





AT LAST EVENING'S FIRE ON THE

A fire of an unknown origin broke out on the east side of King's Road at 6.20 last evening in the house owned by Mr. William Cook, victualler, and occupied in the top and larger portion of the building by a family amed Sheppard, and in the ground flat by Mr. W. F. Kenny, who keeps a barber shop. In response to an 5 alarm sent in, the Central and East End companies were quickly on the scene. The fire looked theratening at the outset and if there had been any wind in such a thickly populated neighborhood, the results would have been disastrous. A blaze which came from the barber shop was eating its way through the ceilings and was hard to get at. The firemen were hampered in many respects. The barred, the owner having left for 5 home ten minutes previously, and had to be broken in. Next the place was filled with smoke which was so dense as to almost suffocate not a few of tedious task was the removal from a |5 room in the top flat, Mrs. Sheppard, who was very ill in bed, being only four days sick. Hanley, on the opposite side of the street The scene was a sad one and elicited the sympathy of the hundreds of peostrenuous labor the firemen got at the blaze. Two streams of water and the use of the chemical succeeded in extinguishing the fire a few minutes afterwards, but not before Mr. Sheppard's furniture was broken and badly damaged by smoke and water. Hudson's dry goods store at the rear also sustained slight damage, while Kenny's barber shop was completely wrecked. 





The Rt. Hon. Joseph Chamberlain died last night. His death, which came as an entire surprise, removes one of the most striking figures from British politics of a past generation. 

Municipal Government of Jerusalem.

The Jerusalem municipality is composed of ten members, half of whom are chosen every two years, the term of office being four years. From these ten the Governor of the Province of Jerusalem chooses one to be the President or Mayor. The President is the only member receiving a salary, which is about \$64 a month.

The members of the municipal council or commission are chosen by the whole city, but are apportioned in accordance with the different races and religions. Their duties are largely advisory, the President exercising most of the power. All property owners who are Ottoman subjects have a



Dr. John R. Mott.

Last night at the Seamen's Institute, the Protestant clergymen of this country who were present, were treated to an address, the weight and soul and comprehensiveness of which left nothing to be desired. The meeting was presided over by the Lord Bishop of Newfoundland. We have frequently heard that the vision of John R. Mott was the vision of a great missionary statesman and seer, and our testimony is, "The half has not yet been told."

In perfect diction, in majestic thought, in burning sentence he threw the glamour of the modern missionary movement upon us, until we reached the mount of vision. The following sentences give in briefest outline some idea of the most inspiring address on missions to which it has been our privilege to listen:

The forces of Christianity are at present facing an unprecedented situation, a moment critical and alarming both at the home base and abroad. This situation is unprecedented. (1) In danger; and (2) In urgency.

danger because of the possible loss which will come it we fail to seize this moment, and unprecedented in urgency because so many nations are n a plastic condition, but will soon become fixed. Great changes-political, ethical, economic, social and religious-are, taking place in the non-Christian world. This is an interesting day in which to live. If Chrisexcepted). 
