ALLIES HOLD THEIR OWN AGAINST VIOLENT ATTACKS

Germans However Get Possession of Dixmude--British Check Enemy Everywhere They Are Attacked--Mine Sinks Japanese Torpedo Boat

Paris, Nov. 11--The French official statement given out in Paris this afternoon says:--

On our left wing, the fighting was resumed yesterday morning between Nieuport and the Lyne with a very great degree of severity.

On the right of the front the general situation shows no change, with the exception of slight progress by our forces to the north of Soissons and in the region to the west of Vailly, on the right bank of the Aisne.

Outside of these two points, the state of the weather permitted only minor engagements, which resulted successfully for us. Particularly at Colcoeur, three kilometers north of the forest of Parroy, we routed a detachment of the enemy.

On the north of Nieuport, we were even able to recapture Lombaertside and advance beyond this town, but toward the end of the day the Germans succeeded in taking possession of Dixmude. We still hold our position on the approaches of this town, along the canal from Nieuport to Ypres, which has been firmly occupied. The fighting was very hot at these places.

The British troops, attacked also at several points, succeeded everywhere in stopping the enemy.

Various Suggestions For Water Extension Plan

ANOTHER HOME DEFENCE SCHEME

Arbitration Proceedings to Settle Dispute Between Builder and Inspector--Complaints About Laundry--Postponed Meeting of Common Council This Morning

Problems in connection with scientific town planning occupied the attention of the common council at its postponed meeting this morning.

A SIGNIFICANT WARNING

If it is True That Germany Has Threatened To Prevent Americans Distributing Relief To Belgians, There May Be Another Nation in Arms Against Kaiser

New York, Nov. 11--The Herald today says editorially: If it is true, as cabled from Amsterdam, that Germany has threatened to prevent the American relief committee from distributing food and other supplies to suffering Belgians, the defenders of "kultur" in this country will have more defending to do.

Germany's attitude toward the action in Belgium is a crime against civilization. Having conquered and overrun a country with which they had neither quarrel nor excuse for quarrel, the Germans have stripped the country of not only its valuables but of its food supplies, and at the time when neutral nations are compelled in the interest of humanity to undertake the task of saving the Belgian people from starvation, Germans continue their pillage.

Now to their vandalism they add threat of preventing the distribution of supplies to the needy. The spectacle is one that not even the greatest admirer of German prowess can view with any feeling save disgust.

Among the interesting letters received this week from the boys at Salisbury Plain was one from Lieut. Eric W. MacDonald of this city.

"The English people," he says, "continue to be very kind to the Canadians, for whom they seem to cherish a genuine regard. While the men made no delivery of their letters, it is a pity that we have not had any of our own from home."

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BULGARIA READY UNDER CONDITIONS

Sofia, via London, Nov. 11--Another detachment of Macedonians has arrived here after being released by the Austrians, who captured them at Shabats, where they had been forced in to the Serbian army.

The press here admits that Bulgaria is quite ready to pay the blood debt owing to Russia, but not until the Triple Entente gives ample guarantees that Bulgarian rights will be restored in Macedonia, and that Bulgaria is protected from the territorial designs of her neighbors.

Discovery of a case of spying at Basel against Germany.

Amsterdam, Nov. 11--Vorwarts announces the death of Frederick William Metzger, socialist member of the Reichstag for Hamburg.

London, Nov. 11--A Central News correspondent writes that the gunnery of the German cruiser Emden was good in the beginning of her fight off Cocos Island with the Australian cruiser Sydney, but deteriorated later.

GERMANS SUPREME EFFORT

Paris, Nov. 11--It is becoming more and more evident to French observers that Germany is now making a maximum effort in Belgium to carry out her determination to penetrate the battle line of the allies with a frontal attack, and reach either Dunkirk or Calais.

Tokyo, Nov. 11--It is officially announced that torpedo boat No. 33 of the Japanese navy was sunk by a mine early today at the mouth of Kiao Chau Bay, while dragging its mines. Amajory of the crew was rescued.

It is announced here that many of the men aboard the German cruiser Emden, beached and burned on Cocos Island were killed or wounded in the battle.

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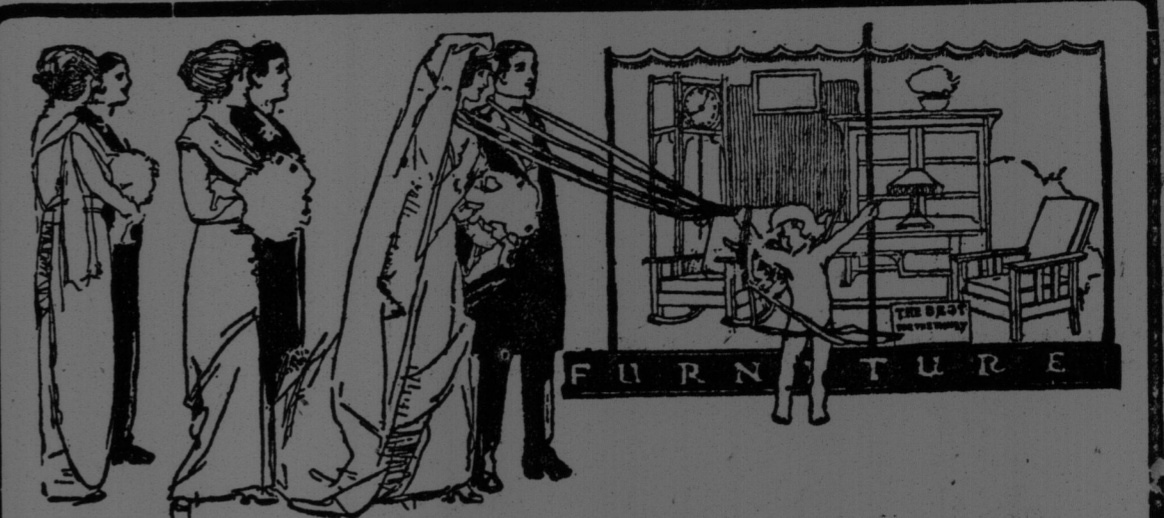

THE WAR NEWS

The drop in marine insurance following the destruction of the German cruiser Emden shows how great was the feeling of relief at the allied fleet which were engaged in the operations against Tsing Tau are released for other service we may reasonably anticipate the early destruction of the small German squadron which is still at sea, and was last heard from on the coast of South America.

PRODUCE THE REPORT

"AT GRIPS WITH FATE"

The people of Canada cannot remain unmoved when they read of the houses in England to encourage recruiting for the new armies necessary to a successful prosecution of the war. The appeal that is being made under the names of Premier Asquith and Mr. Bonar Law reads as follows:— "We shall need all the best the nation can give us of its youth and strength. If we are to repair, as far as may be humanly possible, the innumerable wrongs inflicted on our Allies; if we are to avoid for ourselves the ills which they are suffering, if we are to maintain for our children all that we hold dear in honor and the freedom of our very life as a nation, we must fight with the courage and endurance which won for us the struggles of the past."

These are strong words, and reveal the seriousness of the situation. A London cable says that a remarkable change has come over the social life of the people. The interest in sports, politics and society is practically dead, and the ordinary questions over which parties differ are put aside while all the people unite to face the common danger.

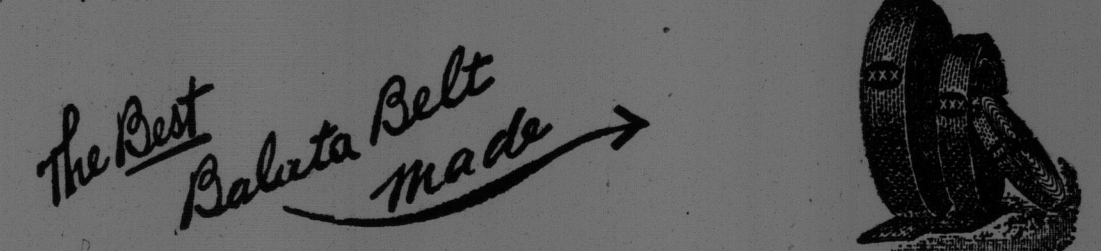

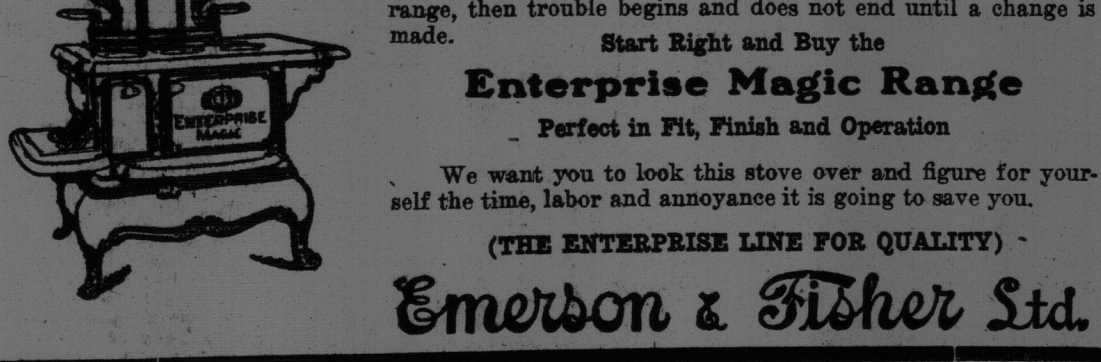

PANAMA LOCOMOTIVES.

Forty electric locomotives, which are tow vessels through the locks of the Panama Canal, have been shipped to the Canal Zone. These "electric mules," as they are called, weigh 50 tons each, and are 60 feet long. Four locomotives will be used for each vessel, two hauling on top and two on the bottom. The two top ones are one inch in diameter, and are composed of six strands of high-tension wire around a hemp core. The specifications call for a breaking strength of thirty-seven tons each, and tests have

shown a strength of more than 16 per cent in excess of this.

Quebec, Nov. 11.—The Anglican Synod of Quebec will meet on December 16 to elect a new bishop to succeed Rt. Rev. A. H. Dunn, who has resigned and gone to England, after being here twenty-two years. Among the names of possible successors are those of Bishop Thornloe, of Algoma; Canon Tucker, of London, Ont., who has done so much in the way of shaping the church's missionary policy; Dean Williams, of Quebec; and Canon Gould.

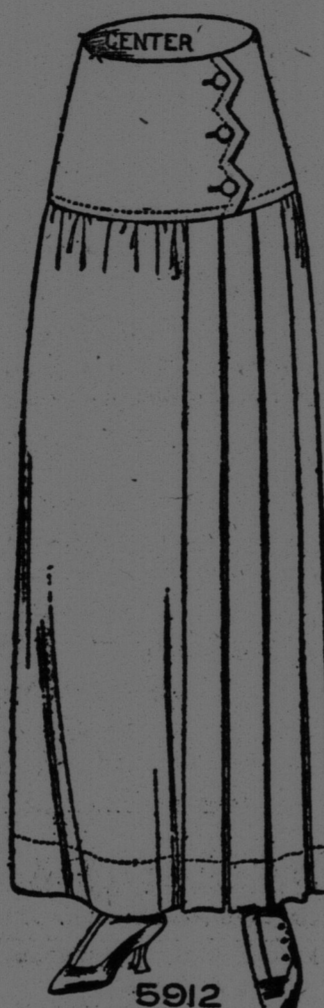

Four-piece skirt in broadcloth for misses and small women. The notched yoke strikes a decidedly new note in hip trimming.

Here is a new model for a separate skirt that has sprung into instant favor. It is a four-piece affair with a two-piece yoke, pointed at the side where the adjustment is effected. Both pleats are gathered, are used to dispose of the fulness below the hip yoke and the bottom is finished with a plain hem.

To make the design one will need 2 1/2 yards of 44-inch or 3 1/2 yards of 44-inch material.

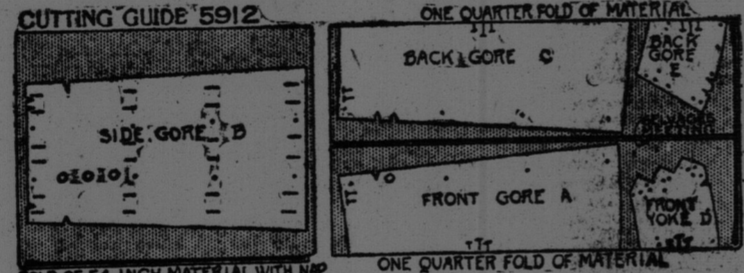
The home dressmaker who has had but very little experience can develop this skirt very successfully. Using 44-inch goods, first fold it, then arrange on the fold the side gore.

Now fold the material again, making a quarter instead of a half fold as in the first instance, and along the lengthwise fold place the front gore, also front yoke. Along the opposite edge arrange the back gore and back yoke. If the cloth is properly folded in quarters the selvages will meet.

To make, join the gores, then form box pleats and gather upper edge along double "T" perforations.

For the yoke, first underface side edge of front. Then turn under lower edges of yokes on small "G" perforations, lap front yoke on back, matching corresponding single small "G" perforations and stitch, leaving edges (on left side) free for opening. Lap lower folded edge of yoke on gares, notches, centers and edges underneath even and stitch in tuck effect. Adjust a webbing or a straight strip of canvas two inches wide to position underneath upper edge of skirt for a stay; stitch upper edges together.

The buttons should be as plain as possible to conform to the simplicity of the design.

HAVE YOU A NEEDLE ECONOMY HINTS FOR THE HOUSEWIFE

The cheapest way is always the best way. We learned that bit of wisdom from our grandmothers, but most of us have learned for ourselves that neither the cheapest materials, nor those that are highest priced are the best.

Take stockings for instance. You cannot always judge a stocking by its price. An expensive stocking will often run to "Jacob's ladders," and little holes in the heels long before a cheaper stocking has commenced to show any wear at all.

So we must learn to select stockings, especially stockings for the little folks, by the quality of the thread not by the price tag.

Buy stockings with hard twisted threads. Those soft to the touch will be sure to wear through the very first time. Willie scrambles over the fence after the ball and the knees will be "out" the first time Mary cuddles down on the floor to cut out dolly's new Red Cross costume.

We know that the best is always the cheapest but that neither the cheapest nor the highest priced are always the best.

The white and lighter shades in stockings wear better than the black, but they do soil easily and the sensible mother will use chiefly black hose with white feet.

A hard thread and hard rather open weave makes the most durable hose, and they should be reinforced as soon as bought. This is done by running the laces and heels and toes with good damping cotton. It is easily and quickly done and will considerably delay the hole at the point of strain.

Mother's and big sister's stockings can easily be made over for the children by cutting off the wornout feet and part of the ankle and making a new foot.

Economies in Darning

Proceed as follows to darn hosiery in the most economical and lasting way:

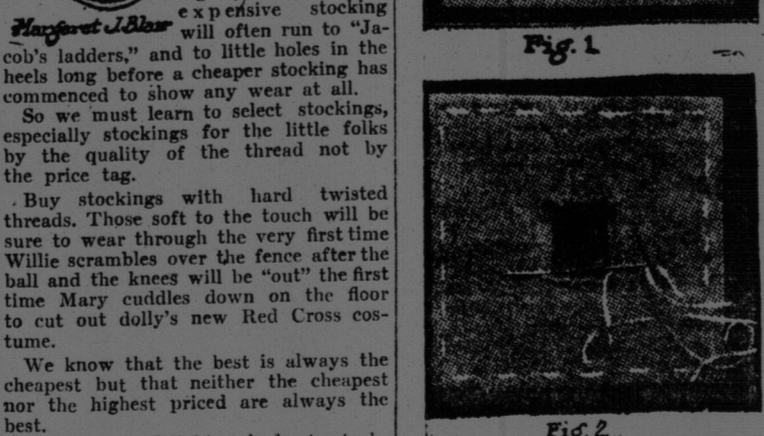
Materials.—Stockings with hole in heel or toe piece of cardboard about 3 1/2 inches square damping cotton to match the stocking; No. 6 darning needle.

To Put the Warp

1. Baste the stocking on the card. (Fig. 1)

2. Cut the hole so that each edge is straight with a line of stitches, and about in the centre of the piece.

3. Pull out all the loose ends of the cut loops. You should be able to see a



warp thread, over the second, under the third, over the fourth, and so on across the hole.

3. Finish with running stitches.

4. Turn and come back with running stitches, very close to the first row.

5. In weaving back across the warp, put the needle under the threads it was put under. (Fig. 2)

6. Continue this weaving until the warp threads are filled, always putting the wool threads close together.

7. Cut off the knot.

Be sure to take up but one thread at a time and always alternate the over and under stitches. Do not draw the threads tight or the hole will be puckered.

This method of darning is for the feet of stockings. Later you will learn how to mend the knees.

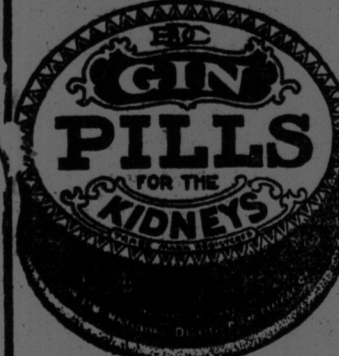

German Wounded Sight Seeing in Berlin

Morning War Summary

London, Nov. 10, 9:35 p. m.—The details of the contending armies in the eastern and western theatres of the war, especially as concerns the situation in West Flanders, dove-tailed to so few respects tonight as to leave but one big fact on land or sea undisputed. That was the destruction of the German raider Emden and the trapping of the German cruiser Koenigsberg, which read a letter in a palm-lined East African river, under circumstances which need as though they were taken from Stevenson.

The British marine insurance rate was almost instantly cut in half—never since the days of the Confederate warship Alabama has there been such a successful commerce-destroyer as the Emden. Cheers broke forth at Lloyd's on the announcement, and for the moment the struggles of the armies in France, Belgium, Russia and elsewhere were forgotten.

Yet all these armies were at each other's throats—the Germans and Russians clashing in cavalry engagements along the German frontier, the Russians still harassing the Austrians in Galicia, and the French, British and Belgians holding back what appears still to be a tremendous German attempt to break through the Allies' line in the vicinity of Ypres.

Many despatches speak of the movement of German troops eastward from Belgium, as forecasting the necessity of reinforcements along the eastern frontier, but neither the French nor German official statements this afternoon indicated any slackening in the violence of the German attacks in East Flanders.

In fact, the French statement says that between the sea and Arras, the opposing forces were both acting on the offensive. The situation along the battle line in France proper, from the standpoint of the Allies, was summed up in a despatch from an "observer with the Indian corps," who says there has been no marked change anywhere, though he professes to see a gradual weakening of the German attacks.

Aside from the military aspects of the war, what stood out boldest today was Germany's reported threat to cut off the food supply which the United States is sending to Belgium, if the Belgians did not return to their cities and make an effort to resume their normal occupations. The Belgian answer is that it has been impossible to resume a semblance of normal activity, because the German soldiers had commandeered all implements and materials necessary to an industrial revival.

Advices from South Africa report the further rounding up of rebels, not far from Pretoria, where an additional 120 were killed or wounded. For the first time since 1790 there has been an execution in the Tower of London, Carl Hans Lody, a German spy, who lived for a time in the United States, being shot to death.

AUSTRIAN REPORT OF RUSSIAN RETIREMENT. London, Nov. 10, 9:05 p. m.—The following despatch from Berlin was received this evening by the Marconi Wireless Telegraph Company:

"It is officially reported from Vienna that the Russians have evacuated the greater part of Bukovina and retired in the direction of the Diester river, where they have been pursued by the Austrian troops, who have taken many prisoners."

"It is officially reported that after two days' heavy fighting on the Caucasian frontier the Turkish troops have completely defeated the Russian army and captured the Russian positions."

"A Turkish fleet has pursued Russian ships which were bombarding Kofu, but the ships escaped in the fog."

GERMAN REPORT OF JAPANESE ACTION. Berlin, Nov. 10.—The Novoe Vremya, a newspaper published in Petrograd, reports that the Japanese government has demanded from China a concession for the construction of a railroad from Sui-Nan, in Shantung province, to the Yang Tse river.

This information was given out to the press today from official quarters.

THE CONSUMER.

(Conservation.)

Carelessness in packing goods for shipment results in breakages and loss. The cost is carried on an overhead expense and the consumer pays.

Accidents happen. The employer carries liability insurance. The insurance company pays, but collects from the employees. The employer in turn collects the additional cost from the consumer.

On account of our excessive fire loss, the company pays, but collects from the consumer. The consumer has to pay the additional cost.

Fires are, to a great extent, the result of carelessness. The insurance companies pay their proportion of the loss, but the consumer pays in the end.

Forest fires occur, causing immense loss to timber. To provide for these losses the lumberman must collect recompense from the consumer.

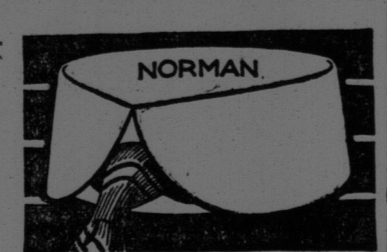
A municipality lays a new pavement; a public service corporation a few days later cuts holes in it, and cruelly attempts to repair the damage. This is part of their cost of doing business, and the consumer pays the bill.

Through defective plumbing and wastefulness in the use of water, excessive pumping expense is incurred. The corporation pays the bill, but collects from the consumer.

A Five Shilling Rebellion was the phrase used by General Smuts, South African minister of defence, speaking at a meeting in Johannesburg on Saturday. General Smuts' declaration that the union government was prepared to see the thing through may be accepted with confidence in view of his successful handling of the labor crisis a few months ago.

General Smuts' statement on Saturday at a review of the motor transport that DeWet's oration at Vrede would always stamp his rebellion as a five shilling affair had reference to DeWet's grievance against a magistrate for inflicting a fine of five shillings on him for thrashing a Kaffir. Curiously enough the name of the town where DeWet broke in rebellion is named Dutch Peace.

THE COAL SITUATION

(Coal Age, New York, Nov. 7.)

As a result of the continued mild weather, anthracite consumers are becoming indifferent about accumulating further stocks, and the companies are pushing hard for business. The short coal snap of last week stimulated buying for the moment, but all sales are now in free supply, and orders generally scarce. Evidence of the poor business in the northwest is seen in the light lake trade, however, is that the tonnage has been somewhat curtailed through the current week.

Circle prices on the Hampton Roads coals in the coastwise trade are purely nominal, all spot business being subject to such active competition that heavy concessions are now the rule. Some coal loaded on contract is being refused and is exceedingly difficult to move. The local spot demand has practically disappeared, and there is absolutely no life in the market. There has also been a gradual but well defined slowing up in the export business.

The steel industry in the Pittsburgh district, while some of the mines shipping the lake markets are already beginning to close down and the end of the current month will see many of these idle. One compensating feature of the light lake trade, however, is that the tonnage has months gradually tapering off for several months so that the trade will not be subjected to the customary shock of an abrupt cessation of shipments. The short coal snap of last week caused a run of domestic orders, but it was not of sufficient duration to affect the general situation, and had also been discounted to a certain extent. The general heaviness in all lines of industry, particularly iron and steel, together with the further restriction in the lake trade, due to the congestion at the upper lake ports, are the predominating features in the current market. The real test of the lake shipping closes down entirely.

The southern market has touched the lake market for several years, both as regards prices and demand, but the operators have adopted rigid curtailment policies and have the situation well in hand. The middle western trade through October was a big disappointment, the tonnage showing a heavy decline, particularly at some points such as Chicago, where it is estimated at 60 per cent normal. However, close observers see indications of a change for the better in the very near future. Many furnaces have now started up for the winter's run and there have been some heavy orders for war supplies placed in the middle west, which will stimulate manufacturing.

In the Alleghenies, just beyond Condupton, Pa., there is a cave a few feet from the surface which in a natural ice mine, the ceiling, walls and floor being covered with ice perpetually. Curiously during summer the ice is thicker than in winter. The origin of this ice mine is a mystery to all scientists.

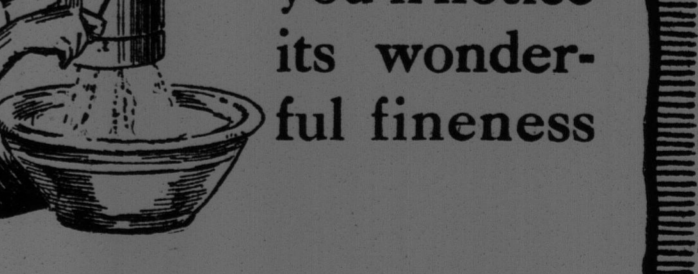

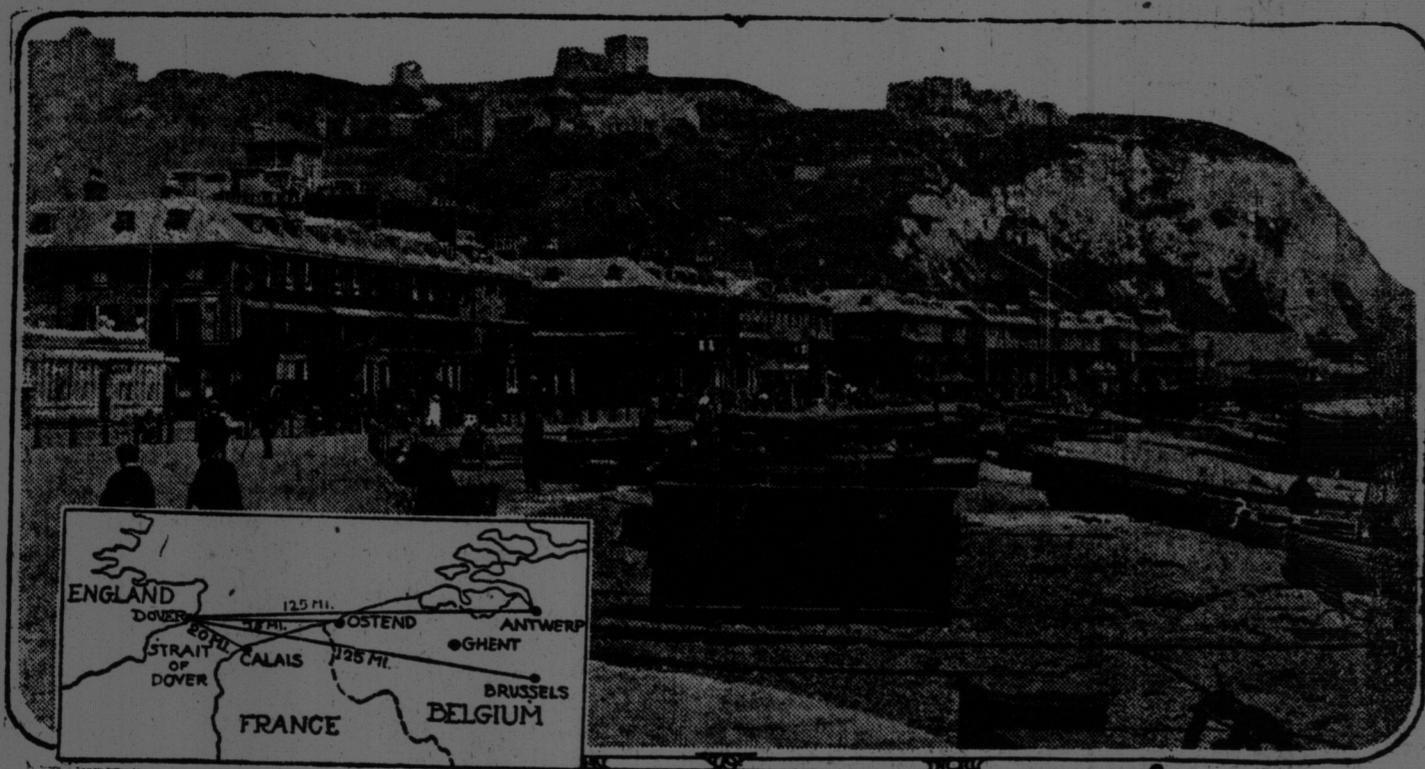

Famous Dover Looks For Zeppelins and Has a Marvelous Gun To Bring Down "German Sausages"



Seaport at Dover, the famous and historic old town which is the gateway to England from the Continent.

Burton Goes Down to Dover, Gateway to England, to See How They're Prepared For German Raid; Scores of Mounted Cannon Mounted; Historic Old Place

(Correspondence by H. P. Burton) Dover, England, Oct. 4.—The ribbon of salt water that shimmers between Dover cliffs and Belgian sands—between the high headlands of England and the low shores of Belgium—is only a few miles by steamer.

The chalky cliffs of Dover bristle today with giant guns as the flanks of porcupine bristles with living weapons. Big 80-ton monsters, painted white, poke their noses from the snowy steps; smaller guns, farther down, and pointed green, are half-buried in grassy slopes; and scores of long, slim-nosed fellows train their mouths skywards from every point of vantage on surrounding summits.

It is the thought of Zeppelins, that has Dover in its grip. I knew it the minute I struck the town. You could feel it in the air. You could watch everyone peer slyly upwards and outwards from time to time and when I reached the shore, there, at the edge of the sea, were two English aeroplanes patrolling for German "birds."

Dover does not go to sleep o' nights these times. When darkness falls and the light of Cape Gris Nez, on the coast of France, begins its flashing, Dover starts her work of watching in earnest—for is it not in the night that Zeppelins drop bombs?

The evening I was in Dover no fewer than twenty-four searchlights were sweeping the skies. There were three on the towers of old Dover Castle—this fortress that has been British, Roman, Saxon and Norman in turn—and Dover has heard that the Kaiser says he will eat his Christmas dinner in the hall where William the Conqueror came to demand the keys that Harold had sworn to give!

Another searchlight blazed from the ruins of the Pharos, that, in another warlike era, served as a beacon for the Roman gallees on their way from Gaul. The searchlights were everywhere except where the war department has secreted its most formidable guns.

WINTER, BUT NOT ARCTIC WINTER, WHERE THE BOYS ARE FIGHTING AND TENTING

Washington, D. C., Nov. 10.—They will not be able to build trenches in the snow and bridges of ice in the war zone of east and west Europe. Prof. Charles F. Talman is the European weather expert in the United States weather bureau at Washington and he found a lot of data about the temperature and such things in the districts where they are fighting.

In the extreme northwestern part of France, in Belgium and in southern Germany the average of the lowest temperatures reached from year to year is fourteen degrees above zero, Fahrenheit. Within this area, which includes practically all of the present western battlefields, the lowest temperatures ever recorded have been 18 and 14 below zero.

Prof. Talman turned to the Encyclopaedia Britannica and read as follows: "While the average summer temperature of Germany is 60 to 62 degrees, the January temperature average falls to 36 to 38 degrees in West Prussia, Posen and Silesia, and 22 to 26 degrees in East Prussia, and upper Silesia. The navigation of the rivers is regularly interrupted by frost. Similarly the upper basin of the Danube on the Bavarian plain has rather inclement climate in winter, the average for January being 25 to 26 degrees.

That may be taken as authoritative," said the professor. The January average temperature at Berlin, 52 degrees, is the same as the January average for Philadelphia, Pa., Wichita, Kas., St. Louis, Mo., and Cincinnati, O. The January temperature at Posen and Breslau, which is 29 degrees compares with the temperature of New Haven, Conn., 28 degrees; Indianapolis, Ind., 28; Columbus, O., 29; Denver, Colo., 29; and St. Paul, Minn., 29.

The average January temperature at Brussels is 36; at Paris, 37; at Berlin, 32; at Petrograd (St. Petersburg), 17 degrees.

While the bureau has no records of snowfall in either of the battle areas, the temperature records show, and the fact is, that snowfall is frequent. Already the reports are being received from the mountainous border of France and Germany.

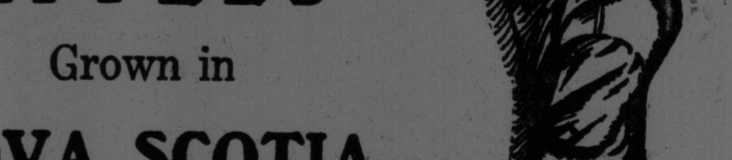

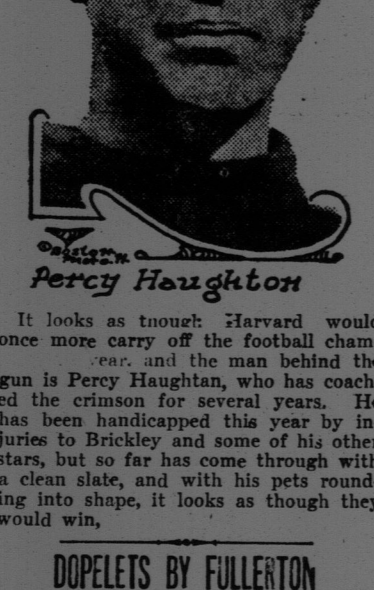

DEATHS IN THE CITY DURING 12 MONTHS WERE 40 FEWER THAN IN YEAR BEFORE

Total For Year Ended Oct. 31 Was 777—Greatest Number Was of Babies Less Than a Year Old—Tuberculosis Claimed Two More Than in 1913

During the year ended October 31, at the board of health offices 777 deaths were registered, a decrease of forty from the number recorded during the previous year. This report was submitted in the annual statement of T. M. Burns, secretary of the board, at the annual meeting held yesterday afternoon with M. W. Doherty presiding.

The report of the chief medical officer, Dr. C. G. Melvin, for the quarter, was presented. Four dealers in Kings county were notified that if they complied with the requirements of the board they could supply milk in the city, while four local men were reported for keeping cows without the sanction of the board. There were four citizens before the board for not complying with the regulations demanding sanitary conveniences on their premises.

Number of Deaths.
Tuberculosis claimed two more victims this year than last year, the totals being eighty-one and seventy-nine. The number of males who died last year was 429, and females 348, while this year the number of males was 380 and females 397. Canadian born totalled
