



Fighting in the Fog.

Some Exploits of the Royal Newfoundland Regiment in the Final Phases

Have you ever looked over your papapet across that expanse of disputed territory known as "No Man's Land" and saw rolling toward you a solid wave of dark gray vapour that is characteristic of October weather in Northern France? If not, you will want to picture the thickest fog from the Banks enveloping you in your vessel, and you will picture to some extent the surroundings of our Battalion on the morning of October 14th. 1918.

Just before "zero" hour the vapour settled down, and when the Regiment jumped "over the top" the artillery support and smoke barrage produced such a dense curtain that visibility was impossible and the advancing line of figures melted into the mist. 

Ralph Adams Cram, a member of the Boston Planning Board, told the members of the Boston Housing Association on Friday that he had found at the Fore River yard of the Bethlehem Shipbuilding Corporation, a die cutter who received \$224 for one day's pay. For a period of four months this man averaged \$220 every working day, Mr. Cram said. The die cutter, according to Mr. Cram, was given a new machine to work with, which made it possible to increase his output greatly, while the piece-work basis upon which he was paid, remained unchanged for the period of his record wages.

The London Daily News says: "A British secret naval code book fell into German hands, and Admiral Hall knew it. 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
