RUSSIAN BARRICADE SETTLERS TO JAPANESE REPRESENTATIVE OF THE YALU RIVER

St. Petersburg Report Declares the Japs Also Have Landed

Flag at Wiju.

St. Petersburg, April 12.—Gen. Kurapatkin's report to the emperor in a despatch to the emperor bearing today's date, says that Gen. Krasulinsky on the night of April 8 ordered a detachment of sharpshooters to cross to the left bank of the Yalu, opposite Wiju. The sharpshooters landed on the bank of Yam and surprised a patrol of 20 Japanese scouts just as the latter were approaching the east side of the island in three boats.

The Russians allowed the Japanese to land and then fired on them. Nearly all the Japanese were shot, wounded, drowned and their boats sunk. The Russians sustained no losses.

Non-commissioned Officers Loucheux and Soukhachev distinguished themselves in the fight.

The following day the Japanese lowered their flag at Wiju and their outposts, which later have been seen, fell back. On the night of April 9 four Russians crossed the river to Yamato (Yongampo) and made towards a Russian village, where they found a squadron of Japanese cavalry. They remained there twelve hours, when they were betrayed by Koreans and found themselves obliged to swim the river, their last having struck a sandbank. One soldier lost his life.

The Japanese pursued the Russians in a boat, but were in turn attacked by a Russian boat, which had come to the rescue of the swimmers. The Japanese were all killed and their boat sunk.

REPORTED AT TOKIO.

Tokio, April 12, 8 p.m.—It is believed here that fighting has commenced on the Yalu River. It is known that the Russians occupy the right bank of the river in force. The direct information from the Yalu district has been received here, but the position of the Russians is known, and while it is doubted that they will be able to prevent the Japanese from crossing the river, it is regarded as certain that they will offer some opposition. It is not believed, however, that there will be a serious engagement during the Japanese attempt to cross the Yalu.

The foreign military observers attached to the first Japanese army have been ordered to hold themselves in readiness to move, and it is expected that they will leave for the front in a few days.

FIGHT SURELY ON.

Chefoo, April 13.—(Noon).—The captain of the steamer "Koban," which arrived here to-day from Newchwang, reports that he heard heavy firing between five and seven o'clock this (Wednesday) morning in the direction of Port Arthur. The firing was continuous, but the ships were not hit.

KOREANS NOT FIT.

Seoul, April 11.—About 600 flat-chested, sandal-shod infantry left Seoul to-day for the northern part of Hamgyong Province (on the frontier of the Kirin district of Manchuria), to keep in order the Chinese troops who are constantly employed with the Chinese soldiers in the Tumen region, which has been the subject of diplomatic representations of the Japanese government. It is considered doubtful whether these troops will reach their destination, fears being expressed that they will desert. The Japanese minister to Korea, M. Hayashi, has requested the Korean government to order the Chinese troops to leave Newchwang, sailing at the same time as the British gunboat Epigee at 1 o'clock yesterday afternoon.

RUSSIANS' MISTAKE.

London, April 13.—"The Times" Newchwang correspondent, cabling under date of April 11, says: "Last night a pilot's flare was mistaken for the lights of a Japanese fleet. The Russians fired and sank the vessel with 35 hands, besides killing three persons and wounding seven in another junk."

EXPECT ANOTHER FIGHT.

St. Petersburg, April 13.—According to telegraphic reports received by The Novosti from its correspondent at Liaoyang, a bombardment of Port Arthur and a fight on the Yalu are expected momentarily.

HEAVY FIRING HEARD.

Chefoo, April 13.—(11 a.m.).—A correspondent of the Associated Press at Tenchoo, 40 miles northwest of here, telegraphs as follows: "Sounds of heavy firing were heard at half past 6 o'clock this (Wednesday) morning. The firing evidently was being done between here and Port Arthur. It is believed that the long expected sea fight will take place. The Japanese battleship Asahi, flying an admiral's flag, was seen off Chefoo yesterday going to the west, and there is no doubt that the remainder of the Japanese fleet was in the vicinity of Port Arthur. The Russian fleet, which was seen outside of Port Arthur yesterday."

RUSSIANS ENTRENCHED.

Seoul, April 12.—(4:30 p.m.).—Japanese advices from Northern Korea state that the Russians have strongly fortified Choutiencheng, a walled town on the Manchurian side of the Yalu River, about ten miles north of Antung. It is estimated that there are 20,000 Russians at Antung ready to oppose the Japanese crossing.

With Hayes returned here from a journey to Anju, thence to the American mines at Unsan, and thence to the Yalu River. Japanese Minister Hayashi is urging the Korean foreign office not to permit the northern provinces to be taken by the Japanese, as their absence would increase the existing feeling of unrest.

CRITICISM OF COUNCIL'S ACTION.

Mr. Hammond Spies Resolution "Impudent."

In conversation with H. C. Hammond, it is reported to the resolution passed by the city council asking clemency for the parties implicated in the recent election frauds, Mr. Hammond expressed himself in his usual vigorous style.

"Really, I am not at present thinking of anything else besides the affairs of the Northern Navigation Company," he said, "but I must say that when I read a morning paper on my way down from Owen Sound to-day I felt thoroughly disgusted to think that the city council should pass such a resolution by an almost unanimous vote. If the maudlin sentimentalism which is now running riot and appears to be growing in this fair Reuben town is not checked, I don't know where the community will land."

"If one wants to go into a saloon to take a drink at the bar, he is pounce on by the prohibitionists, who believe that drink is a great curse, and that only prohibitionists, and not temperance men, are allowed to have any rights. Last summer I was called before the police commissioners to upset a misguided idea, I believe, a safe, self-responsible outfit, called the 'Lord's Day Alliance,' who wish to make it prohibitive that no one should be allowed to purchase bread and butter and a glass of milk to eat on the Sabbath. I was called before them with money to spare can go to the hotel and have a meal with a bottle of wine or beer."

"The most impudent thing I have seen for some time is the resolution of the city council, which virtually criticizes the judgment of his honor Judge Winchester, who justly designated the ballot frauds as being worse than robbery or sandbagging, inasmuch as it is virtually killing the votes of honest men. If Toronto ever seeks to be a good, clean city, the growing generation should be educated up to lead virtuous lives, shunning lies and hypocrisy and paying their just debts in full. The city has sold a beat race, the one to recognize the government of Nicaragua over the Mosquito Coast, which since the early sixties, has been a matter of contention between the London government and the Central American Republic. London authorities once more will protest against any violation of the Zedon-Wyke treaty of 1880, by the terms of which her Britannic majesty agreed to recognize the sovereignty of Nicaragua over the Mosquito Indians. The British protestate over this territory ceased, and in return Nicaragua pledged itself to assign the Mosquito reservation to the Indians and grant them certain rights of local autonomy. With the ratification of the Hay-Bunau Varilla canal treaty the London authorities believe that time is auspicious to settle the question with Nicaragua."

Accordingly the London government has informally mentioned its intention to the United States department, and has prepared to convey formal official assurances that it has no intention of asserting any right of sovereignty. The sole wish of the British government, it is stated, is to bring Nicaragua to a realization of treaty obligations. A number of Mosquito Indians have arrived in Jamaica recently with complaints of harsh treatment at the hands of the Nicaraguans. As far as the state department is concerned, the British government is thoroughly understood. Significance is attached to a despatch received to-day from Jamaica that the British minister there has left for Bluefields to settle the dispute between the Nicaraguan authorities and the Mosquito Indians, and also to arrange for the release of the schooners seized by the Nicaraguan government and of the crews that have been imprisoned at Gracias a Dios.

There appears at present no possibility of the United States recognizing itself in the controversy. Great Britain formerly held a protectorate over Greytown and the Mosquito Coast, but the disputes with Nicaragua date back over half a century ago.

There was only a small amount of money in the safe, although it contained many valuable papers. In the same sledge hammer, the property of the G. T. R. were left in the store. Woodstock, April 12.—(Staff Special).—These are the names of the citizens of Woodstock convicted by Magistrate Ball: JOHN HATTEN, keeping cockpits; CHARLIE HUBNER; WILLIAM WAITES; FREDERICK CHAMBERS; P. Henry Carscalen, K.C., M.L.A.

Report of Committee.

It was evident to your sub-committee that the railways of the Province of Ontario could bear additional taxation without interfering with their efficiency, and that the railways were imposing burdens disproportionate to those imposed under the Assessment Act on real estate generally or upon other corporations. Your sub-committee has observed the conditions of the railways and has recommended that the provincial government should be authorized to tax the railways on their gross receipts, but that the tax should be graduated so as to fall most heavily on those railways which are not in the public interest.
