Little Sun-Baked Town, Arica, To Be International Centre

WASHINGTON, Aug. 3—In less than a month a little sun-baked town on the south Pacific, Arica by name, will have become an important centre of international events. There the stage is being set for the next act in the drama known to the world as the Tacna Arica controversy.

On the afternoon of August 8 (according to present schedule), a plebiscitary commission representing Chile, Peru and the United States, presided over by General Pershing, will hold a first meeting. This commission will arrange for the holding of a plebiscite in fulfillment of an arbitral award made by President Coolidge on March 4, 1925, in settlement of a forty year dispute over the sovereignty of the provinces of Tacna and Arica.

THE RHODES PLAN

After five months of idleness in the Cape Breton mines there is at least a substantial prospect of peace and resumption of work. Premier Rhodes, who has addressed himself earnestly to the task of having mining resumed, has not yet effected a settlement, but he has proposed a compromise which the miners' leaders have agreed to recommend favorably to their following, and the British Empire Steel Corporation is to pass upon the arrangement in a day or two.

As in the case of the British mining trouble, the interim agreement now under consideration is not put forward as a final solution of the difficulties which have brought this distressing struggle in Nova Scotia, but it aims at the resumption of mining, the first requisite of the situation, and prepares the way for a searching investigation into the entire case. If the Rhodes agreement is accepted it will last for six months, during which time a commission of inquiry will take testimony concerning all branches of the controversy.

Premier Rhodes, in urging the acceptance of this interim agreement upon both the miners and the company, describes present conditions as intolerable, not only in the mining district but throughout the province, and expresses the conviction of the Government that the terms outlined should be accepted, not as a final settlement, but as a working basis for the resumption of operations in order to avoid further loss and disorder. The terms proposed for the six months' interval involve some concessions on both sides, and, as in the Baldwin settlement, Mr. Rhodes proposes that the public shall contribute. He is willing that the province shall rebate one-fifth of the coal royalties for twelve months to come, provided that work is resumed at once.

The public will recognize that Premier Rhodes is right in urging that the resumption of mining at once is of paramount importance. The parties to the dispute will not sacrifice principle for the sake of getting to work again, and the inquiry to be begun, in the interim plan is accepted, will offer to both sides an equal opportunity to make good their claims before an impartial tribunal.

A TRUCE

The feeling of immense relief naturally following Premier Baldwin's success in averting the tremendous dislocation of industry which would have been caused by a coal strike is followed immediately by recognition of the fact that it is a truce that has been effected, and that the basic problem remains. A strike is likely to come next year unless in the interval between now and spring the Government can find some solution which will give promise of the lasting industrial peace which is by no means achieved by the present compromise. This compromise is described by some critics in London as certain to invite further demands later on. While it is doubtless true, the Prime Minister was driven to choose what he deemed the lesser evil. He thought it best, even at heavy sacrifice, to avoid for the present the economic loss and the increased social bitterness which a strike would bring, in order that there might be more time in which to investigate conditions and seek some more promising means of settlement than any hitherto devised.

The men are at liberty to do for the same hours and at the same rate of pay as at present, and the Government, until May 1 next, is to give the mine owners, substantial aid, approximating the money they would have saved had wages been decreased and hours lengthened. It is estimated roughly that this will mean some \$10,000,000. This is described by the London Times as "postponement of the conflict by means of state assistance."

But those critics do not point out how Mr. Baldwin might have done better. The country has escaped a violent industrial war for the present at least, and it is known that Mr. Baldwin and his associates, during the period of investigation, will concentrate upon the problem the best effort of men of courage and sincerity. This at least may be said, that the prospect of a fair settlement is better than it would have been had the Prime Minister merely confessed helplessness and so added a million miners to the already vast army of the unemployed.

When Gaudaur Beat Hanlan

(The Wanderer in Winnipeg Tribune.) Longer ago than middle-aged chaps care to enthusiastically confess, there was another regatta at Duluth, Minn. Sport has its ups and downs. Rowing in these days—say three decades ago—though with fewer participants, was as much in vogue, from a popular interest standpoint, as golf or tennis of today.

Didn't Winnipeg, just two years ago, follow the example of Toronto and put on a big professional regatta, featuring the names of Wallace Ross, the big Lower Provinces champion, Teemer, the American, and other celebrities? Hanlan was then in the height of his aquatic glory, world's champion conqueror of everybody in sight save finally Beach, the redoubtable Australian blacksmith, who was the first to lower the Canadian's colors. Hanlan, beginning with a remarkable display of armchairing in Central Park Exhibition in Philadelphia—was it in the seventies?—became a national hero—Toronto's foremost citizen of international renown, honored, fêted, elected to the city council, because he had no wish to go to the legislature. There were Hanlan clubs, Hanlan's Island—nothing was too good for Hanlan.

The last time I saw him was at the Duluth regatta. Our Winnipeg oarsmen were there, including George F. Galt, the founder, guide and counsellor of the Winnipeg Rowing Club, and in those days Canada's foremost four-oared stroke, the man who stroked the crew that won for Winnipeg the first international championship at the National Regatta at Pullman, Ill.

It was a great day for Winnipeg, triumphing, as the Winnipeg Rowing Club did on that notable occasion, over the Argonauts of Toronto, New York's crack four and half a dozen other crews, seeking like our own, wider fields to conquer. The Duluth regatta—now ancient history to the youth of today had entrants in both the professional and amateur classes. I remember well the splendid sculling of W. H. Thompson—veteran, now a member of the service—and the skilled oarsmanship of P. A. Macdonald, entrusted with upholding Winnipeg's honor in the four-oared class.

Tremendous interest centred in the galaxy of professional talent. A few of the names I recall: Hanlan, Gaudaur, Teemer, Wallace Ross, Hann, Planted, Ten Eyck and some others. Hanlan, the Australian, had just lost the world's championship to Beach, his star, some thought, was on the wane, and though undaunted on this occasion, he had a powerful rival in Gaudaur, the strapping six-footer from Oreglia, Ont. Canada, at this juncture, was the land of great oarsmen. There was O'Connor of Toronto—not present at the regatta. I met him in Winnipeg. He was on his way to Australia to meet Beach in the world's championship race. O'Connor, in his prime as an athlete, diet from an attack of typhoid fever. Wallace Ross was in the logical class for the world's championship; so was Gaudaur, who later succeeded to the title. Canada was indisputably the foremost producer of great oarsmen of professional rank.

The professional single scull race at Duluth was featured by some excellent rowing, also some heated after-race discussion between the contestants. The more youthful Gaudaur defeated Hanlan. The latter, still magnificent in form, was just lacking in the marvelous muscle-power of his giant opponent. Hanlan was no less perfect in stroke and recovery, but his fight for the bulkier and stronger rival, Hanlan took his defeat very much to heart. He was confident that he could do better if given another opportunity at Gaudaur. Hanlan, well in his forties, didn't make enough allowance for years. And there were many who held the view that Hanlan at his best could not have defeated the later Canada's, American and world's champion, very closely approaching the ex-champion in his highest form, and assuredly surpassing him in strength.

That regatta was the last big assemblage of the stellar professional oarsmen of this continent. A woman was engaging a new housemaid. "When you wrote and answered all my questions," she said, "why didn't you tell me you were Scotch?" "I didn't like to be boasting," answered the maid.

FIND FLY FOSSILS

BOULDER, Col., Aug. 3.—The tiny fly, which in Africa carries the germ of sleeping sickness, has been found in Colorado. But there is no cause for alarm, for the flies have been dead and buried for thousands of years and are known only by their fossil remains preserved in rock deposits near the foot of Pike's Peak. RAINFALL BELOW NORMAL FOR JULY

Hours of Sunshine Numbered
Only 174—Temperature
About Usual.

Although the rainfall for this district was slightly below the normal during the month of July, the number of hours of bright sunshine was remarkably low, being only 174 hours. Statistics for the month's weather as they have been compiled at the meteorological observatory in Douglas avenue, P. L. Hutchinson said last night showed the rainfall had amounted to 3.35 inches, or three-tenths of an inch below the normal. The mean temperature had been 60 degrees, which was just about normal, and during the month the range of temperature had been from 78 degrees on July 12, as the maximum to 46 degrees on July 1 as a minimum. The temperatures rising Saturday, Mr. Hutchinson said, varied from 64 to 84 according to the official records, and on Sunday they ranged from 62 to 84 degrees. The rainfall of Saturday amounted to only .02 of an inch while Saturday began well, cooled off towards nightfall and ended in a rain storm of short duration. Sunday reversed the process, and after a cloudy morning, sent a bright, warm and sunny afternoon. The wind still clung to the southeast, however, a quarter more favorable for storms than the weather.

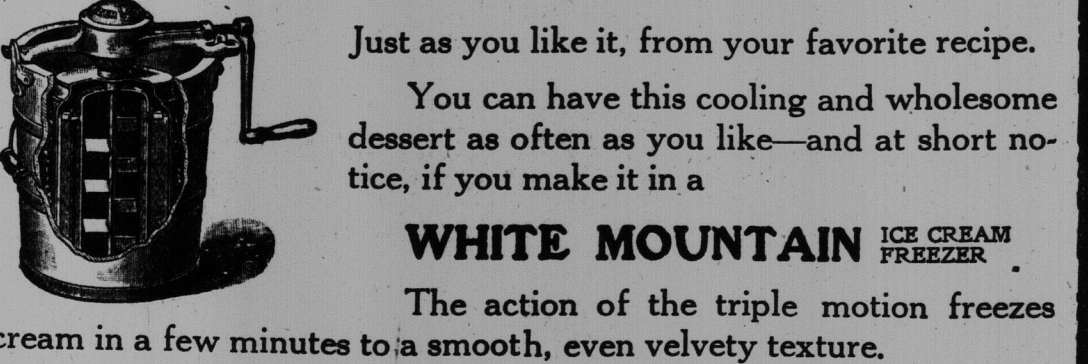

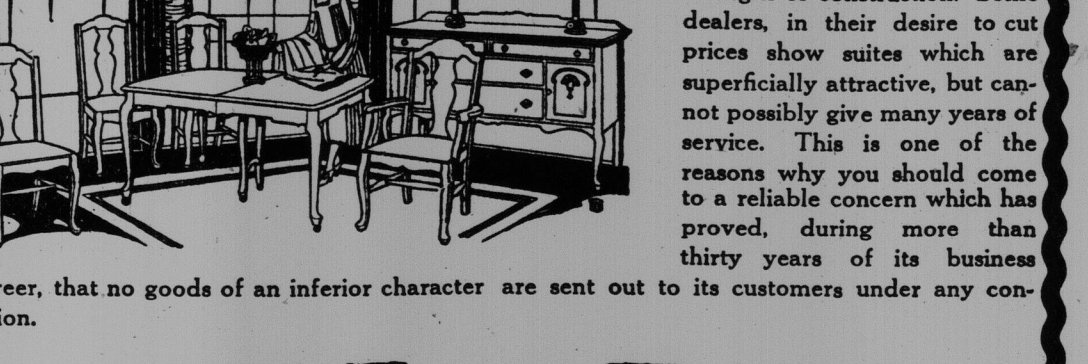
