Coyle Acquitted.

Coyle Acquitted.

The trial of Coyle was resumed on Wednesday morning; the interest in the case was unabated, and notwithstanding the Fair and its numerous attractions the court was crowded throughout the day, several fenales being present. Several witnesses were examined, after which Mr. Glass addressed the jury for the prisoner. He gave an able resume of the testimony on both sides. The learned counsel repudiated strongly the theory that there had been a criminal intimacy between the prisoner and Phoche Campbell. The Crown had not made out that Coyle was the man who bought the pistol. They had in fact, proved exactly the opposite. The learned counsel then referred to the statement sworn to by Phoche Campbell, accusing John McWain of the murder, and he wished to know why that statement had not been brought forward when the witness was oxamined. He alluded to the frequency of cases in which confessions had been made by perfectly innocent persons. He cited the case of Coleman at the Kingston assizes in 1848 or 1849, where the prisoner was arrested, tried and executed for murdering a woman, and the admission on which he was convicted had been made while the prisoner was intoxicated. Sometime after the execution of Coleman, his innocence was clearly proved.

RARE DISCOVERY.—Dr. A. M. Ross, of Toronto has a well-preserved tooth of the extinct American elephant, or mammoth, which was found, together with a large number of other bones of the same animal, in a mound of light clay loam on the property of Mr. R. Mr. McKellar Vindicated. The Mail and all the smaller Min-The Mail and all the smaller Min-isterial papers have been employing their spare time and space for the last few weeks, in trying to fasten serious charges of fraud and dishon-esty on the Hon. Mr. McKellar in connection with the Elgin Association. These charges have been reiterated day after day in the Tory journals, and frantic demands were made to Mr. McKellar to explain or confess his guilt. He was not so accommodating to his unscrupulous assailants as to do either. In the full consciousness of his own honesty and rectitude, he could afford to treat such slanders with comtempt, well knowing the object for which they were invented, and that only a few unprincipled politicians affected to

believe thom.

But if Mr. McKellar has preferred to keep a wise silence in reference to these attacks, another gentleman has come forward to vindicate his public and private character, and to the satisfaction of every man, who believes a plain, straightforward and truthful statement. This gentleman is the Rev. Mr. King of the Buxton mission near Chatham. The charge was that Mr. McKellar on the strength of certain representations made by himself and Mr. King in London in 1859 induced certain philanthropic gen-tlemen there to raise \$8,000 in shares induced certain philanthropic gentlemen there to raise \$8,000 in shares for the purpose of erecting saw and grist mills in the Baxton settlement, which as most of our readers know, was occupied exclusively by colored people, most of whom had at one time been slaves, and who had either been liberated or escaped from bondage. We may explain that Mr King at one time, owned a plantation and a number of slaves near New Orleans, but abhoring slavery, he sold the plantation, brought his slaves to Canada, and gave them their freedom. Mainly by his influence the Elgin Association was formed, 9000 acres of land were purchased in the Township of Raeligh, and this land was sold to the colored settlers, giving them ten years in which to pay it. It was with the view of assisting the resources of the Township that the mills for which the \$8000 was raised in London were erected. Air King could not give his personal supervision to the working of the mills, the agents employed to manage them proved faithless, the scheme faited, and in addition Mr King last \$15000 of his own money. What, our readers will ask, was Mr

What, our readers will ask, was Mr
McKellar's share in the transaction?
Simply this, that when in London he
