TERROR IN PETROGRAD

Copenhagen, Oct. 28.—A young lieutenant named von Knorring, who has just escaped from Petrograd, said here that life in Petrograd with General Yudenitch's forces advancing against the city, is like a hell and that the greatest tragedy in history is now being played there. For a long time the most necessary victuals have been lacking and if one does not have an income of at least eighteen thousand rubles a month, it is impossithousand rubles a month, it is impossi-ble to get anything to eat except mouldy ble to get anything to eat except mouldy bread and rotten herrings.

Many thousands are dying from famine and cold. The lack of coal and wood is now terrible, and wooden buildings are being torn down for fuel; even the famous wooden pavements of Petrograd are used and the streets are thus made impossible for traffic. The marines and workingmen have taken possession of all good apartments and no established business now exists, all the trading being done by waggons. done by waggons. at any moment houses are searched by at any moment houses are searched by marines or bands of factory girls, who steal everything eatable, dragging the inhabitants into the courts and accusing them of every conceivable crime.


All the men are forced into the Red Army, which is now 200,000 strong in Petrograd alone, but, of course, this army is always near revolt against the Red marines, who are the masters of the city.

The lieutenant says that Lenine's influence has not diminished. His representative is Angelsowitch Bachkirern, who is the terror of Petrograd. Sickness

London, Oct. 1—(Correspondence)— The famous resturant, familiarly known as "Stone's," in Panton street, Haymarket, London, was recently offered for sale by auction. A bid of \$135,750 was offered, at which price the property was

withdrawn. "Stone's" has been a favorite trysting place of literary and artistic men for nearly a century. It has always been celebrated for good food and good ale, and the foaming tankard and smoking steaks and chops have ever been irresistible to men famed in art or in letters

or the professions.

Oliver Goldsmith and Edmund Burke frequented Stone's. It was known and used by Dickens, who wrote: "The West End chop or steak, it is true, was for a long time difficult to come at, and as a rule exceedingly bad when you got it, although the grill loving Londoner was even then able to go to Stone's in Panistreet with a tolerable certainty of finding what he wanted."

The dining room is one of the oldest

The dining room is one of the oldest fashioned cating places in London. The room is small and is divided into compartments, which hold tables for four, and an observant person would note that and an observant person would note that the seats are usually occupied by the same people—men of mature years.

For thirty years no woman has been known to dine at Stone's, though "old inhabitants" refer to an occasion when one was seen in the dining room in the one was seen in the dining room in the almost dim ages of the past.


In the spacious coffee room, still existing, most of the London celebrities have foregathered from time to time, and in 1838 it was recognized as the only place in the West End where a clay pipe could be smoked after lunch, the tobacco provided being exclusively of that kind known as "C'naster," for which six cents a packet, then called a cartridge, was charged.
