**SMOOTH TEA WITH GOOD STORY SMOULDED MANNY**

Sold Coal at \$3.50 Per Ton, and It Looked Good—General City News.

**HAMILTON, March 2.**—(Special.)—Many citizens were the victims this morning of a man giving himself the name of J. Daly, and who represented himself as an M.C.R. agent. He said the company owing to a strike, had some good coal to sell at bargain rates. He took many orders at \$3.50 a ton, and in most cases secured a payment in advance. The following four cases were reported to the police: Mrs. Gibson, 70 East King-street, \$3; Mrs. Davis, 15 West Barton-street, \$2; Arthur Duggan, 35 Oak-avenue, \$5; William Hofmann, 77 Steeven-street, \$7; a grand total of \$32.00, that the enterprising man made in an afternoon. It is believed that there are many other cases not reported.

At a mock trial in the Centenary Church schoolroom this evening, J. Orr Callaghan was placed upon trial before Judge P. P. MacPherson, the charge being running his automobile at the speed of 100 miles an hour, of running down a banana man and stealing his wares, and of drinking Peruna. He was found guilty and recommended to mercy. W. McClelland was the crown prosecutor, and J. Carpenter appeared for the defence. The trial was held in connection with the men's annual entertainment. Refreshments were served by the Ladies' Aid Society.

**Verdict Quashed.**

This afternoon Judge Monck quashed Police Magistrate Jeff's judgment, inflicting a fine of \$25 on Trudell & Toby, who were accused of breaking a city by-law by causing a blockade in front of their store, thru having a man fitting clothes in their window. The judge held that conviction could be sustained under the city by-law, under which proceedings were taken.

The police are keeping a close lookout for armed foreigners. This afternoon Constables Brannan and Gibbs locked up John Graze, 157 North Macdonald-street, on the charge of carrying an unlawful weapon. The constables said that they threw away a 38 calibre revolver in front of him.

**Talked Behind Closed Doors.**

Aldermen appointed to confer with the Cataract Power Company magistrates slipped off on the quiet Saturday afternoon and had a meeting behind closed doors. Another meeting of the same nature was held on Tuesday. The company claims that bonded indebtedness of \$500,000 on the railway prevents it from borrowing another \$500,000, needful for renewing the system, and want the aldermen to fix the city's share of the company's earnings for the next five years at what it got last year, and to charge 5, instead of 8, per cent. on the increase shown during the last fifteen years of the franchise period.

The farmers of Wentworth County are organizing telephone companies, and claim to have the backing of a large company which will set up in opposition to the Bell Telephone Company and compete with the Bell Company for a franchise in Hamilton and Toronto.

that he did appear publicly in the company of notorious prostitutes, and (3) a charge also unprintable.

These are but the more recent manifestations of a man who has made a name for himself in the past by his public servants of habits which have for years been a public scandal in this territory.

Mr. Pringle also complained that similar charges made during the previous four or five years had been ignored by the government. He requested that the names of his witnesses when the date of the hearing was fixed.

Mr. Henderson committed Mr. Pringle to the charges would be heard separately, those against Grouard on Oct. 9, and on Oct. 15, J. E. Grouard, a witness appearing against Mr. Pringle, had heard from Rev. Mr. Pringle by letter on Oct. 14.

In this letter Mr. Pringle had declined to proceed with his charges against Mr. Grouard on the ground that he could not force witnesses to appear. Grouard demanded that Pringle be asked to disclose the names of his chief witnesses whose testimony could not be obtained by reason of refusal to attend an investigation. He suggested that Commissioner Henderson use his influence to compel the witnesses to appear, and to secure their attendance. I further undertake to bind myself to take no proceedings against any witness appearing against me at the instance of Mr. Pringle, provided such witness speaks the truth only. I ask that a day be fixed for the hearing, and that Mr. Pringle be asked to proceed against me on that day.

On Oct. 19 Commissioner Henderson forwarded Grouard's letter to Pringle, and said he would like to hear from him as early as possible as to the date on which he would be prepared to proceed.

On the same date Mr. Pringle wrote to the minister enclosing a copy of his letter, and declared that when the government appointed the latter a commissioner, with power to subpoena, and protect witnesses he would be ready to establish his charges.

On Oct. 23 Mr. Pringle wrote to Commissioner Henderson in view of your opinion, expressed to me, that under your instructions you have not the authority to subpoena witnesses I must decline to appear as a prosecutor at the investigation ordered by you. I am a Roman Catholic and I do not wish to be a party to the charges against Messrs. Lithgow and Grouard.

He added that it would be unwise for him to place his name at the head of an unwilling, capricious or hostile witness, and that even willing witnesses would hesitate before a commissioner who could give them no protection. He suggested that Mr. Henderson might make an investigation as the agent of the interior department, or get from Ottawa the powers of a royal commissioner.

**Wanted Power to Summon.**

On November 3 Commissioner Henderson wrote to the minister enclosing Pringle's letter and suggesting that he (Henderson) be appointed a commissioner under the enquiries act. Previous to this, on October 23, Mr. Pringle wrote to the minister suggesting that he be appointed a commissioner under the enquiries act. On November 11 Mr. Oliver wrote to Mr. Pringle that he saw no necessity for the appointment of a commissioner with the powers suggested by Mr. Pringle and that he had instructed Mr. Henderson to make an enquiry with a view to ascertaining all the facts. He said that if Mr. Pringle did not appear Mr. Henderson would have to proceed without his assistance, as the commissioner had been so instructed, adding: "and if for lack of evidence you are unable to furnish the investigation should not establish the facts which you desire established the fact is your own, not mine."

Man Who Planned Raid on Parkdale Bank Halls From Strathroy.

**NATIONAL SUNDAY LAW.**

United States Alliances to Copy Canadian Measure.

CINCINNATI, Ohio, March 2.—(Special.)—Announcement was made here today by the Rev. Frederick J. Stanbridge, pastor of the First Methodist Church, that preparations are on to launch a campaign for a national Sunday law to be introduced into Congress, framed along the lines of the Canadian law, which does not even allow freight trains to move a wheel on Sunday.

The first step will be taken at an executive committee conference to be held in Toronto, Canada, in May, to be attended by delegates from the Canadian Lord's Day Alliance, the American Sabbath Union, the Sabbath department of the W.C.T.U., and representatives of seven state Sabbath closing alliances not yet federated with the American national organization.

PROFITS OF MUNICIPAL OPERATION.

Further figures are out regarding the operation of municipal enterprises in Great Britain, among them those relating to the electric supply and street railways of Liverpool. From the profit the rates of Liverpool will be relieved by upwards of £270,000. The total income of the electricity department during last year, amounted to £1,370,000, and after deducting the cost of generating and distributing a balance of £790,000 remained, out of which the usual grants were made to the sinking fund and reserve and renewals accounts, the surplus of £137,000 going in relief of general rates.

Liverpool street railways earned over \$2,900,000, the balance after deducting working expenses being close on \$1,000,000. Allowing for all capital charges, a surplus was left of \$328,000, which also went in relief of general rates. Sunderland City railways yielded \$21,000 in rate relief, and Walsall municipal railways made a net profit of \$21,000 on last year's working. The average fare paid per passenger in Liverpool was 2-1/5 cents, in Sunderland a shade under 2 cents, and in Walsall 2-8/10 cents. Motive power was in each case supplied from the city departments.

THE MEN WHO FIGHT FIRE.

The action of the fire and light committee yesterday in recommending a number of increases in the pay of the fire department will not be harshly criticized by the citizens in general. The fire department in recent years has shown great improvement, and it is not often that a complaint is heard. Chief Thompson has seen to it that the department has kept pace with the times in regard to equipment, and when the high pressure system is in working order the Demon Fire will have a hard time to spread himself downtown.

But it is a pity that the committee has overlooked the claims to recognition of some of the officers. The chief recommended Deputy Chief Noble for \$500 more. Now whatever fault may be found against him for parks commissioner, there's no one can deny that the deputy is a first-class firefighter. He has onerous work, a large responsibility and all the perils of active duty and all constantly increasing. Is it any wonder, then, that he should seek to better himself in another field of civic industry, in which the rewards are greater? A word could also be said for the district chiefs—men who have spent from 30 to 40 years in the city's service, from the time when they used to run with the boys of the old brigade—volunteers. They are battle-scarred veterans all, yet each doing his duty to-day. Firefighting seems a thankless work, altho the disposition of the aldermen to better the conditions of the lower grades is a happy sign that conditions in the future may be more in accord with what the nature of the work can honestly demand. Toronto is a big city now, but its firemen are about the worst paid in proportion of any on the continent.

SENATOR LA FOLLETTE'S NATIONAL POLICY.

To be nominated by one's own state for the long term of six years, and to be elected in the republic a high honor, and failure to be declared the "favored son" is of bad omen. Wisconsin has given many proofs of the regard in which its ex-governor and present senator, Robert M. La Follette, is held, and to all appearance will again declare him its first choice as chief executive of the country. Hitherto he has refused to express himself publicly on national questions, except from the platform or in the senate, but he recently broke his self-denying regulation by sending a despatch to a meeting in his own state, at which he was unanimously nominated candidate for the presidency.

Nelson Montell, among other things, to put on the statute books a law relating to the production of dairy qualified certificates before they can seek employment in the cheese factories of the province. It is not intended that this regulation shall be enforced at once, but that sufficient time should be allowed to permit makers and prospective makers to fit themselves for the standard that will be required.

HOW PROVINCE SPENDS AND HOW IT RECEIVES

Public Accounts Submitted and a Surplus of \$606,173 is Recorded.

The public accounts for 1907 were presented to the legislature yesterday by the provincial secretary. On the motion of the provincial treasurer the accounts were referred to the statutory committee on public accounts.

Receipts for 1907 totaled \$8,320,419.19; the actual expenditure, \$7,714,246.51. Thus the surplus for 1907 was \$606,172.68, as compared with the 1906 surplus, \$429,299.82 and the 1905 surplus, \$220,159.68.

Including balances on hand at the end of 1906 the total receipts were \$11,817,658.81. These balances at the end of 1906 were \$3,310,636.70. The receipts from the stock issue and the 1902 surplus, \$429,299.82 and the 1905 surplus, \$220,159.68 were advanced to the T. and N. O. Commission, which left a balance on the proceeds of the bond issue of \$1,161,831.51. The current account in the banks at the end of 1907 totaled \$112,302.44.

The year's receipts \$1,724,029.68 came from the Dominion Government as the subsidy on population and included the increased subsidy from the Dominion Government. The net return to the province from interest in trust funds held by the Dominion was \$99,044.30. The subsidy in 1906 was \$1,330,257.28, and the interest on trust funds \$30,446. The interest on investments for 1907 was \$108,116, as compared with \$80,689 in 1906. The return from municipal debentures in 1907 was \$13,225, as compared with \$16,292.

The total revenue from the department of lands, forests and mines in 1907 was \$2,098,494. The interest on \$2,232,199 in 1906. The 1907 receipts from sale of agricultural lands was \$69,584, as compared with \$83,849 in 1906.

The total revenue from mining lands in 1907 was \$1,134,719, as compared with \$1,182,243. Mining leases and crown rent totaled \$25,579 in 1907, as compared with \$19,000 in 1906. In this department there are large items which come from the new sources of revenue provided by the Mines Act, 1906, and Supplementary Revenues Act. These are: mining licenses, \$137,768; recording fees, \$134,628; acreage tax, \$5003; profit tax, \$26,922; and gas tax, \$11,227.

Revenue From the Forests. The total revenue from woods and forests in 1907 was \$1,319,061, as compared with \$1,800,914 in 1906. The items which made up the 1907 receipts were: stumpage, \$555,370; ground rent, \$45,084; transfer fees \$2373. The biggest decreases were in the first two items. Stumpage receipts decreased \$555,370 and timber dues in \$1,295,378.

The receipts from licenses in 1907 were \$287,126, as compared with \$579,207 in 1906. The receipts from land stamps were \$34,798 in 1907 and \$85,945 in 1906. The receipts from the education department were \$47,328, as compared with \$64,545.

The provincial secretary's department returned \$237,205, as compared with \$206,026. The returns from fisheries in 1907 were \$68,111 and \$68,998 in 1906. The returns in the department of agriculture in 1907 were \$78,538 and \$86,224 in 1906.

A friend of the police who attends the meetings recognized the man who had been selected by lot and told to kill Chief Shippey and Mayor Buss.

Immediately following the tragedy in Denver attempts were made to trace the crime to a conspiracy in which the man had been selected by lot and told to kill Chief Shippey and Mayor Buss.

The Iowa police discovered that the society of anarchists formed here had been issuing inflammatory literature since every workshop as the cost of the anarchists was \$55,970.

In addition to these measures, all known anarchists in the city, among them Emma Goldman, were warned that they would not be allowed to make addresses in public. So far as is known none attempted to disobey the order.

The documents sent out by the Italian organization were carefully worded.

Although self-declared anarchists in this city are known to the Chicago police, the identity of the man who attacked Chief Shippey is a mystery.

The incident had an exciting interview with an office seeker a few minutes after the executive had returned to his office from the Shippey street shooting.

The order will be made general and include religious as well as political gatherings, it being asserted that inflammatory speeches are often made at such meetings.

By making the edict sweeping it is thought objections to it on the ground of discrimination will be forestalled.

Police Raid Headquarters. One of the first places raided by the police in the shooting was the headquarters of a society known as "The Edlistad Group," at 47 Union street.

COMMITTEE PASS UPON FIREMEN'S INCREASES

The Chief Gets Recommended for \$500 More—Cost of a Salvage Corps.

The civic fire and light committee took a fall out of Chief Thompson's list of salary increases yesterday and reductions were considerable.

The chief didn't ask an increase to his own salary of \$3000, but Ald. Church moved that \$750 be tacked on, citing the salaries paid to fire chiefs in other cities.

The chief spoke in support of increasing the salary of the deputy-chief from \$2500 to \$2800, but the committee deemed the present remuneration sufficient.

The committee declined to take action on the proposal to increase the salaries of the three district chiefs from \$1500 to \$1800, and the salary of the assistant district chiefs from \$1200 to \$1500.

The following recommendations were acted upon: Junior assistant F. A. Telegraph, \$800 to \$900; 28 captains, \$1000 to \$1100; 26 lieutenants, \$800 to \$900; 7 engineers of engines, \$650 to \$800; 7 assistant engineers, \$800 to \$900; 250 firemen, \$500 to \$600; 250 telephone operators, \$550 to \$600; storkeeper, \$500 to \$600.

The chief wanted the salary of the senior assistant F. A. telegraph increased from \$850 to \$1000, but it was made \$950, while the salary of relief engineer was raised to \$900, instead of jumping from \$800 to \$1000, and the salary of the relief assistant engineer was increased from \$800 to \$850, instead of \$900.

One cut was made in the chief's estimates for equipment, the item of \$2500 for new horses being reduced to \$2000.

The chief reported that it would cost \$30,000 to establish a proper salvage corps, and \$9500 per annum for upkeep. The city should not pay more than 10 per cent of the cost, the insurance underwriters contributing the rest.

A deputation of prominent retail merchants asked that no further licenses for moving picture shows on Yonge-street between King and Queen streets be allowed. It was claimed that there was a fire risk created, and that business of a substantial kind was injuriously affected through the cheapening effect in the neighborhood.

As licenses for such shows cannot be refused when applicants undertake to comply with building regulations, the police commissioners will be advised against the granting of further licenses. It was also agreed that legislation empowering the city to regulate moving pictures and slot machine establishments should be applied for.

Ex-Controller Hubbard protested against the adoption of Chief Thompson's recommendation that the district of Bathurst and Jarvis-streets should be placed in the highest class of brick fire limit. The building trade was stagnant and such further regulations would further cramp it, he asserted. The mayor was allowed to stand over.
