Opening at Hamilton of Big Race Meet Big Crowd Out For Derby Day, and a Record Meeting is Anticipated.

HAMILTON, June 26.—The Hamilton Jockey Club's spring meeting opened yesterday in brilliant fashion. The weather was of the real summer kind, the track at its best, the program full of interest, and the attendance so great that there was hardly room for all the people who wanted to see the sport. As is usual here, the contention was very keen and close, finishes in the best of the retained names of some of the best performers now in training, and the afternoon was featured by the enthusiasm of an appreciative crowd. This is the first meeting ground of the season for the Kentucky and Canadian cracks, and yesterday, it must be admitted, the former had the best of the argument. In the opening event, Hawthorn, the most-talked-of horse in America this spring, overcame the Davies champions, Plate Glass and Calgary, while Leochares also finished in front of them. They had up only 93 pounds each, the lightest weight ever put in at and better than will happen again this season. Trainer Trevey said that Hawthorn was hardly ready for the mile and a quarter of the Derby, but was not fit to run six furlongs in 1:12. He did not quite reach that mark, and did not need it. This was Hawthorn's first start since he won the Blue Grass Stakes at Lexington in April, and possibly accounted for the phenomenal odds laid against him. As much as ten to one was quoted at one time, and he could be backed at four to one at present. In his previous career he has almost invariably been an odds-on choice, no matter what the field. Mr. Davies' flying filly, Southern Maid, also met defeat from the Uncle Scott, Little Nephew. The latter led throughout, and equalled the track record of 59.45. He was not all out at the finish, either. Mr. Turney left Horton in the stable, and expected to win the Derby with Kleburne, who probably likes the distance better than Horton does. Only Buskin and First Sight opposed him, and Kleburne made the pace for a mile and an eighth, when Buskin wore him down and won handily. 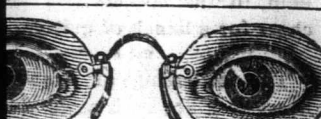
