, the personal property of Mr. L. J. A. Derome, upon whom, however, a personal demand of assignment has been made by La Banque Nationale, and contested. The principal creditors are: The Hochelaga Bank, indirect and secured, $\$ 26,000$; Bourret Estate, $\$ 11,981$; Watson, Foster \& Co., Limited, $\$ 10,925$; Geo. H. Hees, Son \& Co., Toronto, $\$ 3,147$; Cie Imprimerie Moderne, Montreal, $\$ 2,738$; Alf. Mame \& Fils, Tours, France, $\$ 1,497$.
-A story was current in London, Ont., recently that twenty-four Cardoc farmers had been fleeced by two men representing themselves as travellers for a Toronto steel range concern. It is stated that these fellows went through the township ostensibly to sell a very desirable style of stove or range. When the farmer's declined to buy, the agents made a proposition to each in turn, offering them
at first, $\$ 2$ and then $\$ 2.50$ a day, to drive them through the country. An agreement being produced each signed it. The document, however, was not an agreement to drive the agents for a stated sum, but an agreement to pay $\$ 64$ for a steel range.
-The British Consul at Havre reports that the importations of American bituminous coal, which were notable in 1900, have now entirely ceased, notwithstanding a reduction in freights, by which American coal can be delivered at Havre at practically the same price as British coal. The Consul explains as the reason for this that the importers prefer British coal because it contains a greater proportion of larger pieces than the American, which is much more friable than the British.

-The Liverpoool customs officials, acting under instructions from the Government, have, we are informed, visited the bonded warehouses and forbidden further deliveries of sugar, of which there are heavy stocks in the stores. The action is taken to indicate that there will be an increase in the sugar duties in the budget.--Newcastle-onT'yne, April 7.-The customs authorities here to-day refused to issue the usual order enabling timber vessels arriving to discharge their cargoes. This is interpreted as meaning that the Government intends to place a duty on timber imports.
-The Quebee and Lake Huron Railway Company has been organized, and work will begin in the near future. At a meeting held in the city of Quebec this week, the following officers were elected: President, Hon. Frank Campbell, Bath, N.Y.; Vice-President, Hon. Adelard Turgeon, Quebec; Treasurer, Mr. Henry G. Hablo, New York; Secretary, Hon. Charles Langlois, Quebec; Directors; Roger Larue, John D. Cameron, Quebec; John N. Drake, New York; Hon. Senator Landry, Quebec; Hon. Solicitor-General Henry G. Carroll, Fraserville.

in his 56th year, of Thomas C. Bulmer, for some time one of the largest and most prosperous real estate owners in our western suburb. In return for this concession the Government will be given control over freight and passenger rates as a guarantee that the interest of the country through which the road passes will not suffer.
-It is announced at Liverpool that the beef trust of Chicago will shortly try to raise the price of meat in England by controlling the despatch of American beef to that side of the Atlantic. The Post says that for the first time probably on record a cattle ship has left an Ameriean port without live cattle on board, this being part of the

-An Ottawa letter states that there was excitement in Hull this week over the voting on the $\$ 73,000$, and as a result of the big vote cast it was carried by a majority of 166. The purpose of the by-law is to raise money for extensions of waterworks, pumphouse, electric light, and other improvements. The other by-law to raise $\$ 30,000$ to meet debentures coming due carried without opposition.
-A Melbourne, Victoria, cable announces that the Decimal Coinage Committee's report has been submitted to the Federal House of Representatives. It recommends the adoption of the decimal system, based on the sovereign, deprecates the estabishment of a Commonwealth Mint and recommends that branches of the Imperial Mint supply the coins, and that the Commonwealth receive a seigniorage on silver and copper.
-The Liverpool Journal of Commerce states that a new steamiship line is to be established between Liverpool and South African ports with sailings also from Glasgow. There will be no reduction in freight rates, however, as an amicable agreement has been established with the Clan line management. The Clan line is now controlled by J. R. Ellerman, formerly chairman of the Leyland line.
-A recent Berlin cable announces that subscriptions to the Russian loan were closed there on the 3rd instant. The loan was very greatly over-subscibed. The total Russian loan is $393,000,000$ marks. Of this amount $300,000,000$ marks were offered for subscription in Germany, Holland and Russia. The loan is free from taxation; it is at 4 per cent. and the issue price was at $971 / 2$ per cent.
-The contractors for the erection of the pier for the Lower Traverse lighthouse, are pushing the work rapidly, and hope to have the pier in readiness to be placed in position about the 1st of June next. The pier is to be built on a new plan, not in the form of an ordinary crib, but rather after the design of an air ship, and it is said to be the first of its kind introduced in Canada.
-Mr. J. A. Ruddick, chief of the Government Dairy Department, has called a conference of all the dairymen in

the Dominion for April 29th and 30th. The object of the conference is to discuss prevailing systems of manufacture, and also to arrive at a more uniform method of dairying, which may be carried on in future. This conference will bring about thirty-five dairymen to the city.
-A Berlin cable announces that the Telegraph Department, of the Imperial Posts has decided to adopt the Rowland invention, by which four telegrams can be sent simultaneously in each direction at a speed of from 300 to 350 words per minute, instead of 145 words, at at present. The apparatus will be immediately employed in Berlin and Hamburg.
-Announcement has been made at Kalamazoo, Mich., of the organization in Georgia of the Southern States Portland Cement Co., with a capital of $\$ 2,000,000$. W. F. Cowham, of Jackson, Mich., is president of the company, in which a number of Michigan and Canadian capitalists are interested. The offices of the company will be in Atlanta and the plant at Rock Mar, Ga.
-President Hodge, of the South Shore Railway, is at present considering figures for the work of extending the road from Sorel to Chaudiere, where connections will be made with the Intercolonial Railway. The work consists of about seventy miles, and eight bridges, and will involve an expenditure of about $\$ 2,000,000$.
-The St. John, N.B., City Council has adopted the following estimates of expenditure for the year: Interest and sinking fund, $\$ 88,497$; exhibition, etc., $\$ 636$; free public libraries, $\$ 2,650$; common schools, $\$ 92,124$; sewerage maintenance, $\$ 9,000$; police, 26,500 ; fire, $\$ 22,200$; street lighting, $\$ 21$,750 ; street department, $\$ 50,000$; total, $\$ 325,357$.
-The Sanford Company, Hamilton, Ont., has received the
contract to make 4,000 tunics, and 4,000 riding breeches for the fourth contingent. The cloth will be supplied by Boyd, Caldwell \& Co., of the Clyde Woollen Mills, Lanark. The order must be completed in one month from receipt.
-It is announced at London that the Weardale Steel and Coal Company has decided to consolidate and remodel its works on American lines. It will expend $£ 50,000$ for an improved plant, and will remove its works from Spenny Moor to Cargofleet on the River Tee.
-After eighteen months' study of the German administration system, three Japanese named Mori, Nakamiro and Asabina have returned home with the purpose of introducing German methods in the administration of the Island of Formosa.

Montreal St., a few sales at 271 to $2713 / 4$; Toronto St., $1181 / 4$; Twin City, $1201 / 4$ to $1211 / 4$; Montreal Power, $1011 / 2$ to 102 . Montreal Telegraph is quoted at 165 ; Richelieu \& Ont., 115; Commercial Cable, 150; Montreal Cotton, 123; Dominion, 493/4. Banks: Montreal, 260; Ontario, 134; Molsons, 206; Royal, 180. Further gold remittances are going out from New York. In London the market is flat. A new loan is expected of $\$ 200,000,000$ in the form of Consols, some of which may come to this side. A syndicate has been formed to spend $\$ 25,000,000$ in extending underground railways in London. This year the volume of new loans and companies issued in England has gone past all records, which is hardly a sign of Britain's being financially hardup. ## MONTREAL WHOLESALE MARKETS.

Thursday, April 10, 1902.
The great influx of settlers to Manitoba, the North-West Territories and New Ontario is naturally infusing new life into all branches of trade and industry. Nor can this afford to be overlooked. It remains for the capitalists and leading merchants of Canada to now cope with what will be the added necessities of the near future, shown in a pretty fair way by the necessities following the crops of last fall. In prices the past week shows but few changes. Flour is lower, but this is always a quiet month, the heavy movement having preceded it. Dairy products are well sustained in price with a good export movement. The chief feature has been the heavy drop in turpentine, which after repeated advances has suddenly declined 6 c per gallon. Hardware in in brisk movement, but prices show no change. Groceries are steady as to values with the usual fair movement. Leather is quiet locally but the movement to England continues good. Dry goods are in good request, the early opening of summer conditions hurrying the demand for light weaves.

## BUTTER.

There has been considerable business passing with a good demand for dairy

April delivery was $3 / 4 \mathrm{~d}$ lower, at 6 s $51 / 4 \mathrm{~d}$, but May was unchanged at 6s 6d; cane was unchanged. It is generally expected that the budget, which will be announced to-day will provide for a higher rate of import duty on sugar into the United Kingdom. The stock of raw sugar in the four ports of the United Kingdom is 220,000 tons, showing an increase for the week of 1,000 tons. The New York market was dull and unchanged. Sugar could have. been purchased on the basis of $31 / 2 \mathrm{c}$ for centrifugal 96 deg . test, but the best bids that refiners were openly making were on the basis of $33 / \mathrm{cc}$ for ditto. The supply of sugar on offer was limited, as the recent purchases by refiners have fairly well cleaned the market for the present. Importers were ordering their arrivals of unsold sugar into store rather than sell at a concession from $31 / 2$ c. Later in the day a sale was reported of 70 tons muscovado 89 deg . test, at $215-16 \mathrm{c}$.
showing a decline in prices of $1-16 \mathrm{c}$. Centrifugals were quoted nominally unchanged at $31 / 2 \mathrm{c}$. Advices from the other side state that Tarragona almonds are higher. The Malaga market for Valencias is urmer. Sicily filberts in the primary market, have shown a decidedly easier tendency during the week. It is reported that shipments from Sicily in February were almost 1,000 bags, but still leaving heavy supplies in that quarter of about 11,500 bags. The Greek currant market has again fallen off slightly, and several of the largest exporters in that country have expressed the opinion that lowest prices have been touched. A steamer is mentioned as expected in Greece to load about the middle of the month. Mail advices, referring to the frost, report that damage is not serious and in only certain localities. It is apparent from the action of the Greek market that the reported damage is of no importance. The English markets are advised as unchanged, with a fair business doing, but with stocks somewhat larger than those carried during the last normal year. Canned

A report dated 9 th instant says: The stringency of supplies keeps foundry grades very firm, and in some sections steadily increasing prices have to be paid for anything deliverable within the next six months. This applies to Southern as to Northern iron, although the principal Alabama furnaces continue to


quote on the basis of $\$ 12$ for No. 2 at the furnace. The output of foundry iron by Virginia furnaces is being curtailed owing to the greater profit offered by basic iron as a result of the very heavy demand. Pitsbirg mail advices assert that the effect of the recent 300,000 -ton purchase of Bessemer cannot fail to be beneficial to the iron market as a whole and is likely to cause a rush of orders for billets and finished products, as buyers, having the assurance that prices are to be no lower for many months to come, will not hesitate to contract for material in advance. In fact, according to some reports, there is already a marked increase in the demand for steel billets, a number of lots selling at $\$ 31$ to $\$ 32$ Pittsburg. The demand for small lots of foundry iron for immedi-
ate delivery continues unabated, and buyers have as much if not more difficulty in finding sellers. Such lots as come out bring special prices, the difference over the list quotations depending upon how badly the buyer needs the stock. In finished material of all kinds the movement continues very large and considerable premiums on official prices are paid for quick delivery. This is said to be particularly true of bar iron and steel. The demand for plates is large and mills are said to be so full of work as to be indifferent about booking further orders. From $\$ 5$ to $\$ 10$ per ton premium is said to be offered in some cases for structural shapes for early delivery.

pensate for this shortage. The Butchers' Association and the Association of Foreign Cattle Traders aver that the scarcity in meat will increase unless the Government permits the entry of South American and Canadian live cattle, which might safely be done as disease among this stock has disappeared.

## INSURANCE DECISIONS.

## Applicant as Part of Contract.-Un-

 der Code, c. 4 , sec. 1741 , providing that no application or representation made by a person obtaining insurance shall be introduced in evidence unless a copy of such application or representation be attached to the policy, and insurer cannot show the falsity of statements contained in an application or representation where no copy thereof is attached to the policy. Corson vs Iowa Mut. Ins.. Ass'n, 88 N. W. Fiep. (Iowa 1086.-Changing Benefi-ciary.-The beneficiary in a mutual benefit association life policy has a vested interest therein, which cannot be taken away without his consent, unless change of beneficiaries is authorized by the policy or the by-laws of the association. Hill vs Groesbeck et al, 67 Pac . Rep. (Colo.) 167.-Changing Beneficiaries.- Another View. Though insured gives a benefit societycertificate to the beneficiary with intent that it shall be hers absolutely, this does not amount to a contract, so as to prevent his changing the beneficiary. Cade vs Head Camp, Pacific Jurisdiction, Woodmen of the World, et al., 67 Pac. Rep. (Wash.) 603.
Effect of Assignment.-Assignment of a paid-up policy after notice to the insurer and acceptance by the assignee works a complete change of ownership. Appeal of Colburn, 51 At. Rep. (Conn.) 139.-An expulsion of a member from a fraternal insurance society must be made in accordance with its rules and constitution; otherwise, it is null and void. Woodmen of the world vs Gilliland, 67 Pac. Rep. (Okl.) 485.Fraternal Society--Provisions as to Old Line Insurance.-Where the answer of defendant in an action on a life policy alleges that it is a fraternal beneficiary society, but there is no proof thereof, and the certificate sued on indicates that the organization is an insurance concern, it will be considered a life insurance company, subject to the provisions of Code, section 1812. Brown et ux vs Modern Woodmen of America, 88 N. W. Rep. (Iowa) 965.
Husband and Wife - Agreement at Time of Divorce.-Where the premiums on a life policy were paid by the wife of insured, who had possession of the nolicy, and, after being divorced from insured, gave the policy to him in pursuance of his agreement to have their son made the beneficiary, insured's action in making himself the beneciary was a fraud on the son, and after his death his personal representatives held the proceeds of the policy as trustees for the son. Cockrell vs as trustees for the son. Cockrell 203 .

-Incumbrance as Part of Insured Pro-perty.-Where a policy insured for separate amounts the dwelling house, furniture, cattle, and other items, and provided that any incumbrance of the property insured without the consent of the company should avoid the policy, a chattel mortgage on the cattle does not avoid the policy as to the house and furniture. Taylor vs Anchor Mut. Fire Ins. Co., 88 N.W. Rep. (Iowa) 807.

Insurance by Lessee. - A lessee's agreement to insure was an independent agreement, in which he acted as a principal, and the lessor could not be held liable on the ground of agency. Northern Assur. Co. vs Goelet et al, 74 N. Y. Supp. 553.-Limited License -A license authorizing a life insurance company to transact business in this State does not authorize it to engage in the business of loaning money. State vs Union Cent. Life Ins. Co., 67 Pac. Rep. (Idaho) 647.-Marine Insur-ance.-In the absence of proof of the existence of a usage, such as prevails in England, that a marine insurance broker who procures a policy of insurance for a client is alone liable to the underwriter for payment of the premium thereon, and must himself look to the assured, the ordinary rule governs in this country, and the assured becomes the debtor of the underwriter for such premiums. Marine Insurance for Part Value.Where a vessel carries marine insurance for a part only of its value, the owner is a co-insurer as to the uninsured part, and in case of a loss such part, called the "owner's risk," is to be taken into consideration in fixing the proportion of the loss to be paid by the insurer. Material Representation.-A false statement, in an application for life insurance, in relation to the last time the applicant was treated by a physician, and the disease for which he was last treated, which was both a warranty and a representation material to the risk, is fatal to a recovery on the policy, and justifies the direction of a verdict for defendant in an action threreon. Suicide while Insane.-A condition in a life insurance policy that if, within three years from the date of the policy, the insured should die, by suicide, sane or insane, the liability of the company should be limited to the amount of the premiums paid, is valid, and it is no answer to such a stipulation that the insured was insane, or unconscious of the moral and physical consequences of the act which caused death. hope to enjoy in it. Queen Alexandra, who is not only foremost in supporting home industries, but is one of the keenest collectors and most expert connoisseurs of fine lace, wore at the istate opening of Parliament a marvellously fine and beautiful Honiton veil beneath the small diamond crown, and permitted it to be made generally known that she did so in order to bring lace of this type into notice. How successful Her Majesty's gracious thought has been may be judged from the fact that Mrs. Barnard, of Coombe Raleigh, honorary treasurer of the Ladies' Guild in connection with the Honiton Lace School, has obtained orders to the
value of over $£ 1,000$ to be executed between now and June. The Princess of Wales is patroness of this guild, and has honored it with repeated orders, but Royal support and sympathy are, of course, no new thing for the industry. There are old women living whose mothers helped to make a wonderful dress for Queen Adelaide, in which every flower was copied direct from nature. Queen Victoria, who realized that the workers were often in poverty and distress, ordered through a Miss Bidney, the finest dress they had ever made, to wear at her own wedding. Some 200 women and girls were employed upon it for several weeks, and in order that its

lovely design should not be repeated the patterns used were destroyed. The bridal veil and flounces worn by Princess Louise, Duchess of Argyll, at her wedding were also of this type.
At the present time, Honiton, Beer, Sidbury and Branscombe are in healthy rivalry as to the good work they are turning out, and the present revival owes much to the zeal and enterprise of private ladies. Mrs. Fowler, at Honiton, has been foremost among these, giving employment all the year round to women and girls, even though she saw little immediate prospect of disposing of their work. The county council has come to her support now with a handsome grant-in-aid, and she will be able to hold classes to instruct beginners. No less enthusiastic has been Mrs. Barnard, who has supplied fine designs, and striven to emphasize the Flemish
influences to which this lace unquestionably owes its origin. The people could not afford to buy new patterns, and without help were slow in adapting the examples put before them, but one of Mrs. Barnard's greatest triumphs has been that or preserving the art of making real net upon the pillows. ton, the craft has practically disappeared. At Beer, it is interesting to note, several antique examples have lately been received for repair and restoration, in view of their being worn during the coming season.

Prices have advanced considerably with the higher standard of work of the last five or six years, and it would seem that there is no lack of young girls willing to make themselves really proficient. All who have interested themselves in the question are of opininn that the great need is that of better opportunity to learn to do the finest work, and that more classes and more advanced instruction yet are demanded. Miss Trevelyan points out that London possesses no great central depot where the buyer, foreign as well as English, can go when desirous of choosing choice examples for court or wedding dresses, and at which it should be possible to see all kinds of British laces. It must be borne in mind in this connection that in Bucks, Bedford. and the Midlands other ladies have been working successfully on similar lines, and these should also be brought under the direct notice of the ordinary purchaser. In Ireland, it has been achieved, however, and it is difficult to estimate the benefit that has come to the workers there through the Irish Industries Association and other bodies. The Irish Lace Depot, in Grafton istreet, Dublin, alone deals in $£ 20,000$ worth a year, and has workers who can earn $£ 60$ a year by their skill. rope, says a London paper, his friends would rather have missed a prize fight, than be seen with a cigar on the Mall. George IV. took his tobaceo as snuff, and what he would have thought or said if Beau Brummel had offered him a cigarette no man knoweth. Nowadays we only know snuff in historical novels or Oxford common rooms. We associate snuff with quaint and crusty old gentlemen, and the papers tells us, with a pleasing choice of adjectives, that snuff takers are"either old men or poor women." Who the genius was that first took tobacco neat instead of as smoke history saith not. What is certain is that snuff became popular in England just about 200 years ago, and the learned opine that the cause was Sir George Rooke's victory at Vigo, where besides gold and Spaniards and other unconsidered trifles he captured a large parcel of snuff and brought down prices. . In those days macaw, or rappee, cost some 5 s a pound, and every one used it save perhaps staunch old country squires, who stuck to their church wardens and October ale. There were dainty ladies to meet niore delicately, and yet more amply the requirements of well-bred noses. Queen Charlotte had her snuff account. Frederick the Great took it in handfuls, and smothered his clothes therewith, so that his valets acquired a small but comfortable income by brushing them and selling the result. So at least tradition records; but those crafty menials must have had noses and eyes of triple brass. Even the great Samuel Weller, prince of servants, could not manage snuff without sneezing; but he
belonged to a degenerate age, when pipes and cigars were coming to conquer. Napoleon was not exempt from the habit. Southey wrote verses in praise of snuff. All the more distinguished people, Beau Brummel, Lord Alvanley, and the rest had their own peculiar mixture.
The snuff-maker kept books full of recipes, and made for each customer his own brand. The tribulations of the modern tobacconist, if each smoker had his own private mixture, would be too awful to contemplate. One old house, known to the bucks of the Regency as "The Rasp and the Crown," still preserves the exact proportions of the mixture that was absorbed by the First Gentleman in Europe. The true snuff-taker was faithful to his one love. When cigars were fighting their way to fortune, if you wished to make a man your enemy for life, the best way was to smoke a cigar while he was taking snuff or filling his box. A modern parallel would be to smoke a pipe of shag at a public dinner. Snuff-taking was comparatively economical. The ordinary man consumed some two ounces a week-cost about $71 / 2 \mathrm{~d}$. The smoker whose tobacco costs no more is an economical man. Of course, there were hardened sinners who bought their snuff by the halfdozen pounds, and luxuriated in its dry delights. There were also gentlemen (of the lower orders) who contented themselves with carrying coffee. Partly, like Mr. John Smauker in "Pickwick," because it did not make them sneeze; partly because it was cheaper, as the Surrey laborer still smokes smugweed. Coffee looks very

## GROWTH OF CANADA.

The first steamer made its appearance in Canadian waters in 1809. The account taken from a Quebec journal may be of interest.
"On Saturday morning, at 9 o'clock, arrived here from Montreal, being her first trip, the steamboat Accommodation, with 10 passengers. This is the first vessel of the kind that ever appeared in this harbor. She is continually crowded with visitants. She left Montreal on Wednesday at two o'clock, so that her passage was 66 hours, thirty of which she was at anchor. She arrived at Three Rivers in 24 hours. No wind or tide can stop her. She has 75 feet keel, and 85 feet on deck. The price for a passage up-is $\$ 9$ and $\$ 8$ down, the vessel supplying provisions."

judge from the following advertisement which appeared in the Upper Canada Gazette, when the century spun off two of its ten decades: "We, the subscribers, feeling the want of a medical gentleman of liberal education and undoubted loyalty to practise in the village of Bath, will pay annually the amount opposite our names to any person of that description who will establish himself among us." There were eleven gentlemen, and the total sum they promised yearly was £ 24 . The pecuniary benefits were not great, according to the ideas of to-day. But mark the fine flavor of the offer. The doctor they wanted must be of a "Ioyalty" that was "undoubted."
These illustrations, says the vominion Statistician, must suffice to show how the people of Canada stood in the early part of the century.
How we stand to-day may be shown in two ways-1st, by comparison with our neighbours; and 2nd, by the collected statistics.

1st. In 1800 the population of the community to the south of us was 5,308,000 , or just about the population of the Dominion of Canada in 1900. The thirteen original States had had twelve or thirteen years' experience of union. Years before Edmund Burke, who knew the people of the Atlantic seaboard of this northern continent better than any other man, had described in flowing periods the wonderful doings of this people who were "yet in the gristle."
Now, how stands the record as between the $5,308,000$ of 1800 in the United States and the $5,400,000$ of 1900 in Canada.
The United States began the century with a population 14 1-3 times greater than that of the united provinces of British North America. They end the century with a population 13 1-3 times greater than that of the Dominion.
They bave not quite kept their dis-

We may boast fairly enough that we have managed to develop in population at least as well as they.
The five million Unistoniams had in 1800 an external trade of $\$ 161,750,000$.
The five million Canadians had in 1900 an external trade of $\$ 381,517,000$, nearly 60 millions more than double that of their neighbors when they had the same population.
In 1800 the exports of American produce by the five million Unistoniams amounted to $\$ 32,000,000$. They succeeded in supplying their own wants and had an exportable surplus of 32 million dollars. The five million Canadians in 1900 supplied themselves with full measure and running over and still had an exportable surplus of domestic products valued at $\$ 170$,000,000.
The public revenue raised by the five million Unistoniams in 1800 was $\$ 12$,500,000 .
That raised by the five million Canadians in 1900 was $\$ 51,030,000$.
In some things the five million Canadians outstrip the 76 million Unistonlams. Mr. Mulhall has studied out the earnings of the mercantile shipping of the world and his statement is: Canada's shipping earned $\$ 17,200$, 6u0. The United States shipping earned $\$ 16,000,000$ in 1899.

P. F. Godenrath of Similkameen, B.C., recently in a trip east. Continuing, he said: "'he development of the Similkameen has been retarded for lack of transportation facilities. This, however, will shortly be overcome, as both the Canadian Pacific Railway and the Great Northern are now taking steps to enter the district. The Canadian Pacific will probably build into the country from Spence's Bridge, on the main line. The Great Northern controls the Victoria, Vancouver, and the Eastern Railway charter from the coast to the Kootenays. This company is now constructing a line, starting from Marcus, on the Spokane Falls and Northern Railway, and has reached Cascade City, B.C., on the international boundary line. The roadbed is completed between that point and Grand Forks. From the 'Smelter City' the route is via the Kettle River Valley to Rock Creek, thence through the Myers Creek district, on the Colville Indian reservation, to Oro, on the Columbia River. The survey from this point follows up the Similkameen River to Princeton, thence across the Hope range to Vancouver.
"If the C.P.R. decides to come in from the north and follows the surveys already made, it will start from Spence's Bridge, going south through the Aspen Grove district to Otter Lake, thence down One-Mile Creek to the Similkameen River.and on east through the valley, and connect at Midway with its Columbia and Western branch.
"The coal basin, of which Princeton is approximately the centre, is about eight miles in length by from six to seven miles in width. The outcrops of coal seams are visible, all around the rim of the basin, and along the banks of both the Similkameen and Tulameen rivers and tributaries. All surface exposures of coal are lignitic in character, but recent explorations at depth by bore drill disclosed the existence of bituminous coal. Since being

great attention through the discovery of alluvial gold in the Similkameen River. Again, in the ' 80 's, another excitement was started on Granite Creek, but the rich parts of these placer diggings have long since been worked out, and, although the existence of large anil valuable lodes was well known, nothing was done in the way of prospecting until after the opening up of the Kootenays and the Boundary. Recent years have witnessed the influx of hundreds of prospectors and now within a radius of 20 miles and less of Princeton, some eight distinct camps have been established. These camps contain gold, silver, copper, and lead ores. Capital is slowly entering the district, and as the initial stages of development have proved most satisfactory, there is now every assurance that eventually the Similkameen will equal, if not rival, any other section of the province."

ter Ship Canal Company, submitted at the thirty-fourth half-yearly-meeti:s of the shareholders held recently:
"At the end of August the falling off in receipts amounted to $£ 3,386$,but the trade of the later four months of the year enabled us to rub off that deficit and finish with a balance of increase of $£ 13,525$. The result was the more encouraging because it was a year of exceptional difficulty for all ports. The extraordinary depression in the freight market and the skort maize crop in American resulted in many liners being taken off the American berth and many others being unable during the course of the half year to obtain full eargoes.

The great bulk of tramp steamers that come into Liverpool with ${ }^{~}{ }^{\prime} \mathrm{ml}$ ber, grain, cotton and other articles, as. well as into Manchester, when they take coal cargoes outwards nearly always go to Cardiff, the reason being that Cardiff steam coal is what the steamers want to buy at various large coaling stations in foreign countries.

head. I cannot speak of any but a very small portion, because while negotiations are in progress it is impossible to disclose them. But I may mention that a new service from Quebec has been arranged in conjunction with the Great Northern Railway of Canada, which will begin as soon as the St. Lawrence opens.
"There has been a further development of the Baltic and North European lines. There is a new line to the Persian Gulf, running monthly, which has been started by the West Hartlepool Steamship Company, and one steamer is now in port loading. Then, our good friends, the Manchester Liners, have recently had two new steamers made ready and set to work, and I believe I am not transgressing in saying they have bought two more, which will soon be ready for work. Other general developments are also in progress.
"One word as regards the exports of Manchester goods. We have, as you know, approached the various steamship conferences over and over again, and as far as our representations are concerned, they continue to be ineffectual. We know that some of the lines in conference are willing and anxious to load here, but the other members of the conference will not allow them to swerve from the arrangement, and the shipowners will not break loose because the conference arrangements give them a good rate of freight and a paying trade, and they are not prepared to undertake a fight in order to give traffic to the Ship Canal. The whole solution of the difficulty lies with the Manchester merchants; and if, some day, the Manchester Chamber of Commerce and the Manchester merchants would really take this matter in hand, as good citizens, they could secure a very large accession of export trade, though not the whole of it. If the ships came up

## ROCKY MOUNTAIN COAL BEDS.

The magnitude of the aggregate area of the Rocky Mountain coal fields is as yet scarcely appreciated. As described by Mr. L. S. Storrs in Part III. of the Twenty-second Annual Report of the United States Geological Surey, now in press, they occupy about 60 per cent. of the length of a belt along the eastern base of the main range, extending southward from the Canadian boundary fully 1,000 miles, through Montana, Wyoming, Colorado, and New Mexico. Another less extensive belt occurs along the western base of the Rocky Mountain range in Wyoming, Utah, Colorado and New Mexico. Between these two belts, in the park region, are numerous isolated basins. In addition to these generally bituminous fields, large areas of the plains in Montana, Wyoming and the Dakotas are also underlain by coal, usually lignite, but valuable for local use. According to the latest estimates, the areas of the coal-bear-

ing formations in the six States, and one Territory of the Rocky Mountains are, for anthracite, bituminous and lignitic-bituminous coal, 43,610 square miles, and for lignite, 56,500 square miles. The history of the development of the various coal fields of the Rocky Mountains is essentially the hisory of the general development of the region, which has no parallel elsewhere in the United States, and in which, as in the case of the Western interior coal fields, the great transportation lines have been the determining factor.
The Colorado coal fields are the only ones for which a fairly accurate estimate can be given. A conservative estimate places the workable beds at about 50 per cent. of the total 18,100 square miles of coal-bearing area and the available coal at nearly $34,000,000$,000 tons. The Colorado fields have
been divided into three groups - the eastern, the park and the western. The fields of the eastern group are the Raton, the Canyon City and the South Platte. The Raton field extends north from the Colorado-New Mexico line 45 miles along the base of the Front Mountain range and about 32 miles eastward into the plains, and embraces Western Los Animas (the Trinidad district) and Southern Huerfano (the Walsenburg) district counties. Five of the 40 coal beds are usually of workable thickness, varying from 8 feet down. The coal is both steam and coking. The Canyon City field is near Canyon City in Fremont County, east of the Wet Mountain range, south of the Arkansas River, and north of the Newland Creek. Some of the beds are from 4 to 5 feet thick. The product is excellent domestic coal. The South Platte field begins a few miles
north of Colorado Springs and runs thence north along the Front range for about 140 miles, nearly to the State line, its width being about 40 miles. One mining district of the field is immediately north of Colorado Springs, in El Paso County. There are five others northwest of Denver, at Boulder, Marshall, Lafayette, Louisville and Erie in Boulder and Weld counties. The coal is essentially lignitic.

poor one. You need only to have common sense , and good eyes and a magnifying glass. First you examine the diamond's table. The table is the surface, and it should be perfectly flat perfectly octagonal. Then examine the circumference, and if that is round the gem is, at least, you may be sure, well cut.
"Now, for flaws, you look into the diamond, using the glass here, for the reason that a flaw imperceptible to the naked eye will often lower a gem's value 50 or 60 per cent. Flaws in diamonds resemble those little feather marks in ice that we so often see, though scratches on the surface are also flaws. If none are to be found you study next the color, remembering

## THE DRUG HABIT.

At the present day the sufferer from sleeplessness, neuralgia, and other disorders of the nerves flies to the medicine chest for relief, and swallows such drugs as chloroform, chlorodyn hydrate, sulphonal, antipyrine, and morphine, which is also injected under the skin. The London Standard makes the remarkable statement
that in Chicago 35,000 people habitually take morphine subcutaneously. With all these drugs the habit grows, for the patient becomes inured to the dose, and in one case, which ended in a lunatic asylum, twenty-four grains of morphine were taken daily. In former years laudanum was habitually used in the Fen districts of East Anglia to prevent ague, and the older folk would swallow a dose which would have ended the life of an unseasoned person.
As the opium controversy is perennial we need only remark that Mr . ompson is not convinced that it is particularly hurtful to Orientals, though certainly pernicious to Europeans. Hasheesh, or bhang, prepared from the Indian hemp, is a much enticing drug, for it produces the most roseate visions. # ..The Royal-Victoria Life Insurance Co.. RESERVES ON A $3 ½ \%$ BASIS HELD ON OVER 60\% OF INSURANCE IN FORCE. 

The Annual Meeting of this Company was held on Wednesday, the 26 th March. Mr. James Crathern, President, occupied the chair, and Mr. David Burke, General Manager, acted as Secretary.

There were a large number of shareholders present, and the Directors' Report and Financial Statement for the year 1901, was considered very satisfactory.

## DIRECTORS' REPORT.

The Board of Directors submit for your consideration, their report of the Company's business for the year 1901, which shows a very satisfactory increase over previous years.

## INSURANCE TRANSAOTED.

The new insurance applied for amounted to $\$ 1,204,076$, of which $\$ 1,099,405$ was accepted, and $\$ 111,240$ declined or not carried out at the end of the year. The insurance in force on the Company's books has now reached the sum of $\$ 2,702,456$.

INOREASE OVER PREVIOUS YEAR
Applications received, $\$ 1,204,076$ increase $\$ 288,076$, or 31 per cent. Insurance in force, $2,702,456$ increase 290,905 , or 36 per cent. Insurance issued, $1,099,405$ increase 585,576 , or 27 per cent.

## OASH INOOME.

The income of the Company from cash premiumis and interest reached the sum of $\$ 104,376.67$.
The accumulated assets of the Company which increased over $111 / 2$ per cent. during the year, taken together with the guaranteed capital, now amount to $\$ 1,104,594$, for the protection of policyholders.

## DEATH OLAIMS AND ANNUITIES.

The claims by death occurring during the year amounted to $\$ 15,000.00$, which, although larger than the previous year, and in part due to accidental and acute causes, was much more favorable than the mortality tables indicated. The death claims paid within the year amounted to $\$ 9,500.00$, and the sum of $\$ 3,668.14$ was paid to annuitants.

Since the last Annual Meeting, the Directors have further increased the deposit of securities with the Dominion Government of the value of $\$ 102,947.97$, making the amount deposited for the protection of policyholders $\$ 175,180.63$. Our deposit now exceeds the legal Reserves on all policies in force in the Company as computed by the Superintendent of Insurance, together with all other liabilities to policyholders, the figures of which appear in the financial statement attached.

The Insurance Act of Canada requires all Life Insurance Companies to value their Reserves on new policies issued after December 31st, 1899, on a $31 / 2$ per cent. interest basis, and on policies issued previous to that date 4 per cent. Reserves commencing from January 1st, 1910, and after January 1st, 1915, to maintain $31 / 2$ per cent. Reserves on all policies in force. In conforming with these requirements, this Company already maintain the high Standard of $31 / 2$ per cent. Reserves on over 60 per cent. of its insurance in force.

The Directors again have to express their appreciation of the faithful efforts of the Company's agents and staff.
The books and securities of the Company have been regularly audited during the year by Messrs. MacIntosh \& Hyde, Chartered Accountants, and their certificate is attached to the financial statement.

The Directors retiring this year are Hon. L. J. Forget, Hon. Robert Mackay, and Messrs. James Crathern, John Cassils and David Burke, all of whom are eligible for re-election for the incoming term of three years.
