with a burdensome curriculum, particularly in the languages and most particularly in Latin. Respectably the university was appalled by the education department, by broad-minded educationists on the faculty and by the sagacity of individual teachers and by solutions of teaching bodies, a mitigation of the evil and a school a chance to do the work of education in the true sense of the term. The university was asked to do its share towards removing from the schools that incubus of "cream" with which we are all too familiar. Five thousand copies a year, it is said, of foreign translations of classics are annually imported into this province. And teachers tell us that the reason and justification for this lies in the fact that by the great majority of students the work cannot be done even superficially without resort to such questionable aids. What education there is in this kind of work the average layman may be excused for wondering.

The interesting feature of the situation is that the agitation for moderation in Latin study comes from within classical teachers themselves. A most interesting feature is the obstinacy with which university classical men are found opposing the views of their best friends, namely, the classical teachers, who, as has been said by a recent writer, are furnishing the university with material to keep alive its classical department. It seems to us that there is good ground for the assertion that the worst enemies classical study has had in the province are those speaking collectively, for there are exceptions charged with its guardianship in the higher walks of learning. Well may Latin in this hour of its affliction exclaim, "Deliver me from my friends!"

A FORCED APPOINTMENT.
 In the appointment of Frank Oliver, M.P., to the portfolio of the interior, the expected has happened. He represents a constituency which in the last elections gave him a majority of over 3000, and which, by reason of its pronounced foreign complexion, is almost certain to return him again. There is not another constituency west of Lake Superior that could be relied upon to elect a candidate pledged to the coercion of the Northwest. This fact the government virtually acknowledges by putting aside Walter Scott, a recent convert to the Liberal cause, and choosing a man who has been anything but consistent in his support of the Laurier government.

Mr. Oliver is a man whose steady support of the government is of rather recent date. From 1896 to well into the period of Conservative opposition, he frequently asserted his independence. As late as the introduction of the autonomy bill he was believed to entertain opinions differing substantially from those of the authors of the educational clauses. His record is one of strong advocacy of the principles which are being violated at Ottawa to-day. How he is able, in the face of this record, to associate himself with a ministry committed to coercion is not easy to understand. He probably shares the theory, now popular in the ministerial party, that "the King's government must go on."

NEW YORK'S PUBLIC BATHS.
 (From Supt. Noonan's Annual Report.)
 The forty-first street bath was opened to the public on Nov. 2, 1904, at a cost of \$100,000. The bath is an improvement both in plan and in equipment. It has more than 100 showers and 10 bathtubs.
 The forty-second street bath is much larger than any of the other baths now in operation. There are in course of construction one bath at West sixtieth street, containing both showers and bathtubs. FOOD OF THE LUMBERMEN.
 Prof. Ellis Declares Diet Most Generous and Energy Great.
 The Canadian Institute on Saturday night has secured detailed statements of the food supplied to the men in eight lumber camps and compared what was eaten by one firm in the years 1891 to 1894 with that of another firm in 1901. While some years ago the food was somewhat of a hodgepodge of cheap port and beans, there was now a very great variety, the food was of good quality and very well cooked. He showed the standard dietaries of Germany, England and the United States, and the amount in the food supplied the lumbermen making allowances for the differences in each, and calculated the amount in the food supplied the lumbermen and in the other nutrient substances in the diet. The corresponding amount of energy, the diet of the Canadian lumberman was perhaps the most generous in the world. The amount of energy was nearly double that of the standard dietaries and very much in excess of any other classes of people that had been studied, so far as he knew.

CHLOROPHORM CLUB.
 Atlantic City, N. J., April 8.—An organization to study and practise the theories set forth by Dr. Osler has been organized in this city. Its membership contains many of Atlantic City's business and professional men.
 Benjamin Bacharach, brother of Postmaster Harry Bacharach, organized the Chlorophorm Club. He has been elected its president. Mr. Bacharach, in speaking of it to-day, admitted that he was a "naked truth" clothed in scientific and mis-statement, special appeals to class hatred, to the envy of the poor, and to the lock-wit of the herd-dog and the prodigal."

Oliver is New Minister Leaves at Once for West Election Without Delay

Winnipeg Not Surprised for Edmonton is Only Seat Surely Liberal—Old Line Adherents Not Enthusiastic Over Choice.

Ottawa, April 8.—(Special)—Frank Oliver, member of parliament for Edmonton, was this morning sworn in as Minister of the Interior, succeeding Hon. Clifford Sifton. He was accompanied by the prime minister to Rideau Hall, where the ceremony was performed, and left at 12:30 for the west.

It is not definitely decided when the election will be held, but it will be held just as soon as the notices can be got.

Winnipeg, April 8.—(Special)—News of the appointment of Frank Oliver to the vacant portfolio of the Interior was not, under the circumstances, received with any great surprise here, for it is notorious that Edmonton is the only western Liberal seat the government could hope to carry now.

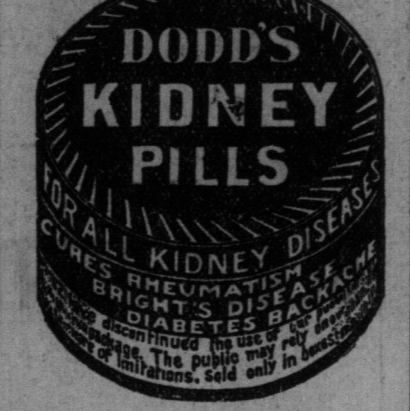
RELIGIOUS COMPLEXION OF OLIVER'S CONSTITUENCY

Figures of Last Election and an Idea of the Religious Division of the Electorate.

Ottawa, April 8.—(Special)—In political circles here there is much speculation as to the prospects of the new minister of the Interior getting re-elected in Edmonton. The official figures for the last election show that 5106 people voted to the polls; 45 ballots were rejected, and of the balance, Oliver of 235 and record 1526, giving Oliver a majority of 2090.
