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



The Union of South Africa was formed under the South Africa Act which passed the home parliament on Sept. 20th, 1909. Under its term the self-governing colonies of Cape Colony, Natal, the Transvaal and the Orange River Colony formed the Inion of South Africa. The Union Parliament has two chambers, a Senate and a House of Assembly. Senate consists of forty members. The House of Assembly has 121 members distributed as follows: Cape of Good Hope 51, Natal 17, Transvaal 36, and the Orange Free State 17. The members must be British subjects of Eu-

General Botha has had struggle since the war commenced. He has had to face and put down a rebellion, and he also undertook opposed by the Nationalists, led General Herzog, the campaign which brought German S. W. Africa under the control of the Union. also favoured aiding the Empire by sending troops to fight in Europe or General Herzog opposes this policy. Four parties are in the field in this Election: South African peared in yesterday's Mail & Advocate party, led by General Botha; the stating that the Secretary of the Board Unionist party, led by Sir Thomas of Trade found it impossible to obtain Smartt; the Nationalists led by General Herzog and the Labour party. The issue between Botha and Herzog is defined as one between the "One Streamers" and the "Two Streamers." Botha is urging unity of action be tween the Dutch and English, and ask ing them to persevere on the road o mutual respect and co-operation, leading to true harmony and peace.

Off Siberian Coast. Seattle, Wash., Oct. 16.- After a

successful walrus hunting expedition in the Arctic, headed by Capt. O. A. Aannevik, noted navigator of the Far North, the steamer Corwin has reach-The Corwin left this port last May

and after delivering cargo and passengers at Nome was outfitted for cruise to the Siberian coast and far into the Arctic. With all her passenger accommodations removed Capt. Annevik heading the expedition and Capt. R. J. Healey acting as navigator, the Corwin steamed direct from of the offer. Austria's peace terms Nome for the Siberian coast. Twenty Eskimos, skilled in hunting walrus were obtained and with her officers, the only white men aboard, the vessel began her cruise in search of big

cruises in the Arctic; going as far as latitude 69.40 north. On the first cruise her crew bagged 837 walrus, were discharged into the freighter Latouche at Nome and sent to Seattle. On the second expedition the crew bagged 516 walrus, from which were obtained 100 tons of hides, 4,000 pounds of ivory and 165 barrels of oil, the vessel's cargo when she

arrived in Seattle.

"There was a big blizzard on the Fourth of July in the Arctic and more than ten inches of snow was on the Corwin's deck before the storm was over. Offered Bribe to the Serbians.

Prince Alexander Refuses to Sell His Country to Austria.—Greek Munitions for the Turks.

Chicago, Oct. 16 .- A cable to the ribune from Paris, says: The information reached here to

day that Austria a month ago offered tempting terms of peace to Serbia. And only the intervention of Prince Alexander, who said that Serbia was ready to die by the sword rather than be a traitor, prevented an acceptance were that Serbia should retain all territory held before the war, with the exception of Bulgarian Macedonia, which was to be handed back to Bulgaria. Serbia, of course, was to allow Austria and Germany to send The Corwin made two hunting troops and munitions to Constantinople through Serbia and Bulgaria via Belgrade.

For this purpose the Belgrade sec or of the country was to be ceded to Austria, for the period of the war, Austria guaranteeing to return it at the end of the hostilities. The Serbian council was seriously

considering the offer which, in their view, required no greater sacrifices on the part of Serbia than the allies' proposals to pacify Bulgaria, would let Serbia out of more fighting when Price Alexander dramatically ended the discussion.

It also became known here to-day in connection with the refusal of Greece to support Serbia that Greece has for some time been actively sup plying Turkey with munitions of war. Greek vessels have been obtaining permission to enter the port of Smyr a for cargoes of figs contracted for before the war. Ostensibly the Greek vessels entered Smyrna with light cargo, but in reality they were every time loaded with munitions for the Turkish Army. Only recently have the allies learned what was going on and Greek vessels going to Smyrna are now stopped.



I doubt if the address I have used s sufficient, but it was attached to a other pairs of the same kind with them, and I thought you may be interested to know that these are being used by wounded soldiers in this hospital. They were distributed just at an appropriate time. Some of us had needed a change for a day or two. With thanks.

FROM DRIVER DODGSON, R. F. A. Sunday, Oct. 3rd, 1915. Dear Miss Stone,-

I hope you will excuse me taking the liberty of writing these few lines, but I think it is only right for me to thank you for sending me such a beautiful pair of warm socks. I was in St. Thomas's Hospital when they were given me, but I am now with the third line of my Regiment being almost better now. Perhaps you would like me to give you an account of my doings while out in France, so here goes: It was on March 30th, at midnight, when (along with my two cousins who are also in our battery) we set sail for Southampton and landed at Havre (France) by as near as I can remember 5.30 a.m., here we had breakfast and had to water and feed our horses; we stayed for two days at Havre waiting to be sent into the firing line. Havre is a kind of receiving or clearing station. All troops who land there are sent to different parts of the country; we were not sent into action straight away but were kept on firing practice for a

ortnight at a small place 18 mile outh east of Paris. Then we went for a march and entrained on the outskirts of the French capitol; I was rather disappointed here as I was wanting very much to see Paris. The reatest difficulty I had up to this ime was in speaking French, but I and just about mastered the art of

asking for a few things.

The first thing we did was to put our horses in the boxes and the guns and limbers then had to be slung on trucks, that done we looked about for our "carriages" but to our dismay found that we had to go in horse boxes, some straw was put in the bot- vote assured. tom and there were thirty of us in each, or just enough room for us to stand up in, and in this way we were travelling 30 hours. When we alighted we were greeted by French and British Tommies who were in a rest camp at the Headquarters Base, and by April 28th, or just short, of a month from leaving England, we fired the first shot at the Germans. I am a driver in the R. F. A. and it was in the fight from Hill 60 that I received my wound. We had been at it for 3 days with our 18 pounders, and I was tion to our firing battery waggons; we had got there and were returning with the horses to a place of safety when my horse, which was a leader, was killed by a piece of shrapnel, of played by the bands and sung by the course it fell causing me to break my audience brought the entertainment left arm. I shall be very glad when that time comes, as I will be nearer home and will be able to see my mother and sister who live together my father being dead. I was a costume cutter before joining the army, and as soon as the war is over am going back again to my old trade. My socks were admired by my two ocusins who are in a hospital in Leeds -both of them being gassed. They came across from France by the same poat as I did but I did not see them. It would have done your heart good to have seen the rush last April for woollen socks, mittens and scarves, although it was warm during the day pair of socks I have been given to they came in very useful at nights wear this week. 
