

MEDIATION FOR HUERTA

Refuses Offer of The South Americans

TO INCREASE ARMY INSTEAD

Appointing Five New Generals of Higher Rank — U. S. Government Still Biding Its Time

(Canadian Press). Mexico City, Mexico, March 7.—General Huerta received today a message in the United States in which he was asked whether or not he would accept combined mediation of Brazil, Argentina and Chile, to settle the Mexican problem.

The provisional president replied by saying that this mediation would be on no conditions, but emphatic in view of the fact that the relations with countries named are not of a cordial nature.

As indicative of Huerta's intention to increase the strength of the army, the executive today issued a decree providing for the appointment of five divisional generals of the army, a rank not now in vogue, and ten general officers of the staff.

It is officially admitted that the attack on Masatlan has been resumed. That the government is determined to establish a Federal bank is officially announced.

As a reason for this, it is stated that notwithstanding the fact that the banks now existing have been given the privilege of issuing notes of three times the amount of their reserve, they have shown no intention of aiding the government by so doing.

Answers to News. Washington, D. C., March 7.—State department officials have decided that there will be no answer made to the recently presented by the Huertista government suggesting that, on account of the Benton incident, the United States should revoke the right it had extended to the Constitutionalists to use arms in this country.

The United States government is using its time, while the commissions appointed by the Constitutionalists to investigate the recent cases of Benton and the disappearance of Gustave such, make a report.

IT JUSTIFIED IN USING DOCTOR'S NAME

Parishboro, N. S., March 6.—The tragic death of Mrs. Frank Wheaton is a topic of conversation. There is no doubt that the death of Mrs. Wheaton due to a criminal operation, but it is a strong feeling that Dr. Jeffery should not have been mentioned officially in the verdict on the evidence submitted at the inquest.

The coroner's authorities, at Halifax, are now before them the evidence laid by the coroner and until this evidence is carefully weighed and sifted, no action will be taken. New elements are expected in a few days.

SNOW MELTING ON MARS

Ottawa, March 7.—The so-called canal of Mars are now exhibiting striking developments, according to Dr. Lowell, of the Flagstaff Observatory.

A dispatch received here Dr. Lowell said: "The north polar cap of Mars is melting and the canals are being dug and darkened near the edge of cap."

Dr. Lowell's theory of the melting of snow at the Mars pole produces floods that sweep out and produce the color changes in canals.

RATE INCREASE SUSPENDED

Ottawa, March 7.—The Railway Commission has issued an order suspending the proposed increased tariffs on Canadian railways for sleeping accommodations as regards sections and wing rooms. The railways have announced that they will require passengers to purchase two full fares if they do not purchase the drawing room, and a half to secure a section, that one upper and lower berth.

The tariffs have been suspended pending investigation by the commission.

TRUCKER INJURED. A trucker, James O'Neill, was struck by a car in No. 5 shed, Sand Point, resulting in a nasty wound on the back of his head last night about ten o'clock. He was taken to the Emergency Hospital where three stitches were put in the cut.

Explorer Has Quarter Million But Needs \$50,000 Additional

Sir Ernest Shackleton Working Fifteen Hours a Day Completing His Plans—Determined to Use Weddel as Base

New York, N. Y., March 7.—A London cable to the World, says: Sir Ernest Shackleton has now secured \$250,000, which was needed to carry out his exploring trip across the Antarctic continent in the south. He wants \$50,000 more to have a margin for the supporting parties. The government has offered \$100,000 as free gift. Another person offered \$150,000 for the claimant's rights, but Sir Ernest says this remains to be decided.

DRIVERS OF MYSTERIOUS RIG ARE FUGITIVES FROM LOCAL REFORMATORY

Boys Who Stole Horse and Carriage Near Digby Believed to be Fred. Wilson of St. John and Leo McGinn of Moncton—Descriptions Correspond

That the two strange boys who have been seen in the neighborhood of Digby and left a horse and carriage in the woods, which the police of the town think were stolen, are Fred Wilson and Leo McGinn who escaped from the Industrial Home for Boys at East St. John on the night of February 28 is the conviction of S. E. McDonald, superintendent of the home, who was in telephone communication this morning with Chief Bowles, of the Digby police force. The description of the boys given by the chief corresponds to the most minute detail with that of Wilson and McGinn, the latter, a French Canadian, originally from Moncton, who speaks broken English. The boys are apparently aged about 16 and 17, and are both of the same age. Each has dark hair and is dark skinned. The boys are believed to have used the mysterious rig at Digby as a means of escape. They wore blue overalls, which had evidently been taken from the home, had no overcoats, and had their overall straps outside their jackets.

WOMEN EMIGRANTS MAY AVOID CANADA

Reasons Why They Should Go Elsewhere Pointed Out in England—No Free Land Grants

London, March 7.—A discussion has been proceeding in the Referee, an English Sunday newspaper, on the position of women emigrants to Canada. One of the latest criticisms is furnished by M. M. Sewell, of Putney who writes:

"I may add two objections to Canada as far as women are concerned. One is that Canada refuses the free grant of land to women that is given to men. Two or more girls with a knowledge of farming and a little capital can do very well in Canada, even putting up their own buildings; but, when they are dependent on a man, how many could succeed while their lives would be easy compared with that of the wife of a farmer or even a domestic servant, where climatic conditions make domestic work so hard?"

"The second objection to Canada for women is its laws, where married women are concerned. Not long ago a man yielded his right to his wife, away from his wife, though her money had been invested in it.

"Australia, New Zealand, and Rhodesia are at present far more suitable for women emigrants than Canada, and fruit farms can be successfully run by women alone."

Sir George Ross Died Today

Former Premier of Ontario Passed Away at Eight O'clock This Morning—His Distinguished Career

Toronto, Ont., March 7.—Sir George Ross, senator of the Dominion of Canada, and prior to 1898, premier of the province of Ontario, died at eight o'clock this morning, after an illness of several weeks.

Hon. Sir George William Ross, son of the late James and Helen (McKinnon) Ross, of Rossett, Godswood, was born on September 18, 1833, near Nairn, Middlesex county, Ont., his parents having come to Canada in 1822. He had his early education at the public school, and the Toronto Normal School, and graduating as L.L.B. from Albert University, Belleville, in 1858. He was given the honorary degree of LL.D. by various universities, including St. Andrew's University, Scotland.

His married life was spent in Ontario, he married Miss Christina, daughter of Duncan Campbell, who died in 1872, and secondly, in 1875, Catherine, daughter of the late James Ross, who died in 1902. In May, 1907, he married Mildred, eldest daughter of the late John Robert Peck of London, Ont., who survives him.

A solicitor in 1860, George William Ross was called to the bar in 1862, but had been, previous to his legal career, a school teacher, inspector of public schools and inspector of model schools. He was also a member of the central committee of examiners from 1878 to 1880, and a member of the Ontario bar association, and was elected in 1872. He continued to represent that riding into Ottawa Hill 1888, when he was elected to the House of Commons as member for West-Middlesex in the legislature.

On Mr. Ross's retirement in October, 1898, Hon. George Ross succeeded to the position of premier of Ontario, and remained in office until his death on February 19, 1908. He continued to act as leader of the Opposition until his elevation to the senate.

As a legislator and administrator he introduced in 1882 a resolution, known as the Worthy Patriarch of the Sons of Temperance of North America, 1876, besides which he had many other activities in the same cause.

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Proclamation of Martial Law a Piece of Political Strategy

The Work of Beneficent Boss "Rich But Honest" Who Took This Method to Stop Government's Career of Extravagance

London, March 7.—D. A. McMillen, who has just arrived from Rio Janeiro, explained yesterday that the proclamation of martial law in Brazil was a piece of political strategy on the part of Pinheiro Machado, the beneficent boss of Brazilian politics. Machado, he said, is immensely rich and honest. President Dantas conducted his regime with such wide through means that the credit of the country stopped. The government, Mr. McMillen says, owes \$2,000,000 to the merchants of Rio Janeiro alone.

NEW I. C. R. TIMETABLE IN EFFECT ON MONDAY

Quebec Express Will Leave at 6.15 p. m. and Make Suburban Stops — Arrangements For Suburban Service Involve Needless Expense

The new time-table for the Intercolonial Railway, to become operative on Monday, was issued today. It announces the change with regard to the time of departure of the Quebec express, which in future will leave St. John at 8.15 making all the suburban stops to Hampton. There is also provision for the C. P. R. arriving at 2.10 p. m. from the east, to make the suburban stops between Hampton and the city, on Saturdays.

From point of view of practical economy, what is regarded as the most important item in this connection is the continuation of the arrangement of running an engine and van from Moncton each day to bring into the city the string of freight cars left at Hampton in the early morning.

Tonight's Game. Montreal, Que., March 7.—Managing Director Kennedy of the Canadiens, announces this morning that Newy Londe will positively play against Toronto and that Gardner will play if he is able. This however, is not certain.

WANTED A THOUSAND EXTRA TO REMARRY HIS FORMER WIFE

She Thought the Thousand She Gave Him Enough and Had Him Arrested When He Drew \$400

Quebec, March 7.—The arrest of a commercial traveler named Gosselin on a charge of obtaining money on false pretenses here, led up to a remarkable story in the Court of Sessions today. The case was not guilty. The charge against him was made by a young woman of means named Gaudet.

Her story was that she and the accused were married some years ago, but after a short time they discovered that there was an impediment to their marriage. They then appealed to the courts and had the marriage declared void. The church authorities subsequently annulled it also. The parties then drifted apart, the woman going to the United States. As time passed the impediment to marriage had been removed by the granting of a dispensation by the church. The parties again came together, and the man informed the woman that he would marry her again provided she would give him \$1,000. She agreed to do this, and he then asked her to give him a check for that amount.

All arrangements for the wedding were completed, but the woman alleges that the day before the proposed ceremony the man informed her that he had changed his mind about marrying and would not see her unless she gave him another \$1,000. She refused to do this. Next day the pair accidentally met at the bank, where the woman said she ascertained that the man had deposited the check in his name, but had withdrawn \$400 of it. She then told the bank manager not to pay the rest of the money to the accused, while the latter insisted on getting it. The manager then informed him that the money would not be paid except by order of the man.

It was on the alleged drawing of the \$400 that the charge of receiving money under false pretences was entered.

A letter from Miss Mabel Peters was read, expressing her thanks for being made honorary president and wishing the association success in its work.


A statement from the treasurer showed that the sum of \$1,787.84 had been expended last year for permanent equipment for playgrounds.

Daily Hints For the Cook

Oatmeal Bread

First have your water boiling hot. In to your bread pan put a cup of rolled oats. Now pour over it 8 cups boiling water, 1/2 cup of molasses, 1 tablespoon of lard, 1 dessertspoon of salt. Let cool. When blood warm, add 1 yeast cake, which has been dissolved in cold water. Now add bread flour until firm and can be kneaded. Let rise over night and make two loaves and bake 1 hour and 20 minutes.

Cracker Plum Pudding

Six common crackers, 1 quart milk, 1 cup raisins, 8 eggs, 4 1/2 tablespoons butter, 1/2 cup sugar, 2 tablespoons milk, 1/2 teaspoon ground nutmeg, 1/2 teaspoon salt. Split the crackers, butter them, allowing 2-4 tablespoons of butter to each cracker. Stone raisins and place between the cracker halves, putting together again in original shape. Pour the scalded milk over the crackers; let stand overnight; add the eggs beaten, diluted with the 2 tablespoons of milk; sugar, salt and nutmeg. Bake 45 minutes. Serve with wine sauce.

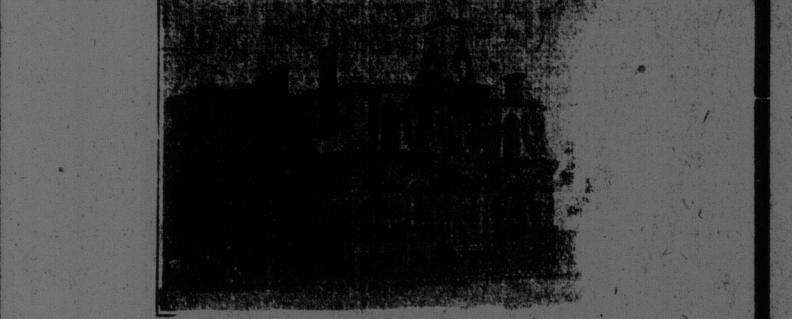

SIR GEORGE ROSS Canada and the Empire have sustained a loss in the death of that eminent educator, veteran statesman and strong imperialist, Sir George Ross. This paper recently considered at the odd coincidence that Sir George Ross and Sir James Whitney, who had been such vigorous opponents in politics in Ontario for so many years, were both critically ill at the same time and in the same hospital.

THE METROPOLIS The fact that the people of St. John are disposed to lend their assistance to efforts made for social betterment has been illustrated in connection with the Salvation Army Metropole. An executive of leading business men has been formed, with a general committee of more than one hundred and sixty other citizens, who sympathize with the movement to enable the Salvation Army to have for its purpose a building specially designed and built to deal more effectively with the derelicts whom the city recognizes must be cared for, and can best be dealt with by an organization which has officers specially trained for that work.

THE METROPOLIS (Continued) Since the city itself does not apparently have any intention of dealing with the matter as a department of civic affairs, the next best thing, and many people believe it to be really the best thing, is to co-operate with the Army. There should, however, as this paper has pointed out, be a working agreement between the civic authorities and the Army, by which those who are known to the Army officers to be utterly undeserving shall be compelled either to leave the city or be dealt with in such a manner as will take them off the streets, and put an end to the annoyance caused by them so long as they are at large, begging for assistance.

THE METROPOLIS (Continued) The story reveals are costing the people of Canada a lot of money. It is said there is likely to be a \$20,000,000 deficit instead of a surplus this year, and the revenue continues to decline. The revenue for February was \$9,698,120, as against \$11,186,870 in February of last year. There was also a large increase in expenditure, and nearly \$3,000,000 was added to the national debt during February. It will not be a cheerful statement the finance minister will have to make to the country in his budget speech.

THE METROPOLIS (Continued) With the Canadian Northern asking for a large bond guarantee, and with numerous other demands from its friends for financial consideration, the Borden government finds itself embarrassed in a manner which cannot but invite comparisons with the period of buoyant revenue and great progress and prosperity during the period when Sir Wilfrid Laurier and his colleagues were at the head of affairs.

THE METROPOLIS (Continued) When Hon. Mr. Nantel was asked yesterday why Mr. John Macdonald was appointed an excise officer in St. John in disregard of the civil service examination act and of the principle of promotion, he explained it by saying that Mr. Hazen "was very pressing" in his demand for Mr. Macdonald's appointment. Mr. Hazen is a member of a government pledged to civil service reform. His notions of reform are not those set forth in the civil service act. Promotion may be all right until a fat job looms up, but when it does "a friend of the minister" must get his reward.

THE METROPOLIS (Continued) In the first four months after the American tariff was revised downward, 182,461 Canadian cattle were exported to the United States, compared with 20,101 in the like period in the previous year. Cattle and beef are higher in Canada as a consequence, and the Canadian consumer gets no compensating advantage.

THE METROPOLIS (Continued) Whenever a member of the Borden government is driven to the wall, even if it be the premier himself, he tries to get out of the difficulty by talking about something that was done by the Liberals when they were in power. Why should "reformers" attempt to justify themselves in such a manner?

THE METROPOLIS (Continued) Ottawa may be a bigger city than Fredericton, but the New Brunswick capital is not to be beaten in the matter of railway bond guarantees. When it comes to a question of making the money fly, our own legislators are not to be sneezed at.

THE VALLEY RAILWAY The citizens of St. John are vitally interested in this matter of the appeal for more financial aid in the shape of a bond guarantee for an additional \$2,000,000 for the St. John Valley Railway. If additional aid is to be granted, what guarantees are to be given in return? When will the road be completed? When will work be begun on the Gagetown-St. John section? What will be the standard of construction of the section of the line which it is assumed will be utilized by the Grand Trunk Pacific? The time has arrived when silence must be broken and the people taken into the confidence of the government. The city council and board of trade are naturally expected by the citizens to guard their interests in this matter and to get the fullest information in relation to the Valley Railway and its terms in St. John. The whole province is deeply interested in the question because of the proposed additional bond

CONSERVATIVE MISRULE PRODUCES DEFICIT OF \$20,000,000 Ottawa, March 6.—The February financial statement for the dominion, issued today by the finance department, shows in a startling manner the accelerated progress of decreasing revenues, and increasing expenditures under Hon. W. T. White's administration. The demand of MacKenzie & Mann for millions via the federal treasury finds the Borden government's expenditures, with its \$20,000,000 deficit in sight at the end of the fiscal year. At the present rate the next fiscal year will show very heavy borrowings by the Canadian government on a credit already strained and a tight money market which has already raised the rate of interest payable on the last dominion loan of \$25,000,000 to nearly four and a half per cent. Instead of there being a surplus at the end of the present fiscal year, some three weeks hence, of revenue over all expenditures, there is likely to be a deficit of approximately \$20,000,000. Last year's record surplus of revenue over ordinary expenditures, namely, \$36,360,000, will be reduced this year to \$34,000,000 or \$23,000,000 more than the surplus.

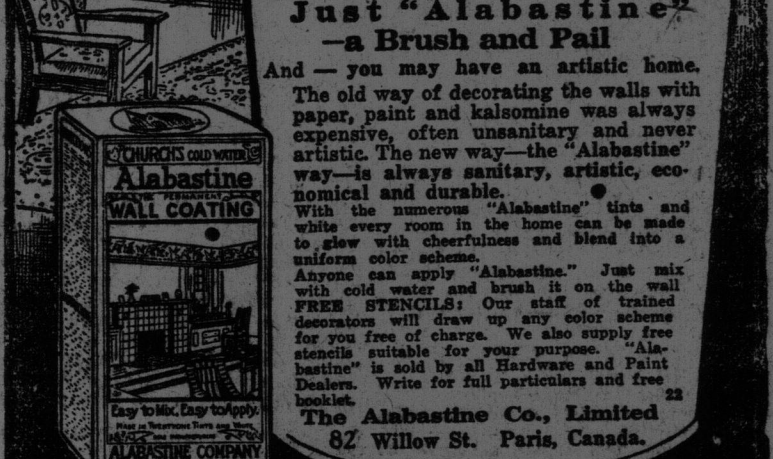

THE BRIDGE COMPANY PREPARES FOR WORK

AGED MAN JOKES WITH OPERATING SURGEONS

Declines Anaesthetics While His Appendix Is Being Removed—Eighty Eight Years Old and Never Ill Before

Davidson, Mich., March 7.—Although he is 88 years old, and was never ill before in his life, when Abram Snyder was confined to his bed by appendicitis he didn't give up hope. Instead, he sent for physicians, secured anaesthetics, watched the removal of his appendix with great interest, joked the doctors about the sharpness of their knives, and today is able to make his way about his room with assistance.

Despite the age of the patient, and the shock to his system by his refusal to sleep during the first time he was in the hands of surgeons, the operation is complete success. The operation was performed several weeks ago.

Mr. Snyder was born in the West Victoria district of Canada, January 1, 1826. He was married January 28, 1848, to Jane Atkinson of the same place. With his wife he came to Michigan in 1851, remained two years, went back to Canada and returned to Michigan in 1853, residing in Davidson township continuously since. His wife died December 19, 1902.

Mr. Snyder has worked hard all of his life and to this he attributes his good health.

INSIDES ON WRONG SIDES

Elkins, W. Va., March 7.—When surgeons operated on Mrs. Laura Cassel, of Widdell, at the hospital here today, they found her internal organization just the reverse of that of all other normal human beings.

She was operated on for appendicitis, and her appendix was found to be on the left side instead of the right. It was also found the spleen was on the right side instead of the left, the liver on the left side, and strangest of all, the heart was on the right side.

Surgeons stated that the woman would recover.

PLANS COMPLETED FOR NEW \$3,000,000 MILL AT BATHURST

Construction of Fifty-ton Sulphite Pulp Plant to be Started at Once—A. G. McIntyre of St. John Will be Manager

The Bathurst Lumber Company of Bathurst, N. B., announce that they have completed plans for the erection of a fifty-ton sulphite pulpmill at Bathurst. Work on this undertaking is to be started at once, and it is announced that by May 1, 1915, paper makers will be able to purchase for the first time a domestic product of the highest grade, cook-bleached mitcherlich sulphite fibre.

The mill will be operated under the name of the Bathurst Pulp & Paper Company, Limited, with a capitalization of \$3,000,000. Angus McLean, general manager of the Bathurst Lumber Company, will be president of the new company, while A. G. McIntyre, editor of the Pulp and Paper Magazine, and superintendent of the Forest Product Laboratories, a recent graduate of McGill University, son of Rev. W. E. McIntyre, of this city, will be the manager.

It is proposed to make a thirty-six hour cook sulphite and bleached electrolytically a grade of paper that is in great demand in the country and heretofore a quality that had to be imported from the United States.

The mill is to be situated on Bathurst harbor and the Nepisiquit and Tegauche rivers, which empty here, contributing materially to the economical operation of the plant, which is also favored by the vicinity of adequate transportation advantages and a good labor market. The Bathurst Lumber Company owns 2,800 square miles of limits extending from the plant itself.

QUINCY FIRE CHIEF WAS ST. JOHN MAN

News of the death of a former St. John man, Daniel J. Nyhan, district chief of the fire department of Quincy, Mass., received in the city recently, was heard with regret by many friends. He had been a resident of the states for the greater part of his life and had been a valued member of the Quincy fire department for twenty-five years, occupying the position of chief for much of that time. Relatives in St. John are John Dever, his step-father, of Chesley street, a half-sister, Miss Annie Dever, and a half-brother, Alfred L. Dever, who was in Quincy for the funeral.

The Quincy papers describe the funeral as one of the largest ever held there, besides being most impressive. The body was borne from the church of the Sacred Heart through long lines of firemen and the age of the late respected chief was told on all the fire bells of the city. Delegations from other fire departments in neighboring centres were present, and the cortege was representative of all classes of citizens by whom Fire Chief Nyhan was held in high esteem.
