If the above premise and conclu-sion are correct, and properly state the attitude of this people, through the principles of the Monroe Doc-trine, in their broader and more gen-eral scope, why should not the Unit-ed States propose to Grent Britain, that in case of war by England with any other power, this nation would protect Canada from invasion or at-
