# House of Lords, Tuesday, June 30.

The Canadas. The Earl of Mountcashel said that, wi the permission of the Government, he had to put a question on a subject of very considerable importance to a large class of emigrants who had gone out to Canada. It was well known that in the course of the last and present year, very considerable numbers amounting to 6,000 emigrants, had crossed from the United States into Canada. Most of these were paupers, who had gone out as emigrants, and who, owing to the state of difficulties of that country, were unable to obtain employment. These, let it be borne in mind, were in addition to 16,000 or 17,000 poor persons who were already in the Canadas, for the greater part without employment. In 1841 a sum of money was proposed to be raised, by way of a loan, for the purpose of carrying or public works in Canada; and Lord Sydenham who was then governor announced to the House of Assembly that Her Majesty's government would call on the Imperial Parliament to give aid to the local Government .-He hoped that the present government, tho'h he would admit that they were not bound by the acts by the acts of their predecesors, wol'd gurantee the loan for the sake of carrying on on public Works, and thus give employment to large numbers of those who were otherwise unable to procure work. There could be no risk run in government guaranteeing the loan, as the whole province of Canada would be security for it. The question which he would he wish to ask was, whether such arrangements had been made by the 'government, as to the loan, as would enable the local government to carry on the public works,

and thereby give employment to the distressed emigrants in Canada? The Duke of Wellington said that, as the noble Earl had given notice of his question, he should have an answer. A farmer goes to London and purchases some articles which he stands in need of from a merchant or mechanic, promises to pay for said articles in some kind of produce. when the time arrives he comes in with what produce he agreed to, he is competted by this law to go to the market and pay fees upon every load, and upon produce already purchased by an agreement made between Debtor and Credito with which no body of members have any right

a to interfere. In the city of Montreal a Farmer may bring within the limits of the Corporation any kind of produce he may please; if he goes to market of course he pays the fees, but he may sell it o pay his debts with it without being asked for fees, or his purchasers being in any danger

While the right of the Corporation of London to regulate the market fees is fully admitted, but as there are exceptions to most general rules so there should have been to this, every man who calmly consults his own understanding will easily perceive the defect of the law and its evil tendency. Gentlemen :- All the correspondence that has passed between the Provincial and Home Governments respecting the admission of the 5000 0 0 Agricultural products of Canada into the ports of Great Britain, having been laid before Parament, I avail myself of this opportunity to reply to the numerous letters I have received during the last two weeks, on this important

The construction put on these despatches by His Excellency's advisers, is, that the British Government propose to take off all duty on Canada Wheat, provided the Provincial Parliament will impose a duty on all Wheat try, and that on payment of such duty here it shall enter Great Britain as Colonia) produge. For the purpose of carrying into effect this great boon, there is now before the House of Assembly a bill to impose a duty of 3s. Stg. tering this Province from the United States. passed before the prorogation of this Session. This will give the Canada farmer a great advantage over the American grower of wheat. hesides being a source of great revenue to this Province, while at the same time the duty is not so high as to divert its being sent to England through other channels than the Saint Lawrence.

In consequence of changes that have lately a taken place in the Executive Council, and the early prorogation that is to take place on that 3300 0 0 account, the till for the imposition of a duty on the other articles of Canada produce, will £391651 0 0 not be matured until the winter session, but the Government are then bledged to introduce such a bill. 



Annexation of Texas. The Senate of the United State rejects ed the Texas treaty by a vote of 35 to 16. on the 18th inst. On Monday, Mr. Benton introduced a bill to effect the same object. which was read the first time. It authorizes the President to negotiate with Mexico and Texas, on the following basis. The boundaries of Texas to be as fol-

[Here the boundaries of the original rovince of Texas are described. It embraces the land bordering on the streams flowing into the Mississippi, and comprehends 200,000 square miles, enough for four states.

2. The assent of the people of Texas: 3. The "State of Texas," embracing the well settled part of Texas, and with a territory not exceeding that of the largest state in the Union, to be admitted into the Union, on a footing of equality with the original states, immediately upon completion of this act of annexation. 4. The remainder of the territory to

constitute a territorial government, to be called the South Western Territory. 5. The whole territory annexed to be equally divided into two parts in the northern part of which slavery shall never be tolerated, and in the southern part of which it shall be tolerated.



It is useless to argue that men who are sent as represen. tatives of the people to Parliament ought to be rich enough to bear their own expenses. unless it can be proved that rich men possess better abilities than men who are not rich; unless the existence of talent unassociated with riches be denied, both of which propositions have no existence in truth, and both of which almost every day's experience proves to be false. After this exordium, the speaker passe in review the history of the Jews from the days of Abraham down to the period of their subjugation to the Roman empire and the birth of Christ. This part of the address was of such peculiar interest, that we shall gratify our readers by giving some portions of it in his own words.

To comprehend and fully understand people were placed at that important crisis we must endeavor, if possible, to place our powerful, rich and happy, prosperous and independent, the conquerors of every neighboring power, living in the midst of luxury and civilization, enjoying a happy, and equitable code of laws, with wise kings. gillant warriors, a pious priesthood, and great national prosperity, suddenly assail ed by powerful pagan nations, allured by a love of gold, and tempted by the hopes of plunder, contending year after year against fearful odds; their enemy strengthened by fresh levies, while their own resources were exhausted, finding themselves gradu ally sinking, a weak, decayed, defeated power; the once glorious and famed people, abundaned by hope and almost desert and their glory, wrested from them, and the beams of the setting sun falling on the belinet of the Roman centurion, keeping guard near the Holy of Holies.

In this distracted position, and at this period of unexampled calamity, Jesus o! Nazareth found the Jews at the commencement of his ministry.

Denonncing the priests and Pharisees preaching against hypocrisy and vice, prophecying the downfall of the nation, and thus attracting followers and apostles by his extraordinary gifted powers, he became formidable by his decision of character, his unceremonious expression of opinion, and the withering nature of his rebuke; he preached at all times and all places, in and out of the temples, with an eloquence such as no mortal has since possessed, and to give the most powerful and absorbing interest to his mission, he proclaiming himself the Son of God, and declared himself ordained by the Most High, to save a benighted and suffering people as their Savfor and Redeemer.

The Jews were amazed, perplexed and bewildered at all they saw and heard .-They knew Jesus from his birth; he was their neighbor, they knew his father Joseph and Mary his mother, his brothers, James and Judas: he was in constant intercourse with his brethren in their domestic rela tions, and surrounded by the Household goods; they remembered him a boy, disputing, as was the custom, most learnedly with the doctors in the temple; as a man pursuing to the age of thirty, the modest and laborious calling of his profession; and vet he proclaimed hunself the Son of God and performed most wonderful miracles was surrounded by a number of disciples. poor, but extraordinary gifted men, who sustained his doctrines and had an abiding faith in his mission; he gathered strength and followers as he progressed; he denounced the whole nation and prophecied its destruction with their altars and their temples; he preached against whole cities and proscribed their leaders with a force which even at this day would shake our social systems.
