ANSWER.—J. Dent. He was born at Cropwell, near Nottingham, England, November 18th, 1821; was blessed in his youth with a pious education, made the subject of God's converting grace in the year 1843. Engaging almost at once in the work of calling sinners to repentance, as a Local Preacher, he served the Church in this honorable capacity for a period of ten years. In 1854 he offered himself to the Missionary Committee for the Canadian work; was accepted and entered on his duties in this country in the fall of the same year. He labored successfully on the London, Yorkville and Welland Canal Circuits; was well received, and promised to be of great service to us as a community. He was seized with his last illness in the midst of a glorious work of God, on the last mentioned Circuit, and the impression is general that his end was hastened by his too arduous exertions in the work to which he had given himself. He died March 3, 1857. Bro. Dent was possessed of a most gentle and amiable disposition; as a student, he was thoughtful and industrious; as a preacher, he was eminently practical; his great aim was to save souls; nor was he allowed to labor in vain or spend his strength for nought; though his career was short, it was successful, and by his consistent and devoted life, he has left behind him a savor which many will long love to cherish.

- IV. That the Rev. J. C. Watts be Conference Reporter.
- V. That the Morris Circuit be divided into three Circuits, to be called, respectively, the Clinton, Morris, and Grey Circuits.
- VI. That the Nassagaweya Circuit be divided into two Circuits, to be called, respectively, the Nassagaweya and Nelson Circuits.
- VII. That the Brock Circuit be divided into two Circuits, to be called, respectively, the Brock and Uxbridge Circuits, to be bounded thus:—
The Brock Circuit to consist of the Lloyd, Georgiana, Sutton, King, Lion, Cannington, Beaverton and Colter's Corners' Appointments.
The Uxbridge Circuit to embrace the Providence, Reach, Uxbridge, Randall's, Bear's and Nelson Appointments.
- VIII. That this Conference having heard with much satisfaction the statements of Rev. G. Pegler and Rev. J. A. Swallow, the Deputation from the Rochester Wesleyan Methodist Conference, recently held at Jamestown, New York, and rejoicing to learn that kindred objects and similar principles of church government prove our church and theirs to be substantially one, we cordially reciprocate this fraternal interchange of sympathy, contending as we do for liberty to our Ministers and our people, among whom we recognize no Lordship arising from either office or color; for we are all one in Christ Jesus.

IX. That in order to give a practical expression to our appreciation of the kindness of our Wesleyan friends in New York, we now appoint Brethren McClure and Goldsmith as a deputation to the next Annual Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Connexion, to be held at Hope-well, in that State, on the 4th Wednesday in April, 1858.

X. That the following Brethren be the Stationing Committee:—Rev. J. Bell and J. Caswell, with Brothers G. Clemens, J. Eddy and J. Leggett.

XI. That this Conference gives full power to the Trustees of Park Lot No. 7, in the Township of Derby, County of Grey, Province of Canada, to dispose of that property in any way they may see fit, for Connexional purposes.

XII. That the application of a number of friends in Stanstead, for the services of one of our Ministers, be entertained, and that Stanstead be placed on the list of our Missions, to be called the "Stanstead Mission," and that the Stationing Committee be instructed to see it, if possible, suitably supplied.

XIII. That it is high time some measure be adopted by which to secure more fully the Religious Instruction and Training of the Youth of our Connexion. This Conference therefore recommends, that wherever it shall be found practicable to do so, our Ministers set apart an evening of the week or of the Sabbath, to give religious instruction to the children of our people, and to circulate widely our Catechisms among them. And further,—That Reports be made by our Ministers to the District Meetings, as to the result of their Catechetical Instructions.

XIV. That the Superintendents of Circuits report the Sabbath Schools, under their care, to the Secretary of the Sabbath School Teachers' Convention, to be held at _____ and that our Ministers be recommended to attend such Convention.

XV. That the Rev. W. McClure be appointed to inquire into the present state of our Sabbath Schools, and that it shall be his duty to recommend some plan of Tuition and usefulness, including Catechetical instruction, Libraries, Reading Societies, Bible Classes, occasional Lectures, Tem-

That in the opinion of this Conference it is extremely desirable that our General Superintendent be at liberty to attend much more fully to the special duties of his honorable position; and the Stationing Committee is therefore strongly recommended, if in their judgment consistent with the highest good of the Connexion, to release him from the full responsibilities and duties of a Circuit charge.

XVII. That the following Brethren be a Committee, to be called the Publishing Committee, who shall have the direction of the Finances of the *Evangelical Witness*, and be empowered to devise plans for its continuance or abandonment, viz.:—Revds. the President of the Conference, J. H. Robinson, W. McClure, D. Savage, with Dr. Salter, E. McPhail, J. Hartman, J. Foster and J. Dobson, Esquires. The Committee to meet in Toronto, in the month of Sept'r next. The President of the Conference to be Chairman. That the *Witness* be published semi-monthly for the current year.

That the Editor of the *Witness* have a seat in our Annual Conference. That the best thanks of this Conference be given to the Rev. J. H. Robinson, for the valuable services he has rendered the Connexion as Editor of our paper, and that he be appointed to the same office for the ensuing year. That J. Hartman, Esquire, represent the *Witness* in our next Conference.

XVIII. That the best thanks of this Conference be given to Dr. Salter, of London, for his valuable assistance in conducting the *Witness* during the absence of the Rev. J. H. Robinson.

XIX. That the Statistics of each District be prepared by the Secretary of the District Meeting, in a regular District form, and presented to the Conference by the Chairman of the District.

XX. That the Resolutions and Recommendations of our District Meetings, as well as the Spiritual state of the

Districts, be presented to the Conference by the Chairman of each District,

XXI. From a deep sense of the evils resulting from the traffic in Alcoholic drinks, this Conference reiterate its former sentiments on the Temperance Question, and would recommend all our members to adhere strictly to the principles of Total Abstinence.

XXII. That in view of the continued and increasing use of Tobacco, in various forms, amongst the Ministers and Membership of our community, and feeling deeply convinced that the habit is both unnecessary, wasteful, and seriously pernicious in its effects, both on body and mind, we earnestly urge on all associated with us in Church Fellowship, the duty of discountenancing it in every quarter, both by example and precept.

XXIII. That we very deeply lament the great loss the Connexion has sustained by the early and unanticipated removal, by death, of our dear Brother, the Rev. John Dent, while in the very prime of life, in the active employment of superior and sanctified talents, as a Minister of Jesus Christ, and in the midst of a very gracious work on his Circuit. In the presence of this solemn Providence, we adore and tremble, and would tender our prayerful sympathies to his bereaved wife and family.

XXIV. That the collections for our various funds be taken up on all our Circuits, in the following order:—Beneficent Fund in the months of July or August. Pastoral Fund, as per Discipline, between October and Jan'y. Chapel Fund in the month of March or April.

XXV. That the following Brethren be a Committee to draw up a plan for the more effective training of the Young Men raised amongst us, and called out into the ministry of our body, viz: Rev. W. McClure, J. C. Watts and D. Savage.

ADDRESS

TO THE

MEMBERS OF THE CANADIAN WESLEYAN
METHODIST NEW CONNEXION CHURCH.

BRETHREN,—

BELOVED IN THE LORD,—We rejoice to send you from our Annual Assembly, the salutation of holy love; grace, mercy and peace, from God our Father, and from our Lord Jesus Christ, rest upon you, upon your households, and upon the whole Israel of God. We bless God for that large measure of grace which has rested on all our assemblies during our sittings, nor do we fail to recognize in this very thing, that you have us and our work upon your hearts, always in your prayers to God making mention of us, and not less so when we are absent from you; the unity of the church in believing prayer, is the centre of all stability and the guaranty of unfailing progress; be, therefore, our supplications united, and “without ceasing.”

On many of our Circuits, outpourings of the Holy Spirit have descended on several occasions during the year; our people have been greatly encouraged, and many souls have been born again; while others have been powerfully drawn out in pursuit of the blessing of perfect holiness of heart, and complete salvation from the miseries of doubt, instability of love, the slavery of sensuality and prevailing worldliness. To be established and strengthened, rooted and grounded and settled in love, is at once your and our duty, our only safety, our highest honor and ornament.

Our rejoicings, however, are mingled with sadness, because all our churches have not been equally favored by revivals, we painfully feel there must be a cause, and that “it cannot in the Saviour be. Witness the streaming blood.” We would therefore implore the brethren on those Circuits where no progress has been made, as well as those where actual falling off has taken place, to humble themselves before the Lord, “for he

delighteth in mercy," and take every congregation and every class, and every family, and every individual, so as to know in whose tent the "wedge of gold, and the Babylonish garment" is hid, that you may purge out and put away the accursed thing from among you, for why should God's Israel be beaten down and slain by the men of Ai? "Awake thou that sleepest, and arise from the dead, and Christ will give thee light."

Our hearts have been saddened by the very unexpected death of our dear brother, J. Dent. Warmly attached to our people, naturally gifted for the work of the ministry, and deeply baptized with the Holy Spirit, we had hoped for many years of efficient service in his work; but the Master hath come, and called him from labors to rest—from earth to Heaven; and just when he was fully occupied in a protracted service at Pelham, amid the songs of the saved, the groans of the penitent and surprise of the awakened sinner; he passed away to take part with the Angels of God, who sing over the penitents at Pelham, and the entry of their overworked ministers in the Sanctuary above.

In the summing up of the present state of our beloved Connexion we find an advance in nearly every department, and although the increase of actual membership is small, not amounting to 200, the number on trial is large, and to fold these safely and early in the year with the flock of Christ should engage our earnest and active solicitude. Our progress in Chapel building has been very important, both as it respects the localities where they have been erected, and the character of the buildings themselves; the friends in those localities deserve our hearty commendations for their zeal and enterprise and liberality, and we do hope and urge it on all our people to stand by them in their labor of love, cheerfully sharing with them your kindest sympathies and your utmost liberality, "for with what measure ye mete, it shall be measured to you again." We are happy to inform the brethren that although our pecuniary engagements for the past year were greater than on any former year, for support to weak and destitute Circuits and Missions, while our only means of meeting those engagements depended entirely on the amount of our missionary contributions, yet never on any former year did our community provide us with so large a sum. This is especially important and cheering, because of the very high prices of all our markets, together with the depression in every branch of business, the difficulties in the money market, and the heavy losses sustained by so many thousands, spreading as it has over the whole community a depressing gloom. The widening and whitening fields around us, while awakening our praise to the Lamb, at the same time deepen our solicitations and tax all our means to provide suitable laborers. In consequence of the exertions of our Gen. Superintendent in England this spring, on behalf of our Canadian Churches and Missions, we hope by the end of July to have six or seven young men added to our number of ministers; these, with three or four who have come forward in this country, will, we trust, greatly increase the efficiency of our churches; still our actual wants are not yet supplied. "Pray ye therefore, the Lord of the harvest, that he would send forth laborers into his harvest; the harvest indeed is plenteous, but the laborers are few." It does seem to our judgments that our beloved people have not yet so fully appreciated as they should, that it is from your *own* house and of your own most loved and valued sons, our classes, and congregations, must be supplied with the most efficient leaders and teachers of the people. We covet intensely your Moses, your Samuels, your Josephs, and your Timothies, for our Lord's work; who among you is willing this day to consecrate his, *her* lamb, a free will offering to God? May He accept your cherished treasure.

The Wesleyan Methodist Church of America have again stretched out to us the hand of brotherly unity, by sending over to our Conference a deputation,—the Rev. J. Pegler, President of the Rochester Conference, N. Y., and the Rev. J. Swallow. Bro. Pegler gave Conference an interesting account of the rise, progress, and present condition of the community in the States; he also preached an excellent discourse on the Thursday evening. Conference heartily reciprocating this brotherly kindness, and recognizing in their polity the leading features which so distinctly characterize our own, a deputation, viz: the President of Conference, and William McClure, was appointed to visit their Conference next spring.

On the Sabbath evening, four young men, having completed their probation of four years, were received into full connexion, while a fifth was also ordained for special purposes. The large Church was crowded, and the various narratives of conversion, religious experience, and call into the ministry, were deeply interesting, and impressive. At the close of the service Bro. W. McClure gave the charge,—may these young men "give full proof of their ministry," and be eminently "wise to win souls."

In the consideration of many subjects brought under our

review, and on which a great diversity of opinion was elicited not a single breach of brotherly love disfigured any of our debates, while from all our Circuits stability and increasing attachment to our beloved community came to our knowledge. For this we thank God, and take courage. "Brethren, *guard* this sacred unity; cultivate with every care this love; bear with firm and steady shoulders the '*Cross*,' resolve to toil, to endure to the end; pant after entire holiness of heart. Oh, hold *this* standard high, and the very God of peace shall be with you, and we pray God that your whole spirit, and soul, and body, may be preserved blameless unto the day of his coming; faithful is he who hath promised, he will also do it."
