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The Russians have definitely regelled Field Marshal Von Hindenburg's drive toward Riga and Dvinsk, and along the Dvina fiver, and have themselves taken the offensive, but apparently, owing to the state of the ground, have been able to make only slow progress in the marsh region west of Riga. Along the Styr river, in the south, the Austro-Germans, by a counter-stroke, have pierced the Russian lines and captured 1,500 prisoners, according to the Berlin official statement. These strokes are about all that can be expected on the vestern front there have been no events of importance. Petrograd, Nov. 13—The following official communication from general headquarters was issued today: "On the western (Russian) front our troops in the Shlok region, pursuing the enemy, inflicted severe losses on him, and advanced west of Kemmern. Heavy German Losses in Labyrinth.

Heavy German Losses in Labyrinth. Paris, Nov. 14—The following official communication was issued by the war office tonight: "In Artois, in the Labyrinth, the Germans, by a sudden attack, this morn-ing succeeded in penetrating, near the road from Lille, one of our first line trenches. Our counter-attacks immedi-ately drove them out. The enemy left all his wounded on the ground. "Around Loos, and Souches there has been merely cannonading. "To the north of the Aisne, we con-centrated what appeared to be a very effective fire on the German organisa-tions on the plateau of Nouvron. "A somewhat intense artillery action has continued in Champane, in the re-sign of the Butte Du Mesnil, and on the heights of the Meuse, in the Chevaliers wood."

200,000 RUSSIANS WOULD BRING IN ROUMANIANS

Russian Army Woald Turn Scale in Favor of Allies-GreeceWould Come in Also

In rest London, Friday, Nov. 15—The Times' Balkan correspondent, telegraphing from Bucharest, expresses the opinion that if Russia could send into the Serbian cam-paign a force of 200,000 men while the French and British troops are landing on the Aegean coast, the hesitation which prevails in certain quarters in Roumania and Greece would throw in their lots with the Eatente allies. "In this event," says the correspondent, "Roumania could fall on Bulgaria in the rear with 200,000 men and simultaneous-ly attack the German front with 400,000 men. Roumania feels safe in the Car-pathian passes, which she regards as im-pregnable. The scene of action in such a case would probably be Eastern Bul-garia or Thrace, where Field Marshal von Der Goltz's army is assembled, but dacks munitions."
