

PEOPLE OF NOTE



Hon. Thomas Staples Martin, one of the United States Senators from Virginia and who entered the senate in 1895, was born at Scottsville, Va., on July 29th, 1847.In 1853 his father removed to a farm which was located about two miles outside of Senator Martin's native village and he still resides on this property. Senator Martin attended the Virginia Military Institute during the Civil War and when the students of this historic institution volunteered for military service in the Confederate army he went along. After the war, Senator Martin studied law and was admitted to the bar in 1869.
