TEMPERANCE LEGISLATION The following resolution on Provin-

cial Temperance legislation was passed: "We recognize and heartily appreciate the advanced step taken by the Provincial Government in the enactment of legislation prohibiting the sale of iutoxicating liquor, and providing for a measure of Provincial enforcement. We regret, however, that any exception was made of the city of Halifax, and would urge upon our representatives in the House of Assembly to effect such amendments to the Act as will make it operative all over this Province. Further we trust that the citizens of Halifax will take measures as quickly as possibly to fall into line with all other parts of the Province so that the present law will be of
