\$1,250,000 for 1,200 Ostrichs.

Pioneer in Plume Business Now Has Money Enough to Buy Feathers for His Own Wife.

Los Angeles, Cal., Dec. 3.—The Cawston ostrich farm, probably the best known in the world, has been sold to a syndicate of Los Angeles bankers for an approximate consideration of \$1,250,000 by Edward Cawston, principal owner. The deal disposes of the South Pasadena and San Jacinto establishments, embracing a total of more than 1,200 birds.

Mr. Cawston retains a part of the stock, sufficient to insure him a place on the directorate. The company will do business on an enlarged scale.

The Cawston farm is twenty-five years old. It has grown up about a nucleus of fifty birds brought from Africa by Mr. Cawston, who originally employed six men to care for them and for the farm. The success of the enterprise was so marked that within the last decade twenty-one other ostrich farms have been started in the United States, all modeled more or less after the South Pasadena place.

Five years ago the Cawston company was reorganized and incorporated for \$1,000,000. Mr. Cawston holding the majority of stock. It is stated that dividends since paid aggregate the total paid for stock in the company at that time.

It is the intention of the new company to establish a chain of feather stores, one to be located in each of the principal cities of the country.

Lieutenant Nimis, of the Royal Fusiliers, an expert on surveying and sledging, is also on board, while a Swiss, Dr. Merz, who won the ski jumping championship in 1908, takes part as an expert for ice work.

The Aurora also carries a monoplane which Dr. Mawson considers will be very valuable in the effort to find the South Pole.

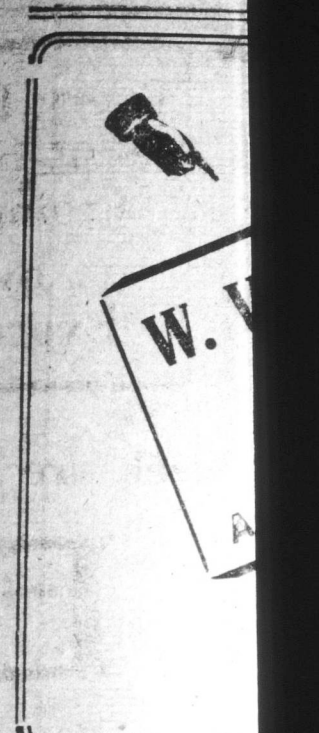

Yesterday we chronicled some increases in salaries in the Postal and Telegraph Department, but in spite of increases made there is apparently some grave defects still existing which especially affect the efficient working of the telegraph department so far as it relates to the distribution of the news despatch to the evening newspapers. Yesterday we received a despatch at 3:30 p.m. which was sent out from the office according to the slip at 2:20 p.m. The expense offered by the messenger was at least had so many messages to deliver that he could not get to the office earlier. The result was that five messages meant for publication yesterday, although the sender and cable company will have to be paid for the work, were not published, and they arrived too late for publication. On former occasions we have explained the time taken up in the distribution of messages from the telegraph office to our office. But this is only one cause of complaint. There is another. A news despatch arrives at the Postal Office between 10 and 11 a.m., and we are informed by the chief in charge that the frequent delay in sending out this despatch arises on the fact that there is often no list available in the office to make copies of these messages for the newspapers. There is also another news despatch due to arrive in the office between noon and one p.m., and happens sometimes that this message cannot be sent out in time for the evening newspapers to deal with satisfactorily. Sometimes the despatch is not published at all the day it is received, and at other times, it is curtailed more or less, according to circumstances. We are assured by the Postal authorities that the cause of the trouble is the same as in the former case. There is no typist available for copying out the despatches, and always found. Special to Evening Telegram. WASHINGTON, To-Day. Ratifications have been exchanged between Britain, Russia, Japan and the States for the protection of seals in the North Pacific and the Behring Sea. Under this treaty pelagic sealing will be terminated and the taking of fur seals be regulated by the four governments. The Congress will have to appropriate \$200,000 to compensate Japanese and Canadian sealers for the abandonment of sealing.

Insurrection in Albania.

Special to Evening Telegram. LONDON, To-Day. A despatch from Vienna says: According to official advices received, a dangerous insurrection has broken out in Albania and 12,000 men are under arms. An extension of the movement is probable.

Barbour did good service in Alexander Bay by freeing seven schooners that were caught in the ice. Two were from Newtown and two from Salvage, and three belonged to Baxter Barry of the Bay wanting to get to Middle Arm. They were all jammed off Rose's Mill in six inches of ice and would likely be there all winter. The Fogota had to "butt" seven miles and was at it from 7 in the morning till three in the afternoon.

Spanish Polar Expedition.

Senor Gisbert Proposes to Drift for Three Years, Starting from Alaska. Several recent occurrences in Spain have betokened an awakening in that country of interest in scientific matters. Accordingly we are not surprised to hear that the Spaniards are planning an Arctic expedition. The project was submitted to a recent meeting of the Royal Geographic society of Madrid by F. J. Gisbert, who has had some experience in polar exploration, and a committee has been appointed to raise the necessary funds which it is estimated will amount to \$125,000. Senor Gisbert proposes to drift for three years in a trans-polar current—a la Nansen—starting from a point north of the Alaska coast, in 100 degrees west longitude, whence he expects to reach the Greenland Sea. Side trips are to be made on sleds, in order that exploration may cover a zone of 100 miles on either side of the ship's position.—"Scientific American."

Swift Justice for Five Bandits.

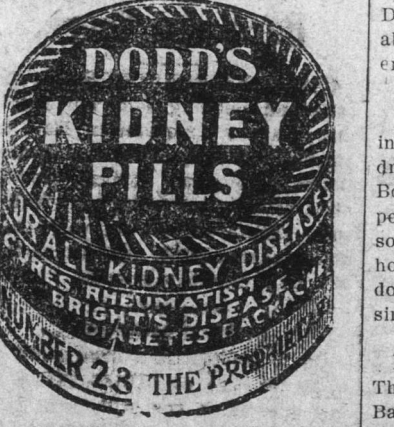
White Plains, N. Y., Dec. 5.—The five bandits who descended on an isolated farm house near Croton Lake on November 9, and murdered Mrs. Mary Hall, the young wife of a Supt. of work on the New York aqueduct, were all sentenced by Justice Tompkins late to-day, to death in the electric chair during the week of January 15. The chain of five convictions for murder was completed to-day when the jury returned a verdict of guilty in the case of Angelo Guisto.

Justice never came more swiftly in this State to so many murderers. Within two days after the crime, the five bandits were arrested and their trials began November 23. In most of the cases the jury were out barely fifteen minutes. Those arrogantly convicted were Vincenzo Formia, Philip Di Marto, Lorenzo Cali and Santa Zanza.

London Children's Health.

Great Care is Taken by the School Medical Authorities.

London, Eng., Dec. 3.—The beginning of the year has made in improving the physical condition of the school children is indicated by the report of the chief medical officer. There are now employed ninety-six male and eighteen female doctors, each devoting quarter time to school work, and these include specialists in mental disorders, in eye and ear, disease, in deformities and in dentistry. In 1910 not less than 172,619 children were examined, of whom 52,954, or 32.6 per cent., required medical treatment. There were defects of vision or eye disease in 18,923; defects of throat or nose in 25,927; defects of hearing in 9,497; skin disease in 2,913; and other diseases in 15,296. Dental treatment was begun during the year, with a special study of the physique and nutrition of the children.

Advantages of Gas.

But the advantages of gas over the old-fashioned way of conducting domestic affairs is by no means confined to cooking. If, instead of gently pulling that magic chain, which turns on the bright incandescent light, one had first to have ordered and taken in oil, polished the pedestal of the oil lamp, cleaned the glass chimney, trimmed the wicks, filled the bowl with oil, one might cry out about the difficulty of doing the day's work, and the dreadful death of really reliable domestic servants. Geysers in a bathroom avoid all the disappointment of finding that the water is only tepid instead of being boiling hot, because the kitchen fire has been allowed to burn unlit for the cooking for the day is over. With a geyser all the trouble of stoking and building up the fire, and keeping it at a certain height are unnecessary, one strike of the match applied to the burners is absolutely all that is needed for the attainment of a hot bath, and the water heats with great rapidity. Where there are young children, it is often of untold importance to have ready to hand the means of giving a hot bath, and of sudden illness, so this is another point in favour of substituting gas for the old method of heating cooking &c. During the winter months the gas fire also plays a prominent part in lessening the labours of the housewife. It is satisfactory, after having been out for some hours, to be able, on returning home, to get all the benefit of a cheerful fire in an incredibly short space of time, without waiting in what the wood splitters, and the coal frequently refuses to kindle. When unexpected visitors arrive, it is so easy, whilst discussing the cheering cup, to set a match to the gas fire in the drawing room, and the temperature of that apartment having risen to a desirable height, the evening can be pleasantly passed in the enjoyment of music, for it is here that the piano usually finds a home.

By using the gas ring at the top of the cooker, a plentiful supply of hot water can be obtained for washing dishes, cutlery and cloths; further, by obtaining flexible piping, the ever-useful gas-heated iron is at your service. But it may be urged, is not all this gas rather an expensive item? Properly used, most decidedly No! for, without its aid, assistance in the household would in many cases, be absolutely indispensable.

In conclusion, it must be said that to abstain from the use of what is so clean, so safe, and so convenient, the saving of domestic drudgery is, to say the least of it, being a penny wise and a pound foolish.

Housing Problem.

Laborer Asks Some Questions.

Editor Evening Telegram. Dear Sir.—One of the evening newspapers on Saturday last, commenting on the Bowring Park and the Housing Problem, says it learns that a company has finalized arrangements for the purchase of the strips of land in the neighbourhood of the proposed park opposite Littledale Academy with the idea of erecting small dwelling houses renting at about \$120 to \$150 per annum—describing its frontage and so forth—it would make ideal sites for the purpose suggested as they are about to build some thirty houses. Now, sir, I was under the impression when the idea was first mooted in our midst, it was the intention to get the employers and others interested to erect a certain number of houses, so that their employees would be able to hire them at a small rental—say, from \$50 to \$70 per annum. All this was brought about through the lack of houses for the labouring men, or those who could pay about that amount yearly; but when the item referred to puts the rental down at \$120 to \$150, I would like to know what labouring man in St. John's can afford to pay that sum, not including car fares, for our labouring class are practically idle during the greater part of the winter months. Again, the distance is too near town. Why didn't he say somewhere about Topsail Hill! I would like to ask how many laboring men would walk all the way from Waterford Bridge to the centre of the town if they had daily work to perform? The idea to my mind is absurd. Again, it speaks about the Reid Co. extending their street car tracks in that direction; if such was carried out the man who goes to work at 6 and 7 in the morning would have to wait until 8.30 as the cars do not commence to operate before 8 a.m., or else he would have to foot it which would be worse on him than a day's work, and what about the winter months? When and how are they going to reach that distance, the cars are often tied up here in town after a very small fall of snow. Whatever chance the laboring man would have in getting to work from the higher levels, or somewhere about that distance, he certainly would have none from the distance referred to. It is true they go great distances in Canada and the States; but the companies are far better equipped

than our car company. I recall a few years ago the Reid Co. car or two up from Rawlins' Road to Harvey Road and LeMa Road to the Junction of Barter's but it was for a very short time, was said it did not pay. Now, in all sincerity how is it to go pay to run them to Waterford Bridge? Hoping I have not trespassed much on your valuable space, I remain, yours truly, A LABORER St. John's, Dec. 12th, 1911.


Cod Still Plentiful.

SATISFACTORY YEAR IN BANK OF MONTREAL.

Splendid Financial Statement Presented at Annual Meeting.—Mr. H. V. Meredith Becomes General Manager of the Institution, Sir Edward Clouston Resigning After Many Years' Service.
The annual report of the Bank of Montreal, presented by Sir Edward Clouston, Bart., general manager, at the 94th annual general meeting of the shareholders, held in the boardroom, Montreal, Dec. 5th, shows a gratifying state of increased prosperity in the institution's affairs. During the year ended Oct. 31, 1911, net profits, after all deductions and provisions, totalled \$2,276,519; dividends were disbursed amounting to \$1,449,000; \$3,000,000 was credited to the reserve account; and there remains at the credit of profit and loss the sum of \$1,855,185, in comparison with \$961,789 at balance on Oct. 31, 1910.
Mr. R. B. Angus, president of the bank, having taken the chair on motion of Mr. W. M. Macpherson, it was then moved and carried that Messrs. G. P. C. Smith and Barrett H. McLennan be appointed to act as scrutineers, and that Mr. James Aird be secretary of the meeting. Sir Edward Clouston then read the report of the directors.
In moving the resolution of adoption the President, Mr. R. B. Angus, said:—"I have to call the attention of the shareholders to two important changes in the annual statement."
"The one that was authorized by you and subsequently approved by the Treasury Board provided for an increase of the capital stock by \$1,600,000, mainly with a view of extending to that amount the right to increase the issue of notes in circulation. This appeared to be urgently demanded, as the circulation of this bank had reached the legal limit—the amount of the paid-up capital—and as other banks were much in the same position. It was feared that a great scarcity of currency would soon be experienced."
"The calls on new stock extend over a period of nine months, and the payments being completed, the capital will stand at \$16,000,000, and the rest at a like amount."
"Another considerable change in the statement at this time will be seen in the treatment of bank premises account, which for years had been represented by the comparatively insignificant sum of \$600,000, notwithstanding the large expenditure recently incurred. Your directors have been frequently criticized for having charged the full amount of the cost under this head against the profits of the year, and it has been suggested that we should alter our system to conform to that of other banks in the published statements. We have, therefore, had a conservative valuation made of the property, which results in the figures now submitted, namely, \$9,088,000; land, \$4,735,000; and buildings, \$4,353,000, and have taken back less than half that amount, or \$2,000,000, more adequately to represent this item in the balance sheet. To adjust bank premises, consequently, the sum of \$3,400,000 has been applied and the balance carried forward."
Mr. Angus concluded: "I regret to announce the retirement of Sir Edward S. Clouston from the general management of the bank. After 47 years of service, 29 of which have been passed in the chief executive office, it is natural that he should seek some relief from the arduous duties of that position. I am happy to say, however, that his mature judgment and great experience will still be available to the administration in the less strenuous office of vice-president. He will be succeeded by Mr. H. V. Meredith, an able and well qualified officer, who will surround himself with such capable assistants as are always to be found on the staff of the bank."

The Bonavista sailed for Sydney at 8 o'clock last night, and will ply during the winter months between Sydney, Halifax and St. John in the coal trade.
The schr. Fleetly left Sydney on Saturday coal laden for this port, and should soon turn up.
The Mayflower is now 49 days out from Oporto to this port and is making a long run. She is evidently meeting the bad weather which the Galathea experienced.

Women of The Empire.

Father Bernard Vaughan Tells Toronto Audience Who are Wanted—Ideals the Great Need—Stirring Address on Question of Public Morality by Well-Known London Priest.

Toronto, Dec. 6.—"Our empire has little use for the frivolous, doll-dressed darlings of society. There is enough work for all women to do if only they will address themselves to it. Than doing nothing at all, it would be better to take in a little washing. It is not the women who work who need rest cures, but those who are worn out doing nothing, and doing it badly."
Such in part was the opinion of Father Vaughan, as expressed before the feminine audience of Loretto Abbey this afternoon. Father Vaughan, an especially impressive speaker, addressed the students of the Abbey the necessity of a mission in life, governed and directed by a lofty ideal. By way of parenthesis he reminded them, with Lecky, the historian, that it was reserved for Christianity to supply to the world its highest ideal of virtue, and at the same time its strongest incentive in its practice, Jesus Christ. "Hit your wagon to that Pole Star," he concluded.
Father Vaughan remarked that in the course of a conversation with a leading woman in society, he happened to say that "Given a man's code of morality, I could state with almost dead certainty how, under any given circumstances, he would act; but given a smart woman's code it would be impossible to assert what her line of action might be."
She drew herself up and replied: "And pray, how could you, my dear Father, tell how she would act, when she wouldn't herself know?"
Father Vaughan said further that what he wanted to see in the rising generation of ladies on both sides of the Atlantic was lofty and holy character, something reliable, something scornful compromise where principle was in question.
He pleaded for the uplifting of some ideal; and said in part:
"All noble and lofty human action presupposes the influence of some ideal; no healthy human life can be borne up unless sustained by some such uplifting force. Lose your ideal and you lose your mission. The policy that has no ideals will never vitalize and inspire a family, still less a people. The only test of progress which is to be anything more than a mere animal rejoicing over mere animal pleasures, is, as has been well said, the development and spread of some spiritual ideal, which will rise into an atmosphere of effort and distinction, the life of us more ordinary folks."
"Never was there a stage in the story of our life," continued the speaker, "when ideals were of such imperious need as to-day. When engrossed so much in material comforts and luxuries, there was an ever growing danger of our settling down into gross, selfish, self-centred materialism."
"Be sure of this," he said to his lady audience, "that unless you meet indulgence by self-denial, you will go under as surely as if you fell through a crevasse on one of your verging glaciers."


