

The report of the Mission Band was read by Rev. Dr. Mowat and adopted.


The report of the Juvenile Guild was read by Miss H. E. Mowat and adopted.



Kirk=Session Report.

The Kirk-Session respectfully submit their annual report to the congregation.

Throughout the year public worship, morning and evening every Sunday, has been conducted, and the Sacraments have been duly celebrated. With a short break in Summer the Prayer Meeting has been kept up the whole year.

It is with sorrow we record that the death rate among our communicants has been unusually high, and that we have been bereft of many long known and greatly valued ones. These are their names— Mrs. Thomas Donnelly, Mrs. Wilkinson, Rev. Dr. Bell, Mrs. Lawson, Mrs. Ireland, Mr. Spankie, Miss Rogers, Mrs. Macpherson, Mrs. David Harold, and Capt. Thomas Taylor.

In addition to these ten removed by death, eight communicants have been certificated to other congregations, making a loss of eighteen communicants. On the other hand there have been thirtynine received into full communion with the church, fifteen on profession of faith, twenty-two on presentation of certificates from other congregations, and two by restoration—thus leaving us a gain of twenty-one.

The Communion Roll now stands at 563.

The Sacrament of Baptism was administered to eight children.

Seven marriages were celebrated.

The Kirk-Session, sharing in the very general desire of the congregation for a better Service of Praise at public worship and having regard to the requests repeatedly made that steps should be taken for securing this, have to report that after careful, prayerful consideration, and keeping the best interests of the congregation closely in view, they have taken such action as they believe will impart such attractiveness to the musical services of the sanctuary, that the congregation will not only be satisfied but gratified. They have appointed as organist and choir-master a gentleman of high character, rare musical ability and thoroughly experienced, an acknowledged success in his profession—namely, Mr. T. Singleton of Port Hope.

The Session desires to express their admiration of the earnestness manifested in almost all the departments of congregational life and work, and express their warm gratitude to all the workers in the different associations, and to the teachers and officers in the Sabbath School. They wish also to cordially thank the members of the choir for their voluntary services to the church.

The Poor Fund accounts have been submitted for our inspection and we have found the same correct, and are satisfied that the fund is prudently managed.

Praying the Lord to be merciful to us all and to make us more useful in our day and generation and so more meet for the perfect worship in the church above, we lay this report before you.

Report of Board of Management.

It is with a great deal of pleasure that the Board of Management submits the following financial report of Receipts and Expenditure for the year ending 31st Dec., 1898:

The ordinary receipts compare favorably with the previous year, and the liberal givings at the anniversary collection, and the special contributions through Mrs. Mackie on floating debt account, have enabled the Board to reduce the latter by \$700.02, and but for the fact that the insurance has been readjusted, necessitating the payment of all premiums this year, the floating debt would show a much greater reduction.

Total...... \$37000 00

In order that all the salaries payable might run concurrent with the fiscal year of the church accounts, they have been paid up to the 31st Dec. This explains the amounts paid over and above the respective salaries to the Minister, Precentor and Organist, as formerly on 31st Dec. two months of the quarter had expired but the corresponding part of the salaries was not payable till 31st January. Now that these accounts have been so adjusted the comparison of expenditure year by year will be more correct.

We regret to record the loss to the Church and especially the loss to the Board of Management by the removal of Mr. Geo. Parker from the city, and the following minute has been recorded regarding his departure:—

The Women's Home Association have pleasure in presenting to the congregation their annual report, not so much on account of what they have succeeded in accomplishing, but of the honest efforts that they have put forth in various directions for the help of the ehurch.

They have, through twenty-one of their members, been in close contact with all the members of the congregation, keeping them interested and in most cases sharing in the life and work of the church. They have distributed monthly the Mission Record, which gives all the intelligence up to date of the work of the church at home and abroad, and of St. Andrew's Notes which tell them of all that is going on in the congregation. They also receive contributions for the missions of the church, and other special objects, at times most convenient for the people.

For the past two years the Association has had the management of the Interest Fund, very carefully watching its growth from month to month, and endeavouring as best they could to raise the required sum. Though on neither occasion they were successful in raising the whole amounts, they are very conscious that had it not been for the rare business qualities and energy of the Convener, the results would have been considerably smaller. This year the total raised for the Interest Fund is \$405.83, leaving a balance of \$132.17 to be somehow provided for. The Association regrets to report that owing to Mrs. Hughes resignation of the Convenership of the Fund, they have no member who considers herself competent to undertake this work, and therefore would suggest that some young gentleman with a knowledge of book-keeping would volunteer to do it for the next two years.

Early in the year the Association had under their consideration the subject of the floating debt, which was brought before the congregation at the last annual meeting, and resolved to try and wipe it out. After considering several schemes, they adopted one which they considered the best, and which, had it been cordially received throughout the congregation, would have wiped out the debt as it stood at the end of last year. They issued cards to 400 of the congregation soliciting the sum of \$3, payable in smalls or in any way suited through the year. Only 140, however, took part in the work and therefore the amount raised is only \$440.25.

Another work which the Association has to report is the Talent work, now well known in the church and beyond it, and dear to the hearts of many earnest members of the congregation. They have been working quietly throughout the year and have raised for the further reduction of the mortgage the sum of \$356.05. A great many of the workers contributed of their gains to the floating debt, which accounts for no larger sum being raised for the Talent this year. Indeed the Floating Debt amount is mainly the work of the Talent workers. There therefore still remains a large constituency to be appealed to on behalf of the floating debt.

Through the efforts of Mrs. Mowat there was gathered and despatched to Beaver Lake Mission Field, the charge of the Rev. E. C. Gallup, a bale of useful clothing weighing 120 lbs., and valued at \$40.

The Poor Fund has been administered for the Kirk-Session by the Association. The accounts have been audited by the Association and also inspected by the Kirk-Session and the management has been entirely satisfactory.

The work of the Guild has been steadily and quietly going on throughout the year, all the Sections carefully looking after their respective departments, and meeting together once a month to compare notes, consult together, and be mutually encouraged.

We regret the loss of several specially active members who have gone to reside elsewhere. Our best wishes follow them and we hope that others will be found qualified to take their places, for whoever goes the *work* remains.

Early in the year the Guild assisted by kind friends gave a literary entertainment entitled "Homes and Haunts of Burns," which required a good deal of profitable preparation, and which was enjoyed by the public. Our thanks are due for all assistance rendered, but *especially* to Miss Annie Davidson, who may be said to have carried the *whole* thing successfully through. The sum of \$67.11 was realized and of this the Guild placed a cheque for \$60 on the collection plate on Anniversary Sunday.

The Dorcas Section is still presided over by Miss Smith, ever indefatigable and alive to her work. It consists of ten members—Mrs. Mackie, Mrs. Gillie, Mrs. O. J. Hickey, Mrs. Reid, Mrs. Hopkirk, Mrs. W. Wells and the Misses Minnes, Spankie, Connor and McGuin. Their work, as is now well known, is specially on behalf of the poor of the church, that through want of clothing grown up people may not be prevented from attending public worship, and children kept away from Sabbath School. In addition to this pure charity they execute orders from busy homes, thereby earning a little to buy needed materials for the poor.

In addition to a great deal of mending and patching during the year the following list of articles made will give a somewhat fair idea of what the Section has done:—28 flannel skirts, 16 flannel shirts, 66 aprons, 32 pairs sleeve protectors, 17 pinafores, 8 skirts, 15 fancy bags, 3 pairs mitts, 10 pairs boys drawers, 2 blouse waists, 1 pair pants, 1 sailor suit for boy, 3 night shirts, 2 hats trimmed, 4 pairs bloomers, 3 dresses, 2 under-waists, and 12 comforters for St. Andrew's Ward.

In the spring of the year they had a small sale, from which they realized \$52. From their earnings they gave \$10 on Anniversary Sunday, and \$25 to the Floating Debt.

The Hospital Section, with Miss Hudgins as the unwearied Convener, has prosecuted its work with unabated vigour and interest. In the General Hospital all Presbyterian patients are sought out and kindly ministered to, and many a stranger is thus cheered during the time of suffering.

The House of Providence and the House of Industry have also been regularly visited, but we regret to report that the Hotel Dieu has been closed against us by the Superioress, and that her action received the approbation of the priest in charge. It is only right to add that the doctors. Roman Catholic as well as Protestant, expressed their desire that our visits should be continued, and that their letters to this effect were submitted to the priest (Rev. Mr. Kelly) but without avail.

Rockwood Hospital has been in the sole charge of Mrs. Marshall and Mrs. Mason, who are deeply interested in the work there, feeling that it is needed and having the satisfaction of knowing that it is appreciated. They have kept up the weekly meetings throughout the year without any interruptions, and the patients who attend them look forward to them as sunny hours in their lives.

The Social Section has attended to all the friendly meetings and gatherings that were held. In union with the Women's Home Association they gave the Congregational Social after Anniversary Sunday and at the close of the year they had an "At Home" for the young people of the church, which was largely attended.

We regret to report that Miss Alice Fisher, the genial Convener of this Section for the year, had to resign office on her leaving for Washington. She will be missed in the Guild as an amiable and active member. The V and coul sympath through sponding Such i that we est wish clearly n In n
