GOING TO ENGLAND British Museum Gets Odd Bequest; Wealthy Rothchild's Flea Collection

London, Nov. 19-The scientists of the natural history department of the British Museum are delighted at a remarkable bequest from the late Nathaniel Rothchild, the largest and nearest complete collection of fleas in the world. It comprises several thousand specimens, each preserved in

tion, for no government would be willing to spend the money which it cost Mr. Rothschild and no scientific institution could afford to do so.

Mr. Rothschild often commissioned exploring expeditions to find speci-mens of fleas infesting certain animals or birds in far parts of the world and he is credited with having once financed an expedition to Greenland obtain fleas of the Arctic seal.

Major Austen, of the Insect Department of the Museum, said the collection contained specimens of nearly all the distinct kinds of fleas in the world and that it was particularly valuable for the study of their disease

carrying properties.

A Bi-Product of The Real News

The writer of these passing observations likes to look upon the bright side of things. Dour darksome thinking and speaking shuts out the sun and makes for unhappiness. Therefore the scores of citizens who gave up initiation fees to enter upon the charter membership of a re-organization of a popular order in this city at a nearby date need not fear that their money took wings with the organizer whose personal financial trouble got him into the clutches of the law lately.

It is stated that all remittances will be honored if properly vouched if they are not already forwarded. To check up an organizer upon the eve of the fruition of his efforts might logically be construed into a black eye for the order is universally important and quite able to stand any local criticism that might seem to attach itself through such happenings as those of recent date. This is a good time to let out your faith belt a loop or two. Don't doubt.

Have we a meat war round-

Have we a meat war roundabout us? We pick up the papers
and read of roast beef for ten
cents, fifteen cents, twenty cents;
good steak at twenty-five, twentysix—yes, I believe I read of a
t-bone steak for a quarter a pound!
Now this is great, three hurrahs
and a wild hurroo. This spells a
whole lot of things. It means that
meat producers are marketing
their cattle and getting real money
to put into circulation in many
other ways; it means that merchants are taking advantage of the
plentitude of meat on the hoof to
bring the high cost of living down
an appreciable peg or two. Morebeing the high cost of living down an appreciable peg or two. Moreover it brings us that much nearer to the happy old pre-war times when our dining table was not so much a financial worry and when mother's Saturday shopping was a great big joy lasting the whole week through. These croakers whom we hear grouching about things generally, these good friends who pour insidious Yankee propaganda into our ears or would lure us to the wind-blown west, tell them about these things when they start decrying home and its conditions.

I read a fine thing in a letter to a local manager of an international concern one day this week. It was from the company's general-manager. It was an observation in reply to the local manager's report on a backwardness in business as compared to previous falls. The general-manager wrote: "What you say of backward conditions is also true of our branches in other eastern cities the size of St. John and larger. It would seem that we have run into one of those mysterious calms that on odd occasions occur in the most unexpected periods. In this regard you must remember the summer season, how unusually brisk it was, a season when we expected to fall down. About the only thing for us all to do is to keep everlastingly plodding along to keep as near normal as possible, cut out excesses and fancy exploitation ideas, get the fullest co-operation of the people we are trying to keep employed and always remember that fifty-two weeks make a year, not a scattered few." How such messages from men in authority must inspire honest workers and extract their very last ounce of effort. But so many bosses don't write that kind of letters, thus making matters worse. making matters worse.

making matters worse.

The glut of coal in both the Canadian and American markets, the mildness of this early section of winter, absence of bread lines here or great exodus of townspeople to United States, are conditions that should make St. John people feel perfectly contented. We know there have been a larger number of removals to the States this summer and fall than since the oldtime rush but over-production and fading "green bills" are sending some back home. More will follow. St. John is the last to enjoy booms and also the last to suffer slumps. We seem to be at the foot of the ine geographically in all such fluctuation of money and work. We still remain what a wag once termed us to be, "A three-square and feather-bed town." The Halifax situation has nothing to do with St. John. Our sister city enjoyed a Klondyke boom during the war, then the catastrophe occured that poured millions of quick relief and rehabilitation money into the city. All the while government terminal work was in progress, in fact the city was being shifted from one base to another on that account. So when all this subsided the excess population and activity naturally ceased. Wartime reaction added to the slump. But Halifax is not downhearted in spite of the drain she has suffered. Nor should we be in St. John. Canada is a

young healthy nation, heir to Nature's most fabulous fortune of all kinds and St. John and Halifax are favored scaports for at least one half the broad continent. Only the biliously blind and unpatriotic think otherwise.

think otherwise.

Being among the thousands who rushed wildly over to the eastern side of Courtenay Bay on the day the dry dock was opened I was also one who missed that grand parade so hurriedly and creditably gotten up to observe the occasion but I later saw it in the movies. Ever since seeing the picture I have been contemplating what a truly remarkable burst of community spirit and folk-love the Assyrian people displayed in their turnout on horse and afoot to say nothing of their splendid ship float and its artistic pictorial significance. Before expressing myself thus I took the pains to look into the matter. There were over fifty of the Assyrian colony in the turnout, each dressed at an expense of close to ten dollars. Some of the materials had to be imported, the float ran into a considerable extramonut. To give national atmosphere to it all the men donned the garb of their homeland folks of a decade ago, the flowing robe and turbanned head-piece. These were made by the Assyrian housewives here. There were horses to hire and many other details that cost real money. To make their turnout plain to their Canadian fellow-citizens the Assyrian folks had expensive paintings of their native Lebanon Valley executed and attached to the sides of the float. Onlookers must certainly have appreciated the display but I'll wager not everybody figured what it cost those new citizens and possibly preciated the display but I'll wager not everybody figured what it cost those new citizens and possibly fewer still gave it the proper emphasis as an isolated case of hearty co-operation with a civic movement. Let us congratulate the Assyrian people upon their contribution and in the same breath arch our eyebrows in the direction of many patriotic and native-born organizations whose floats and personal appearances were sadly missing. It was an historic day for St. John and the Assyrian people sense it thoroughly. Perhaps the blood of this temperate zone runs a little too slowly.

This made real good listening coming from one whose mind is specially attuned to sizing people up and probing their inner natures. What's more it seems to be a true estimate upon analysis. I was chatting with Miss Vaughan, the efficient chief of the Public Library staff a few days since and learned that at the instance of The Ontario Library Association the children of St. John have just finished an interesting week of special attention in the Hazen Avenue storehouse of good reading material. Pictures suitable to children adorned the wall spaces, magazines and books created for youthful minds were put to the front. Everything was done to inspire the rising generation a desire for wholesome, instructive, patriotic literature and worthwhile victures. Every public library in Canada did the same thing that week and it was a marked success. This present week is Canadian Authors Week when books written by Canadians or works of any author upon Canadian subjects are being displayed conspicuously and recommended to visitors. 

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



The four main provisions of the Bill are plain and simple. They are as follows:

(1) It would create a new corporate body, to be called the United Church of

(2) It would merge in this new corporate body the entire Presbyterian Church in Canada—its name, its ministers, its members, and its property. (3) It would provide that, within six months, a congregation may vote itself out

of this new corporate body. (4) It would provide a commission to decide as to the equities of congregations voting themselves out in the general property and funds of the Presbyterian Church.

WHAT THE BILL MEANS:

(a) If this bill becomes law, then the Presbyterian Church in Canada passes out of existence—her very name is abolished. Canada would be the only civilized country in the world in which there is no Presbyterian Church.

(b) All the ministers and members, all

many ministers and members of the Presbyterian Church would be compelled by law to become members, and become subject to the discipline of an organization in which they do not believe and which they do not desire to join. (d) A congregation must vote itself

out within six months or ever after remain part of the United Church. If a congregation does vote itself out—it is out in the cold with a vengeance, for there will be no Presbyterian Church in Canada

(e) Should a bare majority of a congregation at a meeting held within the six months, decide to remain in the United Church, they would keep the whole of the property and funds of the congregation. Thus, if a congrega-tion of 401 members voted as follows: 201 to stay in and 200 to withdraw, the 200 would have no claim whatever either on the congregational property or on the general property of the Church. That is: a bare majority of one at a meeting, where many through sickness and such like causes cannot attend, may create this crisis and perpetrate this injustice-from which there will be no appeal.

(f) This Bill, if it becomes law, will certainly create a serious disruption in the Presbyterian Church in Canada, for there is a very large body of solid, determined Presby-terian people who will absolutely refuse to be incorporated by law, against their will, into any non-Presbyterian organization.

These are the outstanding features of this Bill, and they show that Union, at this time, is out of the question. If Union can only be accomplished upon the terms of this Bill, then surely every true and loyal Presbyterian must conclude that Union should not now be

Pictures of Hammer's Air Trips From Spitzbergen May Aid Amundsen.

orthern wastes as far as the eightythird degree were shown last week for the first time at a projection room in second street, New York. The flights were under the command of Captain Hakon Hommer, who made Spitzbergen his base. It was explained that the pictures might assist those who

the pictures might assist those who accompany Captain Ronald Amundsen when he attempts to fly to the North Pole next year.

It is explained in the subtitles of these pictures that one is looking upon craters, ice cliffs and mountains that have never before been seen by human eyes. Twenty-one flights were made in all, and the longest lasted about seven and one-half hours, covering a distance from Spitzbergen and return of about 750 miles. Except for one or two sequences nothing living is shown in these pictures, which take up about half an hour. Maps are included on the screen for the purpose of explainthe screen for the purpose or explaining the route taken.

Captain Hammer explained that in the first instance the flights were made last year, there being, of course, constant daylight, the temperature everaging about zero. Captain Hammer will accompany Amundsen on his flying polar trip next year, when Dornier machines will be used. These machines are made in Italy and Germany. In the longest flight the altitude averaged more than 4,000 feet, but for certain periods they had to go up to nearly twice that altitude to clear the high peaks.

As might be expected these pictures are only interesting because of the explanations as to where they were taken. The high mountains, and the expanses of water do not differ much from those which might be taken in any other uninhabited northern zone.

Captain Hammer was accompanied by a pilot and a photographer. It was said that the pilot after flying 200 miles wanted to continue on the journey and that Captain Hammer to make him turn aboút had to threaten him with a revolver. Captain Hammer said that no matter what success they might have had, he did not wish to attempt the flight to the pole without Captain Amundsen.


