The scouts at the "Head of the Coteau," northwest from Lake Travers, have written to Gen. Subley under date of the 24th ultimo, that they have neld communication with some of

the Sioux Indians from the upper country .--These Indians report that most of the Sissotons are, as before stated, anxious for peace. They are encamped near "Big Mound," on the Missouri Coteau, to the number of two hundred and twenty lodges. The Yanktonais are expected to arrive in the same neighbors hood shortly. The Telon Sioux are assemb ing on the bank of the Missouri river, preparatory to crossing to this side, as they say there are no buffalo in their country, and they will starve if they remain there. I may state that one and all here are burning with rage to bring these fiends to speedy justice.
