NOTE AND COMMENT

A German paper says that peace cannot long be delayed. Yes, the kaiser's defeat is not so far away as some persons imagine.

The Manitoba Government will spend \$125,000 for the purchase of sheep in Ontario at once and will sell these at cost to the farmers of the province. This is the announcement made by Hon. Van Winkler, Minister of Agriculture. The Minister was notified by the Department of Hon. W. J. Hanna, that large quantities of sheep were being sold for slaughter on the Ontario market, and that it would be wise far Manitoba to get a number of sheep to stock up the farms of the province.

The Provincial Government will fix the price to the public of the fish shipped from Lake Nipigon and Nipissing. It is to be 12½c a pound, allowing the dealer 2½c. Places wanting fish will be sent the amount required from general distributing plants. It is not intended that other fish shall be substituted for the Government fish.

defects? We urge this as a convincing reason for repairing our shattered constitution without delay, and for setting up a new and complete political genius of these islands. We believe in the principle of the second chamber; we believe that its powers should be a reality and not a sham, and that its composition should be in accord with the ideas of the time without breaking wholly with its noble historical past.

An order is in preparation requiring all wholesale dealers in fruits and vegetables throughout the Dominion to register with the Food Controller. There is also in preparation a further order which requires that a statement of all purchases of apples from the fruit growing districts shall be filed with the Food Controller. The order covers contracts entered into for the 1917 crop.

Freight Charges on Cattle Shipments

Mr. W. P. Macdonald, local representative of the Ontario Department of Agriculture, is co-operating with the Honorable Martin Burrell in carrying out the plan recently announced, by which important freight concessions apply on carload shipments of female cattle and sheep and also on stockers and feed cattle to country points.

Ontario breeders will be particularly interested in the Free Freight Policy included in the Minister's announcement. Under this policy female cattle under two years of age and ewes three years or younger may be shipped from any Canadian Stock Yards to local points without the payment by the purchaser of freight charges on same. By arrangement with the Railway Companies 25 per cent. of these charges will be rebated by the railroads and the remaining 75 per cent. will be collected by the Railroad Companies direct from the Dominion Livestock Branch. The shipper will be required to make a declaration that he is a bona fide farmer and that the stock so returned is for his own use or that of his neighbors and is for breeding purposes only. Representatives of the Dominion Live Stock Branch, who are now employed in connection with other work at the different stock yards, will be prepared to render assistance to shippers in assembling their consignments if so desired.

Farmers who are in a position to handle additional cattle for feeding purposes this winter or for finishing on grass next summer will receive a rebate of 25 per cent. of freight charges paid on any carload shipment which they may purchase on Eastern Stock Yards. This rebate is being granted by the Railway Companies following regulations made by Mr. Burrell regarding the need of making the fullest use of Ontario's abundant supplies of feed in increasing the beef supply of the country.

Owing to the scarcity of feed in many parts of Western Canada this fall there has been a heavy run of stocker and feeder cattle in the Winnipeg yards during the past few weeks. In view of the fact that feed conditions in Eastern Canada are so satisfactory and the demand for feeding is so general the Dominion Department of Agriculture has agreed to pay fifty per cent. of the freight rate paid on carload shipments of feeding cattle from the Winnipeg Stock Yards consigned to country points in Eastern Canada. This concession will be applicable to both drovers and farmers alike. Shippers consigning to Eastern Stock Yards from the Winnipeg Yard will not be entitled to this reduction, however.

The District Representative will be glad to furnish any further information desired and assist farmers in arranging for co-operative shipments if desired.

MR. HANNA has announced that after November 1 the net profits of Canadian millers will be limited to a maximum average of 25 cents on the milling of sufficient wheat to make a barrel of flour of 196 pounds and the offals produced in connection therewith. Mills will be licensed and will be required to manufacture one or more of three standard grades of flour, which will represent a higher percentage extraction than the white flour now in general use in Canada. Cash prices for these standard grades will be set from time to time.

Household Hints

It is a good idea to make the most of corn meal before it becomes expensive. If the members of your family are properly fed they will feel fit and equal to whatever they have to do.

Stale bread can be saved to make gems as well as griddle cakes.

All gravy and bits of vegetables or meat will make good soup.

Left over cereal of any kind will make very good breakfast muffins.

Dough should be kept covered while rising to prevent a crust from forming which interferes with expansion.

After baking out the fat from the tallow of beef, the cracklings can be ground fine, mixed with rice and fried in cakes.

A custard mixture of one egg to a cupful of milk, well seasoned, mixed with well chopped greens, or any left over vegetables and baked as an ordinary custard, makes an unusual meat substitute.

Cold starch may be used more than once. Let the starch stand for a few minutes to settle, then pour the water from the starch. Put the remaining starch into a hot place to dry out. Turn into a box for future use.

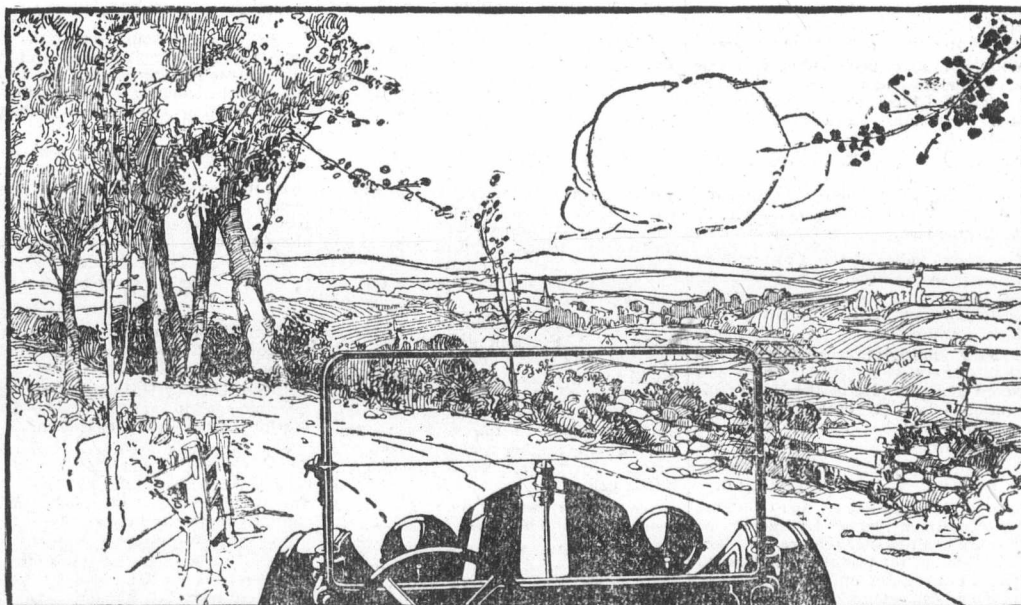

Sir Charles Was a Dreamer

A LADY in Toronto who knew Sir Charles Tupper well tells how deeply interested he was in dreams and apparitions, in all the absorbing questions of psychical research. Once in crossing the Atlantic with him she and a friend received a nervous shock one evening, when Sir Charles came into the cabin where they were seated and told them that he had seen a strange face at the porthole. Unlike John Greenleaf Whittier, who longed to see some dear ghost walk in and sit down beside him, when he was alone, they had no hankering after such an experience. Although Sir Charles' bitterest political opponents claimed that, when he was playing the fascinating game of politics, he was of imagination all compact, and could give to airy nothing a local habitation and a name, very few suspected that he was a sympathetic student of the engrossing questions which were being investigated in a scientific way by societies of psychical research.

After completing his medical studies in Scotland Dr. Tupper and a friend made an excursion into England before returning to Canada. In passing a gipsy encampment they decided to have their fortunes told. As the gipsy girl looked into the hand of the young Canadian doctor she told him that he had come from a long way across the waters. She then proceeded to read his past life as if from a book; but she could not tell him much about the future.

The impression which this fortune-telling gipsy made upon him is one of the first hints which we get in the life of Sir Charles that he was susceptible to anything of this kind. If she could have told the future as easily as she read the past what an improbable story of marvellous achievements in the consolidation and development of a great country he would have heard that day, for as Sir Wilfrid Laurier testified long afterwards there was no one who gave more of his heart and soul to the work of Confederation than Dr. Tupper.

One of the remarkable dreams which Sir Charles could never forget came to him when crossing to Britain a good many years after the incident at the gipsy encampment. He dreamed that a Halifax lady came to him and told him that his wife was dangerously ill. “The dream was so real,” he says, “that I wrote it down with the date. When I reached Liverpool I wrote to my wife telling her the dream and the date, and saying I was ashamed of being so disturbed by a dream, as she had never had any serious illness, but that I should feel uneasy till I heard from her. She wrote to me the same day from Halifax, and our letters crossed in mid-ocean, telling me that on the night in question she had taken dangerously ill and that the lady who appeared to me in my dream had stayed with her all night.”

At another time, much later in life Sir Charles went to Paris, leaving Lady Tupper in England. He dreamed one night that she was very ill. So sure was he that there was something in his dream that he returned to England the next day and found that his fears were too well-grounded.

Another of Sir Charles' dreams which he often referred to relates to the unveiling of Nicholas' statue to the unveiling of Nicholas' statue at Ottawa, July 1st, 1903. “I dreamed the night before that when I unveiled Mr. Davin's statue he was a black man who put out his hand to shake hands with me, and that I fell down in a fit.”

When Sir Charles unveiled the statue he was so surprised to find that it was bronze instead of white marble that he forgot a quotation from Bulwer Lytton which he intended to make. His dream of the night before must have flashed through his mind and led him to fear that the bronze statue might make an effort to shake hands with him. It must have been a great shock which led Sir Charles to forget anything, for he had a marvellously retentive memory. When he was 84 years old he and his granddaughter began the study of Italian together at Rome, and in an almost incredibly short period of time he spoke the language well enough to respond in that tongue to the Pope when his Holiness blessed him. The Pope blessed Sir Charles, and, as is the case of old Father Taylor, the sailor preacher of Boston, no doubt Sir Charles blessed the Pope.

Sir Charles inherited his susceptibility to such things from his distinguished father, Rev. Charles Tupper, who lived so near to the border land of the better life that he could see many things that were hidden from grosser natures.

Many think that dreams are entirely fanciful, and meaningless, inspired more by the dinner eaten, or the nervous excitement of the waking hours, than by anything psychical or spiritual. Instead of saying that we are such stuff as dreams are made of, they think that it is wiser to say that dreams are such stuff as we are made of. Many dreams are no doubt of this kind.

Oxidization of Brass.

Brass when immersed in a hot solution consisting of one-half ounce of golden sulphuret of antimony and four ounces of caustic soda in each gallon of water becomes oxidized with a pleasing brown shade. PREPARE TO MEET THE COST OF WAR

Belligerent Nations are Carefully Husbanding Resources by Effective Organization

Ottawa, Oct. 16.—The cost of the war has become so great in recent months that the layman is at pains to understand it. The Allied financial experts, however, are not frightened by the prospects in view of the measures that are being taken to maintain financial stability in Allied countries.

Assuredly one of the most important of these measures is that which provides for the safeguarding of the national prosperity by sending into military service only those who do not happen to be working at essential tasks. The great basic industries, such as agriculture, transportation, etc., are being carefully protected against disintegration in all the larger belligerent countries. As a result, a very quick recovery is expected to follow the end of the war.

Canada is being congratulated upon her wisdom in recognizing the unexpected length of the war by putting into operation a Military Service Act of moderate type yet bound to prove an efficient help to industry.

CANADA

GEORGE the FIFTH, by the Grace of God, of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland and of the British Dominions beyond the Seas, King, Defender of the Faith, Emperor of India.

To all to whom these presents shall come, or whom the same may in anywise concern—GREETING:

A Proclamation calling out the men comprised in Class 1 as described by the Military Service Act, 1917.

And Whereas moreover it is enacted in and by the provisions of an Act of our Parliament of Canada holden in the 7th and 8th years of our reign and known as the War Time Elections Act that certain persons thereby disqualified from voting with such of their sons as on polling day are not of legal age, shall be exempt from combatant military and naval service;

And Whereas it is further provided by our said Military Service Act that applications for exemption from service shall be determined by our said local tribunals, subject to appeal as in the said Act provided, and that any man, by or in respect of whom an application for exemption from service is made; shall, so long as such application or any appeal in connection therewith is pending, and during the currency of any exemption granted him, be deemed to be on leave of absence without pay;

And Whereas our Governor-General of Canada in Council has determined to call out upon active service as aforesaid the men included in Class 1; as in the said Act and hereinbefore defined or described;

And Whereas moreover it is enacted in and by the provisions of an Act of our Parliament of Canada holden in the 7th and 8th years of our reign, and known as the Military Service Act, 1917, that every one of our male subjects who comes within one of the classes described and intended by the said Act shall be liable to be called out on active service in our Canadian Expeditionary Force for the defence of Canada, either within or beyond Canada; and that his service shall be for the duration of the present war and demobilization after the conclusion of the war;

And Whereas the men who are, under the provisions of the said last mentioned Act, liable to be called out, are comprised in six classes of which Class 1 is, by the provisions of the said Act, defined to consist of all our male subjects, ordinarily, or at any time since the 4th day of August, 1914, resident in Canada, who have attained the age of twenty years, who were born not earlier than the year 1883, and were on the 6th day of July, 1917, unmarried, or are widowers but have no child, and who are not within any of the following enumerated

EXCEPTIONS:—

1. Members of our regular, or reserve, or auxiliary forces, as defined by our Army Act.
2. Members of our military forces raised by the Governments of any of our other dominions or by our Government of India.
3. Men serving in our Royal Navy, or in our Royal Marines, or in our Naval Service of Canada, and members of our Canadian Expeditionary Force.
4. Men who have since August 4th, 1914, served in our Military or Naval Forces, or in those of our allies, in any theatre of actual war, and have been honourably discharged therefrom.
5. Clergy, including members of any recognized order of an exclusively religious character, and ministers of all religious denominations existing in Canada at the date of the passing of our said Military Service Act.
6. Those persons exempted from military service by Order in Council of August 13th, 1873, and by Order in Council of December 6th, 1898;

And Whereas it is moreover provided by our said Military Service Act that our Governor-General of Canada in Council may from time to time by proclamation call out on active service as aforesaid any class of men in the said Act described, and that all men within the class so called out shall, from the date of such proclamation, be deemed to be soldiers enlisted in the military service of Canada and subject to military law, save as in the said Act otherwise provided; and that the men so called out shall report and shall be placed on active service in the Canadian Expeditionary Force as may be set out in such proclamation or in regulations; but that they shall, until so placed on active service, be deemed to be on leave of absence without pay;

And Whereas it is also provided by the said Act that at any time before a date to be fixed by proclamation an application may be made, by or in respect of any man in the class to be called out, to one of our local tribunals, established in the manner provided by the said Act in the province in which such man ordinarily resides, for a certificate of exemption from service upon any of the following

GROUND OF EXEMPTION:—

- (a) That it is expedient in the national interest that the man should, instead of being employed in military service, be engaged in other work in which he is habitually engaged;
- (b) That it is expedient in the national interest that the man should, instead of being employed in military service, be engaged in other work in which he wishes to be engaged and for which he has special qualifications;
- (c) That it is expedient in the national interest that, instead of being employed in military service, he should continue to be educated or trained for any work for which he is then being educated or trained;
- (d) That serious hardship would ensue, if the man were placed on active service, owing to his exceptional financial or business obligations or domestic position;
- (e) Ill health or infirmity;
- (f) That he conscientiously objects to the undertaking of combatant service, and is prohibited from so doing by the tenets and articles of faith in effect on the sixth day of July, 1917, of any organized religious denomination existing and well recognized in Canada at such date, and to which he is in good faith belongs;

And that if any of the grounds of such application be established, a certificate of exemption shall be granted to such man.

And Whereas moreover it is enacted in and by the provisions of an Act of our Parliament of Canada holden in the 7th and 8th years of our reign and known as the War Time Elections Act that certain persons thereby disqualified from voting with such of their sons as on polling day are not of legal age, shall be exempt from combatant military and naval service;

And Whereas it is further provided by our said Military Service Act that applications for exemption from service shall be determined by our said local tribunals, subject to appeal as in the said Act provided, and that any man, by or in respect of whom an application for exemption from service is made; shall, so long as such application or any appeal in connection therewith is pending, and during the currency of any exemption granted him, be deemed to be on leave of absence without pay;

And Whereas our Governor-General of Canada in Council has determined to call out upon active service as aforesaid the men included in Class 1; as in the said Act and hereinbefore defined or described;

Now Therefore Know Ye that we do hereby call out the said Class 1; comprising the men in our said Military Service Act, 1917, and hereinbefore defined or described as to the said class belonging, on active service in our Canadian Expeditionary Force for the defence of Canada, either within or beyond Canada, as we may, in the command or direction of our Military Forces, hereafter order or direct.

And we do hereby strictly command, require and enjoin that each man who is a member of the said class shall, on or before the 10th day of November, 1917, in the prescribed form and manner, report himself for military service, unless application for his exemption shall then have been made by him or by another person entitled to apply on his behalf; wherein our loving subjects, members of the said class, are especially charged not to fail since not only do their loyalty and allegiance require and impose the obligation of careful and implicit obedience to these our strict commands and injunctions, but moreover, lest our loving subjects should be ignorant of the consequences which will ensue if they fail to report within the time limited as aforesaid, we hereby forewarn and admonish them that any one who is hereby called out, and who without reasonable excuse fails to report, as aforesaid, shall thereby commit an offence, for which he shall be liable on summary conviction to imprisonment for any term not exceeding five years with hard labour, and he shall nevertheless, if we so require, be compelled to serve immediately in our said Expeditionary Force.

And we do hereby proclaim and announce that for the greater convenience of our subjects, we have directed that prescribed forms, for reporting for service, and for application for exemption from service, may, at any time on or before the said 10th day of November, 1917, be obtained at any post office in our Dominion of Canada; and that reports for service and applications for exemption from service, if obtained at any of our said post offices and properly executed, shall be forwarded to our postmaster at the post office from which the same are obtained to sit from day to day thereafter, as may be necessary or convenient, at such times and places as shall be duly notified, until all applications for exemption from service shall have been heard and disposed of; also that men belonging to the class hereby called out who have not previously to the said 8th day of November, 1917, reported for service, or forwarded applications for exemption through any of our post offices as aforesaid, may make applications in person for exemption from service to any of our said tribunals on the 8th, 9th or 10th day of November, 1917.

And we do hereby moreover notify and inform our loving subjects who are within the class hereby called out, that if, on or before the 10th day of November, 1917, they report themselves for military service, or if, on or before that day, application for exemption from service be made by them or on their behalf, they will not be required to report for duty, or be placed upon active service as aforesaid, until a day, not earlier than the 10th day of December, 1917, which will, by our registrar for the province in which they reported or applied, be notified to them in writing by registered post at their respective addresses as given in their reports for service, or applications for exemption from service, or at such substituted addresses as they may have respectively signified to our said registrar; and we do hereby inform, forewarn and admonish the men belonging to the class hereby called out that if any of them shall, without just and sufficient cause, fail to report for duty at the time and place required by notice in writing so posted, or shall fail to report for duty as otherwise by law required, he shall be subject to the procedure, pains and penalties by law prescribed as against military deserters.

Of all of which our loving subjects, and all others whom these presents may concern, are hereby required to take notice, rendering strict obedience to and compliance with all these our commands, directions and requirements, and governing themselves accordingly.

In Testimony Whereof We have caused these Our Letters to be made Patent, and the Great Seal of Canada to be hereunto affixed. WITNESS: Our Right Trusty and Right Entirely Beloved Cousin and Counsellor, Victor Christian William, Duke of Devonshire, Marquess of Hartington, Earl of Devonshire, Earl of Burlington, Baron Cavendish of Hardwicke, Baron Cavendish of Keighley, Knight of Our Most Noble Order of the Garter; One of Our Most Honourable Privy Council; Knight Grand Cross of Our Most Distinguished Order of Saint Michael and Saint George; Knight Grand Cross of Our Royal Victorian Order; Governor-General and Commander-in-Chief of Our Dominion of Canada.

THE NEW MAID.

It Takes Her About Two Weeks To Get Broken In.

FOUR BE PATIENT WITH HER.

It is Unwise to Stir Up Her Nervous Reflexes by Trying to Teach Her All Your Fads at Once—Give Her Time to Grasp Your Routine.

Many a mistress becomes hopelessly discouraged by the seeming inefficiency of the new maid in the first two weeks, when a longer trial would have shown marked improvement had she only given the girl a chance to prove it. The first fortnight is the hardest time for the servant in a new home, and it usually takes her all of that time to become accustomed to the way in which the head of the house likes to have her work done. If the mistress encourages her and does not lose patience in the beginning the girl will usually show signs of real efficiency in the last half of the first month.

Unfortunately, however, most women are apt to look on their maids' first efforts in the most critical way. The maid can always feel this supercritical atmosphere, and her work is not improved any by the nervousness created through fear of dismissal.

The new maid, as a rule, falls into one of two classes—the rather shy girl who needs to be told just what to do and the confident, rather aggressive girl who takes hold immediately and starts work without any directions. The average mistress usually prefers the latter, but the former often makes the better maid if her services are retained long enough.

The average mistress does not want to have to direct a maid all the time, and small blame to her. But often the shy girl will settle down and become an excellent maid after she has grown accustomed to the way in which her employer likes to have things done. She would prefer being directed at first until she knows just how the housewife wants the work done, but once she gets the swing of things she goes ahead.

It is far wiser to spend two weeks in breaking in the new maid carefully

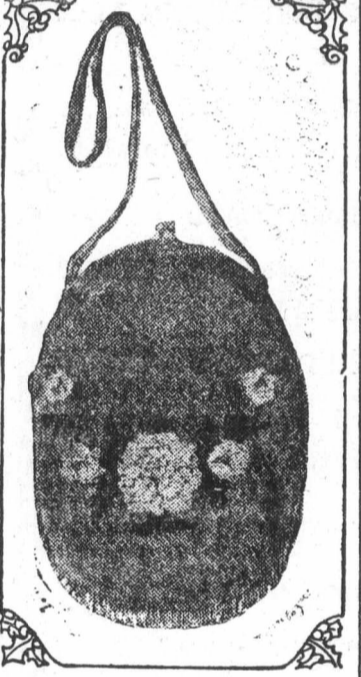
and patiently, housewives, if by so doing you obtain a thoroughly satisfactory girl. If after three weeks or a month you see she does not take hold at all it is time enough to let her go then.

If you find the new girl wants to be told just what to do next do not be impatient, but show her just what you want done and how. Make her out a schedule of the work to be done each day in the week—Monday, washing; Tuesday, ironing; Wednesday, sweeping; Thursday, cleaning silver; Friday, mending; Saturday, baking, or any other arrangement you prefer. Tell her the duties which have to be done daily, like bed making and brushing up.

And she will be satisfactory, for you will have all the work done the way you want it. But don't lose patience in the first fortnight.

 Any farmer or drover can purchase a car load of cattle for feeding purposes on the Winnipeg market and have them shipped to any country point in Ontario upon payment of only one-half the usual freight charges.

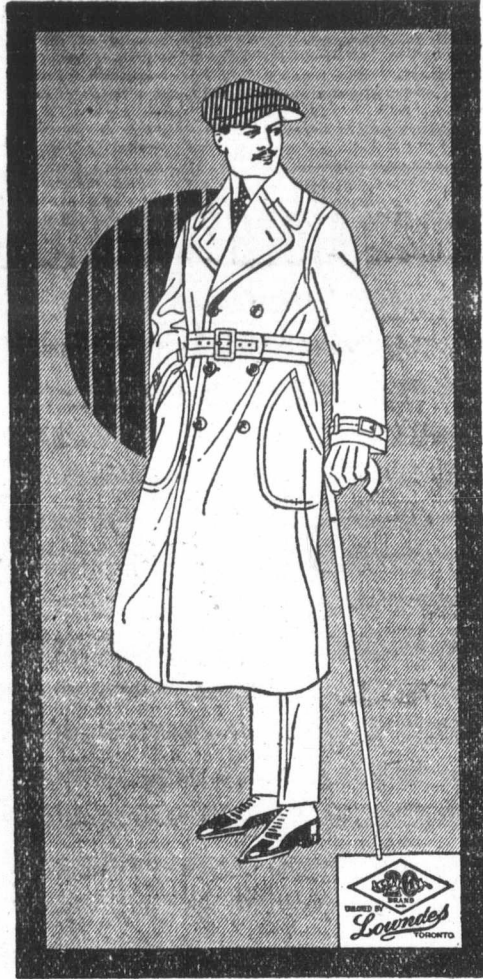

The early frost on August 17th did considerable damage and is responsible for greatly lessening the amount of corn that will be fit for seed this coming spring.

Seed corn will be very scarce and high in price this coming spring. There are no supplies of seed corn being held over from last season. Two short seasons for corn, and the scarcity and the high price of feed has resulted in a shortage of seed corn on hand.

All farmers should prepare at once for next season's planting. Insure a good crop and increased production by selecting your seed corn now. See that it is properly dried before the heavy frosts set in. Corn has a great deal of moisture in it this season. Heavy frost may damage the germ. Select your seed corn now and see that it is properly dried before heavy frosts. Better to use artificial heat, supplied very gradually.
