Another thing which militated against the guccessful competition of the American manufacturer was the question of freights, the charge being as great for shipping agricultural implements from Ingersoll to Napanee, as from Chicago to Napanee. MAIL CONTRACT CANCELLED.

The properietor of the Hamilton and Lowville stage has been notified by Postoffice Inspector Barker that, in accordance with instructions received from the Postmaster-General, his contract for carrying the mails between this city and Lowville will cease after June 30 next. The contract has been held eight years, and was renewed last April for a period of two years. The alleged reason for its cancellation by the Government is that the late Government had no right to renew the contract without calling for tenders. The Hamilton and Lowville stage leaves the city daily at 2.30, and drops mail bags at Flambore', Clappison, Carlisie, Kilbride and Lowville, reaching the terminus at 6.50, and leaving there again at 6.30 in the morning. There is no electric or tram service along this route, and the mails will still have to be delivered in the present way.






