## ONLY PEACE TERMS WHICH THE GERMAN CAN OBTAIN

Rt. Hon. C. F. G. Masterman Writes to London Newspaper

### BELIEVED GOVERNMENT VIEW

le Covers All The Countries Affected By The War and Sums Up a Heavy Toll Against the Marauders—Fleet to be No More

London, Nov. 15.—The Right Hon. C. F. G. Masterman, in an article entitled "The Only Peace Terms" published in the Daily Chronicle, and believed to represent the government's view, proceeds: "Belgium will be restored to independence, with indemnity adequate for rebuilding her cities and industries, and compensation for her disabled and her dead. "France will receive Alsace and Lorraine, indemnity for all the damage done in the present conquered provinces; but also a natural boundary which would render Germany's attack forever unprofitable alike upon Belgium and France, is the boundary of the Rhine. Let Germany remain there, for the Rhine is its natural boundary. "Denmark shall receive Schleswig, which is purely Danish. "Germany, Austria and Russian Poland shall be united under the care of a king appointed by him. "The Turkish empire would be torn to fragments, and Armenia, Syria, Palestine, Mesopotamia and Thrace divided among those who would develop and revive these once fair places now desolate under alien rule. "The Arabs would generally be permitted to form an Arab Serbia will be restored, with heavy indemnity, from Austria. "The vast dominions of the East will receive Bosnia and Herzegovina, full and adequate access to the Adriatic and all of Austria that is Serbia. "A united Roumania, a united Greece, if possible, if the nations can rise to the height of their opportunity. If Greece or Roumania considers Greece, Iceland or Transylvania not worth fighting for, they will never receive them. "The German fleet should be surrendered and either sunk or divided up among the allies. All Zeppelin or Zeppelin balloons should be burnt. German colonies, worthless in themselves, must remain as trophies for the nations who conquer them—South Africa, India, Australia and New Zealand."

## RUSSIANS HAVE UPPER HAND IN THE BALTIC NOW

Japanese Help With Munitions Has Had Effect—Czar's Men Driving Germans—Enemy Suffers Heavily in the West

### GERMANS ARE HIT HARD IN WEST

London, Nov. 15.—A Petrograd despatch to Reuter's says: "Japan rendered opportune aid in the Baltic duel between General Ruzsky and Field Marshal Von Hindenburg in the matter of shells and, now that artillery conditions have been equalized, the Russians are confident of the result. "After long and arduous fighting in the marshes, the Russians have emerged from the lake defiles and military authorities look for a speedy development in General Ruzsky's aggressive tactics. The Germans, driven back to within ten miles of Mitau, are evacuating munition depots."

## BRITAIN DOES NOT DO SUCH THINGS

London, Nov. 15.—A statement issued yesterday by the admiralty says: "In a German wireless message sent on the night of November 12, it was conjectured that British hospital ships are being used for conveying troops, munitions and other war material. This is absolutely false. British hospital ships always have and always will be used under the conditions prescribed by the Geneva and the Hague conventions."

Paris, Nov. 15.—A league has been formed here by the parents of 600 soldiers who are serving at the front, with the object of ferreting out and reporting to Minister of War Gallieni cases where young men fit for military service are occupying positions in the interior which are more or less sinecures through the influence of powerful friends; and the persons who are protecting them. The league hopes to co-operate in this war with M. Gallieni's campaign to root out favoritism.

London, Nov. 15.—The Spanish steamer Berabe, Cardiff for Bilbao, with a cargo of coal, perished when the vessel ran ashore in a gale at Foz de la Coneyra, at the mouth of the Gironde river. The steamer is believed to be a total loss.

### BODY OF SAILOR, LIKELY FROM MISSING PRINZ OLAF, IS GIVEN UP BY THE SEA

Charlottetown, P. E. I., Nov. 15.—The body of a sailor, supposed to have been one of the crew of the missing collier Prinz Olaf, has been found at East Point. It was greatly decomposed. Some distance away a life belt marked Prinz Olaf was picked up.

### POLICE COURT

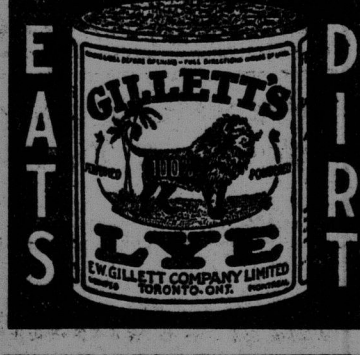

Edna May Crossman Proves To Be Edna McGrath

SOON WILL BE A RE-UNION

Taken From Home by Annie Parker, Nurse, When Infant-Sister Lives in Lynn and Has Been Searching For Her

The Moncton Transcript publishes the following:

"I hardly know whether to be glad or sorry," said pretty fifteen-year old Edna May Crossman, of 406 Robinson street, yesterday morning, when she learned for the first time that her name is McGrath and not Crossman, that she was taken away from home when a baby by the woman whom she always supposed to be her mother, and with whom she has been living quietly in this vicinity for more than eleven years.

Miss McGrath has been separated from her family for fourteen years, during which time her relatives have sought in vain to find her. Recently, however, some unexpected developments in the United States led to her location yesterday morning by the Moncton police acting on behalf of a sister in Lynn, Mass.

"I have always supposed myself to be the daughter of Mrs. Crossman, although she often said that she had something important to tell me before she died. I thought about this secret at all, I supposed it referred to money matters, and so in the woods that I have a sister and relatives in the United States comes as a great surprise.

Edna May McGrath was born in Charlestown, Mass., on January 2, 1900. Her father employed as a nurse a woman named Annie Parker, recently, however, the child's mother died in giving birth to this daughter, and the nurse, Annie Parker, was engaged to remain a will-nurse to care for the children. When little Edna was three months old, the nurse disappeared, taking the child along with her.

From that time until the present efforts have been made to locate the missing girl, until recently, a sister, Miss Caroline M. McGrath, now resident in Lynn, stumbled across the trail of the Parker woman, and was encouraged to re-open the search for her missing sister.

At the time the Parker woman was hired the McGraths did not know where she belonged, but the recent investigations of the Lynn police established the fact that she had originally come from Moncton, and still more recent enquiry has established the fact that she was a woman who attained local prominence in a sensational trial which took place thirty-five years ago.

The police investigations revealed the fact that after running away with the child, she had married a man named Wallace, later she obtained a divorce from Wallace and married Ernest Crossman, who resided about two years ago a short distance beyond the Subway in Main street west.

While resident in Main street, Mrs. Crossman died suddenly and without having an opportunity to disclose to Edna the secret which she had frequently told her she must reveal before death.

While the young girl had always been anxious to learn this momentous secret, yet she had always been led to suppose her self a daughter of Mrs. Crossman, and although the failure to obtain the information worried her, yet she had not an inkling of its probable nature and was entirely unprepared for the news when by the merest chance her whereabouts was discovered.

The family has been living in the vicinity for several years, and the baby who was taken away from home in 1900 city. Deceased is survived by her parents and two sisters. The funeral will be held from the Mission church, Paradise row, on Wednesday morning.

SAYS PROSPERITY OF CANADA SHOULD BE UNLIMITED AFTER WAR

W. A. Smithers of Grand Trunk I Optimistic in Montreal Interview

"I find that Canada is bearing up under the strain of war times much better than I had anticipated," said W. A. Smithers, chairman of the London board of directors of the Grand Trunk Railway, when interviewed on his return to Montreal last week. Mr. Smithers has been in Canada for the last two weeks conferring with Mr. Chamberlain, president and managing director of the railway, and studying railway problems at first hand. "I am very much encouraged," he said, "by the signs of renewed activity. I have spoken with many prominent business men and statesmen since coming to Canada. They are all optimistic and look forward to a good fall and winter. Conditions should be particularly good in Canada when this year's harvest is marketed. The way Canada is progressing is a revelation to me. Even with the empire in the throes of a world's war, conditions are good and after the war is ended and we come to normal times again, Canada's prosperity should be unlimited. I cannot help thinking that the extraordinary prosperity of the United States will have a beneficial effect on Canada. Both countries are so intimately connected commercially that one country's prosperity will inevitably promote the other's."

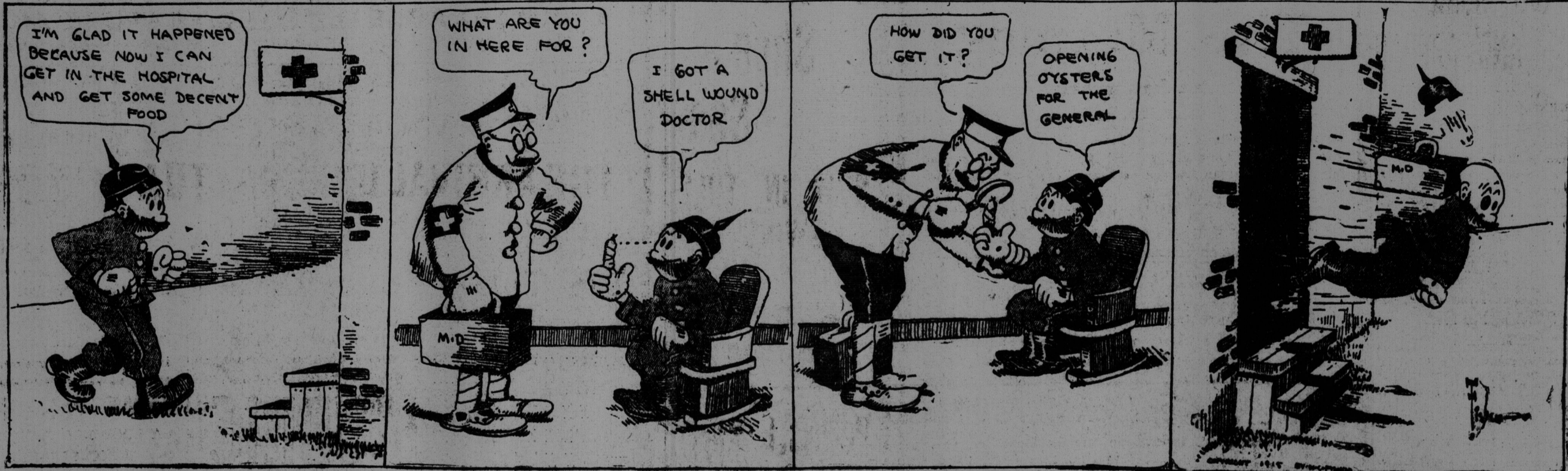

WAR SITUATION AS SHOWN IN SUNDAY NIGHT CABLES

Saloniki, via Paris, Nov. 14.—The Italian cruiser Piedmonte, bombarded and destroyed the railroad station at Dedegatch, Bulgaria, on Friday. The warship also destroyed two trains made up of eighty cars loaded with war munitions.

London, Nov. 15.—The Italian cruiser Piedmonte has arrived at Saloniki, according to a despatch from that place to the Daily Telegraph.

London, Nov. 14.—The Serbians are falling back from mountain range before the advance of the Austro-German forces, losing 1,000 or more prisoners daily, a few guns and quantities of stores. They are fighting continuously, however, and are inflicting considerable losses on their pursuers.

Along the eastern front the Serbians appear to be holding their own against the Bulgarians and are making a stand on the western bank of the Morava river. So stubborn has been their resistance, the Bulgarians have had to call for assistance from the Austro-German artillery in their effort to drive the defenders out of Katschank Pass. Thus far they have been unsuccessful.

ALLIES ON OFFENSIVE IN BALKANS

The British and French troops, which are receiving reinforcements, are also meeting with some success, and besides repelling the Bulgarian attacks, have undertaken small offensive movements with good results. The Austro-Germans and Bulgarians, however, made such progress from the beginning of the campaign that it will take serious work now to check them.

For the moment the political situation is graver than the military. The Central Powers have again protested to Greece against the landing of Allied troops at Saloniki. King Constantine is reported to have replied that as Saloniki is an open port there has been no infringement of Greek rights in the landing, and that Greece will remain neutral until one of the belligerents has transgressed against these rights. France and Italy, the latter having now joined her Allies by sending a warship to Saloniki, are particularly anxious as to the attitude of the Russians, being, definitely, reported Field Marshal von Hindenburg's drive toward Riga and Dvinsk, and along the Dvina river, and have themselves taken the offensive, but apparently, owing to the state of the ground, have been able to make only slow progress in the marsh region west of Riga.

Along the Styr river, in the south, the Austro-Germans, by a counter-stroke, have pierced the Russian lines and captured 1,500 prisoners, according to the Berlin official statement. These strokes are about all that can be expected on the eastern front, while the soft weather continues.

On the western front there have been no events of importance.

Petrograd, Nov. 13.—The following official communication from general headquarters was issued today:

"On the western (Russian) front our troops in the Shok region, pursuing the enemy, inflicted severe losses on him, and advanced west of Kemmeren. "Almost everywhere on the rest of the front there were merely exchanges of shots and encounters between outposts.

"There is no change in the Caucasus. "Petrograd, via London, Nov. 14.—The following official communication was issued from general headquarters today:

"On the western (Russian) front the Germans attempted to take the offensive against the Bessarabia front, in the Hekal district. They were repulsed by our artillery fire. In the Dvinsk district, farther to the south, as far as Pripiet, there is nothing to report.

"Desperate fighting continues near the village of Medvjeh, northwest of Caortorysk. The enemy's attempts to advance in the direction of the river Styr were stopped by our fire. Near the village of Podgata, west of Caortorysk, there was desperate fighting.

"On the Caucasus front, on the west shore of Lake Urmits, our troops repulsed Kurdish forces."

Heavy German Losses in Labyrinth. Paris, Nov. 14.—The following official communication was issued by the war office tonight:

"In Artois, in the Labyrinth, the Germans, by a sudden attack this morning succeeded in penetrating near the road from Lille, one of our first line trenches. Our counter-attacks immediately drove them out. The enemy left all his wounded on the ground.

"Around Loos, and Souchez there has been merely cannonading.

"To the north of the Aisne, we continued what appeared to be a very effective fire on the German organisations on the plateau of Nouvron.

"A somewhat intense artillery action has continued in Champagne, in the region of the Butte Du Mesnil, and on the heights of the Meuse, in the Chevaliers woods."

200,000 RUSSIANS WOULD BRING IN ROMANIANS Russian Army Would Turn Scale in Favor of Allies—Greece Would Come in Also

London, Friday, Nov. 15.—The Times Balkan correspondent, telegraphing from Bucharest, expresses the opinion that if Russia could send into the Serbian campaign a force of 200,000 men while the French and British troops are landing on the Aegean coast, the hesitation which prevails in certain quarters in Roumania would be dispelled and both Roumania and Greece would throw in their lots with the Entente allies.

"In this event," says the correspondent, "Roumania could fall on Bulgaria in the rear with 200,000 men and simultaneously attack the German front with 400,000 men. Roumania feels safe in the Carpathian passes, which she regards as impregnable. The scene of action in such a case would probably be Eastern Bulgaria or Thrace, where Field Marshal von Der Goltz's army is assembled, but lacks munitions.

The distance of the Entente Allies' naval base from the scene of the hostilities in Serbia and the necessity for guarding the long line of communications in a difficult country and in the face of a hostile population are regarded by the correspondent as rendering a northward march from Saloniki inadvisable. The concentration of forces farther east is held by the correspondent to be imposed by military conditions.

"Sussex" (as the letter was signed) says it was the bar-room that the soldiers liked to get to St. John for, and that the only thing Sussex lacked and St. John had was the bar-room. Well, we thought this was a hard thing to say, for among the thousands of soldiers who have been at Sussex this summer there has been very little drunkenness. In fact the misconduct of any of our men, or of the 64th either, has been so small that it could hardly be noticed, for those who want liquor can buy it here just as well as in St. John.

We men from St. John feel that it is only fair for us to be there, near our homes and families while we are here. And we do not propose to spend our time in the bar-rooms, as that sarcastic "Sussex" letter said. We only want to be near our homes and families and to be where we can go some place to spend a social evening. Many of us will never come back, and is it not fair that we can have our time where we can amuse ourselves while we are here? There is a soldiers' recreation club in St. John, and several other places have been opened for their comfort and benefit, while one can go to the Y. M. C. A. or the theatre, etc., to spend the evening, while there is practically nothing to do here to put in the time. It is fair enough for the men from Sussex and around this section to stay here this winter, but it is not fair for them to keep the St. John men here. Talking Dog Dead. Dresden, Germany, Oct. 24.—(Correspondence of The Associated Press)—"Don," a "speaking dog," which years ago made the rounds of American variety theatres, and is said to have made more money for his owner than any dog ever had made, is dead. He passed away at a very respectable old age at his birthplace near here, whether he had come when he ceased to be a theatrical drawing card.

"Don" was the property of a forester named Ebers, who marvelled at the animal's uncanny trick of imitating human voice. Dr. Bessler, director of the Hamburg Zoological Garden, became interested in "Don," and finally was instrumental in getting a theatrical engagement for him. Eventually Ebers' daughter toured Austria-Hungary, Russia and finally the United States with the dog.

Princeton Player Won. New Haven, Conn., Nov. 13.—Princeton won from Yale in the annual chess match played during Friday night, the scoring being 8 to 2.

New York, Nov. 12.—Baseball men admitted themselves puzzled today at the action of the Federal in signing two Pacific Coast League stars, Joe Gedeon of Salt Lake and Jimmy Johnston of Oakland—by the Newark Club. They professed to see in the action a cessation of peace negotiations for at least several months.

John Gunzel, manager of the Brooklyn Feds, has admitted that he has eight stars of the International League signed up for next season.

Veteran Trainer Dead. Stratford, Ct., Nov. 13.—Capt. John C. Bond, a veteran sportsman and trainer of some of the most famous boxers of recent years, dropped dead yesterday afternoon at his training quarters on the banks of the Housatonic River in this town. His death was due to heart failure and a general breakdown brought on by advancing years.

Captain Bond, who was seventy-six years of age, was known to every lover of the boxing game. He was renowned for his knowledge of sports, and his training camp has sheltered some of the greatest fighters of modern times: Terry McGovern, Stanley Ketchel, Tommy Murphy, Young Corbett, and other athletic celebrities are among those who have made Bond's their training quarters. The fighters of the Dan Morgan stable are now training at Captain Bond's club-house.

For the last few days Captain Bond had been complaining of feeling ill. On Wednesday he declared to Joe Smith, trainer for Battling Levinsky, "I don't think I'll be with you long, Joe." He called for Smith again yesterday, but the latter was doing road work with Levin and Al McCoy. When the fighter returned they found Captain Bond dead.

Kilbane Suspended. Milwaukee, Nov. 12.—Johnny Kilbane, featherweight champion of the world, was suspended today by the Wisconsin Athletic Commission for failing to appear in answer to a charge that he did not do his best in his bout with Ritchie Mitchell here recently. Kilbane's suspension will stand until he appears and satisfactorily explains the alleged dilatory tactics in the match.

Moran Charged With Assault. Philadelphia, Nov. 12.—Frank Moran, heavyweight pugilist, was arrested and held under \$600 bail by Magistrate Call today on charges of assault and battery made by a chorus girl named Marlin. Moran and the girl are appearing in a local theatre and while behind the scenes yesterday afternoon engaged in an argument. Moran denies the charges.

**THERE IS NO SIGN OF DOWNHEARTEDNESS IN DUPLISEA'S LETTER**

Staff Sergeant George Sends a Cheering One Home

NOT YET AT THE FRONT

Only Shells So Far From Him Are Egg Shells — A War Chant With Home References Which the Boys Like to Sing

A letter received today from Staff Sergeant Geo. Duplisea, Canadian Divisional Train, now in France, contains many interesting lines written in humorous vein with some touches of serious thought as well, emanating in a way the smiles of "Bert Harte's" Some "Dipsy" letters which have been published here have been particularly well received, and no doubt the following will be of interest also.

"Well, here we are in France in a place marked 'Somewhere.' It may not be on the map, but believe me, child, it's here. And we're here, too, because we're here, so what the —. Yes, we have heard about shells bursting and breathless escapes, some fellows saved by having a cannon ball strike a lead pencil in their pocket, and such things, but we haven't got so close to the firing line as that, at least not as yet. In fact the only shells I've seen bursting over this way have been egg-shells, few and seldom, and it costs a nickel to crack their coats.

"I'm at present 'P' doing duty at a military police office in a 'boose factory' or brewery—that is, I have a gun on my arm which heads 'M. P.' and the boys give it several meanings. Because of the great circumstances they have called it 'Manager of Pubs.' My duty is just to hang around and if any of the fellows call to see that the load they take back is not more than they can carry.

"No doubt you've heard the walls of the first contingent about the mud; well, let me hand you this, right now—they are in a rubber-lined Gladstone compared with what we've had to shake off of our boots. We've been getting much of the mud they left, with some more that's come since, and then some. And every patch is a different color. In fact when I sleep about ten feet, he's apt to become color-blind. His feet look like the latest design in crazy quilts. But just the same, we're having the time of our lives, and we're in it to the finish. Our crowd is a particularly fine bunch of fellows, and there is no wrangling. We get along fine.

"In our section, that is the address, we have four fellows who have a notion they can sing. We wouldn't mind their having the notion, but they only kept it to themselves. But that's classed as one of the hardships out here—they won't. They call themselves the 'Soldiers' Quartette,' and they feel they have nice voices—O they have, (for throwing up a good song) but let's test their voices. We think the world of every one of them, even if some of us do get out of range when they try to open fire. They have one song, however, written by Corp. C. W. Sweet, from which we never run away, brings back happy memories, and they sing it well.

"I want to go back, I want to go back, I want to go back to St. John, And put a clean white collar on 'Till of battles we have won—I miss the ferry, and Silas Perry And the top-horn on the shore; I think the parties vous Francaise Is all right in its way, Nevertheless, I want to go back Away from hard-luck, To the town that I came from, That's why I want to go, Back to the land of snow, Back to St. John.

"Well, we'll all be back some time. It's hard to say how soon, but if more of the boys around home would realize the seriousness of this war and come over to lend a hand in putting some of those German baby killers over the ropes to the count of ten, listen to me the fight would soon end. The fellows at home ought to get into the uniforms at once and get free transport across for the sake of helping to wipe those Sauerkrauts off the map if they know how badly men were needed, they'd come. I know they would, I know they're not afraid but they simply do not realize the urgency. If they are true Canadians they'll come without any coaxing. Well, an revoir, "DIP"
