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THE WORLD OUTSIDE

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GREAT RISK FOR NOTHING

The more the action of the American Congress is investigated the less reason appears for the lowering of Canadian duties on soft coal. Canadian coal interests will have the benefit of free access to the United States markets for twelve months without any action on the part of the Dominion government. Congress has not made the removal of duties on soft coal conditional upon similar action on the part of Canada. In this respect the national districts of the United States have voluntarily opened its markets to the world's coal.

Why should Canada respond with a similar concession to the United States?

Before the American Congress cut down the tariff there was no suggestion in this country that free admission of American soft coal would relieve the stress of the fuel famine. But the moment Congress set to work to remove the restriction on the importation of Canadian soft coal, a few hypercritical enthusiasts on this side of the water seemed to think that Canada must respond with a reciprocal measure. They accepted the action of the American Congress as a generous move towards a reciprocal arrangement.

Reciprocity was not even invited in the discussion of the bill. As a matter of fact, Congress has not touched the duty on soft coal. The duty is not removed. Provision is merely made for a rebate equal to the duty now imposed on all kinds of coal and coming from all countries.

THE DEBATABLE LAND

A new and interesting phase of the Alaska-Yukon boundary dispute is discussed in an article in The Empire Review by Lieut. F. C. Wade, Crown Prosecutor of the Yukon. There have been learned arguments in support of the Canadian and the American contentions as to the boundary, but Mr. Wade deals with a matter of immediate, practical importance—the inconvenience and danger of leaving a strip of territory in the condition of a debatable land. This is an injury not only to Canada, but to an law-abiding people. "Sooty Smith and his gang of bandits," says Mr. Wade "could never have terrorized a town of several thousand people had Skagway been within Canadian jurisdiction, nor could they have carried on their infamous work so successfully in the United States had it not been for the close proximity of foreign soil. The tearing of the British flag from the Canadian customs house at Skagway within the year and the occurrence of last winter's war, a little more careful management would have prevented the formation of the 'Order of the Midnight Sun,' to obtain possession by force of the Yukon territory, should be sufficient to show both sides to the dispute that in postponing its settlement the danger point has already been more than once reached."

Without imputing unworthy motives, the theory may be hazarded that Lieut. Wade is organically an other Polar expedition in order to escape the rigors of the fuel famine.

For the purpose of expediting the trans-shipment and forwarding of the coal, the United States has information for the benefit of the police, and others passing to and from the United States. In all this we find an illustration of one of the weaknesses of the American system of government; that the general interests of the nation and the American citizen are to be forgotten when some local interest, or some narrow body of noisy agitators pushes itself forward. Mr. Wade points out that United States trade with the Yukon is diminishing, and that Skagway and Dyea are being ruined by the existing arrangement. We all remember the result of the short-sighted American tariff legislation, which drove Canadian trade into British channels, made Canada a more powerful rival of the United States in the British market and killed reciprocity in Canada. We have no doubt that similar results will eventually follow in the Yukon, but in the meantime it is deplorable that crime should be encouraged, law and order weakened, and good citizens subjected to inconvenience and danger by the greed and stupidity of agitators and small-bore politicians.

The report that prisoners in the jail are kept warm in these days is a direct incentive to crime.

The election trials may not have been a strain on the Bench, but the by-elections seem to have been a strain on the Bar. Germans say that Rudyard Kipling is a Jew, probably because he so stoutly maintains the doctrine, "What we have we hold."

Lord Charles Beresford will be quite talking, or he will soon be known in the United States as the Captain Hon. Evans of the British navy. Hon. Clifford Sifton is traveling with three private secretaries in the United States.

Policy becomes glaringly enfeebled. The National Policy must be preserved, and it would be sheer folly to jeopardize it for the sake of a few months' experiment with reciprocity in soft coal.

ELECTION TRIALS

When disputed elections were tried before committees of parliament objection was made that members voted according to their party leanings, not upon the evidence. It is now said that even judges find it impossible to forget their party associations when they try election petitions. But there is a more serious defect in the system than this. It was supposed that the trial of disputed elections had been transferred from parliament to the courts. What was really done was that parliament handed over its control of disputed elections to private individuals. The courts do nothing unless they are set in motion by defeated candidates, or agents of one of the parties, or other interested persons. Their interest is not the public interest. They want to unseat a Conservative and elect a Liberal, or the contrary; or they want to discredit the opposite party with revelations of fraud and corruption. Incidentally, this may serve the public interest; but if there is corruption on both sides, a saw-off is likely to be effected. In other words, the more corruption there is the less likelihood there is of trial, exposure and punishment.

So long as this system prevails, we fail to see how any progress can be made in diminishing corruption. Suppose that burglaries and embezzlements were managed in the same way; that a burglar might be prosecuted and allowed to go free according to the inclination of some private person. Suppose this private person was also in fear of the law, and was in a position to make a "deal" with the burglar, so that both could escape the punishment due to their crimes. Life and property would not be very safe in a country governed in that way, yet that is exactly the way in which the fairness of elections is supposed to be safeguarded. The detection and prosecution of offences against the election law ought to be a public, not a private duty.


