THE INVISIBLE HAND.

I cannot pretend to describe the way in which I was seized by the following incident. I am not a fanciful or imaginative man, and I never thought of "ghosts," or took part in any conversation of which they happened to be the topic, it was always to throw ridicule upon them. It was not until I had been in my new domestic, had captured the heart of a certain son of a certain son, who was regarded as the most eligible of the young men of the place, that I perceived the cause of the attention which was being directed towards us.
