SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST LAND REGULATIONS

Any PERSON who is the sole head of a Afamily, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Land Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Duties—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section along side his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside upon the homestead or pre-emption six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to earn homestead patent), and cultivate 50 acres extra.

A Strong Representation Against Removal of Duty on Agricultural Implements.

The following despatch from Ottawa on Saturday is from The Toronto Star (Liberal) and refers to what is regarded as an extremely important fiscal matter to Brantford. A strong lobby from Toronto, Hamilton and Brantford, the Ontario centres of the agricultural machinery industry has been at work for some time at Ottawa in opposition to the possible reduction in the duty on harvesting machinery. It is thought that the Senator took his action in part to emphasize the determined op-position of the machinery makers to any lowering of the tariff or even the principle of so doing not so much as a protest against the declared Libei al attitude, but as an emphatic and dramatic warning to the powers that

All Sorts of Rumors For some time there has been hewd suspicion that a measure of reduction was in the air, and being onsidered by the Ministry. The Westerners want it, Conservative as well as Liberal. Western Legislatures and influential farmer organi zations have passed resolutions affrming the expediency of reducing the duty on reapers and binders and the other tools of the farmer's trade It was thought that it might be that the Government would consider good policies to make a five per cent reduction and seal the Opposition's thunder. Conservatives claim that under their administration, the duty has been reduced from 3' per cent, t 20 per cent for implements, and 17 1-2 per cent. for harvesting machinery.
