HIGH COURT OF I.O.F. IS MEETING TODAY

The First Business Sessions Opened in York Assembly Rooms This Morning

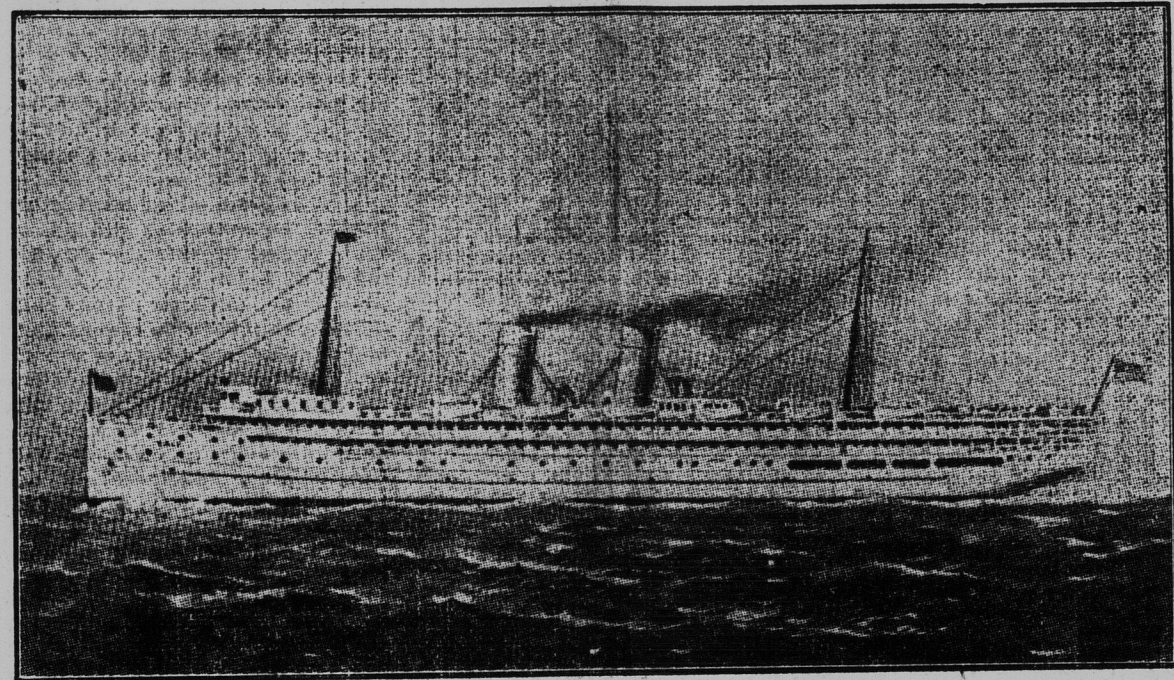

BIG NEW TURBINER YALE ARRIVED THIS MORNING FROM BOSTON DIRECT

Latest Addition to Eastern S. S. Company Fleet Gets Great Reception Here—The "Harvard" Her Sister Ship Will Also Go on the St. John-Boston Route.



The New Turbine Steamer Yale Which Arrived Today.

When the Eastern S. S. Co.'s new turbine steamer Yale arrived this morning from Boston she was greeted by hundreds of people who thronged the Eastern line wharf at Reed's Point.

In keeping with the colors of the university from which the steamship Yale takes its name, the decorations and furnishings of the main saloon are done in blue.

The Yale is the third turbine steamer to be built in the United States, the other two being the Governor Cobb and the Camden, both of which are now in the Eastern Steamship Company service.

The two new turbine steamers were named Yale and Harvard in honor of the Yale and the other Harvard. The Yale, on her voyage here from Boston used only eight of her twelve boilers, and no attempt was made to secure a record, as only had already been secured between Boston and New York by the Eastern S. S. Co.

Among those on board the steamer were: Captain James T. Morse and party, including his two nephews, sons of Chas. W. Morse, the "steamship king."

THAT RAILWAY SCHEME

The attempt of the promoters of the Atlantic, Quebec and Western Railway Company to secure the right to parallel the International Railway across New Brunswick is not likely to succeed. The Globe is somewhat concerned about this matter, although, as the Telegraph pointed out, it was not Senator Ellis who objected when the scheme was up in the senate. It was Senator Costigan who headed it off. Hon. Dr. Pugsley, who when premier, was looking after the interests of the provincial government, is still acting for the provincial government, and believes that the result will be satisfactory. Clearly, it will never do to have the proposed line closely parallel one whose bonds the province has heavily guaranteed, even if, as the Globe intimates, a medical diagnosis would probably describe him as suffering from an acute attack of political intoxication.

THE HOT SEASON

There is reason to believe that a political campaign is in progress in Hants county, N. S. The Windsor correspondent of the Halifax Chronicle appears to have made the discovery. In describing a meeting he says among other things: "So far every word spoken was courteous and friendly. But then Mr. J. A. Scott arose, in a very excited state of mind. A medical diagnosis would probably describe him as suffering from an acute attack of political intoxication. He poured forth torrents of abuse on every one who declined to accept as infallible his method of dealing with the liquor question. His speech was utterly devoid of reason and common sense, and his vicious attack on Mr. Cooper, if he repeats it elsewhere, will assuredly gain votes for the Liberal candidate."

VIRGINIA'S DISGRACE

Former Judge Loving, of Virginia, murdered a man and has been acquitted by a jury. His plea was that his daughter had told him she was given drugged whiskey and was assaulted by a young man with whom she went out for a ride, and that in his wrath he went in search of the young man and shot him to death. The prosecution argued that the evidence to prove that the daughter was false, but the evidence was ruled out. After the trial ended and the judge was acquitted the jury admitted that they did not believe the girl's story, and her father's counsel also admitted that it was attempted. In the course of the trial it was shown that the ex-judge had been in the habit of going himself on prolonged periods of drunkenness and debauchery. The jury decided that he was temporarily insane when he committed the murder. Such is law and such is justice in Virginia. The "brainstorm" and "unwritten law" area in the United States is widening. Under such conditions every man should go armed and regard with suspicion every other man who approaches him. The convenient plea of temporary insanity, backed up by an artfully conceived tissue of falsehoods, ought in such a community to be of great value to any man who desires to make short work of a rival, an enemy or any objectionable person.

THE ARCHBISHOP'S DREAM

The Times one day last week referred to the assertion said to have been made by Archbishop Langevin in an address in Winnipeg, that the French-Canadians should acknowledge no other authority in political and social life than the pope and the bishops. In a letter to the Toronto Globe a Catholic clergyman says that there must either be a misunderstanding or an incorrect report of what the archbishop said. The Winnipeg Free Press, however, accepts the report as correct, and severely condemns the attitude of the archbishop and another speaker, Rev. Father Lacasse. The Free Press states clearly the view of most Catholics as well as of Protestants on this subject. We quote: "The significant address of Archbishop Langevin and Father Lacasse at the St. Jean Baptiste celebration make it very clear that the archbishop and his encourage dream of the establishment in Canadian politics of a Catholic party embracing all the adherents of the church under the leadership of the higher clergy. There have been numerous references of late in the church press in this province to the example set by Germany, where there is a strong clerical party, thoroughly disciplined, which plays an important part in the making of politics. Yesterday Dr. Windthorst, to whose political genius this party is a testimonial, was expressly commended

by Father Lacasse as setting an example of "good politics." This may be simply a Manitoba development or Archbishop Langevin may be the advance guard of a wider movement. "We have spoken of this desire for a church party as a dream and a dream it will doubtless remain. Nothing could happen which would be more disastrous to the interests of the country at large and to the well-being of the church with which Archbishop Langevin is identified than the obliteration of party lines as they exist and the division of the electors into two warring religious camps. Because this would inevitably result from the success of the archbishop's plans. He imagines that if he had a solid party at his command he could club first one party and then the other into submission to his wishes. It would happen, however, that under those circumstances there would only be one other party. It would be made up of all the rest of the people, and it would have such overwhelming political strength that it would be quite out of reach of the club. We have no expectation that any such conditions will arise. The archbishop's co-religionists can be trusted effectively to discourage the scheme simply by refusing to subscribe to it. Catholic laymen, as in the past, will continue to do their own political thinking and will ally themselves with the political party whose policies most appeal to them. As they will differ in their opinions they will be found in the future pretty evenly divided between the two parties, which is the case at present."

Senator Comeau of Nova Scotia found evidence of very rapid growth in the west, from Winnipeg to the coast, but he nevertheless advises eastern people to exercise reasonable prudence in making investments in lands. He would not in all cases trust the maps. As time passes and the more desirable town sites are taken up the senator's advice will gain force. A man who made an investment near home not long since made this observation: "If I lose, I'll know where the money went, anyhow—and know that I lost it myself at home." There is something to be said in favor of this man's philosophy.

With the present week the tourist season of 1907 will be fairly opened. The rush of summer travel from New England does not usually begin until after July 4th. The Eastern Steamship Co., in placing on the Boston route the largest and finest vessel ever engaged in this service not only prove their faith in the business but offer a substantial inducement to intending tourists to come this way. St. John welcomes the Yale, the latest evidence of a steadily improving passenger service between St. John and Boston.

Whether it be in response to the assurance of better pay and more consideration for school teachers in this province, the number of students taking the normal school entrance examinations this year is very much larger than usual. But the number of teachers annually leaving the profession or going west is also large. The number of skilled teachers of experience is not as great as it should be, under a well-organized and well-paid educational system.

The announcement is made that a new commercial treaty between Canada and France is being drawn up, and will be negotiated before Messrs. Fielding and Brodeur leave Paris. Sir Wilfrid Laurier states that it will be an advantageous treaty for both Canada and France. Doubtless an improved steamship service will be one of the results, and in the winter season this should be of special advantage to the port of St. John.

It is evident that in Union street, west, where the slide is in progress, the city council has a problem of a serious nature. In the favorable view a large expenditure is involved, and if any blunders are made it may be enormous. Therefore the most careful consideration is necessary.

Year by year Dominion Day means more to the Canadian. The wisdom of the founders stands out in ever clearer light, and their confidence in the future is justified more and more in the progress of the world's newest great democracy.

Sir Wilfrid Laurier will be back in Canada within three weeks. Shortly after his arrival there may be something doing in political circles, although he may await the coming of Messrs. Fielding and Brodeur before filling up the cabinet.

FREDERICTON NEWS

Reported That New Owners Are in Control of Gibson Cotton Mill. Fredericton, N. B., July 1—Canada's natal day was very quietly observed by the citizens of Fredericton at a public holiday. Business was pretty generally suspended. Flags were flying from all the public buildings and hotels. The weather was very wet and disagreeable, and the people had very little opportunity of enjoying the holiday out of doors. The Gibson cotton mill, which has been closed down since Friday for stock taking, resumed operations this morning. The Canadian Cotton Company, which now practically in control, although some details of the deal are yet to be arranged.

THE STEEL TRADE REPORTED ACTIVE

All branches of the iron and steel industries in the United States are as active as they have been at any time since the first of the year, and the customary shut-down for repairs and inventories in July will be made as short as possible. While new business is not up to the production of the mills, specifications are unusually heavy for this time of year. U. S. Steel for six months ended June 30 will show falling off of about 800,000 tons in unrolled business as compared with January 1st, but this cannot be regarded as unfavorable feature, as shrinkage in volume of unrolled tonnage generally sets in about the first of the year and continues until the latter part of June. A better idea of the conditions will be obtained over the next six months. The belief prevails that there will be a slowing up of the trade about the latter part of the year, but manufacturers do not believe it will reach large proportions.

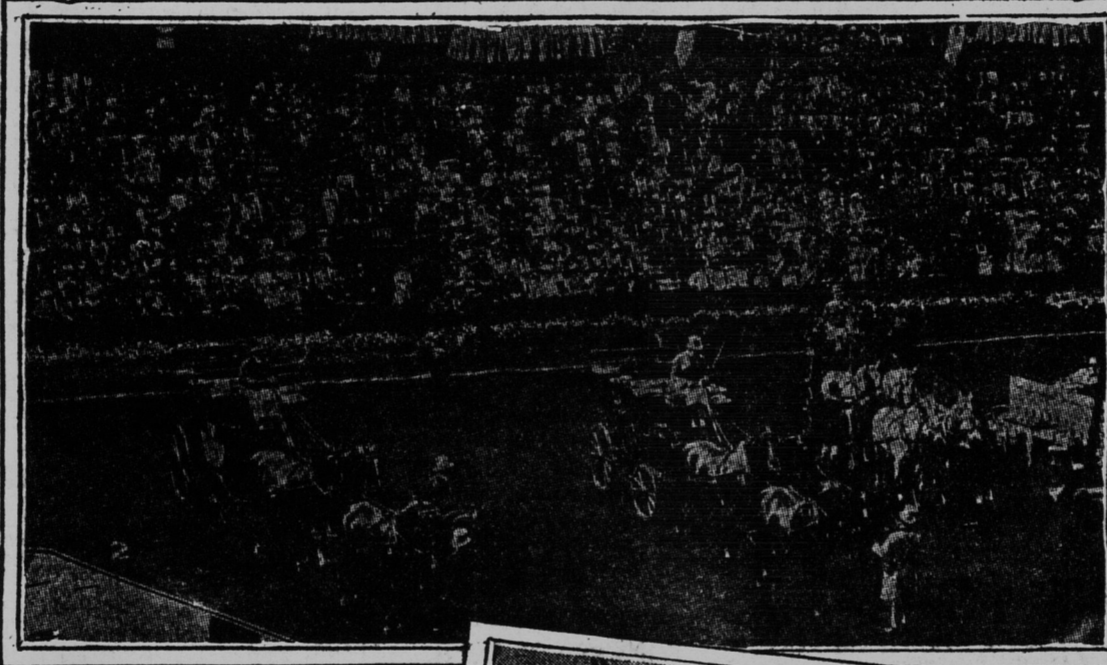
Repairer of Wrecked Tenement Put Under \$25,000 Bail.

The international show at the Olympia was a revelation to the breeders throughout the kingdom. The horses which were sent to the show from the United States not only won prizes, but the English breeders had to admit their superiority, and did not make any effort to beg off from the verdict of the ground of technicalities.

WESTERN FEDERATION MINERS' SPY ON STAND

Boise, Idaho, July 1.—Morris Friedman, a Russian stenographer, who left the employment of the Pinkerton agency at Denver to write a book in which he published certain correspondence of the agency that passed through his hands, was again today the principal figure at the trial of William D. Haywood for the murder of former Governor Steenbergen. More than half of the court's day was occupied in reading to the jury copies of the documents which Friedman took from the Pinkerton records. They were chiefly the daily reports of secret agents operating as spies among the unions at Cripple Creek, Victor, Globeville, Colorado City, Trinidad and Denver, and showed a complete surveillance of the Western Federation of Miners and the United Mine Workers of America during the labor troubles in Colorado in 1903-1904. Friedman, who showed, sat in the federation convention at Denver in 1904, reporting all proceedings. None of the reports that were produced by Friedman and read to the jury by Clarence Darrow, contained other than general references to the collateral issues of the trial, but they were offered in substantiation of the charge by the defense that the Pinkerton agency conspired for the destruction of the Western Federation of Miners and the lives of the leaders. The prosecution offered no objection to any feature of Friedman's testimony and no objection to the introduction of the documents that the defense obtained through him. When Friedman was handed over for cross-examination, the state endeavored to ascertain whether Friedman had any more reports or letters bearing on the general issue. It attacked Friedman on the ground that he had played the Pinkerton tales; had violated his pledge to them and had stolen the documents which he produced; but the witness would not admit that he had stolen the papers and would not allow Senator Borah to call him a "Pinkerton." He insisted that it was not stealing to take information that had been obtained by fraud and deceit of secret service men and declared that the public service which he performed in informing the people of the methods of the agency fully justified anything he had done.

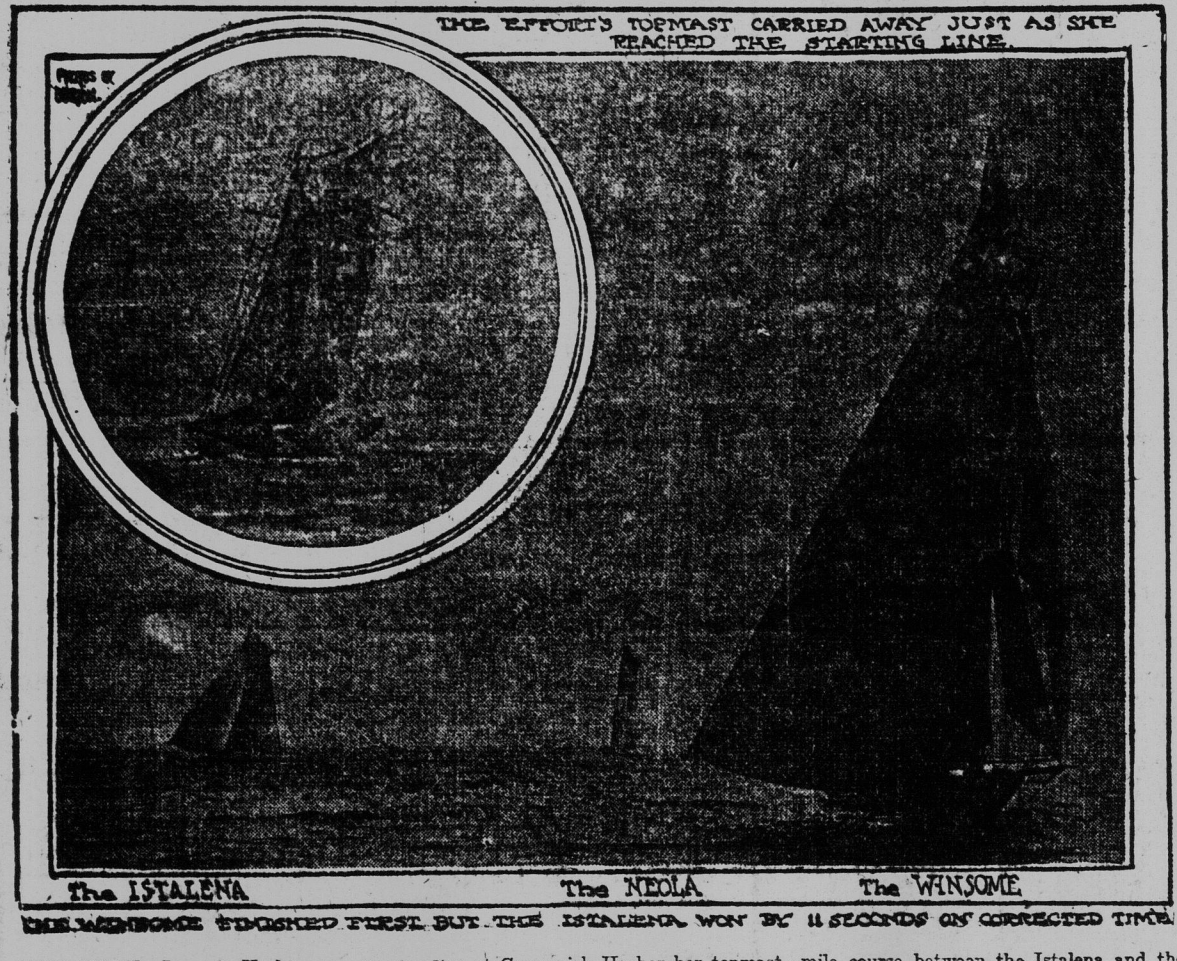

A CHALLENGE TO MARCONI James S. Pitt, Formerly of St. John, Talks of His Wireless System.

Among the passengers arriving by the steamer Yale this morning was one gentleman who is particularly well known in St. John. He is none other than Professor James S. Pitt, who achieved fame in Boston where he is known as "the lightning harber," holding the championship of the world for speed shaving.

Although he is not anxious to discuss the merits of his invention at present, yet Mr. Pitt is convinced that he has improved upon the Marconi system.

Talking to the Times this morning he said he had ample backing and was prepared to challenge Signor Marconi for a competitive test of the two systems for some \$10,000 to \$20,000 per side, the test to take place in any part of the United States or in St. John.

"Yes, I will challenge Marconi," said Mr. Pitt, "and if I, with my machine, cannot do everything Marconi does and more, then I am prepared to admit defeat. Marconi has an instrument on Partridge Island, and so far, he, to my mind, has as yet accomplished nothing with his telegraphy and this belief is shared by many of his friends.

Professor Pitt is accompanied by his brother, T. S. Pitt, eye and ear specialist, of Boston, and Dr. Charles Pitt, surgeon-dentist of Cambridge, Mass. They will spend some days at the guest house, and will return to St. John on Tuesday. Professor Pitt is a former St. John man, and is particularly well known here.
