During the past season, your Directors found it requisite to lay a Main Pipe, from Chaboillez Square, along St. Antoine Street, in crder to alford a proper supply of Gas to that and the adjoining Streets; they also received such favourable encouragement from the Linhabitants of Mountain Street, as induced them to lay the apare Pipes they had on thand, throughout the whole length of that Street, as well as to several houses at a greater distance, where the parties, in all cases, contributed to the expense of laying down the Pipes.

Your Birectors are happy to inform you, that during the last filteen months they have introduced the Gas into upwards of one handred and twenty private dwelling houses; and the revenue obtained from Mountain Street for the past quar-for, has been equal to their expectation, and fully bears them out in their views of the advantages

bears them out in their views of the automated the Company will derive from the introduction of Gas into all private dwellings.

It is matter of much regret, that during the past fifteen menths, the Gas Company should have suffired so severely from the depressed state of trade in this City, and that, notwithstanding the complete founding the complete founding the complete founding. large increase of consumption, by private in

large increase of consumption, by private families, it has been unable to hold its own. The unfortunate fires that took place during the past season, at once awept away upwards of £500 annual revence; and the early shop shutting movement, with the unoccupied buildings, will be a loss to the Company of nearly a similar amount.

The Company, during the first twelve months of its being in operation, suffered materially, from the low price obtained Lor coke, caused by the large quantity held by the Old Gas Company; a great proportion of it, as well as that manufactured by us, was sold at 12s. 6d. and 15s. port chaldron, the price has since been advanced, and chaldron, the price has since been advanced, and about 20s. may be calculated on, as the rate which will be obtained in future, from which there will be an accession to the revenue of from £200

It will be seen from the Working account, that the expenses attending the repair of pipes and neters during the past year have been very heavy, amounting in all to £570 13s. 4d. These expenses for the future will be much diminished, but the use of meters in this climate will always but the use of meters in this climate will always be attended with heavy charges for wear, tear, and repair. It has therefore been found requisite to charge a rental for the use of meters. This is the general practice in most cities in Europe, where meters are in use; and in Montreat, it is much more requisite, on account of the increased expenditure for repairs, as well as from the small quantity of gas made use of by a large portion of these who consume by meter.

Your Directors after taking the present state of wour Directors after taking the present state of the Company's affairs into mature consideration, as well as the large amount the Gompany has of bor-rowed stoney, of money due, and stock on hand, do not think, it advisable to recommend the payment of a dividend for the past year. They trust hownot think it advisable to recommend the payment of a dividend for the past year. They crust, however, that more prosperous times are in store for Montreal, and that, for the future, the Dividends, although small, may have a yearly increase.

Should an opportunity present itself for disposing of the whole or a portion of the surglus and vasant properties, the proceeds would be applied in payment of the loan and thereby greatly lacrease the profits of the Company.

Your Directors have been desirous to carry out the interminate of this Company with regard to the price of gas, as originally contemplated; but under the calisting state of Montreal, they regret to state they are unable to secomplish this, except by sacrificing the whole of the capital invested in the undertaking.

The Directors, however, comsider that the Shareholders in every public Company should receive a fair return upon their invested capital, and therefore conceive that gas should not be

furnished at lower rates than will, at loust, afford a ceturn upon the capital invested, equal to the egal interest of the country.

This New City Gas Company of Montreal have turing the past year varied out the courses, oncered into, between the Gld Gas Company, and the Concession for a term of two cases from the

The Shereholders will at once see the necessity of the above incresse, as if 12s 6d per 1,000 cubic feet from private consumers, is not at present a paying rate, much less in 6s 2d per 1,000 cubic feet from the Corporation.

Your Directors feel antifiled that the present prices would afford a fair return, if the consumption could be materielly increased; but of this there is no immediate prospect, as whatever is now gained by the introduction of Gas into private houses, is on the other hand lost by the early closeing of the shops. The Company likewise suffer a heavy loss by the delay in payment of Gas accounts, and if prompt payment of these could be obtained, there would be a saving to the Company in bad debts, and interest, of several hundred pounds per annum.

The Directors who remain in Office assure you, this the utmost exactions will be used on their part, in conjunction with such other gentlemen, as you may appoint their colleagues, to do all in their power, to gromete the welfare of the Company, and to conduct the business with the most rigid economy; on the other hand, they would arge upon the Shareholders, and all interested in the Gas Company, to make use of the whole of their influence, and endeavour, so far as lies in their power, to extend the consumption has a corresponding ratio to the area of the city, and extent of poss, the prices can neither be reduced, nor a fair return obtained for the Capital invested.

Mr. Calhoun's first assumption is the positive, actual and very imminent danger of a split in this giorious "Union" of ours; what is to be done to avert said calamity, and what only can be done, in Mr. C.'s opinion. The primary movement of the Honorable Senator is to post his forces in battle array, and he then proceeds to deploy and bring them into the field, one by one. Thus:

"How can the Union be preserved?" It is a mighty question; and it is indispensable to go back a short distance. People are sometimes faseous for going backward, and never looking upon the Future. The immediate cause of all the present trouble in the South is a widely-agreed discontent originated with the first agritation of the Slavery
