Paris, Nov. 11-The French official statement given out in Paris this after-

"On our left wing, the fighting was resumed yesterday morning between Nieuport and the Lys, with a very great degree of severity. Generally speaking, our front was maintained, in spite of the violence and the strength of the

German attacks directed against certain of our points of support.

"To the north of Nieuport, we were even able to reoccupy Lombaertzyde and advance beyond this town, but toward the end of the day the Germans succeeded in taking possession of Dixmude. We still hold our position on the approaches of this town, along the canal from Nieuport to Ypres, which has been firmly occupied. The fighting was very hot at these places.

"The British troops, attacked also at several points, succeeded everywhere in steeping the energy."

"On the rest of the front the general situation shows no change, with the exception of slight progress by our forces to the north of Soissons and in the region to the west of Vaillly, on the right bank of the Aisne."
