Further Gains By The Khaki Troops On A Wide Front

Reach St. Quentin Canal at One Point—Gains on Monday Are Held—Fifteen Hundred Prisoners Counted so Far and Many Still Being Brought in

London, April 24.—The British gained ground on the wide front last night south of the Bapaume-Cambrai road. They reached the St. Quentin Canal at one point. Further north, the villages of Beau-camp and Villers Plouich were captured. The positions gained on the French front yesterday, says the official statement today, were maintained and further progress was made east of Monchy and near Rouex. More than 1,500 prisoners were taken in yesterday's operations and many more are coming in.

FRENCH REPULSE ENEMY Paris, April 24.—The artillery was very active last night in the vicinity of Hurbise, in the Foulon valley, and near Craonne, says today's official announcement. French patrols took prisoners. Two German attacks during the night were repulsed. In the Champagne there was grenade fighting.

Paris, April 24.—The French statement of today follows: "In the region of St. Quentin and the Oise our artillery directed an effective counter-offensive. Our patrols were very active, bringing back prisoners. Two German reconnoitering parties which attempted to approach our lines near Vancourt were repulsed with heavy losses.

Violent artillery fighting occurred in the region of Hurbise in the Foulon valley, and near Craonne. We were able to make progress and improve our positions on the plateau of the Chemin-des-Dames and near Juvin-court we captured a German post. Two German surprise attacks north-east of Rheims were repulsed. We took prisoners.

"In the Champagne there was grenade fighting during which we took prisoners. We directed with success a bombardment against the enemy lines of communication near Eparsy, one of our reconnoitering parties penetrated the German lines and brought back prisoners after destroying several shelters. There is nothing to report from the rest of the front."

Petrograd, April 24, via London.—"On the Russo-Galician front there have been rifle firing, scouting and aerial operations," says today's official report. "The Romanians front there were more animated rifle firing in the regions east of Mesteconne and Pokshani. In the mountains the snow is two and one-half feet deep. On the Caucasus front rifle firing and reconnoitering operations occurred."

DID NOT SUCCEED IN SINKING THIS ONE Belgian Relief Vessel Hit But Succeeds in Reaching Port London, April 24.—The American commission for relief in Belgium has learned that the relief ship Kongsli has arrived in port and that it is expected that three-fourths of the cargo will be saved. The second mate is missing. Officers of the steamer say that she was undoubtedly torpedoed, although a submarine was not seen. The attack occurred in the so-called free zone in a district where no mines had previously been encountered.

An Amsterdam despatch on April 31 reported that the Kongsli had been sunk by a mine or a submarine and that one member of the crew was missing. A later despatch from Ymuiden stated that it had been ascertained that the Kongsli had not been sunk, but was being towed into port.

NEW PAPER MEN MEET IN CONVENTIONS IN NEW YORK New York, April 24.—Editors, publishers and advertising men from all parts of the United States and from Canada are here for the annual convention of the Associated Press and the American Newspaper Publishers Association at the Waldorf Astoria. The members of the Associated Press met this morning and the opening session of the A. N. P. A. will be held tomorrow. One of the most important questions is that of war censorship. George Creel, chairman of the government committee on public information, has addressed a message to the convention asking for aid and co-operation. The high price of news paper also will be discussed.

BOY SCOUTS PLANTING VEGETABLES ON POTOMAC Washington, April 24.—Two thousand Boy Scouts, carrying rakes, hoes and spades, paraded past the White House, on their way to a 300-acre plot near the Potomac river, loaned by the government to be cultivated by the boys as a big vegetable garden.

Turks Driven Farther Back By British London, April 24.—The Turks in Mesopotamia have been driven from their position between Samarra and Izbilbat. The war office so announces. The British, pursuing them, occupied Samarra yesterday capturing sixteen locomotives and 226 railway trucks.

BATTLE ONE OF HARDEST OF WAR

British Correspondents Agree It Is Tough Fight

RESISTANCE STIFF Germans Trying New System of Trenches and Machine Gun Pits But Our Forces Gain—English and Scottish Doing Most of Fighting

London, April 24.—Correspondents at British Headquarters in France concur in statements that the battle which has been resumed at Arras is much fiercer than when it began. The Germans, they say, were fully prepared for its renewal and are being stimulated to extreme resistance by their officers.

One of the correspondents asserts that it is one of the most difficult battles of the whole war. The Germans by frantic work, the correspondent says, have constructed numerous trenches and machine gun pits not in a definite line, but strewn everywhere in apparent disorder, as though each position had been selected by virtue of some rise in the ground.

Another correspondent writes:—"The battle is extremely hard for our men. It is a battle to the death. So far all is vague. Fighting is in progress at all the points attacked by our troops and there is an ebb and flow in the battle. Our men are beaten back for a while by the intensity of the fire, but they are attacking again and again and getting forward."

Almost all the fighting, it seems, is being done by English and Scottish troops. It is said that the German casualties have been severe and that those of the British correspondents, inflicted largely by machine guns and shrapnel. Estimates of the prisoners vary. One correspondent says the first day's prisoners numbered not fewer than 2,000. The captures of guns are mentioned without an estimate of their number being given.

PROOF OF LIES BY THE GERMANS

Admission, Now, As To Strikes in Germany, Despite Former Denial

Copenhagen, via London, April 24.—Additional light is gradually being thrown upon the extent of the recent strike in Berlin by items appearing in the Berlin newspapers. The Vorwaerts, which previously denied that the big munitions factories at Spandau, near Berlin, was affected by the strike, printed the following in Monday's edition: "The lathe operators at Spandau, who are on strike, have decided to return to work."

The big munitions factories at Spandau are again working in full force. Martial strikes at the German weapon and munitions factory and Ludwigsloeve (an important establishment not previously mentioned), are ended. The Bolshevik party is again in full operation, strikes having been found for the women operatives, not reported.

"Thus the strike at Spandau, despite the denials of their existence, lasted for a full week."

STORY OF PRESSURE ON KAISER TO ABDICATE

Heard in Spain and Italy But Believed Sent Out by Germans for a Purpose

Rome, April 24.—Via Paris.—The Corriere d'Italia, clerical organ, declares that it is able to confirm reports published in the Spanish newspapers, that the immediate following of the German emperor is exerting pressure on him to abdicate. The paper says that at a recent meeting of the Hohenzollern family, one member intimated that the emperor might save the situation by following the example of the Emperor Nicholas.

The German monarch is reported to have turned pale and, after observing that the general opinion was against him, left the room muttering "we shall see." The same evening he summoned another family council. The chancellor and some of the ministers were present but whatever passed remains unknown. Little importance is attached to this story in Italian political circles, where it is thought that the story has a German origin and is put out with the intention of influencing opinion.

SPAIN AGAIN SENDS NOTE TO GERMANY Madrid, April 24.—The government has sent another note to Germany on the submarine question, according to Imperial.

W. A. ANNUAL MEETING OPENS

The fourteenth annual meeting of the Fredericton diocesan branch of the Women's Auxiliary was commenced this morning in Trinity church school room with Mrs. Thomas Walker presiding. At 1:30 o'clock the delegates assembled in the church, and following Holy Communion, Rev. Ralph Sherman preached a very appropriate sermon in the course of which he welcomed all the delegates to the city.

Following special religious services in the church, the delegates went to the school room where a business session was held. At 11 o'clock Mrs. H. J. Roberts, recording secretary of the diocesan branch, read the roll call to which many delegates from the outlying districts of New Brunswick responded. The school room was filled and much enthusiasm prevailed.

Mrs. H. L. Harrison said that the Canadian women were today proud of their dauntless men, despite their cup of bitterness from Christiania, that the prayer of each of the delegates for a successful and early conclusion of hostilities was being answered.

The meetings will last three days. This afternoon the president, Mrs. Thomas Walker, delivered her address.

TWO NORWEGIANS SUNK

London, April 24.—It is officially announced in Norway, says a news despatch from Christiania, that the Norwegian steamer Reice has been sunk by a German submarine in the North Sea and the Norwegian steamer Skjold of 1,125 tons, in the Atlantic.

GERMANS OVER REACH THEMSELVES IN THE SUBMARINE CAMPAIGN

Bring Censure of Russian Socialists by Sinking Steamer on Which Were Russian Refugees

London, April 24.—Despatches from Petrograd today state that the Russian socialists are greatly exercised over the sinking of the steamer Zara by a German submarine. The Zara was taking some Russian refugees.

The Zara sailed on April 11, and was torpedoed in northern waters two days later. The official organ of the council of labor deputies in Petrograd, commenting on the sinking of the Zara, says: "This heavy blow right at the heart of the Russian revolution cannot pass without its effect. The revolutionary democracy must reply with a blow at the center from which the torpedo was sent. The democracy must regard the murder of its leaders as proof that the rulers of Germany are base hypocrites and that their promises not to harm the cause of Russian liberty are empty words."

CLOSE LONDON STOCK EXCHANGE ON SATURDAYS

London, April 24.—A committee of members of the stock exchange has decided that the exchange should be closed on Saturday until further notice to permit members and employes to take up work of national importance.

NEWFOUNDLAND TO FURNISH COPPER SUPPLY

St. Johns, Nfld., April 24.—The colonial government is developing in Newfoundland copper mining activities on the northeast coast in the expectation of providing additional supplies of the metal for the allies. Three large mines near Notre Dame Bay were worked profitably by old methods forty years ago. When the copper available by these methods ran out the mines were largely suspended. It is estimated that many million tons can be recovered under modern means of concentration.

ARGENTINE WHEAT TO ENGLAND; CANADIAN IN RETURN

Buenos Aires, April 24.—In accordance with an agreement entered into with the British minister the Argentine government has authorized the exportation of 150,000 tons of wheat and 200,000 tons of flour to England on condition that 200,000 tons of wheat from the Canadian harvest shall be returned to Argentina in July.

WILSON'S WAR ADDRESS TO BE SCATTERED AMONG GERMANS

Paris, April 24.—Upwards of 300,000 copies of President Wilson's war address to congress are to be dropped over German lines by French and American aviators. The text of the message, translated into German, has been delivered by the printers and is now ready for distribution. The dropping of the message is the result of an agreement between the French and American governments.

GERMAN GRIP ON AUSTRIA

Amsterdam, April 24.—A Vienna despatch says that the continuance of the pro-German ministers in power is considered certain as the result of the deliberations of the German parties on the political situation. In parliamentary circles it is expected that the Reichsrath will be convened on May 30.

SEVERAL MORE ST. JOHN SOLDIERS HAVE GIVEN THEIR ALL IN THE WAR; OTHERS ARE WOUNDED

Mrs. Margaret Connell, of 2 Short street, received word this morning that her husband, Pte. Robert James Connell, had died of wounds at No. 18 Casualty Clearing Station on April 10. Private Connell was well and favorably known about the city. Previous to enlistment he was a teamster. He was twenty-six years of age and leaves his wife, father and mother, Mrs. Thomas Connell, Marsh road, three sisters, Mrs. Charles Ritchie, Mrs. George H. Fry and Miss Mabel, all of this city, and two brothers, both of whom are serving king and country. A brother, Louis, was reported only this week as being wounded and in hospital. Pte. Fred, now in England recuperating from wounds received while at the front. Louis and Robert were in the same regiment. The deep sympathy of many friends will go out to this patriotic family as all too truly the grim tale of war is being written into its records. Only last evening Mrs. Connell received the last letter that her husband will ever send home.

Pte. Thomas H. Rowley Mrs. G. B. Madill, of 210 Waterloo street, received a communication today from the department of militia and defence, informing her that her brother, Pte. T. H. Rowley, who has been reported missing since April 6, 1915, is now, for official purposes, posted as killed in action.

Private Rowley was in an infantry battalion. He had many friends in this city who will learn with deepest regret that he has made the supreme sacrifice in the defence of his country. He was in the crater fight and it is known he was wounded, as his sister had that word from a comrade. But nothing more could ever be learned.

A brother, Walter Rowley, also enlisted and went to the front. He was reported ill in hospital, but word came from him later to the effect that he was on leave for ten days. No doubt the word he has returned in his post at the front. Pte. F. McCausland Killed That Private Frank McCausland, 17 Albert street, West St. John, a member of a local infantry battalion, had made the supreme sacrifice, falling at Vimy Ridge on April 9, was the information received in the city this morning. Private McCausland was only eighteen years of age. He is survived by his mother, two brothers and two sisters. He had many friends throughout the city who will learn with regret of his death.


Sergt. A. H. Boddington Killed. Fredericton relatives have been officially notified that Sergt. Albert H. Boddington has been killed in action in France. He left here with an artillery unit two years ago and had been at the front for some time. He was formerly employed as a clerk at the Waverley Hotel, Fredericton, and was prominent in the "Prentice Boys and Orange order. He was the first of ten members of the Fredericton fire department on active service to fall in battle. Some months ago he was awarded the military cross. Sergeant Boddington was a native of the old country. He leaves wife and two children.

Pte. James Boyle, who was wounded in the battle of Vimy Ridge on April 14, died on April 18. He is survived by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. James Boyle of Waas, three brothers, John, Fred and Charles, of Waas; four sisters, Mrs. McGinnis, Mrs. Murray and Miss Clara Boyle of Bangor, and Miss Lena Boyle at home.

Private Cecil Flewelling, reported wounded in action, was a former resident of Burt's Corner and son of Mr. and Mrs. F. D. Flewelling, now of Avondale, Carleton county. Private Harry Crocker Mr. and Mrs. Christopher Crocker, of Millerton, have been notified that their son, Pte. Harry Crocker, has been wounded in the right arm and shoulder on April 18. He was formerly in the employ of the Bank of Montreal in Fredericton.

Pte. McDonald Mr. MacDonald of Douglas received notification that his son, Pte. Leslie MacDonald, had been wounded in the arm on April 10 and was now at Eighth Station Hospital, Winnereux. Pte. C. J. Hutchins That her son, Private Charles John Hutchins had been admitted to No. 14 general hospital in Winnereux on April 16 suffering from a gunshot wound in the right thigh was the word received this morning by Mrs. Martha Wilson. CENTRES OF GERMAN MENACE TO SOUTH AMERICA



Brazil's great German population in at least three states, Rio Grande, Parana and Santa Catharina, 500,000 in number, have revolted, according to despatches from Montevideo (Uruguay), which asserted that the Teutons were well armed with artillery, and plentifully supplied. The government of Rio Grande province was said to be concentrating its strongest and most loyal troops to oppose the rebels at Porto Alegre, and the Uruguayan government is massing its troops on the frontier, fearing the Germans may invade Uruguay. The Brazilian Germans were known to have been preparing to move against Uruguay. Their preference was for occupation of Chile, whether the German ambassador to Brazil has fled. At Porto Alegre, Brazil, a mob attacked 270 German houses, tore down German flags and smashed the windows. Afterward, captures of the German emperor were sent to the walls. Porto Alegre is a modern city, with a population of 124,000.

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

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DEATH ACCIDENTAL

After hearing the evidence of several witnesses, the jury summoned to enquire into the circumstances surrounding the death of Thomas Riley, who was killed Friday afternoon, brought in a verdict last night to the effect that the death of Mr. Riley was accidental and they also recommended that certain changes be made with a view to the prevention of similar accidents in the future.

Dr. F. L. Kenney, coroner, presided and the jury was composed of the following citizens: N. S. Springer, foreman; Arthur Bradley, Wm. McCluskey, Archibald Trearant, Silas Wright, Wm. E. Mollins and John DeAngelis.

Evidence was given by Dr. Leatherbarrow, who had attended Mr. Riley at the hospital, Dr. Dunlop, who had made the post mortem and who said the death had resulted from a fractured skull, and Roy Crawford, Andrew O'Brien and Policeman Ward, who had witnessed the accident, and each of whom said that, in his opinion, it was purely accidental. Alex. Long, who was driving the team which knocked Mr. Riley down, made a statement similar to that which he had made previously. The finding of the jury was as follows: "We the jury empaneled to inquire into the death of Thomas Riley, find that the deceased came to his death at the city hospital on Friday, April 20, 1917, about 4 p.m.

"We find that his death was caused by a fracture of the skull, caused by coming in contact with a carriage in Charlotte street, near the head of King street, about 2:45 p.m. on the same date.

"We find, from the evidence, that it was purely accidental; no blame could be attached to the driver.

"The jury strongly recommends that, as soon as the city can arrange it, there should be a traffic policeman stationed at that place and that a clause be inserted in the by-laws to make all vehicles come under the same regulation as motor driven cars."

K. J. MacIntyre appeared for Mr. Long.

Hearty Reception for the British Commission Presented to President

Conference With Chief Executive in Itself Justifies Trip, Says British Statesman.

Washington, April 23—Great Britain's war commissioners spent today in the American capital, receiving every mark of honor and courtesy within the gift of the government.

Foreign Secretary Arthur J. Balfour, formally presented by Secretary of State Lansing to President Wilson in the morning, was the guest of honor tonight at the most notable dinner given at the White House in a generation.

The conference so far, with the enthusiasm that the people of the capital have shown and the courtesies and cordialities extended by the officials, have taken the British commission completely by surprise.

DUTCH LAUGH AT GERMAN "VICTORIES"

"A cinema film, supposed to show the Germans fighting on the Somme, is now being shown here, and is causing great amusement, owing to the wholesale manner in which the Germans "give themselves away" says an Amsterdam despatch to the London Chronicle.

In this film—for take it certainly is one section depicts the Germans making a heroic charge against the unseen British, but, curiously enough, those charging have forgotten to fix bayonets.

Another section shows the Germans firing from trenches with rifles, but, unfortunately for the realistic effect, those soldiers have forgotten to remove the

metal caps used as sight protectors from the muzzles of the rifles. The effect is, of course, ludicrous.

Amid what appears to be a tornado of shell fire, exploding mines, and other dangers, not a single German soldier ever appears to be hit, let alone killed.

This section clearly shows trees in full summer foliage, and is supposed to give a picture of actual occurrences at a certain place last summer. Unhappily, it is well known that last summer the British were much too far from the spot to be able to bombard it.

If the film is attracting crowds, who howl over, go less to be impressed by German might, but more for the sake of a hearty laugh at the almost childish attempt to deceive on the part of the Germans.

Electors Honor Premier Foster

Smoker and Banquet Held at Andover—Speakers of Matters Requiring Government Attention.

Andover, April 23—Premier W. E. Foster, who was elected by acclamation today to represent Victoria county, was given a flattering reception here this afternoon and evening. His speech this afternoon was postponed until 5 o'clock on account of the funeral of Senator Baird.

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

MR. FIELDING'S VINDICATION

(Toronto Globe)

The government's surrender to the free-wheat policy is the vindication of a great Canadian—one of the most faithful stewards of the public business that country has ever known—the Hon. V. S. Fielding. He was not the only Canadian negotiator of the reciprocity proposals of 1911, but as finance minister he was specially loaded with obligation by the men who raised the spurious loyalty cry as an election dodge. It is begging the question to say that the Canadian order in council abolishing the duty on wheat is not related to the Knox-Fielding pact, but to a later enactment by congress. Everyone whose memory goes back to the events of six years ago knows that free wheat was regarded as the backbone of the reciprocity agreement. It was the favorite bogey of anti-reciprocity writers and orators, east and west. Free wheat would destroy the transcontinental railway system. It would disrupt confederation

by turning the currents of trade from inter-provincial channels and causing them to flow north and south. Economic absorption would sap Canadian independence and lead to political absorption. Such was the fundamental clamor of politicians who now confess that they won success by false pretences. In that campaign of calumny Mr. Fielding went down to defeat with his party, but his reputation and his fiscal policies survive. Those who slandered him out of parliament and out of office, now steal his political clothes and seek to hide the theft by removing the label.

Lajoie is not as spry as was and is not rounding into condition as rapidly as he expected.

Outfielder Jacobson hit very hard yesterday, and three of his drives landed in a double, which turned into a run when Lajoie hammered the ball out of the enclosure. In the third he clipped a single over second, and when Barber fumbled it momentarily in centre field Jacobson went to second like a flash, beating Barber's throw by sliding around the base.

MEDAL COMES TO HIS MOTHER

Coveted War Prize Gained by Wm. G. Shanks, Only 18 Years Old

A military medal, won by her son, Private William G. Shanks, has been received by Mrs. E. Shanks, of 27 Middle street, West St. John. The silent tribute to the heroism of her boy, a lad who even now is only sixteen years of age, is highly treasured by the widowed mother. The medal, with its inscription "For bravery in the field," is a trophy with any man might be proud and in this case, when won by a boy of less than military age, his family's pride in his achievement is more than justified.

Private Shanks enlisted in September 1915, when only sixteen years of age, in an infantry battalion and, after arriving in England, was transferred to a motor machine gun section. It was in September, 1916, that he won the medal by his gallant conduct in bringing in a wounded comrade, who was a son of the late Dr. Gray of Fairville, and died the next day. Private Shanks was wounded but, fortunately, not seriously, and soon was able to return to the front.

A letter, dated March 30, was received from the young soldier a few days ago. He was there safe and well, but his family is anxiously awaiting word, as are the relatives of every other soldier at the front, for word of his safety through the recent big drive.

CAMPAIGN OVER THE TIME OF DAY COMES TO CLOSE

The campaigns for and against the adoption of the daylight saving plan in St. John again this summer closed today, and the matter now is in the hands of the common council for decision.

The plan must be awarded to the opponents of the scheme for the excellence of their preliminary organization and the systematic way in which they conducted their campaign. Their work has been carried on in energetic manner. The advocates of the plan had the disadvantage of a later start and did not seem to organize with the same thoroughness in the effort to secure signatures, but they have a long list of names of those who wish the plan to be in operation again this year. One worker says he secured the signature of every employee in a north end lumber mill, with three exceptions, in favor of the plan.

The rival petitions will be presented to the common council at the meeting this afternoon by the committee which has been working against the plan and by members of the Board of Trade daylight saving committee in favor of it. Members of the delegations will be heard for and against and, after their withdrawal the rival class will be considered by the city commissioners.

In addition to the petitions that the plan be again introduced and that it be done away with until made universal, the council also will consider the suggestion for the postponement of its introduction until May 20, when the railway timetable changes go into effect.

HOW GERMANS REPORT DEPORTATION OF PEOPLE FROM PLACES LOST

Amsterdam, April 24.—Via London.—A semi-official statement issued in Berlin says that the deportation of the inhabitants in the evacuated districts between Arras and Soissons has been accomplished without hardships to the civilians. The transport of their belongings even delayed the transport of important war material. For this reason it was impossible in many cases to remove fuel, fruit trees, the wood of which represents important material for our war industry. The trees were cut down, and the wood was used in the spring and summer months not afford cover to marching columns against our airmen.

"The male and female population between the ages of fifteen and sixty were deported. Mothers with children under fifteen remained with their children. The entire population of St. Quentin was transported to the rear. So far as possible they were allowed to choose their own places of abode. Objects of value were taken in charge by the German authorities."

Miss McGinley was eighteen years of age, a daughter of Mrs. Anna A. and the late Wm. A. McGinley. She was popular among her friends, brilliant at school and active in the work of the W. A. of Stone church. She was to have been graduated from the High school this year after a course of outstanding success. Besides her mother, she leaves one sister, Mrs. A. E. Cox of St. John, and three brothers, Alfred E., editor of the Standard, Sergeant Harris A., and Lieutenant Willard G., overseas in the king's service. The latter is slowly recovering after a close call on the battlefield from some time. Many friends will extend sympathy to the family in their great loss. The funeral will be on Thursday afternoon from No. 74 Mecklenburg street.

EARL OF SHANNON GIVES UP LIFE IN THE WAR

London, April 24.—Richard Bernard Boyle, seventh Earl of Shannon, has been killed in action. He was a lieutenant of the Royal Fusiliers.
