Rapid Progress Made in the Drafting of the Treaty---Ten Articles Completed Last Night---Tokio Paper Objects to Peace Terms.

THE TREATY OF PORTSMOUTH

Portsmouth, N. H., Aug. 31.—Rapid progress was made today in the dratting of the treaty of peace. Baron Komurs, at Mr. Witte's request, will probably tomorrow fix a day for its signature. Russai's consent to a suspension of hostilities reached Mr. Witte tonight in a cablegram from Count Lamdorff whom Emperor Nicholas has empowered to deal with the important habe of the practical conclusion of peace and directed to hold himself in readiness to open with Field Marshai Oyama the negotiations for an armistice, the order for the suspension of hostilities and the signing of the truce will not go lorward from St. Peteraburg until Mr. Witte has been informed by Baron Komura that the Emperor of Japan has also given his consent and has empowered Marshai Oyama to conduct the negotiations with the Kumsian commander in the field.

Having advised General Linevitch of the situation, Russia will not hold herself responsible for any clash which may occur before Japan has consented to an armistice.
