movement has taken place, but asserts that it was only intended for the purpose of seeking a more suitable position in case of war with Afghanistan. It is generally believed here that both the Afghans and Russians are hurrying forward, and that a collision is imminent. British consols have fallen 11-16, a Russian securities 2 per cent. A semi-panic prevailed on change.

The London Times, which has constantly been fauning the present alarm, says it is probable that some of Major-general Sir Peter Lumsden's officers have already commenced work on the defence of the Afghan frontier. The government has practically ordered Gen. Lumsden to organize an Afghan defence. The Times understands that the main body of the general's troops has occupied the Robert pass. It is hoped that any measures taken will prevent the capture of the key of India by a coup de main. The Times further says: "If Russia forces England to hostilities she cannot expect that the war will be confined to central Asia. Slandering the Dead. Andrew Carnegie, the Pittaburg million aire, is a great man in his own estimation and in the opinion of many others. It does not, however, become the great living to great dead. Col. Burnaby, perhaps through his own choice, perhaps through the choice of his parents or relatives, adopted the profession of a soldier. In such profession he did his duty and rose to eminence, giving up his life at the end on the battle field. It was probably the death that had he had a choice he would have selected, with possibly the expression of a preference that the great destroyer should come from the hand of a civilized soldier and not from the spear of an untutored savage. However, he did not boast of his deeds, but, with that true quality of modesty that so fittingly becomes a brave and strong man, let them speak for themselves. Andrew Carnegie in his walk in life has probably done his duty, at least to himself and perhaps to his fellow man. He chose to labor in the iron industry, and has accumulated wealth. A portion of his gains-\$50,000 to wit-he recently gave to the faculty of Bellevue hospital medical col. a laboratory. The gift was formally handed over at a meeting on March 9. Andrew Carnegie was the man of the hour, and was cheered and lauded, one would have thought, to his heart's content. But he was not satisfied. In the moment of his tri umph he must needs have a fling at the deeds of a gallant soldier and a sterling man, whose bones lie buried beneath the arid sands of an African desert. Fighting the battles of his country he fell. He did not order the war. It was sufficient for him that his country was involved, and he rushed to aid it to the best of his power, prepared if needs be to die in doing no more than his duty. He would never have insulted the memory of Andrew Carnegie killed in his own iron mill or dead in his bed, but would have freely given that meed of praise due to a man who had risen from poverty to affluence by his own industry. The difficulty between the grand lodge of Quebec and England continues to excit interest on both sides of the Atlantic The American masonic press almost unanimously supports Quebec, and the ommittee on foreign correspondence of the Grand chapter of royal arch masons of

Its royal and aristocratic mem-bers may consider themselves our 'betters,' but we in free democratic Canada will have none of it. If there is a spark of patriotism in the breasts of the members of the three lodges now working in Montreal they will resent this insult by returning their war-rants to our 'betters' in England. Let us have "Canada First" in masonry as well

Still the professorwould not confess to sympathy, even in the
slightest degree, with the scheme of Henry
George. In the first plact, he is strongly
convinced that it is not good for the state
that it should be the universal landlord.
"I think the country benefits considerably by the private enterprise manifested
by the land owners as a body. The state
would not spend upon the land anything
approaching the sums spent by the present
land owners. Take the duke of Sutherland. Would the state spend half the
money he has expended over his estate?
The land of the country, as Frederic Harg
rison remarked when he was here, has
really been manufactured by the landlords,
who, it should be remembered, invest their who, it should be remembered, invest their who, it should be remembered, invest their money in the soil for less than they would get out of the funds. It is all very well for the state in new countries to assume a controlling ownership of the land, for by that means undesirable monopolies may be prevented; but the stimulus of private interest, applied to the land will always be prevented; but the timulus of prevale in-terest applied to the land will always be productive of greater results to the coun-try than a universal ownership on the part of the state, which in such a re lationship would become a machine; and such an ownership has never yet been such an ownership has never yet been tried anywhere throughout the world." But were the facts and probabilities of the case quite otherwise Professor Blackie would still be stanchly opposed to the George proposition. "In my book," he said, "I have approved of the compulsory sale of estates where the land-holder refuses to the said." or fails to do his duty by the soil or the people associated with it. But in the absence of such a failure of duty for the state to take land in which there is public property, as we understand the phrase, in these days, without compensation, would be simple robbery, and I regard the proposition as nonsensical and pernicious in the extreme. Breat Excitement Throughout England-Indignant Feeling Against the Muscovite-Activity at the Dockyards and

LONDON, March 12 .- It is almost im-

possible to adequately describe the state of

ling here. Everywhere the situation is being discussed. On 'change to-day the symptoms were decidedly panicky, but towards the close, on account of a report that Germany had offered to act as a mediator, matters improved a trifle and prices became firmer. The late editions of the evening papers were eagerly snapped up and the bulletin boards were all day long surrounded by such crowds as to make pedestrianism almost impossible and to keep the police actively at work compelling the people to "move on." The same distrust of the government is apparent as characterized public opinion at the time of the fall of Khartoum. It is felt that while Earl Granville is straining every point to Russia, he is also endeavoring to hide the true aspect of affairs, which is believed to be more critical than is really known abroad. Comment is made upon the fact that but for the Times the people would probably have never known entil too late the terrible abyss upon which they were standing. That paper was the irst to chronicle Russian movements upon the Afghan frontier and to direct attention to the strained relations of the two countries. As a consequence, the Times has entirely recovered its prestige, which changes in its staff and the formidable changes in its staff and the formidable competition of the penny papers had of late years done much to weaken. The excitement is not confined to London but is common to the whole country. Members of parliament, all classes of politicians, tradesmen, working people, all are in a foment. Excepting among the extreme radicals but one sentiment is predominant, and that is that at whatever cost Russia's moves must be met boldly and firmly. The dignity of the country demands that much. If fight it is, England will enter upon the campaign with the bitterness and desperation that would characterize an actual war for existence. The news of India's loyalty has been received everywhere with expressions of delight as affording proof that men will be forthcoming in ample numbers to carry the conflict to a

ing proof that men will be forthcoming in ample numbers to carry the conflict to a successful termination. According to popular estimation it will be a war not of defiance but of defence.

It is believed that no formal declaration of war will be made for some time, but it is thought the two countries will be gradually dragged into it by the fighting of forces on the ground. The Russian advance is now certain and this is taken to mean a defiance of Lord Granville's ultimatum. One thing is certain: England ot withdraw an inch. That she h cannot withdraw an inch. That she has no intention of doing so is proven by the incessant activity at all her arsenals and dock-yards. Night and day they are kept busy and all available men are being engaged. Up to date a larger quantity of munitions of war has been turned out this year than was ever known in a similar period within the history of the country.

ever known in a similar period within the history of the country.

The meating of the cabinet at noon, instead of at the usual hour, did not tend to restore public confidence or to allay the feverish excitement. On the contrary it caused reports to spread that a crisis had arrived and the belief in them was strengthened by the fact that before the council general the Rt. Hon. Sir H. F. Ponsonby, equerry to the queen, had a long interview with Mr. Gladstone. Among the rumors to which this gave rise was one that the queen had been advised Among the rumors to which this gave rise was one that the queen had been advised that the Indian situation was grave and required vigorous and decisive action, and that her majesty had urgently insisted on her government doing something. This and similar stories attracted a large crowd to Downing street. Up to 3 o'clock it was not known what the ministers had done not known what the ministers had done.
It was reported that they decided to address a serious representation to the Russian government, that if through any Russian advance in Afghanistan a conflict results with the ameer's troops Russia must accept the consequences, as England is bound to guard the Afghan territory. Another disquieting incident was a conference held by the minister of war with Lieut, Gen. Sir Archibal Alison and the military approximation of the military and the military archivities acceptance.
