NEWSPAPERS CANNOT BE **BUN AS SUBSIDIZED** ORGANS

Success Cannot Be Attained Except When Paper is Independent

Editorial Policy of Most Newspapers is Independent and Free From Political Influence

Madison, Wis., August 8.—"How is news service affected by the constantly increasing cost of the news_ paper plant; the increasing proportion of total newspaper revenues derived from the advertisers, and the non-journalistic interests of the capitalist owner?" was answered in a paper prepared by Don. C. Seitz, of the New York World before the national newspaper conference.

"The first question I am asked is How is news service affected by the constantly increasing cost of the newspaper plant? To begin with," said Mr Seitz, "this is a false premise. The cost of the newspaper plant is not con stantly increasing except as the news value of a publication makes it neces sary to expand. Newspaper machinery while expensive primarily, is enduring

"Newspaper plants ars expensive only relatively. When measured by effi ciency, while costly in the iniative, the are extremely economical from a standpoint of production. Otherwise how would it be possible to produce the grams, and the various bureaus. The such as dominate the field in New York and Chicago? The cheap newspaper is only cheap because its mechanical coordination is economical.

Birth of Newspaper Costly "There is no cheap and easy way left of course, to start a great daily, but this is only because the field is so

thoroughly well guarded by its present possessors. "It is the cost of the news service and not the cost of the plant that makes starting a newspaper difficult. Three-fifths of the cost of operating a modern

daily are what might be called over-head charges. I mean by that news service, editorial writers, pictures, cable-grams, an dthe various bureaus. The grams, an drife various bineaus. tion of total newspaper revenue derived from the advertisers?

'It is only affected by the extent to which the various revenue enable i to spend more money for news and better editorial service. Only the com mon practice of selling newspapers fo 1 cent has had the effect of cutting down the proportion of the revenue. I should say that in a normal, energetic establishment the advertising would b about two_thirds of the revenue, leaving about one-third to come from the circulation.

Margin of Profit Small "The margin of profit on, a 1 cen newspaper is, of course, slightly ove newspaper is of course, slightly over cost of white paper. This does not ap-ply, however, to the Sunday paper, which is an important adjunct of all large dailies, and where the circulation profit remains an extremely important factor. But the advertising it must be remembered, comes only with the news paper's success as a newspaper.



advertising solicitors and culation fakers go out and impose upon the business public and thus secure the advertising which appears daily is another delusion. "Advertising is about the closest kind

of a business proposition. The large department stores spend their money if exact percentages laid against the valu of their wares, usually about 31-2 per cent. of their gross business.

Editorial Policy Independent

"Perhaps the framer of the question had in mind the thought that the in creasing advertising in some way molds the opinions, news service or editorial energy of the paper. "This is another foolish thought. If

there is merit in proportion, and think there is, the more business a newspaper gets, the stronger it be comes; more powerful and more inde pendent. It is giving value received to the advertiser, and does not truckle to him or dispose itself to secure his business. In short, it commands and does not obey.

"If the theorists would think logically for a few minutes they would see the correctness of this proposition. The strong newspaper acquires its power on a basis of public confidence. The advertiser finds a constituency which has faith in its newspaper much more pro ductive of business results than a sub-sidized sheet could possibly find. "Not only do advertisers not run the

policy of newspapers, but they seldom or never try.

Personal Requests Ignored "It is some five years since I hav had an advertiser ask me to do any. thing even in his personal interest, un less perhaps to print a wedding notic or the mention of some social affair, and in this I rather think the editors treated him more shabbily than if had been some one else.

"Good editors are not interfered with on great newspapers. If they were there would be neither good editors nor great


newspapers. "The third question asked: "How is news service affected by the non-jour nalistic interests of the capitalist own-

"This is one of the shibboleths that come piping regularly out of Wisconsin. In my wide range of newspaper acquaintances I do not know any capitalist owners, nor do I know any successful newspapers that are not owned

by themselves. "It is not possible for a newspaper to be successful run in a private interest. The newspaper is a public concern, and when it ceases to serve the public, it ceases to be a successful newspaper. A good many men have tried to start newspapers or have bought newspapers with the idea that they could in some way manipulate them to a private interest. The result has always been disastrous

Must Be Independent to Succeed "This ery about capitalist ownership interests me mildly, because I would like to know what it is based upon. Who are the capitalists? Where are their interests? Who are their interests? Who are the editors whose minds are perverted? What reporters are com-pelled to write against their will? I would be interesting to have a list made for further analysis.
