



**Why We Get Tired.**

BY RUTH CAMERON.



Few women realize how disproportionate a t e l y much weariness and exhaustion comes to them from doing some little thing which is beyond their normal strength.

A doctor was called in one day by a woman who found that she could not get through her day's work in a comparatively small house, and with a family of three, without being completely tired at night. He surprised his patient by asking to see her kitchen. This room was a fairly compact place arranged with some regard to efficiency, and for awhile the doctor was puzzled. Then they passed into the dining-room and his face lit up with comprehension. Between the two was a heavy swinging door. "That door ought to stay back, doctor," explained the woman, as she pushed wearily through it and it swung back, "but the catch won't work. I've been meaning to have it fixed for months."

"How many times a day do you suppose you go through that door?" asked the doctor.

"I couldn't tell you," answered his patient; "perhaps a hundred."

The door was an exceptionally heavy door, resisting to the extent of nearly fifty pounds pressure, according to the doctor's estimate. Every time the house-wife passed through it she had to exert that much effort. It was evidently the last straw that broke the camel's back.

The doctor ordered a spring tonic, but he also prescribed much more emp-

tically a new catch for the offending door.

One over-exertion will tire anybody infinitely more than a dozen exertions. When you make a normal exertion you are simply using muscles and hence strengthening them. When you over-exert yourself, you tear down and weaken your muscles.

You may carry a weight which your arms are easily capable of holding, some distance without tiring yourself; but if you attempt to lift a weight which your arm muscles cannot easily manage, and try to help yourself by using your stomach muscles, as we all do, you will exhaust yourself even if you only carry the weight a very little distance. The amount of work done in the first case may be greater than in the second, but the exhaustion is much less because the effort was normal.

The other day I found myself tired out at noon. It did not seem to me that I had done very much, and I remembered a struggle with a window which saw swollen from the damp weather I had exerted my utmost strength—and more—to try to force the window up, and it was undoubtedly that over-exertion which left me worn out long before the day was over.

Every woman ought to beware of the over-exertions. She ought to be sure that there is nothing in her equipment such as a refractory door, or a heavy tea-kettle, or anything of that sort, which will over-tax her strength. And she had better suffer inconveniences, such as the window that would not open, rather than exhaust herself in trying to overcome them. House-work is none too easy at best. We certainly cannot afford to be extravagant with our strength in this way.

**Bitterly Disappointed.**

Dear Sir—Please permit me space in your esteemed journal to publish a few facts in relation to the manner in which the present Hungry Party are treating the people of this shore in connection with their roads, etc. To say that every right thinking man on this shore (barring a handful of hangers) is disgusted with the management of public affairs is to put it mildly.

I was one who did my best to support this notorious picnic band last year, but to-day, like every other person who possesses brains and reason enough to distinguish good from evil, I have arrived at the conclusion that such a parcel of deceptive office seekers never before disgraced a country.

Among the numerous promises or bluffs which was made to us last election was one that we should have the Elective Road Board system in this district. Well, we elected Woodford and Murphy, and no sooner were they returned than they set about (behind the screens of course) with callous indifference to public demands and placed the Road Board as well as other jobs in the hands of a few friends; and indeed after so much sifting and culling it is quite apparent they selected parties quite as indifferent to the people's interest as themselves. Consequently to-day, the 27th of June, not one solitary dollar has been expended upon our local roads, and the poor farmer is left to do his carting this spring and summer over roads which are in a disgraceful condition. And now the caplin school is here, and after the hardship of securing these fish for fertilizing purposes, we are compelled to get them to our gardens as best we can, sometimes more than a mile over roads washed out by the elements of the past winter and spring. And this is the way the Government are assisting farmers and promoting agriculture.

But they will find that our people can better appreciate a good road to

their gardens than a hundred thousand dollar (so-called) agricultural policy, which robs us of about \$250 per family to support it, and hands back the balance (which is not devoted in excessive salaries and unprofitable exhibitions) in the shape of a gallon of seed potatoes and a \$200 grant annually, which if equally divided would just about give the one thousand voters in this section twenty cents per man; and gives the farmer of this country about as much information on real farming as might be obtained on application to the chief of an Esquimaux settlement on Labrador.

I wonder does Mr. Woodford imagine that with the aid of a few healers here, and a nice smile and handshake, he hopes to cod and bluff the electors into supporting him for another term. If so, he'll find there'll be something doing in 1913 when he tries again.

As for Murphy, he was never taken very seriously, for with the exception of perhaps a health trip to the seashore he is seldom seen. In fact when he made his appearance a few days ago, if it was not for the affectionate way he was embraced by a certain healer he might have left again unrecognized. It will soon be time for him to again show off behind his coach and four. If only to make himself appear imposing and conspicuous, see ridiculous.

I intend, Mr. Editor, when time permits, to deal more fully with other public matters here, and the outrageous way in which our public money was squandered in building a wharf for a supporter and the condition it is in to-day, owing in part to the extraordinary vigilance of the chosen caretaker.

## Commercial Cable Co. Wins.

The action taken by the Commercial Cable Company against the Newfoundland Government, which refused to ratify the contract made with the Company by the Bond administration, is at last concluded. The Supreme Court of Newfoundland upheld the Government in its refusal to ratify the contract, but the decision of the Judicial Committee of the House of Lords reverses the decision of the Supreme Court. The Government will have to pay costs and ratify and confirm the contract. The Commercial Cable Co. broke the cable monopoly here by laying two cables. The contract was made by Sir Robert Bond in order to try and lower the cable rates. This was accomplished but the Morris Government worked on the principle that nothing done by Bond would be ratified by them, and the result has been a long and costly lawsuit, resulting in a win for the Company.



One hundred and eight years ago to-day Alexander Hamilton, one of the greatest minds this country has ever produced, fell in duel at the hands of Aaron Burr. Burr, who was running for governor of New York, wanted Hamilton to utter a few encomiums of his candidacy on the editorial page of the Federalist, a strong stand-pat publication, which stood for a high protective tariff and a central bank. Hamilton responded by informing his readers, in double-loaded long primer, that if Burr read Hamilton's remarks in the Federalist, he became very indignant and promptly stopped his paper, thus starting a melancholy train of delinquent subscribers and making the newspaper profession more hazardous than crushing dynamite with a tack hammer. He challenged Hamilton did not want to kill anybody and refrained from shooting at Burr except his creditors, but the death of Hamilton made a hole in American statesmanship which has never been plugged up since. Hamilton never became very enthusiastic over the masses. He was the inventor of the pleasing axiom that this is a government of the people by a representative part of the people, which T.

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### Roosevelt has been puncturing

with so much enthusiasm of late. He also endeavored to reform the currency by locating all of it that was movable in one spot, where Wall Street could check against it without being interrupted by the country bankers. Nobody liked to discuss the money question with Hamilton, as he usually left them in a condition where they couldn't tell a silver certificate from a laundry slip. Despite his high-brow proclivities, Hamilton was a splendid type of early American character and integrity. He fought with Washington, lived cleanly and in the open, and what money stuck to his fingers was his own. His services to the young republic were never better appreciated than now. **Garlic Cures Consumption,**  
 Is the Statement of a Dublin Physician.  
 Dublin, June 24.—Dr. Wm. C. Minchin, of Dublin, has just written a book on the use of garlic in consumption that is attracting wide interest. Though many prominent medical men bear out Dr. Lincoln's assertions, including Professor Poore, of University College Hospital, London, and Professor Cavazzani, of Vienna University, the book has roused considerable opposition in the profession. This fact does not, however, disturb the author, in view of the fact that he remembers how the medical faculty scoffed at Dr. Bodington and Dr. Henry MacCormac, of Belfast, when they first advocated the open air treatment for tuberculosis patients. Dr. Lincoln traces the causes and symptoms of "the white plague" and boldly declares the garlic treatment is not only of value in pulmonary cases after other treatments have failed, but in all tubercular affections of the hands, feet or other accessible parts of the body. He gives instances of cases where amputation was recommended, but where the use of allyl sulphide (garlic) effected a complete cure on being tried as a last resort. The garlic treatment has the advantages of being cheap and safe in the patient's own home, for Dr. Minchin declares the allyl sulphide, being a powerful germicide, will effectually prevent the spread of infection to others.
