The Supreme Council of the Thirty-Third Degree of the Ancient and Accepted Scottish Rite of Freemasonry, for the Dominion of Canada, assembled in Annual Session at the Scottish Rite Rooms, in the City of Montreal, Province of Quebec, on Wednesday, the 27th day of October, 1897, corresponding to the 1st day of the Hebrew month *Khesvan*, A.: M.: 5658.

Ill.: Bro.: STEARNS made excuse for the absence of Ill.: Bro.: ANGUS W. HOOPER, 33°, Grand Master of Ceremonies, who had been active in the preparation of the rooms for the meeting of the Council up to last evening, but who, on account of illness, was confined to his house.

The Supreme Council was called off, and a Lodge of Perfection, 14°, opened, and members of the Rite admitted.

The Sovereign Grand Commander then delivered his Annual Address, as follows :

To the Supreme Council A.: & A.: Scottish Rite for the Dominion of Canada.

ILLUSTRIOUS BRETHREN :

My heart is filled with joy and with gratitude to the Grand Architect of the Universe for permitting me to be with you once more and to greet you to this session of our Supreme Council.

Having been, as no doubt most of you are aware, for many months suffering from a serious illness, I had hardly dared to hope to be with you to-day. Afflicted with a disease which is deemed almost incurable, my recovery was for a long time considered doubtful ; but, through the mercy of God and the skill of my physician, I was carried over the crisis, and, although still an invalid, I am here to-day to enjoy your fellowship, as I know I have had your sympathy, and to consult with you again on such matters as may be brought before us affecting the interests of our beloved Rite in this jurisdiction.

If, therefore, my message to-day should prove meagre and uninteresting, I trust, my brethren, you will credit it to the fact that during all these months in which I was laid aside, scarcely any item of Masonic duty could be performed by me ; my Masonic correspondence fell far in arrear, and for much of the time I was unable to give the Order even a passing thought.

Notwithstanding this inability of mine, I have no doubt the Reports of the Illustrious Deputies will show that the Rite, under the guidance of its able and experienced officers in the various Valleys of our Dominion, will have pursued its beneficent course, and have become thereby more firmly established, better known and more thoroughly appreciated.

At the last session, you will remember, news was received of the illness of our Illustrious Brother E. LUSHER FOSTER, which prevented him from appearing

with us on that occasion, but we had no idea at the time that this illness was any more than a temporary indisposition. Such, however, was not the case, as a telegram came on 19th November announcing his decease. Bro. FOSTER was probably the youngest man among the membership of this Council, but he had been an active 33rd since October, 1889, and was, during that period, most energetic in the discharge of his duties as a leader of this Rite, filling the office of Deputy for Nova Scotia with much acceptance. We shall miss him exceedingly, as he was seldom, if ever, absent from the sessions of this Council, and his loss will be greatly felt by the members of the Rite in Halifax, as he was constantly engaged in encouraging and instructing them, and in promoting the interests of the Bodies of that city.

Later on news came of the death of one of our oldest active members, EUGENE MORTIMER COPELAND. This was to me most sudden, as I had had no intimation whatever of his being even indisposed. On reference to the minutes of the first session of this Council it will be seen that Brother COPELAND was one of the *four* who were admitted and crowned on that occasion by the late Illustrious Brother ALBERT PIKE, therefore he had been *one of us* for twenty-three years. While our lamented Brother remained a resident of Montreal he was most active in the promotion of the Rite in that city, contributing liberally of his means and devoting much time and attention to the work, but circumstances compelling his removal to another town severed him from active participation in our labors; nevertheless he did not lose interest in the Rite, and never failed to attend the sessions of this Council whenever it was in his power so to do.

Again the angel of death visited us on the 13th August last, and took from our little Band another and a most prominent member in the person of our dearly loved brother DANIEL SPRY, the Grand Chancellor of this Supreme Council. While knowing that Brother SPRY had been ill during the past winter, I had believed that he had almost recovered, and was, therefore, entirely unprepared to receive the sorrowful message. The loss of Brother SPRY is one which all branches of the Craft will deeply feel, he had been so long identified with many of the Grand Bodies in this Dominion, particularly in the Province of Ontario, and his experienced labors had been so constantly exercised in their behalf that his name had become a "household word" in Masonry. He very early in its history in this Dominion joined this Rite, and was from the first an intelligent and active worker. He became a member of this Supreme Council in 1884, and was, with few exceptions, always in attendance at its sessions. He filled for some years the important office of Deputy for Ontario, and was at the time of his death Grand Chancellor. His genial manner and genuine friendship had endeared him to us all, and he will ever be greatly missed and his loss sincerely deplored by the members of this Council.

Brethren, it is sad to be thus deprived of the fellowship of these dear Brethren, with whom we have held "sweet converse together" and whose intimate relationship we have so long enjoyed; and when we look back over the past twenty-three years of the existence of this Council, and con over the names of all those of

our members who have crossed the "Dark River," we will see that the number of the dead is fast approaching that of the living.

"To the past go more dead faces
Every year,
As the loved leave vacant places
Every year;
Everywhere the sad eyes meet us,
In the evening's dusk they greet us,
And to come to them entreat us—
Every year."

Circulars in memoriam of these Brethren were issued and will be printed in the appendix to these Proceedings.

Death has also been busy elsewhere among the Brotherhood of this great Rite.

Our friends of the Northern Supreme Council of the United States have suffered severely by losses in their Active and Honorary Lists.

The names of such Illustrious Brethren as CHARLES T. McCLENACHAN, G. M. G. of C. ; DR. ANTHONY EUGENE STOCKER, Deputy for Pennsylvania; BENJAMIN DEAN, Past Deputy for Massachusetts; and ANDREW BUNTON, of New Hampshire, Active Members, as well as twenty-three Honorary Inspectors-General, many of whom being old and distinguished workers in the Rite and eminent in all the other branches of Masonry, will show the extent of the great losses this Council has sustained.

Brother McCLENACHAN being a man of world-wide reputation in the Scottish Rite, the author of several of its standard histories, and generally considered second to no one in the world as an authority on matters concerning this Rite, I felt that it became me to issue a circular to the Members and Bodies of our Obedience, announcing the fact of his decease and bearing testimony to his work and renown, and I trust that the Supreme Council will approve of my act in thus doing.

The Supreme Council of the Southern Jurisdiction, United States, announce that none of their Active Members have died during the past two years, but they have suffered the great loss of twenty-three Honorary Inspectors, and the following deaths among the members of other Supreme Councils, with which we are in correspondence, have been reported to me during the year :

Letters of sympathy were sent to each of these Sister Bodies and the names of the deceased will appear on Memorial pages of our Proceedings.

FOREIGN RELATIONS.

From the correspondence received during the past year it would appear that no event of any great moment to the Rite, or to the Grand Bodies thereof, other than the deaths we have enumerated, has occurred.

One general story of progress and prosperity comes from the Councils of the United States, and we believe that this will ever be the case, as the principles of this great Rite are being better understood and more thoroughly appreciated and practiced everywhere, and in consequence large numbers are seeking admission to its ranks, and those admitted never fail to bear testimony to its worth.

We are in direct communication with twenty-one Supreme Councils, leaving still a number not yet in correspondence with us, and we hope that the Committee on Foreign Relations, to whom was intrusted the duty, will be prepared to report in regard to the standing of the several remaining Councils, so that we may, at an early day, hold relations with every legitimate Grand Body of the Rite.

ENGLAND AND WALES, ETC.

We received a letter from this Supreme Council expressing sympathy with us in the loss of our Ill. Brother FOSTER, and we have also received the annual circular of this Body, from which we learn that the meeting of the three Supreme Councils of the United Kingdom had been held for 1896, and would again be held in London, in April, 1897. Some changes are announced in the personell of this Council, and six new Chapters of Rose Croix had been established in various parts of the globe under its jurisdiction.

NORTHERN JURISDICTION U. S. A.

I duly received the Proceedings of this Council for 1896, and its courteous invitation to attend its session, which was held in Boston, on 21st September, last.

It was a cause of much regret to me to be deprived of the privilege of being present, but my health would not permit. I am exceedingly glad to know that we were ably represented there by Past Grand Commander J. V. ELLIS, who will, I know, tell you all about this session of this great Council.

SOUTHERN JURISDICTION U. S. A.

This Supreme Council sent me a very cordial invitation to be present at its biennial session held in Washington on the 18th of this present month, which I was compelled to decline, not only from physical weakness, but also because of this meeting being held so close to our own.

This Supreme Council expresses, through its Secretary-General, the hope that a change may be made in the date of our assembling, so that the members of the respective Councils may have an opportunity to exchange visitations.

The Secretary-General (our Representative) says: "Our Rite has prospered vastly. We have created many new Bodies and revived some dormant ones. Our Supreme Council is in better financial condition than it ever was. We have spent a great deal of money on our library and for other purposes, and, like the widow's barrel of meal, the more we take away the larger it gets, and this notwithstanding the depression all over the land." He further says: "We have put up a handsome brass tablet to the memory of the three dead Commanders in the death chamber of two of them, and a handsome granite monument to Brother DR. MACKEY."

I am sure our Supreme Council will rejoice that the grand old Southern Council should show such a happy state of its affairs.

ST. DOMINGO.

Early in the year a circular was received by me from this Supreme Council announcing the pleasing news of the settlement of the difficulties in Scottish Rite Masonry which had so long distracted the Masons of that country, and that, once more, all was peace and harmony. A general fusion of both Councils had taken place, and the late lamented Ill. Bro. JACINTO DE CASTRO remained the Grand Commander of the united Body. To this I sent the congratulations of this Council.

Later on I received the sad announcement of the death of this Grand Commander. It is pleasing to reflect that the "Entente Cordiale" had been restored previous to this sad event, so that that grand old Mason DE CASTRO had the satisfaction of seeing Dominican Masonry at peace before he passed away.

From Mexico, Colon, Belgium and Argentina we have had letters of sympathy on account of the death of Ill. Bro. FOSTER.

That from Colon contained the notice of the appointment of our Ill. Bro. W. H. BALLARD to represent their Council in place of Bro. FOSTER, deceased, and we shall be happy to receive and welcome Bro. BALLARD in such capacity.

From Argentina and Peru we have received a number of Masonic newspapers, which have been sent to the Committee on Foreign Relations.

We have also had from these two countries letters with lists of officers of their Grand Lodge, and asking us to exchange representatives. To these I have replied that as we have no jurisdiction over Blue Masonry, it would not be proper for us to enter into such relations.

From Greece I have received documents and letters issued by a Body calling itself the Grand Orient Supreme Council of 33° for Greece, setting forth the atrocities of the Turks in Crete, and asking the voice of Masonry to be raised against this fierce and implacable people; also a list of officers, with Brother N. DAMASCHINO as Grand Commander—evidently a clandestine Council in opposition to the one presided over by the PRINCE RHODOCANAKIS, and which we recognize.

From Paraguay we received a letter announcing the formation of a Supreme Council for that Republic, and asking our recognition. This letter I sent to the Committee on Foreign Relations.

HOME MATTERS.

Peace, harmony and progress seem to prevail everywhere in the Rite in this Dominion.

It is most gratifying to note that almost every Valley of our Obedience has provided halls specially set apart for the purposes of this Rite. This is almost indispensable if the Rite is to make progress and properly exemplify the degrees. It is most desirable that these should always, if possible, be secured in the local Masonic Temple of the place, so as to identify the Rite with the other Bodies of the Craft, but yet be known distinctively as Scottish Rite Apartments. In this connection let me express the great satisfaction I feel to-day in being assembled in these beautiful rooms of the Rite in the new Masonic Temple of this great city.

I am sure the Brethren here will have an incentive now to be up and doing, so that they will be able to successfully rival their Brethren in the other Valleys of this Dominion.

Re-unions have been held in London, Hamilton and Winnipeg, and exchange of visitations have taken place between the Bodies of Toronto, Hamilton and London, all of which tend to promote harmony and good fellowship and a healthy rivalry.

Shortly after our session held in Ottawa last year, I was pained to receive a telegram from Ill. Brother MCARTHUR, 33°, in these words: "Rite rooms totally destroyed by fire last night; fully insured." When I remembered our recent meeting in those beautiful and complete apartments of the Rite in that Valley, this message was a rude shock, which was only softened by the last words, "fully insured." Immediately thereafter, the enterprising, pushing Brethren of Ottawa went to work to provide another habitation, and we are assured that their new halls are now complete and are even more beautiful and commodious than those so cruelly destroyed. This Council, I feel sure, will express its sympathy with these Brethren, and their pride of them for their irrepressible energy and zeal.

It is a cause for much regret to me that no new Bodies have been established in our jurisdiction during the past year. It has seemed to me that there are many places unoccupied by this Rite, which would successfully support Lodges of Perfection, and I was in hopes that we would have several additions to our Subordinate Bodies. Perhaps the depression which has so long existed in financial matters may have been the cause for this, but now that prosperity seems to be returning, I hope we shall increase the means for the propagation of our Rite and for the diffusion of Freemasonry, which we believe this Rite so eminently fitted to promote.

I have not been called upon to perform many official acts during the year. I approved of changes in the By-laws of Toronto Chapter of Rose Croix and of Toronto Lodge of Perfection.

Acting for what I believed to be for the best interests of the Rite, I issued commissions to Ill. Brother DR. RODERICK MACNEILL, 32°, of Stanley Bridge, Prince Edward Island, appointing him a Special Deputy to look after the Rite in the newly opened field in that Province, and to Ill. Brother WILLIAM DOWNIE, 32°, of Vancouver, to perform the same duty for the Province of British Columbia, and I recommend that consent be given to extend their commissions for another year.

REPORTS OF COMMITTEES.

There will be several important Reports of Committees to be received, among which may be specially mentioned: one from the Committee on Jurisprudence and Legislation, with a draft of a revision of the Constitution; also one from same Committee with reference to the recommendation of Toronto Chapter Rose Croix, with regard to Brother A. WILKIE; and one from the Committee on Foreign Relations in regard to the standing of several Supreme Councils with which we are not yet in correspondence. These are very important questions and will demand your serious consideration.

The Committee on Ritual, from whom we had hoped to have a report, ask further time, as they were unable to undertake the work referred to them. I particularly urge them to do so immediately after the close of this session, as it is most important to have every part of the Ritual perfect and complete.

LIBRARY.

The Supreme Council will be much pleased to hear that Ill. Brother B. D. BABCOCK, 33°, of Ohio, Honorary Member of this Council, has presented us with a complete set of the Proceedings of the Supreme Council of the Northern Jurisdiction U. S. A., handsomely bound, and this Council is thereby greatly indebted to our generous brother for his very valuable gift. Many of these Proceedings are getting to be very rare, and it is almost impossible to procure the issues of some of the years, consequently this donation will be a great addition to our library. In this connection I would urge the Committee to procure, as soon as possible, the Transactions of the Supreme Council of the Southern Jurisdiction U. S., which, like those of the Northern, are becoming excessively scarce.

Again I would draw their attention to the recommendation of my predecessor, Past Grand Commander ELLIS, to procure, if possible, a complete set of the Bulletin that was issued by the Southern Supreme Council, and which has been discontinued since the death of its author, the late lamented Brother A. PIKE. This is perhaps the most valuable periodical ever issued by our Rite, and it is a great loss to be deprived of the fund of information which it contained.

Brethren, we have in this Rite a glorious heritage to preserve and promote, and in consequence we are in bounden duty to bear testimony to its worth and to exemplify in our lives, as Scottish Rite Masons, the sublime precepts it teaches.

ONTARIO.

To the Supreme Council A.: & A.: Scottish Rite for the Dominion of Canada.

ILLUSTRIOUS BRETHREN :

I have the honor to report that the condition of the Bodies of the Rite in my jurisdiction is substantially the same as it was a twelve month ago, though the net result shows a gratifying increase.

I regret that very little if any progress has been made towards an extension of the Rite. In the early part of the year I had some correspondence with this end in view, but it was interrupted owing to my visit to the Old Country, and I have been unable to take it up again since my return. I may say, in passing, that when in England I was courteously received and welcomed by the Secretary-General of the Rite there, and was invited to attend a special meeting of the Supreme Council, which invitation, however, in consequence of my other duties, I was reluctantly compelled to decline.

On the 23rd November, last, I had the pleasure of attending the Second Annual Re-union of the London Lodge of Perfection. The attendance was large and thoroughly representative, and included five members of the Supreme Council. The 4th, 5th, 6th, 9th, 13th and 14th degrees were correctly and impressively conferred on over 20 candidates, partly by the Officers of the local Lodge, and partly by the T.: P.: G.: M.: and Officers of the Toronto Lodge of Perfection; Ill.: Bro.: BICKNELL, of Murton Lodge of Perfection, also rendering valuable assistance. The Re-union was successful in every respect, both as to attendance and also as to the character of the work, and fittingly concluded with a most enjoyable banquet, at which the hospitality of the London Brethren was lavishly displayed.

I attended the Annual Re-union of the Bodies of the Rite in Hamilton, on the 20th, 21st and 22nd of January, 1897. The meeting was as usual a successful one, the working of the different degrees having been entrusted to a large number of reliable Brethren, and the result was most gratifying in every respect. The attendance of visitors was not so large as usual, especially as regards our Brethren from across the lakes, the latter circumstance being attributable to the fact that Re-unions were being held near them about the same time as ours. The enforced absence through illness, now happily much mitigated, of our beloved Sovereign Grand Commander also, necessarily cast a damper upon the Proceedings.

I am informed that it is the intention of the Hamilton Bodies, who have made their usual steady and satisfactory progress, to hold their next Re-union in May, 1898, when it is believed that a larger attendance can be secured, and at the same time enable the Hamilton Brethren to show the City and District of Hamilton to visitors in spring attire.

On the 15th March, last, I paid an official visit to Royal City Lodge of Perfection, Guelph, and was warmly welcomed. The 13th degree was conferred by Ill. Bro. A. J. LITTLE, P. T. P. G. M. and the 14th by the T. P. G. M. Ill. Bro. W. R. TRAVERS, on three candidates. The work was well done, and it was evident that the presiding officers, as well as the officers generally, had devoted much time to the preparation of their respective parts. The books of the Lodge are correctly and neatly kept, but the dues of members are far too largely in arrear.

I endeavored to arrange for a visit to Barrie, but through delays that were unavoidable the Brethren there were unable to get the new rooms in order in time for me to do so. They are now, I am told, almost if not quite ready, and will very soon be ready for my inspection. From what I have heard I feel certain that they will be found to be handsomely and thoroughly equipped, and will reflect great credit upon our Brethren there.

The fact that Ill. Bro. MACWATT has now the supervision of the work is ample evidence that it has been carried out most thoroughly in all its details.

The Brethren in the Valley of Ottawa, through the destruction of all their property by fire, sustained a severe loss. This, however, to a certain extent proved to be a blessing in disguise, for through their active and constant labors, and with the assistance of the insurance companies, more advantageous rooms, and a new and thoroughly up-to-date equipment, have been secured in the re-erected building. The Brethren of Ottawa are now in a position to re-commence their work with renewed vigor, and I hope to have the pleasure in a short time of inspecting both their property and their work.

It was intended by the Bodies in Toronto to hold a re-union in November next, but recently it was decided to postpone it to a later date. I know, however, from the notices which I have regularly received that both the Lodge and Chapter have had plenty to do, and that it has been well done, and what is particularly gratifying new and enthusiastic workers are being continually trained up amongst them.

ILLUSTRIOUS BRETHREN :

I am once more permitted to make my annual report as to the condition of the Scottish Rite of Freemasonry in this Province.

During the past year perfect harmony has existed throughout the jurisdiction, and although our number has not increased as much as I would like to report, still those admitted will, I am sure, reflect credit on our choice.

At the last election of officers in the Lodge of Perfection and Chapter of Rose Croix most of the chairs were filled by the younger members, the intention being to interest as many as possible in the active work of the Rite.

The three Bodies in Montreal have met regularly throughout the year, conferring the different degrees in a most satisfactory and impressive manner.

Quebec, I regret to say, remains dormant, and only confirms the opinion expressed in my last report, and also by the late Ill. Bro. HUTTON as far back as 1878, when he stated that the work of the Rite is practically confined to the City of Montreal in this Province.

I will refer but briefly to the loss we have all sustained in the death of Ill. Bro. FOSTER and Ill. Bro. COPELAND, the former occurring on Nov. 19th and the latter on June 1st. The warning given to us of their approaching end was so short that in neither case were we permitted the privilege of even visiting them during their last hours of illness. Ill. Bro. STEARNS accompanied me to

Longueil to conclude arrangements for the funeral of Ill. Bro. FOSTER. His remains were brought to this room, followed by a large and representative gathering of the Craft. The service was one of the most impressive I ever witnessed, and was commented upon by many who never knocked at the door of a Lodge for admittance. Ill. Bro. FOSTER had a host of friends. During his life he was first in the performance of Masonic duty, and a most vigorous defender of our beloved Rite.

Ill. Bro. COPELAND died at Mastagouche after a few hours' illness. His remains were taken to his residence in Berthier, where the funeral took place, attended by many warm personal friends, many of whom came from a distance. I regret very much that circumstances prevented me from being present. Ill. Bro. COPELAND was a veteran in our ranks; to him and a few others are we all indebted for the beautiful teachings of the Rite in this Province. At one time active and tireless in his work, lavish in expenditure, he contributed perhaps more than one man's share to establish and carry on our work successfully.

Before concluding this report let me extend to all present a hearty welcome to our Grand East. We also welcome you for the first time to our new rooms, a portion of which is set apart exclusively for the Rite, our earnest desire being that during the coming year some of the members at least, of this Supreme Council, may favor us with their presence from time to time.

ILLUSTRIOUS BRETHREN:

I beg to submit this my first report as Deputy for the Province of Nova Scotia, and regret to say that owing to great pressure of civic duties devolving upon me, I have not had time to make it as full and complete as its importance demands.

I am pleased to inform you that the three bodies in connection with the Scottish Rite in Nova Scotia are to-day in a flourishing condition. Victoria Lodge of Perfection has to date a membership of seventy-two, and the prospects for the future are bright, as several applications have been sent in. Keith Chapter Rose Croix has received during the year eleven members, and now numbers fifty-eight on its roll of membership. The Nova Scotia Consistory has during the year raised seven members to the 32^o, and now numbers thirty-four. The returns sent in, however, will show you the standing of the Scottish Rite as a whole in the Province of Nova Scotia up to the present date.

I may add that its position financially and otherwise is in a very prosperous condition, and now that they have a resident Deputy for the Province, the outlook for the future seems very bright.

I regret to inform you that the charter of the Consistory has been lost or mislaid. Diligent search for the same has been made by those in authority, but their efforts have been in vain. The only persons from whom they could have obtained any reliable information have passed away, namely, our late lamented Ill. Bro. FOSTER, 33^o, and E. and P. P. McKIEL, 18^o, late janitor Masonic Hall. In view of this fact, the Consistory would respectfully request that your Council cause a duplicate charter to be issued at once, and thus relieve them from their unfortunate position.

For reasons which I deemed sufficient, each case being considered on its merits, I dispensed with the constitutional time between the conferring of the 30th and the 31st and the 31st and 32nd degrees, in the cases of Sovereign Princes E. N. WOODGATE, H. W. GOULD and E. J. VICKERY, and between the 31st and 32nd on Ill. Bros. MURRAY, LAWSON, R. J. WILSON and D. H. CAMPBELL, and between the 14th and 18th on Bro. W. J. HUTCHINS.

Great improvements and many additions have been made to the stock of paraphernalia, and the full suite of rooms for Consistory work have been completely arranged and furnished with all necessary fittings; three of these rooms being reserved exclusively for this work, so that a great saving of time and preparation is made when degree work has to be arranged for. The ceilings and walls of the Red Room, which is 24 x 48 feet in the clear, have been most handsomely painted in oils down to the lines of the permanent hangings. The ceiling design is wholly emblematical, having the distinguishing symbols of the 14°, 18°, 32° and 33° as prominent features. The whole ceiling is enclosed by an endless chain, the thirty-two links being tied in the east by the double eagle of the 33° with the motto, and each link encloses a beautifully executed design of the degree it represents. On the whole I may say that I have not seen anything of its kind to excel it.

The joint stock book of the bodies shows that property to the value of \$3,520 is now owned by them.

Two Re-unions (in February and June) were held as usual, and not only were the gatherings rendered enjoyable to the members, but distinctly good results followed.

I can confidently report that the influence of the Rite in Manitoba and the North-west Territories has received no check, but on the contrary is steadily increasing.

We have the material, and under the able leadership of the Ill. T. P. G. M. DARRACH and Ill. T. A. McLEAN, S. G. Warden, and the Excellent Grand Secretary, W. A. BRENNAN, as well as others whom I need not name, the Lodge must prosper and go ahead.

Before the expiration of another year we fully anticipate the organization of a Chapter of Rose Croix and Consistory for this Province, the petitions being in readiness for sufficient material to advance, and whenever 20 members of the Lodge of Perfection will be ready to join the advanced grades, we are ready to prepare for the advance movement.

Our membership at present are somewhat scattered and frequent meetings are not desirable, and I was thinking if we could hold occasional meetings at Summerside and elsewhere, it would facilitate our labors and greatly strengthen our ranks. It appears that on 17th October, 1895, the said ALEX. G. WILKIE was suspended indefinitely by Doric Lodge, No. 316, G. R. C., A. F. & A. M., of Toronto, for unmasonic conduct, and that such action was taken after the fullest enquiry into a charge of felony, which had been duly laid against the said Brother.

A Certificate of Conviction, under the hand of the Clerk of the Police Court of Toronto, which is among the papers submitted to the Committee, shows that the said ALEXANDER WILKIE was on the 9th day of March, 1895, duly convicted of having feloniously stolen the sum of \$900 in money, the property of W. D. Matthews, and that upon such conviction, he, the said ALEXANDER WILKIE, was sentenced to be imprisoned in the Kingston Penitentiary for the term of five years for the said offence.

It further appears that Toronto Lodge of Perfection, at a regular meeting held on 18th November, 1895, duly suspended the said Bro. ALEXANDER WILKIE from that Lodge of Perfection for unmasonic conduct.

It further appears that at a meeting of Toronto Sovereign Chapter of Rose Croix, held 3rd January, 1896, the said ALEXANDER G. WILKIE was suspended from the said Chapter, and a resolution directed to be sent to the Grand Secretary-General recommending that he be expelled from the Ancient and Accepted Scottish Rite of Freemasonry.

In some of the papers submitted to the Committee the name ALEXANDER WILKIE appears, while in others the name is given as ALEXANDER G. WILKIE, and in the Certificate of Suspension from Doric Lodge the name appears as ALEX. G. C. WILKIE, but there can be no reasonable doubt that the same person is intended to be designated by these several names.

The suspension of the Brother from Doric Lodge, the Lodge of Perfection and the Chapter of Rose Croix is evidenced by the Certificates of the Presiding Officers and Secretaries or Grand Registrar, as the case may be, of these Bodies.

There can be no doubt of the guilt of this Brother of a serious crime, and no extenuating circumstances seem to have been urged on his behalf.

The Committee therefore recommend that he be expelled from the Ancient and Accepted Scottish Rite of Freemasonry.

ONTARIO.

The Illustrious Deputy for the Province of Ontario presents a very full report of the work in that Province during the past year. He has made many official visits, but regrets that in consequence of his absence in England he could not do as much in this line as he had intended. Reference is made in his report to the severe loss sustained in his jurisdiction, and in fact to the Rite throughout the Dominion, by the death of Illustrious Brother Daniel SPRY.

QUEBEC.

The Illustrious Deputy for the Province of Quebec reports continued prosperity in the Valley of Montreal, but regrets the almost dormant state of the Rite in the ancient City of Quebec.

He also refers to the loss sustained by the deaths of Illustrious Brother E. M. COPELAND, of his jurisdiction, as well as that of Illustrious Brother FOSTER, who was so often with them in this Valley.

NOVA SCOTIA.

The Illustrious Deputy for the Province of Nova Scotia reports that the three Bodies in connection with the Rite in this Province are in a very flourishing condition.

The new material anticipated in the Lodge of Perfection, as well as those advanced to the Rose Croix Chapter, and also the Consistory, augurs well for the future of the Rite in Nova Scotia.

He refers to the mislaying of the Charter of the Consistory, and states, although diligent search has been made for this Charter, their efforts have been without success, and your Committee recommend, that under the circumstances, a duplicate Charter be issued by the Supreme Council, so that they may be relieved from their unfortunate position.

NEW BRUNSWICK.

The Illustrious Deputy for this Province regrets that he is unable to report much activity in the City of St. John, though he expresses the belief, that under the superintendence of the distinguished Brethren who command the three Bodies there, the work of the Rite will be continued with renewed vigor in the near future.

He regrets that the Illustrious Brethren of St. Stephen have not yet made their application for a dispensation for the St. Croix Lodge of Perfection, but expresses the hope that such application will not long be delayed.

MANITOBA AND THE NORTH-WEST TERRITORIES.

The Illustrious Deputy for this Valley reports considerable increase in the membership and much improvement in their Rooms for working the degrees, besides many additions to their stock of paraphernalia, which increases their stock of properties, so that it now stands over \$3,500.

BRITISH COLUMBIA.

The Special Deputy for the Province of British Columbia reports that considerable work has been done and some material waiting advancement.

He refers, with thanks, to the very substantial aid given him by Ill.: Bro.: BENJAMIN ALLEN, of Toronto, when in Vancouver.

PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND.

The Special Deputy for the Province of Prince Edward Island reports progress, which, while not very rapid, takes courage and hopes to be able to report much better results for the ensuing year. The Body is in a healthy condition, and he anticipates that within two years they may expect a membership of fully one hundred.

he correctly assumes that he had through that illness the warm sympathy, not only of members of the Council, but of his Brethren of the Rite throughout the Dominion.

The tender and eloquent expressions of fraternal affection with which the Sovereign Grand Commander refers to the Brethren who have been called from their earthly labors, Ill. Bro. FOSTER, COPELAND and SPRY, will awaken a sympathetic echo in the heart of every member of the Supreme Council. Earnest, active, faithful, each in his own sphere of work, they were all agreeable in their companionship with us, and were animated by a sincere desire to uphold the principles of the Masonic institution. The recollection of what they were will be long cherished in the Supreme Council, and the influence of their good works will remain even when the cause of our present mourning shall have become but a tender memory.

Sorrowing over the deaths in our own household enables us to appreciate more deeply the loss sustained by Sister Councils, and we can extend to these our heartfelt sympathy. In the death of Bro. CHARLES T. McCLENACHAN, not only did the Supreme Council for the Northern Jurisdiction of the United States lose a most useful member, but the Rite itself was deprived of a warm defender and advocate, while this Supreme Council lost a sincere and active friend. The issuance by the Sovereign Grand Commander of a balustrade announcing the death of this eminent Brother and giving a sketch of his Masonic career was an eminently proper act and a just tribute to the memory of a deservedly esteemed Mason.

The Supreme Council must note with particular satisfaction from the address of the Sovereign Grand Commander, that all our relations with the Supreme Councils of our correspondence are harmonious, and that the Rite everywhere is in excellent condition. In respect of St. Domingo, it is particularly pleasing to observe that the difficulties existing in that jurisdiction have been healed, and the Supreme Council of Canada may well congratulate itself on the conservative course which it pursued in regard to Masonic government in that country.

The action of the Sovereign Grand Commander in declining to accredit representatives to the Grand Lodges of Peru and Argentina, is quite in accordance with the genius of our Rite, and must be approved. We heartily wish success to all legitimate governing Bodies of Craft Masonry, and welcome their friendship and good feeling, but as we claim no authority whatever over their degrees, we are not in a position to exchange representatives with the Bodies which control them.

With reference to our home affairs the Supreme Council must observe with satisfaction the fact that peace, harmony and progress prevail, that many of the Bodies of our Obedience have provided halls especially for their own use, and all will agree with the suggestion that it is advisable, as far as possible, that our apartments should be in the local Masonic temple. With the Sovereign Grand Commander, the Supreme Council will rejoice over the energy and spirit of the members of the Rite in the Valley of Ottawa, in so soon restoring the losses which they sustained by fire; and his congratulations to the members of the Rite in

Montreal may well be extended to the entire craft in this city, in possessing such a commodious and beautiful Temple as that in which we are now assembled. The energy and spirit which have been displayed in the promotion of this building, the desire to give the craft a secure and beautiful home, must excite the admiration of all from abroad who know the peculiar difficulties under which the Freemasons of Montreal labor, and should secure for these active and spirited Brethren the hearty assistance, co-operation and the brotherly sympathy of every member of the craft in the City and Province.

While the Supreme Council must share in the regrets of the Sovereign Grand Commander that no new Bodies of the Rite have been established in the year, yet, speaking generally, there is much to rejoice over in the general prosperity of our Bodies already established, and in the position which the Rite holds in the affections of its members, and in the general esteem of the community.

All of the official acts of the Sovereign Grand Commander are fully entitled to the approval of the Supreme Council, and the Committee recommend that the appointment of Ill. Bro. MACNEILL, now an Honorary Member of this Supreme Council, as Special Deputy for Prince Edward Island; and of Ill. Bro. DOWNIE, an Honorary Member elect, as Special Deputy for British Columbia, be approved.

The Committee recommend that the thanks of the Supreme Council be formally conveyed to Ill. Bro. BABCOCK, of Ohio, for his gift to the Library during the year; and that the other suggestions of the Sovereign Grand Commander, in regard to the Library, be referred to the Library Committee, with instructions to report at the next meeting of the Supreme Council upon the cost of procuring the works suggested.

With all that the Sovereign Grand Commander says in respect of our duty to exemplify in our lives the teachings of this Rite of Freemasonry, and to extend its privileges throughout the Dominion, the Supreme Council will be in hearty accord, and the Committee earnestly and sincerely express the hope that the Sovereign Grand Commander may long be spared to us to direct us in the path of duty and to lead the way in a work which is so near and dear to his heart.

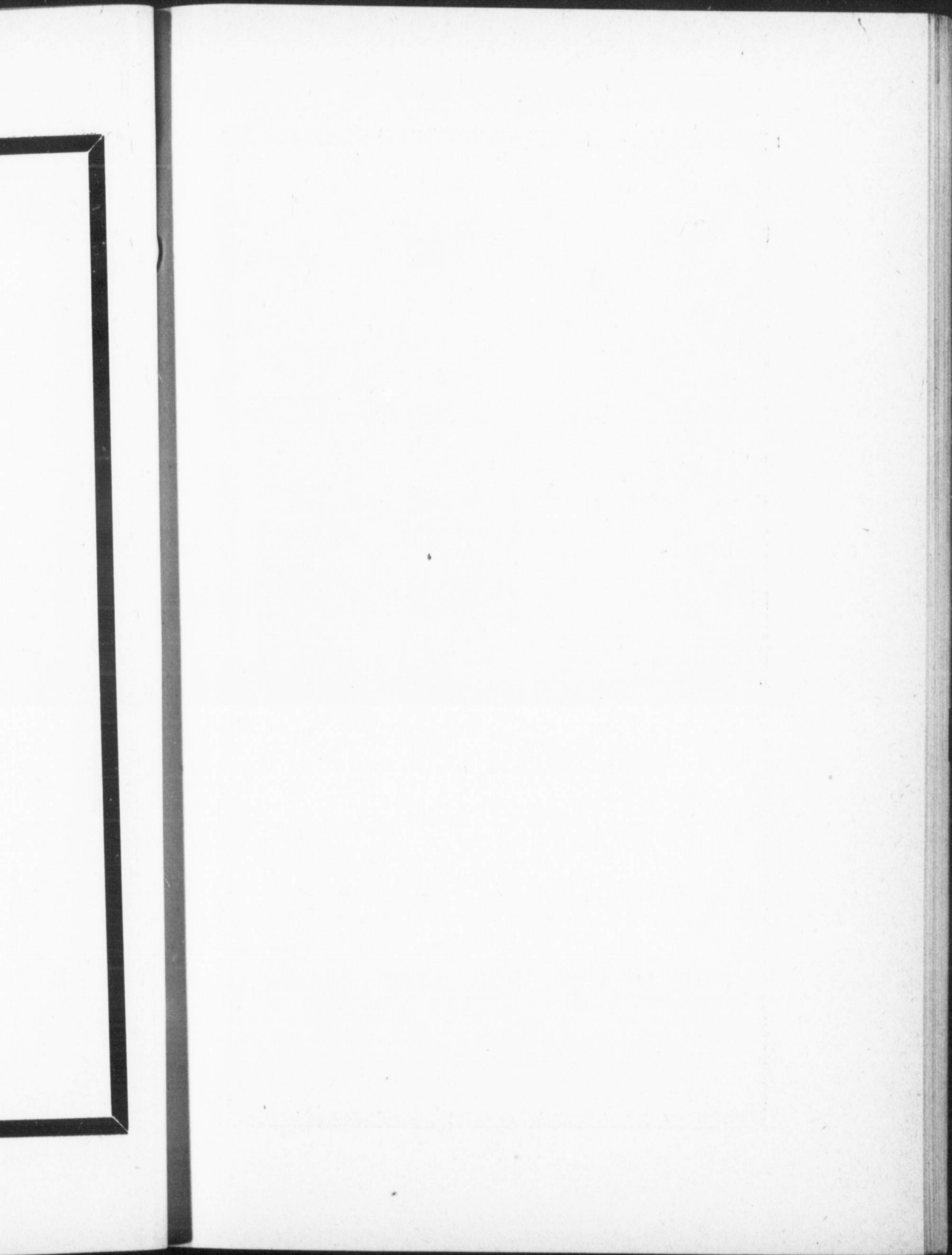

DEAR BRETHREN :

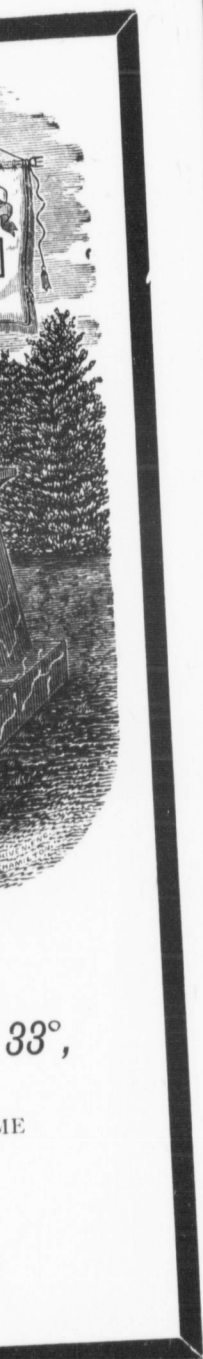
When this Supreme Council was in session in Ottawa in October, we were pained to know that one of our active members was deprived of attending the Council through sudden and serious illness, but we had no idea, nor was it even hinted, that that sickness was to be "unto death." But a few days since we were surprised by the telegraphic dispatch saying our dear and Ill. Bro. E. LUSHER FOSTER, 33°, Deputy for the Province of Nova Scotia, had gone to the bourne whence no traveller has returned.

Our brother was, at the time of his decease, 19th November, 1896, and had been for the past year or more, residing at Longueuil, Province of Quebec. He had been, with scarcely an exception, an attendant at every meeting of this Council since he was crowned a 33°.

The Rite in the Province of Nova Scotia, where he formerly resided, had been under his control for the past few years, and his active, intelligent labors in its behalf did much to assist its progress in that Province.

His loss will be deeply felt by the Brethren of Halifax, who had learned to love and depend upon him. He was one of the youngest but most active members of this Supreme Council, and we will all miss him, as he was truly devoted to the interests of this Order and the Supreme Council which he loved.

He was born in Kingston, Province of Ontario, in August, 1851, was educated at Bishop's College, Lennoxville, and had pursued a mercantile calling. He was initiated into Masonry in MONTORVILLE LODGE, G. R., Quebec, in June, 1878, and received his M. M. Degree in August of that year, and was Worshipful Master of the Lodge in 1881. He was exalted a R. A. Mason in KING SOLOMON'S CHAPTER, Toronto, April 16th, 1883, and was a member afterwards of the ENCAMPMENT OF ST. JOHN, K. T., in St. John, N. B. He received the Degrees of Perfection of this Rite in TORONTO LODGE OF PERFECTION, Oct., 1882; his 18° in TORONTO CHAPTER ROSE CROIX, 1883, and finally the Consistory Degrees in NOVA SCOTIA CONSISTORY, and was for four years its Commander-in-Chief. He was crowned an Active S. G. I. G., 33°, by this



Supreme Council, 23rd Oct., 1889, and appointed its Deputy for Nova Scotia, Oct., 1890, which office he ably filled to the day of his death. He leaves a widow and two small sons who have our most sincere sympathy in their sad bereavement.

In token, therefore, of our sorrow and regret, the Bodies of our Obedience and members of this Supreme Council will wear the usual badge of mourning for the space of sixty days.

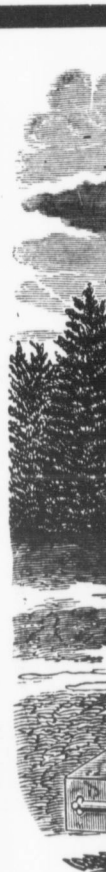

DEAR BRETHREN :

It is again our painful duty to announce the death of a dear Brother and Active Member of our Supreme Council, ILL.: BRO.: EUGENE MORTIMER COPELAND, 33°.

Our Brother, at the time of his death, was at the Camp of the Mastigouche Fish and Game Club, of which he was Manager. The day before he complained of severe pains in the region of his heart, and it was thought advisable to send to St. Gabriel de Brandon for a physician, who arrived late in the evening, and remained all night. He did not think it was a serious case, but just a passing trouble, and expressed the opinion that our Brother would be all right next day. Next morning Brother COPELAND appeared to be much better, and no fear was then entertained of his sudden death, but scarcely five minutes after the physician had left, our Brother became faint, and shortly after breathed his last. His death was painless. The body was conveyed to his home at Berthierville, and there buried.

Brother COPELAND was born in the State of New York, U. S. A., in 1837, and was consequently in his sixtieth year. He was initiated in St. George's Lodge, in the City of Montreal, in 1864, and elected Worshipful Master in 1868; was exalted to the degree of Royal Arch in Caernarvon Chapter, Montreal, in 1864, and elected 1st Principal Z. in 1871 and 1872; was elected Grand Superintendent of Royal Arch Masons for the District of Montreal, in 1873 and 1874; was installed a Knight Templar in Richard Cour de Lion Preceptory in 1866, and elected Preceptor in 1871 and 1872, and received the degrees of the Ancient and Accepted Scottish Rite, up to and including the 32nd degree, at Norwich, Connecticut, in 1873.

Our Brother for a number of years held the office of T.: P.: G.: M.: of Hochelaga Lodge of Perfection, Montreal, and took a great interest in all the Bodies there. Being possessed, at that time, of considerable means, he dispensed them with a lavish hand in the propagation of the Rite. For the past ten years he had not been financially in a position to continue that good work, and being of a sensitive and proud-spirited disposition, was deterred from joining his Brethren as frequently as they wished.

We are again called upon to announce the loss of another of the active members of this Supreme Council, one whom we had expected would be with us for many years, and to whom we could look for valuable assistance and advice.

Ill.: Bro.: DANIEL SPRY, 33°, Grand Chancellor of this Council, passed away on Friday, the 13th inst., at London, in this Province.

The immediate cause of his death was a relapse of a serious illness with which he had been afflicted during the past winter, but from which we hoped he had recovered.

Brother SPRY was one of our most beloved and valued members, a mason of large experience and of great ability, whose name and fame, as a mason, were known not only over this Dominion, but throughout the United States and Europe as well.

He was in every sense of the word a true man, one on whom we could rely, whose word was as good as his bond and whose friendship it was a pleasure to enjoy.

He will be greatly missed by the Canadian craft and by this Rite especially, as, when in health, he was seldom absent from its assemblies, cheering and inspiring the members by his genial presence and his ready and valuable advice, and, with few exceptions, was always in his place at the sessions of this Supreme Council.

Brother SPRY was born on the 29th November, 1835, near Burritt's Rapids, in the County of Carleton, Province of Ontario, and resided for very many years in the City of Toronto. He was at the time of his death, and has been for several years, Inspector of Post Offices, a position which he filled with great ability and with acceptance to the government and the people. His Masonic career was of long standing and of marked prominence. He was initiated in King Solomon's Lodge, No. 22, Toronto, on the 11th March, 1858, and was elected Worshipful Master of same in 1862, and again in 1863, 1868, 1872 and 1873; was elected Master of Rehoboam Lodge, No. 65, in 1871 and 1877. He

was the first Master of Mimico Lodge, No. 369; he was the founder of Zetland Lodge, No. 326, and for many years its Treasurer. In 1875 he was elected D. D. G. M. of Toronto District; in 1881 he was elected Deputy Grand Master of the Grand Lodge of Canada, and in 1882 and 1883 Most Worshipful Grand Master. In Capitular Masonry, Companion SPRY held many offices, including those of Grand Scribe E, Grand H and Grand Z. In Knight Templarism, Frater SPRY took a leading position, and at the time of his death was Grand Chancellor, and held the rank of Past Grand Master in the Priors of Canada and of Victoria. He was created an Honorary Inspector General, 33°, in this Supreme Council on the 15th Oct., 1884, and afterwards crowned an Active at the same session. He was appointed Deputy for Ontario, and was elected to the office of Grand Chancellor at the session of this Supreme Council in 1886; the latter position he held until his death, and both of which he filled with great acceptance.

Such, my brethren, was the man who has left the scene of his labors and his suffering for the peace and joy of a Higher and Holier sphere. We will cherish the memory of him in our hearts and endeavor to imitate his many virtues, and as a mark of respect to his memory, direct that the badge of mourning be worn for a period of sixty days, and may Our Father in Heaven have you always in His Holy Keeping.

A great man in our Rite, perhaps with few exceptions the greatest authority as well as one of the grandest workers in this Order in the world, has left the scene of his labors for, we trust, a Higher and Holier sphere.

Ill.: Bro.: CHARLES T. McCLENACHAN, 33°, Grand Master General of Ceremonies of the Supreme Council of the Northern Jurisdiction of the U. S. passed away at his home in the City of New York on the 19th December last.

When a truly great man dies the whole world mourns and deplors his loss as one that the race has suffered, and it is quite consistent for people, other than his own, to eulogise him for his virtues and speak of the deeds he has performed for the benefit of mankind. Therefore we offer no apology in sending forth this memoriam letter of one who, although not a Brother of our Obedience, was one to whom perhaps more than to any man living, this Rite is indebted for its present high and successful position.

Ill.: Bro.: McCLENACHAN was prominent in all branches of the Masonic Order, but he was pre-eminently so in the A.: & A.: S.: Rite, as his well-known life-long labor and his published works on its behalf abundantly show.

The Grand Commander of the Northern Jurisdiction, in his circular letter announcing Bro.: McCLENACHAN's death, says :

“Our Brother has given to Freemasonry a large share of his useful and busy life. He was a thorough student of Freemasonry, and investigated everything connected with it to its source. As a result of his labors in connection with Masonic literature, he has left as an enduring monument of his love for the Fraternity, his zeal in patient investigation and untiring study, and his ability as a writer, his *Book of the A. A. Scottish Rite*, a manual covering all the Scottish Rite degrees ; his *Addendum to Dr. Mackey's Encyclopedia of Freemasonry*, covering over one thousand subjects ; and his *History of Masonry in New York*, consisting of four large volumes. The work which he performed in connection with the Rituals of our Supreme Council during his twenty-five years of service upon our Committee

on Rituals, in its extent, importance and value, is known to and appreciated by the members of the Supreme Council, and the active workers of the Rite throughout the jurisdiction."

He was ever the firm friend of this Supreme Council and never failed to respond when his valuable aid was sought, which it has often been in the early days of the establishment of this Body.

We therefore direct that this letter be read in all the Bodies of our Obedience, and in token of our appreciation of the deceased and our sorrow for his loss, the altar and working tools of the Rite in this Jurisdiction will be draped in mourning for the space of sixty days.

And may Our Father who is in Heaven have you always in His holy keeping.

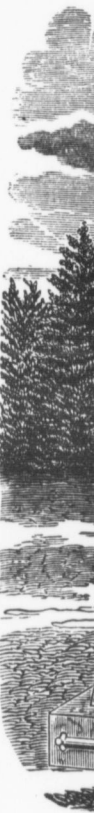

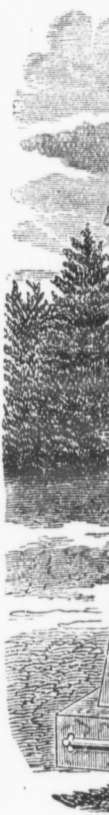
