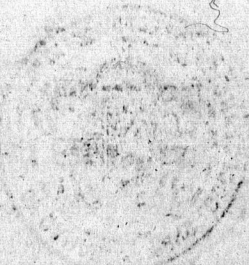

The Grand Lodge was opened in *Form*, at 1.30 p. m.

The Acting Grand Master then announced the object of convening this Grand Lodge, which was for the purpose of laying, with Masonic ceremonies, the corner-stone of "Christ Church," now being erected in the city of Belleville.

The brethren were then formed in procession by the Acting Grand Director of Ceremonies, and marched from the Masonic Hall to the site of the church, where the procession halted and opened out, facing inwards, when the Acting Grand Officers passed through to the north-east corner of the intended structure, where a spacious platform had been erected for their convenience.

The procession was accompanied by the band of the "15th Battalion Argyle Light Infantry," and the Oddfellows' band, and was witnessed by a large number of spectators along the line of march.

After the Grand Officers had ascended the platform, the Acting Grand Master delivered the following address:—

Men and brethren assembled here to-day to behold this ceremony: Know all of you, that we are lawful Masons, true to the laws of our country, professing to fear God the Great Architect of the Universe, to honor the Queen, to confer benefits

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upon our brethren, and to practice benevolence to all mankind. We have among us, concealed from the outside world, secrets which may not be revealed, but these secrets are honorable and in no way repugnant to either the laws of God or man. They were wisely and safely entrusted to the Freemasons of ancient times, and having been faithfully transmitted to us, it is our duty to convey them unimpaired to future generations. Our duties as Masons are, first, a reverence for the Most High God, and a strict obedience to His most holy will and word; obedience to the laws of the country in which we may reside; and, lastly, brotherly love, charity and truth to our fellow-men. On these grand principles has our Order been founded and reared up. It is limited to no sect, rank or nationality. Masonry, from its inherent goodness, has been diffused over the face of the habitable globe, and is patronized by all ranks. Its aims are, as far as human aid can effect, to promote peace and good-will by inculcating lessons of kindness and courtesy to all, in soothing the roughness of our temper and in refraining from allowing differences of opinion to disturb our worst passions. The Bible, ever open in our lodge, teaches us the duty we owe to our Creator and likewise to our fellow-men. It inspires us with awe and reverence for the Great Architect of the Universe; it directs us to practice truth, justice and charity to all alike. Unless the Craft were good and the calling honorable, it could not have lasted for so many centuries, nor should we have been honored with the patronage of so many great and illustrious men of all ages, who have ever been ready and willing to promote our interests and defend us from all adversaries. We are assembled here to-day, in the presence of you all, to lay the foundation stone of this edifice, which is to be dedicated to the service of God. May the work prosper to completion, and may the word preached within these walls be instrumental in bringing many from darkness unto light, and finally lead them to that great congregation above, where the world's Great Architect lives and reigns forever.

The 15th Batt. band then played "Old Hundred."

The Acting Grand Chaplain, R. W. Bro. Rev. Dr. Clarke, offered up the following prayer:—

"O, Thou Great Architect of the Universe, Maker and Ruler of all things, visible and invisible, vouchsafe from thy Heavenly Temple to help us in all the purposes of our present assembly; and grant unto us, at this and at all times, wisdom in all our doings, strength of mind in all our difficulties, and the beauty of harmony in all our communications, to the end that we may set forth thy glory, illustrate eternal truth in all our works; and exhibit in our own lives rectitude of aim, humility of deportment, and purity of character. Permit us, O, Thou Author of life and light, great and only source of love and happiness, to erect this our earthly temple to thine honor, to the public good, and to the salvation of those who may worship Thee therein, so that hereafter this edifice may subserve the sacred use for which it is intended. Grant this, Father of all, for the sake of thy Great name. Glory be to God on high."

The Acting Grand Secretary, W. Bro. W. L. Hamilton, read the following scroll:—

The corner-stone of this Christ Church was laid by R. W. Bro. L. H. Henderson, P. D. D. G. M. of Prince Edward District.

Attended and assisted by an Especial Grand Lodge of Freemasons of Canada, and various lodges and brethren—  
Whom may God prosper!

The scroll was then deposited in the casket, which contains the following newspapers:—The *Intelligencer* and *Ontario*, of Belleville; the *Mail, Globe, Evangelical Churchman*, and *Dominion Churchman*, of Toronto; and the *Daily News*, of Kingston.

The current coins of the Dominion of Canada, namely—50 cents, 25 cents, 10 cents, 5 cents, and 1 cent.

The presentation of the trowel to the Acting Grand Master was then proceeded with, the presentation being made by Mr. J. W. Dunnet, Chairman of the Building Committee. The trowel is a very handsome one; the plate is of silver, richly chased, and the handle of ebony. The following inscription was engraved on the plate:—



PRESENTED TO

In making the presentation Mr. Dunnet said:—

RIGHT WORSHIPFUL SIR,—The Building Committee of Christ Church, through me, present you with this trowel, not only in commemoration of the important work to which you and your brethren have so kindly lent their aid to-day, but also as a slight testimonial of their high esteem for you personally. They trust that while the church which is to be erected rests upon the foundation which you lay, the Church within its walls may rest upon that sure foundation which is laid in Zion by the Maker and Builder of all things.

The stone was then lowered into its place, with the usual ceremonies, the Acting Grand Master saying:—"I spread this cement as an emblem of that cement of peace and good-will which I trust will ever prevail in the sacred edifice to be erected; and may its heaven pointed spire remind the congregation, under God's blessing, of the mansions of bliss from which all good emanates."

The Acting Deputy Grand Master, Senior and Junior Wardens, having performed their respective duties, the Acting Grand Master struck the stone three times with the gavel and said;—"Well made, truly laid, true and trusty, may this undertaking be conducted and completed according to the Grand Plan, in peace, harmony, and brotherly love. So mote it be."

The corn, wine, and oil was then poured upon the stone,

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the Acting Grand Master saying:—"I strew corn upon the stone as an emblem of plenty; I pour wine upon it as an emblem of cheerfulness; and I anoint it with oil as an emblem of comfort and consolation. May corn, wine and oil, and all the necessaries of life, abound among men, and may the blessing of the Supreme Architect of the Universe be upon this edifice and all connected with it."

Response—"So mote it be."

The plans having been presented to the Acting Grand Master, he presented them to the architect, saying:—

"The foundation stone of this building being now laid, I present to you the implements applied to it, also the plans, in full confidence that as a skilful workman you will use them in such a manner that the building will be perfected and will rise in harmony, beauty and strength."

He also addressed the Rev. Incumbent as follows:—

"Having completed our work according to ancient usage, I now wish that every success may attend your and the congregation's endeavors, that as the work has been happily begun it will, with God's blessing, be carried to a happy ending. May I remark that when on the chancel arch you will emblazon that prophetic sentence, 'Glory to God in the Highest, and peace on earth, good-will towards men,' you will remember that written within our mystic halls we have inscribed in letters of gold, on the cope stone of the arch and on the pillars, these words of far greater antiquity, 'Holiness to the Lord, Brotherly Love, Relief and Truth'; and then your parishioners and our brethren are alike reminded of their duty to God and man."

The procession was then re-formed, and returned to the Masonic Hall, when Grand Lodge was closed in *form*.

The Grand Lodge was opened in *Simple Form* at half-past one o'clock afternoon, in the lodge-room of King Hiram Lodge 87, and St. John's Lodge 68, Ingersoll, and from thence the brethren proceeded in carriages to the site of the proposed church, near Salford, when the procession was re-formed, the ranks opened out, and faced inwards, and the Grand Master, supported by the Grand Officers, passed through to the north-east corner.

Bro. James McIntyre, Acting Grand Chaplain, then offered up the following prayer:—

Great Architect of the Universe, Maker and Ruler of all worlds, deign from Thy Celestial Temple, from realms of light and glory, to help us in all the purposes of this present assembly. We humbly invoke Thee to give us, at this and all times, wisdom in our doings, strength of mind in all our difficulties, and the beauty of harmony in all our communications. Permit us, O Thou Author of Life and Light, Great Source of love and happiness, to erect this church set apart for Thy glory and honor, designed in wisdom, raised in strength, and finished in beauty. May we all be characterized by faith in God, hope unfailling, and charity toward all.

The Grand Secretary then deposited the scroll in the cavity of the stone, together with sundry documents, papers and coins.

The Pastor of the Church, the Rev. David Hunt, then presented to the Grand Master a very handsome trowel, bearing the following inscription:—

The Grand Master then addressed those present, after which the brethren were hospitably entertained by the ladies of the congregation.

The brethren then returned to the lodge-room at Ingersoll, and Grand Lodge was closed in *Simple Form*.

The Grand Lodge was opened in *Imple Soth* at half past one o'clock afternoon, in the Lodge-room of Norfolk Lodge No. 10, and from thence the brethren marched in procession, preceded by the Band of the 89th<sup>th</sup> Battalion, to the site of the proposed church.

The front of the procession having reached the site, a halt was made, and the ranks opened out, and faced inwards, when the Grand Master, supported by the Grand Officers, passed through to the North-east corner, where a platform had been erected for their convenience. It had been arranged that the Church of England Service should take place first, and accordingly, as soon as the Grand Master had been received and

welcomed, the proceedings were commenced by the Rev. W. B. Evans, M.A., reading the 87th Psalm, followed by the Rev. John Gemley, M.A., who read part of the sixteenth chapter of the Gospel according to St. Matthew.

The last named gentleman, after expressing his pleasure and thankfulness at the presence of the honorable Order, and remarking that not being yet a Mason, he could not as fully appreciate their kindness, said:—

“In the services and ceremony of this day in connection with Trinity Church, we have to observe that in some respects this is the third ceremony in connection with the first building erected for divine service according to the custom and usages of the Church of England in Simcoe. The old church, the last of which has been removed to give place to the edifice now in process of erection, was built in the year 1849. Prior to that date the services were conducted in a school-house in the town. The erection of the chancel and the transepts, which are to form a part of the new structure, took place in the year 1860. The ceremony of to-day is, from the reasons just given, historically, and in fact, connected with the old that has gone, and to the addition yet remaining, and which will be to the new as it was to the old, that portion of the sacred edifice in which the most solemn rites and services, and the sacraments, will continue to be observed. In a sense scarcely noticeable unless by architect, builder or workman, the old church will yet be found in the new, as many of the venerable and well-tried bricks of the old walls will have their share in the solidity and strength of the new. Thus, like latent virtues, they serve a valuable and useful purpose, though concealed, save in some of their effects, from the glance of the passing traveller. So may the virtues of the living stones, now no more on earth, continue in their moral influence and power to aid those who yet remain. The first Rector—that is, of the Parish of Woodhouse, in which the church in the town of Simcoe was embraced—was the late

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Rev. Dr. Evans. He entered upon his duties in 1828, and after a faithful and zealous ministry of thirty years, was called to his reward in 1858. The next Rector was the late Rev. Canon Grasett, who commenced his labors in Simcoe in 1859, and was summoned to his fathers in 1879, after twenty years' service. The present Rector of Woodhouse, Rev. W. B. Evans, son of the first Rector, is with us to day and taking part in the services. Your present Rector is therefore, strictly speaking, the first Rector of Simcoe. We ask at least the moral support of all who now hear us—first, because the new church will be an improvement upon the old, and in addition to those buildings in this beautiful little town, which give evidence of architectural taste, three beautiful memorial windows will be constructed, thus making four, to adorn the new church; second, it will be comfortable, as regards heating and lighting, and will be the first church building in Simcoe to be lighted with gas. The ladies of the congregation are entering heartily into the internal comforts of the church, and, from the work they have already done, they have shown themselves both generous and judicious, and of exceeding good taste. The organ has been made new, or perhaps better than new. The public will be heartily welcomed in the new, as they were in the old. The pews will be free at the Sunday evening services. He cordially welcomed every denomination to visit Trinity Church whenever they had an opportunity, and concluded by praying that the blessing of God might rest upon all connected with the work in which they were about to engage.

W. Bro. John Wilson, M. D., Mayor of the town, and Mas-  
 ter of Norfolk Lodge, then presented the Grand Master, on  
 behalf of the brethren, with a beautiful specimen of the silver-



smith's handiwork, which bore the following inscription:—  
 "Presented to James Moffat, Esq., M. W. Grand Master A. F. & A. Masons of Canada, on the occasion of laying the corner-stone of Trinity Church, Simcoe, Dominion Day, 1st July, 1882."

The Grand Master, on receiving the trowel, said he accepted it with pleasure, as a memento of this day's proceedings. It was an important implement of masonry, both from an operative and a speculative point of view. He purposed using it at the present time as an operative Mason, to spread the cement which was calculated to bind the building into one common mass, and would immediately apply it to that purpose.

The cement having been spread, the upper stone was lowered with three halts, at which intervals the band played bars of the National Anthem. When it had been guided into its proper place, the principal Grand Officers applied the plumb, rule, level and square, and having reported that the stone was just, true and properly laid, the Grand Master struck the stone three times with the gavel, and said:—Well made, truly laid, true and trusty. May this undertaking be conducted and completed by the craftsmen according to the Grand Plan in peace, harmony and brotherly love. Corn, Wine and Oil were poured upon the stone with symbolical explanations, and the Grand Master entrusted to the architect and builders the tools and plans with which to complete the building.

The M. W. the Grand Master, then delivered the following address:—Reverend Sir, men and women here assembled to-day—Many of you are here, no doubt, through curiosity to see what is to be seen and hear what is to be said. Know you, then, that we are lawful Masons, true to the laws of our country, and established of old, with peace and honor in most countries; to do good to our brethren and fellow creatures; to assist in the erection of buildings, and to fear God, who is the great Architect of all things. We have, indeed, certain

secrets not to be revealed, but these secrets are lawful and honorable, and unless our Craft were good and our calling honest, we should not have existed for so many centuries, or have had so many illustrious men ever ready to sanction our proceedings and contribute to our prosperity. We feel that our Ancient Order is founded upon the purest principles of piety and virtue, and that it inculcates the carrying out of those golden precepts:—"Do unto others as you would they should do unto you," and "love your neighbor as yourself." In all ages, Masons have borne their part in the erection of stately edifices, but in none do they take so much interest as in those intended for the public worship of God, the promulgation of His wise and just laws and commands, and the making known His most inexhaustible mercies. To operative Masons the corner, or foundation stone, of every building is of primary importance, and as Freemasons we call the attention of every newly-made brother to its symbolical meaning, and tell him that on his admittance he figuratively represents that stone, and that we trust he will, on the foundation then and there laid, raise a superstructure perfect in all its parts, honorable to our ancient institution and creditable to himself. To-day we are here assembled by request to assist in the interesting ceremony of laying, with appropriate forms and according to ancient custom, the corner-stone of this new church. And, while admiring the energy of its promoters, we pray God to prosper the undertaking, if it seems to Him good, and may His blessing rest upon all who worship within its walls. May the pastor who officiates be the means of winning souls to Christ, and may we one and all perform with diligence our allotted tasks while it is yet day, and so conduct ourselves that we may be admitted to the Grand Lodge above, where the Grand Architect of the Universe reigns for ever and ever. He then introduced the Grand Chaplain,

R. W. Bro. Evans Davis, M.A., of London South, who, in

the course of an exceedingly fervent and timely address; said:—

I need hardly say I feel very much pleasure in being able to take part in the pleasant ceremonies of the day; but fear, from the very flattering remarks of the Grand Master with reference to myself, I may not be able to gratify your expectations. However, I can truly say I take a deep interest in the welfare and prosperity of our ancient Order. I stand before you to-day, not only as an officer of the Grand Lodge, but as a minister of the Gospel of Christ—one whose duty and privilege it is to make known the unsearchable riches of our God and Saviour. To both of these institutions I am bound by the most solemn vows, by ties the strongest and most sacred. I can truly say I am proud of the position I occupy in the venerable Church of which I am a member, and also in the God-honored institution of Ancient, Free and Accepted Masons, under whose auspices the corner-stone of this house of prayer has now been laid. For my own part, I cannot separate the teachings and principles of one from the other. I make bold to say that he who is a good and true Freemason, practicing the principles taught in every degree, will be a better man, and more useful in the sphere of life in which it may please God to place him. (Applause.) Freemasonry teaches us the great fatherhood of God and the great brotherhood of man—that we should love, reverence and obey His word and will. Then the trowel teaches us to spread the cement of brotherly love—as has been justly said, to remember we are God's children, placed here to help and assist one another. To the brethren of the fraternity, I would urgently request them so to live that no disgrace may be brought upon themselves or upon our noble Order. The eyes of the world are upon you. Show that you are men of honor. Let the grand principles of brotherly love, relief and truth be exhibited in your daily lives and actions, so that it may be seen that Freemasonry is a living reality. It shall thus stand for ages to come, as it has for centuries past, the admiration of the

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world. Many widows have had reason to bless God for the benevolent doings of our members, and many helpless orphans have been raised from ignorance and despair to occupy a position alike honorable to themselves and to those of our Order who cared for them. (Cheers.) While Freemasonry is not religion, yet it truly is its handmaid, and to-day rejoices in this work of erecting a temple to the honor of God and of his Christ. May the blessing of the Almighty rest upon the work thus so auspiciously commenced; may God protect and defend every workman who may be engaged in its erection from accident; may He bless, defend and prosper the minister here in holy things; may many precious souls come within its sacred walls, and be drawn from the world and sin to Christ the Saviour; may every blessing rest upon the ministers and officers who are thus engaged in this great and good work. Brethren and friends, let us learn from the history of Solomon's Temple a lesson of importance. The material for that grand structure was prepared far away from where it was erected, so that not a hammer was heard nor chisel used as the stones were fitted together. So in the spiritual temple. Our souls must be prepared here, as stones for the temple above. Your lambskin apron is symbolical of purity. You are taught in your initiatory degrees to keep yourselves unsullied from the vices of the world, and thereby the better fit yourselves for the spiritual building not made with hands, eternal in the heavens. Let us endeavor to profit by the lessons taught us, and may the gavel be used frequently to strike off the rough edges, and may we one and all, at last, be welcomed into the Father's home above for Christ's dear namesake.

Three hearty cheers were then given at the command of the Grand Master for the Queen, and subsequently by the brethren for the Grand Master.

The Most Worshipful the Grand Master delivered an impromptu reply, in the course of which he regretted that he had not had an opportunity of perusing the address of welcome, so as to be better enabled to reply to its sentiments. He accepted the address as an expression of the loyalty of London Masons to the Grand Lodge, and felt sure that the officers and members of this body would receive a hearty welcome from the eight hundred brethren of the Mystic Tie in this, the Forest City. Speaking of the Temple, the G. M. referred with feelings of joyfulness to the public spiritedness and enterprise manifested by the London Brethren in erecting



such a handsome and substantial structure, and contrasted the improvements made by the Craft in the short space of two years in carrying out to a successful termination the erection and fitting up of such a building as that in which the Grand Lodge was convened. Reference was then made to the benefits of the system of holding the meetings of the Grand Lodge in different cities of the jurisdiction, and to the hearty support his predecessors and himself had given to the continuance of the same. He cordially thanked the Masters of the city Lodges for the personal allusions contained in their address. It showed that, notwithstanding his residence of thirty-seven years and upwards in London, and the filling of important municipal and other public positions, he still retained their respect as a Mason, and he trusted that he might ever conduct himself so as to merit their friendship and goodwill. He spoke of the progress of the city since the last meeting of the Grand Lodge held in 1875, and concluded a neat speech, extending his most cordial thanks to the London craft on behalf of the Grand Lodge for the honor they had done them in welcoming them by such a timely address.

#### GRAND MASTER'S ADDRESS.

The Most Worshipful the Grand Master delivered the following address to the Brethren assembled in Grand Communication :—

BRETHREN OF GRAND LODGE :

Another year has passed away, and many of our brethren, not only in our own jurisdiction, but in others, have passed away with it, reminding us who are left that we too must soon give place to others. We are, however, permitted to assemble

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as a Grand Lodge, as has been the custom annually, to deliberate together for the good of our beloved institution. May the Great Architect of the Universe direct and guide our deliberations, so that they may tend to His glory and the advancement of the Order we should all have so much at heart.

## DEATHS.

The past year has witnessed the loss of many brethren in our own as well as in other jurisdictions. As will be seen by a reference to our last year's proceedings, my predecessor in his address alluded to the attempt that had been made to assassinate the President of the United States, expressing a hope that his life might still be spared. That hope was echoed by millions, not only on this continent, but throughout the civilized world, Alas! that hope, for reasons only known to an all-wise Providence, was not realized. On the 9th of last September he died, but his memory will live to the latest posterity. His death is a sad commentary upon the boasted civilization of the nineteenth century: to think that the Chief Magistrate of a country where millions of the human race have found homes (with all that the word implies), and shelter from the oppressors of other lands, could be ruthlessly shot down by a fiend in human shape is past all understanding; but so it is, our brother has gone where the wicked cease from troubling, and the weary are at rest.

In our own jurisdiction during the year we have lost by death a number of valuable brethren, members who will be greatly missed from our annual communications, and with whom we have been in the habit of associating for many years.

On Friday, Jan. 13, 1882, M. W. Bro. Thomas Douglas Harrington, P. G. M., died at his residence, in Prescott. Our brother was taken away very suddenly—one momentary pang, and all was over. His age was seventy-four and Masonic age thirty-nine. On Tuesday, the 17th January, as Grand

Master, I was present at the funeral, and took charge of the ceremonies, assisted by three Past Grand Masters of the Grand Lodge of Canada, M. W. Bros. Simpson, Seymour and Stevenson, and the Grand Secretary, R. W. Bro Mason. Other distinguished Masons from a distance were present, including the Hon. Judge Badgely, of Montreal, Provincial Grand Master of the Grand Lodge of England. The A. & A. Scottish Rite was represented by R. W. Bro. Murton and a deputation from Hamilton; and the Knights Templar by the Great Prior, Col. J. B. McLeod Moore, an old esteemed friend of the deceased. There were other Masons from Toronto, Ottawa, Montreal; and two Lodges, one Chapter and one Commandery of Knights Templar belonging to Ogdensburg, showing the love and fraternal esteem in which the memory of our departed Past Grand Master was held. To all those Masons in our own and the sister jurisdictions, and to the W. M., Wardens, and brethren of the Prescott Lodge, I tender in the name of the Grand Lodge of Canada my warmest thanks.

On the 26th of December, 1881, I received a telegram from Hamilton, informing me that the funeral of R. W. Bro. Chauncey Bennett, P. D. D. G. M., would take place from the Masonic Hall, Hamilton, on the following Tuesday afternoon. And, again, on the 5th May, another notice of the death at his residence, in Hamilton, of R. W. Bro. Meakins, P. D. D. G. M. Previous engagements prevented me attending either of these funerals. I have, however, been informed that both funerals were largely attended by the fraternity—indeed, I should have thought it strange had it been otherwise, for no two brothers in our jurisdiction were better known for their geniality and brotherly feeling.

Bro. Bennett we have not met at our annual communications for some years, in consequence of a distressing complaint, which was known to be past human aid. Not so with

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Bro. Meakins. His sickness was sharp and short, and his genial face we shall all miss at our meetings.

On the 5th May, 1882, Bro. Donald Currie, a member of Tuscan Lodge, No. 195, London, was buried by that Lodge. He was called away very suddenly, and quite unexpectedly. He, too, has left behind him many mourning friends who can scarcely realize the fact that he is gone. Bro. Currie was a Mason of the right stamp, quiet and unassuming; content to labor in any position he could do the most good. He could always be relied upon if charity, the good Mason's pride, was required.

Thus it is, brethren, "in the midst of life we are in death." Let these lessons admonish us who are left, to be prepared to follow our departed brethren.

I am also notified of the death of R. W. Bro. Geo. S. Blackie, our Representative near the Grand Lodge of Tennessee, U. S.—June 19th, 1881.

And of R. W. Bro. J. M. Austin, Grand Secretary of Grand Lodge of New York.—December 8rd, 1881.

And of R. W. Bro. C. W. Paterson, Past Grand Chaplain of the Grand Lodge of Canada.—October 7th, 1881.

The deaths I have mentioned above are all that have come under my notice, or that have been reported. Doubtless, others will be reported upon by the District Deputy Grand Masters.

From the assassination of President Garfield only a few months were allowed to pass, when the world was again startled with the intelligence that an attempt had been made to assassinate our beloved Queen.

If these assassinations and attempted assassinations are the work of disloyal Socialists and Communists, organized for the purpose of destroying the constitutional liberties of

the people, high and low, rich and poor, then surely the time has arrived for all right thinking people to bestir themselves, and forever rid the world of such unholy organizations.

To us Free and Accepted Masons, who are taught loyalty and attachment to the country that gives us protection, let that country be where it may, our duty is plain, to endeavor, by all lawful means, to stamp this evil out of existence. I would suggest the propriety of the Grand Lodge, at this our first meeting since the dastardly attempt was made, drafting an address suitable for the occasion, and that it be forwarded to H. R. H. the M. W. Grand Master of the Grand Lodge of England, for presentation to Her Most Gracious Majesty the Queen, the Patroness of our Order.

#### NEW LODGES.

I have for years been of the opinion that our Lodges required consolidation rather than additions to their number. Consequently, I am rather pleased than otherwise at the few applications that have been made for Dispensations during the year. I have to report the following Dispensations granted, they having been recommended in the usual way by the D. D. G. M., and having satisfied myself that they were to be located in sections of the country not likely to interfere with Lodges now in existence:—

Leopold Lodge, Brigden, County of Lambton—October 26th, 1881.

Victoria Lodge, Victoria Road, County of Victoria—January 16th, 1882.

Moffat Lodge, Harrietsville, County of Middlesex—April 21st, 1882.

In accordance with the recommendations of Grand Lodge, I continued the Dispensation issued to Cedar Lodge, Wiar-ton, for another year.

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## OFFICIAL VISITATIONS.

Previous to our last annual communication in Hamilton, I had made arrangements for a three months' visit to the motherland. My trip was intended to be one of pleasure and information; with that in view, I was constantly on the move, visiting places of interest in France, England and Scotland. Time was too limited to do more than visit a very few Masonic Lodges in Scotland just before leaving, on the 6th October—Lodge St. Clair, No. 849, Edinburgh; Lodge St. George, No. 888, Glasgow; Lodge Princess, No. 607, Glasgow; and my mother Lodge, No. 21, old St. John's, Lanark. The first-named Lodge did me the honor of presenting me with a jewel and a certificate of honorary membership.

The second, St. George's, made me an honorary member also; and all had banquets on the occasion of my visits. To the R. W. Masters, Past Masters, Wardens and Brethren of these Lodges, I tender my sincere thanks for the great kindness and hospitality experienced.

In our own jurisdiction, the following Lodges have been officially visited by me at their regular meetings or at the banqueting hall, and some at both. The city Lodges of Hamilton, Jan. 18th, when I had the pleasure of listening to a very instructive lecture upon Masonry, by R. W. Bro. Otto Klotz, after which the annual banquet at the Royal Hotel.

It was while about to sit down to the evening's enjoyment, that the Grand Secretary received the message of the unexpected death of M. W. Bro. Harington, at Prescott. The sad news at once changed the character of the evening's entertainment into a Lodge of Sorrow.

By invitation, I attended the twenty-fifth anniversary of Lodge St. John, No. 75, Toronto, at a banquet at the Walker House, Nov. 25th, 1881; a most enjoyable evening was spent.

Dec. 21st, regular meeting of King Solomon's Lodge, No. 378, London West, at which a Past Master's Jewel was presented to the retiring Master, Brother Peter Grant, the evening's work closing with a banquet. The whole affair was a success.

Dec. 29th, ball and banquet by Tuscan Lodge, No. 195, London, and members of other city Lodges, at which I presided. This was the event of the season for London in the way of balls; the ladies were greatly pleased, and think the Tuscan brethren the best Masons in the world.

Feb. 10th, King Solomon Lodge, No. 894, Thamesford, Masonic concert and supper, open to the public. The concert was good, and reflected great credit upon Worshipful Bro. Day and committee.

March 9th, Lodge No. 209a, St. John's, London, regular meeting, after which a supper. I felt a great pleasure in visiting this Lodge officially, as Grand Master, and it is the first time a Grand Master ever did visit St. John's 209a. When it is known that exactly thirty-seven years ago I affiliated with that Lodge, then working under the Grand Lodge of Ireland, and the only Lodge in the village, you can easily understand the pleasure I experienced. I believe the feeling to be reciprocal.

Accompanied by the Grand Chaplain, I visited and presided at a concert given by Nilestown Lodge, No. 875, at Nilestown. The attendance was good. Altogether, the evening was pleasantly spent.

I requested the Grand Secretary to arrange for a meeting of Rehoboam Lodge, No. 65, at the Masonic Hall, City of Toronto, March 22nd, 1882, and to invite the Masters and Wardens of all the City Lodges to be present. The meeting was successful in every respect, and the banquet that followed was a crowning effort of good fellowship. On the occasion I

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had the pleasure of meeting M. W. Bro. J. K. Kerr, R. W. Bro. Spry, D. G. M., R. W. Bro. Nixon, D. D. G. M., R. W. Bro. Saunders, and other Grand Lodge Officers, past and present. I have to thank all these Brethren for their kind hospitality and assistance in discussing matters of interest to the craft generally.

March 31st, the city Lodges of Kingston, on the occasion of the presentation of a well-deserved testimonial, presented by a committee of Grand Lodge appointed for the purpose, to M. W. Bro. Jas. A. Henderson, P. G. M.

Kilwinning Lodge, No. 64, London, regular meeting, April 20th, at which I hope I satisfactorily closed the long standing trouble between the Lodge and Bro. Harens.

Union Lodge, No. 380, London, I have visited very frequently, it being the youngest Lodge in the city, and very zealous, deserves encouragement and guidance.

Lodge of Fidelity, No. 281, Ottawa, meeting and banquet, May 10th.

Lodge Prince of Wales, No. 371, Ottawa, meeting and banquet, May 11th.

Wilson Lodge, No. 86, Toronto, banquet, May 12th. I had great pleasure in meeting the brethren of Wilson Lodge at the Rossin House. Determined not to be outdone, the spread was one of the grandest I ever witnessed, and the speeches of old Masonic veterans, like R. W. Bro. Kivas Tully, were worth travelling many miles to listen to. If you want the genuine article, go to the old-time Mason for it, the young ones will have it by-and-by. Time and patience are needed.

June 1st, visited St. John's, No. 68, Ingersoll, regular meeting. The First Degree was conferred in an admirable manner by the W. M. The officers of this Lodge are well up in their work. The benefit of zealous, good Past Masters is very evi-



dent, judging from the way the business of the Lodge was conducted. I had the pleasure of assisting at the presentation of an address and apron by the Lodge to the I. P. M., V. W. Bro. John Warnock.

June 18th, visited my own Lodge, No. 20, London, for the first time officially, as Grand Master. As I expected, I received a hearty welcome from the officers and brethren. A pleasing incident connected with my visit was the opportunity afforded me of moving a vote of thanks to the retiring Treasurer of the Lodge, Bro. John Smart, who is a very old member, and has been Treasurer of the Lodge for twenty-six years. Bro. Smart leaves Canada to reside in Oregon, U.S., where he has two sons. Bro. Smart's Masonry is of the old type, true and trusty, and can be depended upon.

June 30th, by invitation I paid an official visit to Wilson Lodge, No. 113, Waterford. This Lodge is in a most healthy condition; their new hall is a model of comfort and convenience; furnishings of the latest and best designs, everything in order, and ruled over by R. W. Bro. Long, Grand Registrar, a most zealous Mason, and ably supported by a good staff of Past Masters and brethren, all interested in the welfare of the Lodge—the true secret of success in this or any other Lodge. I have to thank the brethren for the kind reception and entertainment given me.

July 5th, visited St. George's, No. 42, London. This Lodge is in a prosperous condition, well officered, and the members attentive, and, so far as I could see, contented.

I received an invitation from the Most Worshipful the Grand Master of the G. L. of the State of Pennsylvania, to attend the celebration of the Sesqui-Centennial Anniversary of its organization, on St. John the Baptist's Day, June 24th, A. L. 5882, at Philadelphia, U. S. I was compelled, with great reluctance, to decline this invitation.

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Although most anxious, I was quite unable to accept all the invitations sent me from all over the jurisdiction, and now take the opportunity of publicly thanking the W. M. and brethren of all those Lodges for their uniform kindness and hospitality. In this connection, it would be impossible to speak of one Lodge more than another, as all were imbued with the same spirit of unbounded hospitality and brotherly love.

One of the most pleasing features of the office is the deference at all times paid the Grand Master in his official capacity, and also to his subordinates for the time being. No surer test of a genuine Mason can be found than respect for the position, even should the man not be in all respects what he should be. A short time will rectify the one, but destruction to our beloved institution will inevitably be the result of the other.

Lodges of instruction have been held: at London, for the London District, April 27th, 1882, presided over by R. W. Bro. Milner, D. D. G. M.; at Ottawa, for the Ottawa District, March 29 and 30th, 1882, under the direction of R. W. Bro. Cranston, D. D. G. M.; and at Kincardine, Huron District, presided over by R. W. Bro. Martyn, D. D. G. M., June 21st, 1882.

I was able to be present at two of these meetings, London and Kincardine. Both were fairly successful, but not as much so as I could have desired. I am of the opinion that these Lodges of Instruction, as now constituted, have served their purpose, and served it well, during the infancy and younger days of our Grand Lodge. Now that we have arrived at the age of maturity, something more advanced and progressive will have to be substituted. What that something should be is, of course, a matter of opinion, and open for discussion. In the meantime, I venture to suggest the advisability of the Grand Lodge making some provision for

a meeting once a year of all the District Deputy Grand Masters, at a central point in the Province, as soon after the annual meeting of Grand Lodge as possible. Two days would be quite sufficient for the exemplification of the work and other matters connected with the office which they hold. At these meetings, the Masters of the Lodges should, if possible, be present. I claim that, if this suggestion is carried into effect, we would have a uniformity of work all over the jurisdiction that we have not got at present, as District Deputies themselves are not agreed upon many points.

ROYAL SOLOMON MOTHER LODGE, NO. 298, JERUSALEM, PALESTINE.

I desire to call the attention of Grand Lodge to this Daughter Lodge, situated in that far-off land, from whom we have not received any correspondence in some years.

While in the Old Country last year, I met several Masons who had visited that Lodge in Jerusalem. All spoke of their visit with the greatest pleasure; not one, however, was aware that the Charter under which they work was granted by the Grand Lodge of Canada. This, of itself, is not important, but it is of the utmost importance that returns should be regularly made, showing the work that is being done, and by whom. It is the more necessary when it is considered that great numbers of Masonic tourists, from all parts of the world, are in the habit of visiting that Lodge, and that as a Grand Lodge we must be held responsible for the regularity of its proceedings.

I would suggest the propriety of obtaining and appointing a suitable and qualified Brother to act as District Deputy G. M., to whom we could look to obtain all necessary information.

THE FOLLOWING SPECIAL COMMUNICATIONS OF GRAND LODGE

On the 4th October, 1881, when the corner-stone of Christ Church, in the City of Belleville, was, with Masonic Ceremonies, laid by R. W. Bro. L. H. Henderson, as my proxy, and the work ably performed.

On the 30th of August, when the new hall of Wilson Lodge, No. 118, was consecrated by R. W. Bro. G. C. Eden, D. D. G. M., Wilson District.

On the 26th December, 1881, when the new hall of Georgian Lodge, No. 848, Penetanguishene, was consecrated by V. W. Bro. Robt. King.

On the 26th of January, 1881, when the new hall of Langton Lodge, No. 895, Langton, was consecrated by R. W. Bro. R. L. Gunn.

On March 7th, 1882, when I consecrated the new hall in the Temple Building, London. This was an occasion long to be remembered by those participating in the ceremony, as well as those who were listeners. The Masonic procession was a grand demonstration of Masons from all over the country. A special effort was made by the committee of arrangements to make the whole affair a success. Reduced rates on railroads and hotels were secured; these and other inducements tended greatly to increase the numbers present. The day's proceedings closed by a grand banquet, and an operatic entertainment in the New Opera House, Temple Building. At the banquet the city brethren did me the honor of presenting me with a life-size crayon portrait of myself, in regalia as Grand Master; the likeness *is said* to be most faithful, and the frame which contains it is of the most artistic description. This kindness, with others, can never be forgotten, and at the time of presentation was duly acknowledged by me. I have to thank the brethren who delivered addresses on the occasion.

On June 14th, when I laid the corner-stone of a new Methodist Church, near the town of Ingersoll, under the auspices of King Hiram Lodge, No. 37, and St. John's Lodge, No. 68, Ingersoll.

On July 1st, when I laid the corner-stone of Trinity (Episcopal) Church, in the town of Simcoe, County of Norfolk, under the auspices of Norfolk Lodge, No. 10. Being Dominion Day, and a holiday, a large gathering was the result, and our Masonic brethren from distant places combined with those of the town and neighborhood, gave a most respectable appearance, and added greatly to this one of our most imposing out-door ceremonies. To Norfolk Lodge we are all indebted for our entertainment, and the excellencies of the arrangements made on the occasion.

#### DISPENSATIONS.

Applications for Dispensations have been numerous, chief-

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ly from Lodges that have desired to initiate candidates without the jurisdiction. I believe in every instance I have refused to grant a Dispensation unless the Lodge within whose jurisdiction the candidate resided had first given its consent. At the same time, while I have adopted this mode as the correct one, I can see no good reason for Lodges refusing their consent if the candidate has a preference, and his character will stand the strictest investigation. A certificate of character should in all cases accompany the Lodge's consent. I have also been asked to grant Dispensations to confer the Degrees in less time than the Constitution provides. These Dispensations I have also refused, as I hold it would be difficult indeed to find a case that would warrant the Grand Master in setting aside the constitutional period. To my mind it is quite short enough at present.

#### CONSOLIDATION OF LODGES.

The Hiram Lodge, No. 317, Dundas, with Valley Lodge, No. 100, and warrant of the former surrendered.

#### RELIEF.

There seems to be intentionally a restriction placed upon Grand Masters as to granting relief, with, however, two exceptions, and these are not found in our Constitution, but in Resolutions and Rulings, 1875.

It is not my intention to find fault with the present state of the law in this respect, although I have found it rather inconvenient upon one or two occasions during the past year, especially when applications are made of a pressing nature.

On the death of Past Grand Master Harington I ascertained, while in Prescott at the funeral, that his widow required assistance, and that it was absolutely necessary that the Grand Lodge should assume the liabilities in connection with the funeral. I satisfied myself that such was the case, and authorized the Grand Secretary to supervise the bills and see that they were paid. I did so, believing that the Grand Lodge would fully approve of my action under the circumstances.

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The public prints put the world in possession of the information regarding the destruction by fire of the Ring Theatre in Vienna, and the terrible loss of life caused thereby. Late in the month of March I received, through the Grand Secretary, a communication from the Lodge Humanitas, Vienna, appealing for aid for the distressed widows and orphans of deceased Masons. The appeal was strong and urgent, and one that it was impossible to resist, and as I was aware that our Grand Lodge had never yet turned a deaf ear to the cry of the widow and orphans, I assumed the responsibility, and authorized the Grand Secretary to take the necessary steps and forward the sum of twenty-five pounds sterling to Lodge Humanitas as the contribution of the Grand Lodge of Canada.

All the papers in this and the former case are in the possession of the Grand Secretary for the information of the Grand Lodge.

#### JURISPRUDENCE.

This department may be said, and truly, to be one of the most difficult that a Grand Master has to deal with. When the brethren get into a real old-fashioned, genuine snarl, it requires the greatest care, prudence and judgment to set matters right again. I have had during the year several cases of a most perplexing character; but by judicious treatment and the good sense and Masonic feeling of the brethren interested, I have been enabled to restore to harmony, where discord seemed to be the ruling feature.

It would answer no good purpose to go into detail, as the questions have been disposed of and judgment given, unless re-opened by an appeal to Grand Lodge, through the Board of General Purposes. In one or two of these cases I was compelled to act with great promptness, in order that brethren should not suffer through irregularities, and have the Constitution violated from want of knowledge how to act.

The first on the list was before the Board of General Pur-

poses last year, and by the Board referred to the D. D. G. M. of the London District. The case was entitled Kilwinning Lodge, No. 64, vs. Bro. Jacob Harens, and Bro. Jacob Harens vs. Kilwinning Lodge. This was a difficult case to dispose of, and gave the D. D. G. M. and myself a great deal of labor and anxious thought. Happily, it has been finally disposed of, principally through good advice and the generosity of the Lodge itself, the brethren of which, I am sure, will never regret the noble example they have set in teaching brotherly love, even at a sacrifice.

The next on the list is the Rehoboam Lodge case. This case has been heard of all over the country, having been taken notice of by the secular as well as the Masonic press. It is known as Bros. Patterson and Palmer vs. the W. M. of Rehoboam Lodge, No. 65, Toronto.

Happily, this case has also been disposed of. The whole correspondence, including my decision, is in the possession of the Grand Secretary, and will repay a perusal by the Board.

Growing out of this case is a charge against R. W. Bro. Nixon, D. D. G. M., of the Toronto District, by the same brethren, Patterson and Palmer, members of Rehoboam Lodge, Toronto.

This case, as it affects a Grand Lodge officer of high standing, is of great interest to the Craft, inasmuch as the powers and privileges of a D. D. G. M. will require to be defined in such cases as the one under review. I have, therefore, declined to give a decision, and ordered that all the papers in the case be laid before the Board for report to Grand Lodge.

The next and last case of any moment to be taken notice of is one of a most intricate nature, and seldom met with. I question if there is one of a similar character to be found in the 27 years' life of our Grand Lodge. It will be known as Bro. S. Martel Davies vs. W. Bro. John Moore, Master, and St. James' Lodge, No. 74, Maitland.

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In this case Bro. Davies asks the Grand Master to set aside an election for W. M., and declare him elected, in consequence of admitted irregularities in the election held on the 5th December, 1881. On the 21st of April I decided as follows:

"Having carefully read all the papers submitted in this case, I have come to the conclusion that the Junior Warden, Bro. S. Martel Davies, a candidate for the W. Master's chair, at the election held on the night of the 5th Dec., 1881, ought to have been declared duly elected, having received a majority of the legal votes of the members present.

"The W. M., on the contrary, it appears, declared no election, and on the 22nd Dec. wrote the Grand Secretary that a tie was the result each time after seven trials of the ballot, and asking that a dispensation be granted to hold a new election for W. M. on the 27th December.

"No protest, letter or document of any kind having been received by the Grand Secretary to show that even a disagreement had taken place, further than the tie already mentioned, the dispensation was according granted. The election held on the 27th Dec. it would appear, resulted in the re-election of the then W. M., Bro. John Moore. There does not appear to be any charge made that this election was unfair in any way, the former candidate having withdrawn. The election was thus between the W. M. and the Junior Warden. The W. M. having been successful, I do not feel it my duty to interfere now, although I deeply sympathize with Bro. Davies, and deprecate in the strongest possible manner sharp practices of any kind in a Masonic Lodge.

"Yet I am not in a position, for reasons already stated, to place him in the station I believe him to be legally entitled to occupy, in consequence of not knowing how matters stood prior to granting a dispensation to hold a new election on the 27th December, 1881."

In reply to this another appeal was made by the same.

brother and to the same effect, to which I made the following reply, dated April 28th, 1882:—

"The Grand Secretary will please acknowledge the receipt of this communication, and say to Bro. Davies, that much as I regret the result of the correspondence submitted to me in connection with this unfortunate case, my views have not changed as to the undesirability of cancelling the work of the Lodge done through the power of a dispensation, as no exception to that part of the work, but to what took place previously, had been taken.

"The whole case is a peculiar one, and not often, I trust, met with in our Lodges, and should Bro. Davies so desire, may be laid before the Board of General Purposes in July."

Bro. Davies has since written to say that he intends to lay the whole case before the Board, so that the Grand Lodge will have the opportunity of pronouncing upon it during the session.

The following letter, with others, had been forwarded to Judge Dartnell, D. D. G. M. Ontario District, from W. Bro. D. J. Goggin, Master of Lodge 26, Port Hope. As the letter explains the case so well, I give it in full:—

R. W. SIR AND BROTHER:

Allow me to submit the following for your advice:—

Certain Brethren having been summoned to show cause why they should not be suspended for non-payment of dues, and no cause having been shown, it became necessary, in accordance with By-law No. X. of Ontario Lodge, to suspend them. Then arose the question: Whose duty is it to move their suspension? The By-law says they should be suspended, but makes no provision for procedure.

In accordance with Regulations respecting trial before a Lodge of charges for Masonic offences and proceedings therein prepared by M. W. Bro. Kerr, and adopted by Grand Lodge, and to be found in the book entitled, "Resolutions and Rulings and Masonic Trials," page 7, clause 2, section 6, I called on the S. W. to move, and the J. W. to second, the resolution. The J. W. was willing, but the S. W. refused, on the ground that he had conscientious objections to the principle of suspension for non-payment of dues.

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Feeling myself bound by the edicts of Grand Lodge, and finding that the Past Masters present read the law as I did, I then, in accordance with clause 9 of the Duties of Masters and Wardens, in the Book of Constitution, laid my case before the Lodge, and it decided unanimously that the complaint was well founded. I then displaced the S. W. and appointed another brother for the evening. The whole matter was conducted quietly, and with no manifestations of feeling, the S. W. saying that holding my views of the law, it was simply impossible for me to do otherwise.

I desire now to submit the following questions:—

- 1st. Have I read the law aright?
- 2nd. If so, is the S. W. displaced for one evening only or for the remainder of the year?
- 3rd. If for the remainder of the year, shall I appoint, or will the Lodge elect a successor?
- 4th. If I have not read the law aright, what is the proper procedure?

I am not aware what reply the D. D. G. M. made, or what decision he gave, but I judge from a subsequent letter it was not satisfactory, and that the D. D. G. M. himself felt that possibly he had erred, and laid the case before me and desired a ruling before the 15th June, in time for the Lodge meeting.

I made the following reply:—

LONDON, June 7th, 1882.

JUDGE DARTNELL,

D. D. G. M. Ontario District.

DEAR SIR AND R. W. BROTHER,—In reply to your letter of the 6th inst., and also to the letter of W. M., D. J. Goggin, Lodge No. 26, Port Hope, I may say that the question raised is a nice one, and one a little common sense might well be applied to. I do not by any means look upon the clause quoted in the Book of Resolutions and Rulings as imperative, that the J. W. should take the initiative in such a case as the one laid before me, or any similar case. I believe that any member is qualified to move or second a resolution to the effect that members may be suspended for non-payment of dues. I can easily understand in a case of this kind that an officer of a Lodge.



may not desire to take the initiative, and in the case before me it would have been a very simple matter for the S. W. to have retired for a few moments, and his place temporarily supplied till the resolutions had been carried. This, I think, would have answered the purpose, had it been thought of at the time. I would not be inclined to give any such latitude to what may be termed a Masonic offence. I believe it to be the duty of the officers to look well after the morals of their respective members, so that no discredit may be brought upon the Craft generally. An officer refusing to do his duty in that respect should at once be dealt with, especially if the matter has been brought under his notice.

In this case I do not think the S. W. has been guilty of any offence that should be visited with any punishment. I take it for granted that he had conscientious reasons for not taking a leading part in the suspension of these brethren.

From the above I think the Grand Lodge will easily discover that while I am most anxious to strengthen the hands of officers in carrying out the Rules and Regulations to the letter, at the same time there are far more important matters to be dealt with in our Lodges than suspensions for non-payment of dues, which I fear are often allowed to pass by unheeded, and the good name and standing of the Craft seriously injured in consequence.

#### DUES AND SUSPENSIONS.

This may be said now to be a burning question, and one that affects every Grand Lodge, more or less, upon this continent, and I think in none more so than our own.

I bespeak for this subject a careful consideration by the Board of General Purposes at an early date, as suspensions are becoming far too plentiful, being nearly equal in number to our gains from all other sources, judging from last year's returns of our Grand Lodge. I am of opinion that a remedy can easily be found for this state of things, and would suggest

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a general compromise by a payment of say ten dollars by all Masons whose date of suspension goes beyond ten years, and five dollars from those under ten years, and under this arrangement the Grand Lodge relinquish entirely its portion of the claims against suspended Masons; and if, upon enquiry by a committee from the several Lodges, Masons are found whose characters are good, and are unable to pay the sum named, through poverty or distress, that the claims against them be cancelled, and they be invited to visit their respective Lodges as formerly. In many cases the dues have run on unpaid so long that it is utterly hopeless to expect that they will ever be settled but in some such way as I propose.

I would suggest that a system somewhat similar to that adopted by some other Grand Lodges be pursued, that is, under no circumstances can dues accumulate longer than three years, and if not paid at that period, by resolution of the Lodge, the offending brother be declared ineligible for office or to take part in the proceedings. The above is the only punishment ever inflicted, unless able and not willing, and then the member is dealt with for unmasonic conduct; but, until such action has been taken, his membership never ceases in the Lodge he belongs to.

Again, and I am done with this branch of the subject. In this country and the United States, there is a perfect rage for what are called Masonic Rites and Degrees, which at least proves that the want of money is not the cause, at least with some, that Lodge dues are not paid. That being the case, it seems to me it would not be asking too much, and even insisting upon it, if we as Craft Masons are expected in any way recognize these rites or grades of Masonry, to ask that candidates should in every instance be affiliated and in good standing with some Blue Lodge.

I believe that if this suggestion was adopted and carried out by the different rites, it would have a most beneficial

effect in teaching all candidates for higher degrees that ancient Craft Masonry is the foundation of all Masonry, and as such their members must maintain their connection with that body.

#### CONDITION OF MASONRY.

This branch is very properly left to the District Deputy Grand Masters to report upon; their knowledge of the Craft from a constant supervision, and a residence in the respective Districts, gives them an opportunity for observation that cannot possibly be obtained by any other official within our jurisdiction. I therefore bespeak for these reports a careful perusal and consideration. My own experience, so far as I have been able to judge from the visits I have made, is that the Lodges are well up in the esoteric work, and the time has now arrived, in my opinion, when some attention should be paid to the exoteric, in the shape of lectures upon the principles of Masonry, its objects and aims, together with the duties and obligations resting upon themselves and the brethren generally. These and kindred subjects will well repay the time spent in the preparation by the Masters and Past Masters of our Lodges, and the brethren greatly interested and benefitted thereby.

#### WARRANTS SURRENDERED.

In this connection, I desire to call the attention of Grand Lodge to the correspondence that has taken place between the Secretary of the Grand Lodge of Manitoba and this Grand Lodge, with reference to the surrender of the warrant of Kinistino Lodge, No. 381, Prince Albert, N. W. T. From the correspondence that has taken place, I gather that the Lodge has, by resolution, accepted a warrant from the Grand Lodge of Manitoba, and that the warrant of the Grand Lodge of Canada has been forwarded to that Grand Lodge for disposal.

#### FOREIGN GRAND LODGES.

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desired, peace and harmony reign supreme, and the usual interchange of proceedings has taken place between us. I am happy to say that the vexed question between the Grand Lodge of New York and that of Conneticut, as also the difficulty between the Grand Lodges of New Mexico and Missouri are settled, or on the verge of settlement; and with the exception of the matter in dispute between the Grand Lodge of Quebec and the Grand Lodge of England, which it is to be hoped is also approaching a settlement, no cloud darkens the Masonic horizon at the present time.

Last June I was written to by the Grand Master of the Grand Lodge of Manitoba, requesting me to bring to the notice of my Grand Lodge in July the destitute condition of many of the Masons belonging to our jurisdiction upon their arrival, or shortly after, in Manitoba, and complaining of the burden thrown upon the Lodges of that Province, especially those in Winnipeg, in granting relief to brethren from all parts of the world, especially Ontario. The Grand Master suggests that some provision be made by our Grand Lodge to meet similar cases in the future, as the money expended so far has been from six to seven hundred dollars per annum. I felt very much surprised at the information received, and wrote for a list containing the names and amounts granted, which, I understand, is being prepared. The address of the Grand Master in 1881 refers to this matter in such a way that it cannot well be overlooked. I therefore lay the case before you for such action as you may deem proper during the session.

#### LODGE BY-LAWS.

From the large number of By-laws and amendments thereto that have been submitted to me for approval during the past year, I am of opinion that Grand Lodge should assume the responsibility of adopting, as part of the Constitution, a uniform set of By-laws.

The Grand Lodge has already approved of a set of By-laws, prepared by R. W. Bro. Hugh Murray, which are in print, and which have been recommended to Lodges for adoption. Lodges, however, have still continued to submit for approval By-laws not in accordance with the uniform code alluded to, and I am, therefore, of opinion that the matter had better be dealt with authoritatively by Grand Lodge.

## GRAND LODGE OFFICIALS.

With the Grand Secretary, especially, the Grand Master must necessarily be in constant communication. To that officer I am under obligations for his zeal and punctuality in attending to correspondence promptly and courteously.

The Grand Treasurer, whose duty it is to conduct the financial department, I seldom come in contact with, but from his long service and well known ability and faithfulness in the discharge of his duty, I can speak with perfect confidence. His financial statement will be laid before you, which will show the finances of the Grand Lodge in a most satisfactory condition.

As the head executive officer of the Grand Lodge, in whose keeping and guidance the Craft has been since our last annual communication, when you did me the great honor of electing me your Grand Master, I have now the honor of handing back the great trust reposed in me, hoping that while in my keeping the interests of Craft Masonry have not suffered, and that my conduct throughout the year will meet your approval, and my shortcomings be overlooked and attributed to the want of knowledge, rather than to want of zeal or love for the institution.

And now, brethren, in conclusion, let me exhort you to remember the important trust committed to your care—a trust that has been carefully preserved and handed down to us from generation to generation. See to it, then, that you are

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found worthy of the honor that has been conferred upon you. "Love ye one another" is the great commandment. If you do, this will prove to our enemies that a good Mason is a good man, and afford ourselves the greatest comfort, and give us a well-grounded hope of admittance into the Grand Lodge above.

#### ST. CLAIR DISTRICT.

To the Most Worshipful the Grand Master, Officers and Members of Grand Lodge of A. F. & A. M. of Canada.

**MOST WORSHIPFUL SIR AND BRETHREN,**—In accordance with the requirements of the Constitution of Grand Lodge and in the discharge of the duties entrusted to me, I have the honor to submit my annual report for the year now closing on the condition of Freemasonry in the St. Clair District.

I have visited nearly all the Lodges in the St. Clair District and find them working satisfactorily.

The Lodges not visited, was owing to my having arranged to do so in the second and third week in June, but the General Elections for Canada coming on, (out of the usual course) I felt it would to a great extent be useless to make an official visit at such a time as it would be impossible to get



any large attendance of the brethren of the respective Lodges, but the copies of summonses I have received from the various Lodges warrant me in saying that they are prospering and receiving a large addition of new and good material.

At the request of the Most Worshipful the Grand Master, I had the honor to perform, in his name the ceremony of dedicating, consecrating and constituting Huron Lodge, 892, Howard Lodge, 891, and Florence Lodge, 890.

In closing my report I must again express my gratitude and sincerest thanks to the officers and brethren of the District for the universal kindness and fraternal welcome with which I was received when paying my official visits, and as I will not be in a position to accept the office again, I trust the same courtesy will be extended to my successor as has been to myself during the six years I have been District Deputy Grand Master. And pray it may please the G. A. O. T. U. long to continue the peace and harmony that prevails amongst the brethren of St. Clair District,

### LONDON DISTRICT.

To the Most Worshipful, the grand Master, Officers and Members of the Grand Lodge of A. F. & A. M. of Canada.

MOST WORSHIPFUL SIR AND BRETHREN,—I have the honor to submit my report on the condition of Freemasonry in the London District.

When I assumed the responsible position of District Deputy Grand Master of the London District, the largest under our beloved Grand Lodge of Canada, I felt that I had undertaken a task that would tax my utmost energies to accomplish, and I can assure you that I was not much disappointed. As there were at that time thirty-nine Lodges, and one has been added since, you will have some idea of the work to be performed if justice is done to them all as well as to each individual mem-

ber thereof. I undertook the arduous duty with a determination to perform it to the best of my ability, and by visiting, and attending to the requirements of the Lodges; and by the warm welcome I have received from every Lodge, I am led to believe that I have, at least partially, met the views of the brethren.

The first duty devolving upon me was the constitution, dedication and consecration of the new Lodge at Ilkerton, named Henderson Lodge, No. 888. This Lodge bids fair to be a credit to the Grand Lodge and the Order.

The matter of Bro. Harens and Kilwinning Lodge, referred to me by the M. W. the Grand Master, I am pleased to inform you, was satisfactorily adjusted. Several minor matters as to the Constitution and work have been referred to me, and disposed of generally in accordance with the opinions of those best able to judge.

In my visits throughout the District, I found the Lodges, as a rule, very well worked, and that the officers acquitted themselves with credit and honor to the Craft.

I would recommend all Lodges to at once get the work on rulings published by the Grand Lodge, from the Grand Secretary.

I have granted several dispensations to wear regalia at divine worship, which I believe is of great interest to the Craft as well as to each individual member.

I regret that several deaths have been reported, of highly esteemed brethren, whose remains have been interred with the usual Masonic ceremonies.

I was present at the consecration and dedication of the beautiful Masonic Temple just completed in the city of London. It stands, a grand and imposing monument to the brethren of London, as it is perhaps among the finest Masonic

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temples of the world. The Lodge-rooms for the several degrees of Masonry are most handsomely arranged and furnished, and if Masonry flourishes anywhere on this continent it certainly does in the Forest City.

I held a Lodge of Instruction in London, and am proud to report that the result was most gratifying. There was a large attendance from the Lodges of the District, and the Most Worshipful the Grand Master was also present. The work was exemplified in the most able manner by W. Bro. Paine, of Euclid Lodge, Strathroy; W. Bro. Grant, of Beaver Lodge, Strathroy; W. Bros. Simpson and Glass, of King Solomon Lodge, London West, and several of the brethren of the city Lodges, to whom I tender my thanks for the assistance rendered, also for the use of their magnificent Lodge-room. It appears to me that the holding of at least one Lodge of Instruction in each District yearly would be the means of doing more good than any other plan that could be adopted by the District Deputy Grand Masters of the several Districts.

I received an application for the formation of a new Lodge at Harrietsville, and finding that there appeared to be plenty of room for it, and that the brethren applying were well-skilled and quite able to manage a Lodge as it should be, I recommended the petition to the Most Worshipful the Grand Master, who was pleased to grant his dispensation for the holding of the same until the meeting of this Grand Lodge. In honor of the Most Worshipful the Grand Master, the Lodge was named Moffat Lodge. As their prospects to become a flourishing Lodge are good, I recommend that a warrant be granted.

Owing to business engagements at the time, I was, (although very reluctantly) unable to proceed to Harrietsville to institute the new Lodge, and applied to R. W. Bro. McGloghlon to act for me. He cheerfully accepted the duty and performed it to the entire satisfaction of the brethren, and

for which he has my warmest thanks. There was a large attendance from all the surrounding Lodges, who were highly pleased with the proceedings, and promised to render the new Lodge every assistance.

I would fail in my duty should I close this report without thanking the Grand Master for his valuable assistance and aid during my term of office. He was always ready and willing to give me his valuable time and counsel, and the brethren in the London District feel proud of the honor of having him amongst them. May he long remain to diffuse light amongst us.

I have also, amongst many others, to tender my hearty thanks to R. W. Bros. Banghart and McGloghlon, who have been ever ready to give their time and to render me every possible assistance. I also tender thanks to the various Masters and Past Masters throughout the District, many of whom, (if space would permit) are worthy of special mention, as all have been most anxious to make my visits pleasant.

Finally, may peace and harmony reign in the London District, and may our beloved Grand Lodge of Canada go on and prosper until time shall be no more.

I had the pleasure of holding a Lodge of Instruction in the Town of Kincardine, on the 21st day of June, at which the M. W. the Grand Master, and the R. W. the Grand Secretary were present. A very pleasant and profitable time was spent.

I have had but very few complaints or appeals referred to me and those of such a character as to be easily adjusted.

In conclusion I tender my sincere thanks to the brethren of Huron District for their uniform kindness and courtesy to your representative on all occasions.

## WELLINGTON DISTRICT.

To the Most Worshipful the Grand Master, Officers and Members of the Grand Lodge of A. F. & A. M., of Canada.

**MOST WORSHIPFUL SIR AND BRETHREN,**—In accordance with the provisions of the Constitution, I have the honor to submit for your information, the following report on the condition of Freemasonry in the Wellington District, during the twelve months that it has been under my supervision.

I have endeavored, to the best of my ability, to discharge the duties of District Deputy Grand Master by visiting all the Lodges in the District, with two exceptions, and criticizing the work done by each Lodge, setting the officers right in points in which I considered that they were wrong, and exemplifying the proper method by taking part in the work myself. I was on my way to visit Wilmot Lodge, No. 318, Baden—one of the two that I failed to visit,—when I was taken suddenly ill at Hespeler, and was obliged to return home, which I did with great difficulty, and in consequence was unable to complete the full tour of the District before it was time to start for Grand Lodge.

In most of the Lodges that I visited I found the work as approved of by the Grand Lodge strictly adhered to, and the brethren desirous and anxious to observe the ancient landmarks of the Order. There are a few Lodges in the Wellington District that are in a weak and unhealthy condition, arising chiefly from local circumstances. Hemmed in, as it were, by older Lodges on all sides, there is not the proper material offering to make a healthy Lodge, and the consequence is that a deadness seems to be creeping in among the members of these Lodges, and there is not that interest manifested that ought to be. In such cases I have urged the brethren to hold Lodges of Instruction on the night of regular meeting, and by this means they would be able to keep the work fresh in their memory, and it would possess for them a

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greater interest than if they merely met and went through the routine business and closed. However, on the whole, I can safely say that Masonry has made considerable progress in this District during the year just closed. Some of the Lodges that for the two previous years were almost at a stand still, have received into their ranks men that will reflect credit to their respective Lodges and honor on the Craft in general.

Peace and harmony have generally prevailed. Only one new case of complaint came before me, which was a dispute between Harriston Lodge, No. 262, and Clifford Lodge, No. 315, as to jurisdiction. This was finally decided by the Grand Master. One case that originated during my predecessor's term of office, between Irvine Lodge, No. 203, Elora, and Prince Arthur Lodge, No. 835, as to jurisdiction, I succeeded, I am happy to say, in having amicably arranged to the mutual satisfaction of both parties. I found that the brethren of Mercer Lodge, No. 247, Fergus, for the past two years previous to my coming to the office of D. D. G. M. for this District, had been allowing the United Order of Workmen to use their Lodge-room, in which to hold their meetings. At my official visit to this Lodge, in December last, I pointed out to the officers that this was contrary to the rulings of Grand Lodge, and that it must be discontinued. By the terms of the lease which they had given the Workmen, they were compelled to give three months' notice previous to the expiration of any one year. Their year will be up in October next, and the brethren of Mercer Lodge agreed to give the necessary notice and discontinue the lease.

I issued dispensations to permit the brethren of several of the Lodges to appear in Masonic clothing at divine service, and in each case, I am glad to state, that the result was beneficial.

In conclusion, I have to thank the brethren of this District for the kind, courteous and fraternal manner in which they

received me on my official visits, and for the ready acquiescence which they manifested to all my rulings. I have also to record the universal expression of loyalty and affection manifested by the brethren throughout the whole District for the Grand Lodge of Canada, and to express the hope that the same love and harmony that have marked the progress of Freemasonry in the Wellington District during the past year may still prevail during the years that are to come.

### NIAGARA DISTRICT.

To the Most Worshipful the Grand Master, Officers and Brethren of the Grand Lodge of Canada

**MOST WORSHIPFUL SIR AND BRETHREN,**—In compliance with the requirements of the Constitution, and the Grand Lodge, I beg to submit my official report for the Masonic year just ended.

I visited all the Lodges in the District, with the exception

of three. These three I intended to visit, and indeed appointed nights for that purpose, but local causes prevented the meetings upon the evenings in question. Several of the Lodges I visited more than once. At each of my visits, I made a short address in illustration of the principles of Masonry, and for the purpose of bringing more vividly before the brethren, the duties incumbent upon them as Masons in their relations to one another, and to the world generally. These addresses were to all appearance not only kindly received, but, on every occasion, the brethren were good enough to express their approval by resolution.

I also delivered two public lectures on Masonry, viz: at Thorold and Jarvis.

During the year I granted three dispensations for brethren to appear in regalia, viz: to Maple Leaf Lodge, St. Catharines, for a "Literary Festival;" to Mountain Lodge, Thorold, for a "Literary Festival," and to Myrtle Lodge, Port Robinson, for a "Festival."

I am sorry to say that I was under the necessity of canceling the action of a Lodge, and suspending one of its officers who had been charged with a serious Masonic offence, and who had been pronounced innocent of the charges preferred against him, when in my opinion, the evidence adduced warranted a contrary finding. The matter was referred to the Grand Master, who promptly endorsed my procedure in the matter.

I am compelled to state that I have not found the Order in as flourishing and vigorous a condition as I would have wished. Certainly there is not in some places manifested that interest in the institution which its aims and objects have a right to claim. The attendance at Lodges generally is not so full or regular as it ought to be. There are, however, several notable exceptions to this state of things. As far as I can judge, there are members of the Order, who, however

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sound they may be in theory, in practice at least, in spite of their solemn obligations, seem to ignore the close brotherly ties that should bind Masons together, and to forget that they are expected by the world to live up to their professions. This has a great influence for bad, and tends to lower the Order in the estimation of those whose respect and good opinion are well worth having, and who would be the first in their recognition of its many excellencies were its principles carried out in the practice of its members. In my opinion, it is time that Grand Lodge should take steps to enforce from members a stricter adherence to the letter and spirit of their obligations, and make them understand that if they are Masons in name they must be so in reality.

In so saying I know that I am only expressing the sentiments of all true Masons—of those who love the order and are jealous of its honor, who ever are at the post of duty, and who, in a word, earnestly strive to exemplify in their own lives and practice, the duties which they believe they owe to their God, their neighbours and themselves.

In conclusion I would take this opportunity of expressing my profound appreciation of the very many courtesies and acts of kindness received from the brethren in my official visits throughout the District, acts which will ever be treasured up in my memory.

TORONTO DISTRICT.

To the Most Worshipful the Grand Master and Grand Lodge of A. F. & A. M. of Canada.

MOST WORSHIPFUL SIR AND BRETHREN,—I have the honor



to submit my report on the condition of Masonry in the Toronto District.

I have much pleasure in being able to report that Freemasonry in this District is in the most prosperous condition, and that harmony and good feeling prevail in all the Lodges.

The number of Lodges in the District is the same as last year. An application was made from a number of brethren in the Village of Scarboro' for a dispensation to open a new Lodge, but from the fact that some of the petitioners left the jurisdiction for the North-West, and for other reasons, it was deemed advisable to withdraw the application, and it was returned.

I regret that I have not been able to visit all the Lodges in the District, but those which I did visit conducted the work in accordance with the regulations of the Grand Lodge, and rendered the ritual both correctly and impressively.

I have also installed the officers of a number of Lodges, and have every reason to feel well satisfied with the officers selected. I have in each case taken care to ascertain that the W. M. elect was able to perform the work before proceeding with the installation.

Very few deaths have been reported to me. The only one of which I was officially notified was that of R. W. Bro. C. W. Paterson, P. G. Chaplain, and W. M. of Rising Sun Lodge, No. 129, Aurora, whose remains were accompanied by the brethren to the cemetery in the city of Toronto, and there interred with the usual Masonic ceremonies.

My correspondence with the Lodges has been somewhat extensive, and I am glad to know that my rulings have been satisfactory.

I have during the year granted several dispensations for brethren to appear in regalia at social gatherings, and in one



instance for the purpose of attending divine service, and have every reason to believe that in each case the proceedings were "commenced in order, conducted in peace, and closed in harmony."

Two of the Lodges have, during the year, celebrated their twenty-fifth anniversary, viz.: St. John's Lodge, No. 75, and Wilson Lodge, No. 86, on both of which occasions I had the pleasure of being present, with the M. W. the Grand Master, Deputy Grand Master, Grand Secretary, and other distinguished brethren.

I have received but few complaints, and have succeeded in settling these without difficulty, with one exception, a complaint made against the W. M. of Rehobeam Lodge by two brothers of the Lodge, which the Grand Master referred to a commission, of which commission I was chairman. We succeeded in effecting an amicable settlement of the difficulties without entering into a trial or taking the evidence, and reported our actions to the M. W. the Grand Master.

In retiring from the position of D. D. G. M., I desire to express my hearty thanks to the brethren for the uniform kindness and courtesy with which I have been received during my official visits, and I may say on all occasions where we have met together as Masons.

### GEORGIAN DISTRICT.

I am happy to say that I had no complaints to consider, except one from a brother of Kerr Lodge, No. 230, who had been suspended by that Lodge in the year 1878 for unma-sonic conduct. After examining into the matter, I declined to interfere with the action of the Lodge.

An application was made to me by Kerr Lodge to permit them to move from Bell Ewart to some more suitable place. It was represented to me that the Lodge could not continue its existence at Bell Ewart, as that place, which was at one time a flourishing village, was now almost deserted, and that only one member of the Lodge resided there. After visiting the Lodge and consulting with the brethren, I found that it was a necessity, for the maintenance of the Lodge, that it should be removed to some suitable place.

Several of the Masons in Barrie, including R. W. Bro. Spry, having agreed to join the Lodge if removed there, and having satisfied myself that there was ample room for a second Lodge in Barrie, I gave my consent to the removal of the Lodge to that place. Since its removal I understand it has progressed most satisfactorily.

I regret to find Caledonia Lodge, No. 249, in an unsatisfactory state, but as the Lodge is making an effort to meet its obligations, I think it would be well to give it a further opportunity to recover itself.

In conclusion, I have to thank the brethren for the kindness with which I was everywhere received on my official visits, and also to thank those brethren who accompanied me in some of my visits.

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## ONTARIO DISTRICT.

To the Most Worshiptul the Grand Master and the Grand Lodge of Canada.

The undersigned District Deputy Grand Master of the Ontario District, in accordance with his duty, reports to Grand Lodge, as follows :

## STATE OF THE CRAFT.

Peace and prosperity have been the characteristics of the Craft in this District during the past Masonic year. Harmony has prevailed and the very few complaints made to me have been of a trivial nature and easily adjustable.

## MASONIC LAW AND DECISIONS.

I have been called upon to express my opinion upon the following points, among others :

1. A suspended brother has no right to enter his own or any other Lodge, until the cause of suspension be removed (vide Tyler's obligation). Much less can he vote upon such an important matter as the balloting for a candidate while his dues remain unpaid. The moment his arrears are paid or reach the hands of the Secretary he is *ipso facto* re-instated, and entitled to enter the Lodge.
2. A ballot is passed and declared "not clear;" after the Lodge closed, members expressed themselves to the W. M. their opinion that a mistake had been undoubtedly made. At a subsequent regular meeting a petition was presented to the W. M. alleged to have been signed by all the members present at the meeting at which the balloting took place, requesting the W. M. "to exercise the authority vested in him as W. M., to permit a re-consideration of that part of the business which related to balloting and to take it up as unfinished business."

In reply to the W. M.'s request for advice I ruled that to

accede to such a request was not within his duty a prerogative and would be a violation of the Constitution; that a ballot cannot be postponed, much less re-considered at a subsequent meeting (vide G. L. proceedings 1865, page 81): that the candidate must be balloted for at the regular meeting after receipt of petition on report of Committee; that a second ballot cannot be demanded as a right (G. L. P. 1859, pages 65, 192.): that the W. M. after report from the Wardens, can pass the ballot once or more often in his discretion, but that once having declared the result "not clear" the ballot is closed unless before passing to other business, and before any of the voting brethren have left the Lodge, one, or more, of the brethren declare that a mistake has been made: that the petitioners should have declared their opinions promptly! that the matter had passed beyond the W. M.'s control, and the rejected candidates would have to accept the situation, however unfortunate: that it would be better that many good men should be excluded, temporarily only it is to be hoped, by such mistakes than that unworthy material should be admitted by relaxing the stringent provisions of the Constitution.

8. The test of physical fitness appears to be, "Can the applicant properly and effectively, so as to understand and be understood, receive and communicate all the words and signs of the three degrees?" Applying this test, a totally deaf or blind person would be ineligible, as would also one deprived of a limb. Not so, one blind of one eye or deaf of one ear; Grand Lodge has decided (1881) that a candidate deprived of his foot or his right thumb is ineligible. The reason in the last case is an illustration. The loss of the left thumb would not, for reasons which will occur to the initiated. In case of reasonable doubt in the minds of any W. M. he should apply to the G. M. for a dispensation.

4. In the event of a W. M. refusing to appoint a Board of Audit under the By-laws of the Lodge, the Lodge itself could

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name a Committee or Board of Audit. What the Constitution requires is that the accounts of each Lodge should be audited at least once a year. The method of appointing them is of minor importance.

5. After election, but before installation, the W. M. elect of a Lodge having decided to leave the country, was not willing to accept office, I held that it would be proper and convenient for him, at the next meeting, to decline installation, and to ask the Lodge not to confirm the minutes in so far as his election was concerned. This being done, the Lodge should, at their next meeting, proceed to elect another Master on the provisions of the Constitution (pages 51 and 52 "of Masters and Wardens"), being complied with.

6. It is not expressly provided by the Constitution that the report on the application of a candidate should be unanimous, although it is preferable it should be so. A brother who declines to sign, for reasons personal and not Masonic, should ask the W. M. to withdraw his name from the committee, and appoint another brother in his place.

7. It is not necessary to ask for and obtain from the D. D. G. M. a dispensation for a Masonic funeral.

8. A brother is entitled to his dimit, notwithstanding that there are charges against him. He is still amenable to Masonic trial, and, on conviction, penalties, notwithstanding his withdrawal.

9. Certain brethren having been reported liable to suspension for N. P. D., the W. M. called upon the S. W. to move such suspension. He, having conscientious scruples on the subject, declined to make the motion, and, on request of the W. M., vacated his chair, another being appointed in his place. The Lodge subsequently moved a resolution vacating his chair. I was of the opinion that he was guilty of no Masonic offence involving consequences so serious as to deprive

him of his office, and that it would be improper to elect a successor or treat the appointee of the W. M. as such. I thought the better way would have been, on the S. W. declining to make the motion, to ask some other brother to do so, and failing that, for the W. M. himself, on the report, to declare the brethren suspended. I recommended the Lodge in question to rescind their resolution, and leave matters exactly as they were before the occurrence in question. I am not aware what action was taken on this.

#### AMALGAMATION OF LODGES.

M. W. G. M. Henderson has alluded to this subject in one of his addresses. There is no provision in the Constitution providing for the amalgamation of private Lodges. In it appears, that so long as seven members in good standing are desirous of retaining their charter, it would be against Masonic law to deprive them of it.

Excelsior Lodge, No. 353, Colborne, being desirous of amalgamating with Colborne Lodge, No. 91, of the same place, I recommended that Excelsior Lodge, 353, should pass a resolution to the following effect: "That upon the W. M. being notified that Colborne Lodge, 91, has passed a By-law, admitting brethren of this Lodge in good standing members of such Lodge, without ballot or fee, he is hereby instructed and authorized to surrender the charter of this Lodge to the Grand Master; and that the Grand Lodge be respectfully requested to hand over the property and assets of this Lodge, vested in Grand Lodge by such surrender, to said Lodge, No. 91, so soon as the same may conveniently be done."

Also, that No. 91 should pass an amendment to their By-laws, in terms such as follows: "The brethren of Excelsior Lodge, No. 353, being desirous of surrendering their charter to Grand Lodge, and having expressed a desire to become members of this Lodge, all members of the said Lodge who shall within \_\_\_\_\_ months make application to this Lodge

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for affiliation shall, without ballot or fee, and (in each individual case, no Brother of the Lodge objecting), shall, upon signing the By-laws of the Lodge become members thereof."

A By-law in somewhat similar terms has been passed by Lodge No. 91. It is not here necessary to advert to the circumstances under which Excelsior Lodge was established, but deeming it for the good of Masonry that the amalgamation should be effected, I submitted the amendment to the G. M., who has confirmed the same. I have not yet been advised as to any action being taken by Excelsior Lodge.

The foregoing is somewhat by way of suggestion as to the manner in which amalgamation may be effected, until such time as Grand Lodge may make other provision.

#### GRIEVANCES.

These have been of so trivial a nature as hardly to call for notice. One was in relation to a dispute between a Tyler and his Lodge as to the amount due to him, and the only other a complaint as to the non-receipt of a Grand Lodge certificate. As I have heard nothing further in respect to those two complaints, I presume they have been settled to the satisfaction of the aggrieved brethren.

There are a few Lodges in the District who either have become dormant, or whose Secretaries fail to address summonses to the D. D. G. M., as is made imperative by the requirements of the Constitution.

#### AMENDMENTS TO BY-LAW.

Several Lodges have amended their By-laws, and I have considered the same and transmitted them to the G. M. for confirmation.

#### DISPENSATIONS.

I have received applications for and granted the following dispensations:—

On 12th December, 1881, to Orono Lodge, No. 825, Orono, to attend a lecture and supper in Masonic clothing.

On 2nd January, 1882, to Verulam Lodge, No. 268, Bobcaygeon, to appear in Masonic clothing at a social entertainment in the Lodge-room.

On the same date to Ontario Lodge, No. 26, Port Hope, to attend a conversazione.

On the 3rd January, 1882, to King Hiram Lodge, No. 89, Lindsay, to attend a Masonic concert.

#### NEW LODGES.

A properly signed and vouched-for petition, praying for a dispensation for a Lodge to be held at the village of Kirkfield, on the Toronto and Nipissing Division of the Midland Railway. Having personal knowledge of the officers designated, and, having made all due and necessary enquiries, I had much pleasure in recommending the application to the favorable consideration of the M. W. the G. M., and he was pleased to issue his dispensation. The Lodge has received much kindly assistance from the members of Brock Lodge, in Cannington, of which the new Lodge is an off-shoot. This is the most northerly Lodge in the District. It is in good hands and has already received a number of good applications. It is well equipped and found, and I predict for it a career of usefulness and prosperity.

It is proposed to ask for a dispensation for a Lodge to be held at Williamsburg, in the Township of Cartwright, in the County of Durham, distant about six miles, in a direct line, from the village of Port Perry, at which place Prince Albert Lodge, No. 183, holds its meetings. Owing to Lake Scugog intervening the distance is about twelve miles by travelled road. There are several members of Prince Albert Lodge residing in the vicinity, and it is proposed that a P. M. of that Lodge should be designated as the first W. M. Prince

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Albert Lodge is the nearest Lodge to the west, and the Lindsay and Omemeé Lodges to the north, and Jerusalem Lodge, Bowmanville, to the south, are each about fifteen to eighteen miles distant from the proposed place of holding, which is a thriving village, in the midst of a rich and populous farming country. The papers have not yet been received by me, and I state these facts for the information of my successor.

I regret that a more than usual amount of public and official duties has rendered it impossible for me to visit Lodges in my District to the extent that I should have wished. To make amends for this, I have given unremitting attention to all Masonic work; and have promptly answered all correspondence addressed to me.

In surrendering to Grand Lodge the important trust held by me for the period of three years, I desire to express to the brethren of the District my deep sense of their unvarying courtesy and fraternal kindness. I am conscious of not having exhibited the zeal and energy of some of my predecessors, but trust I have done my best under the circumstances, and that my brethren will

"Be to my faults a little blind,  
Be to my virtues very kind."

### PRINCE EDWARD DISTRICT.

To the Most Worshipful the Grand Master, Officers and Members of the Grand Lodge of A. F. & A. M. of Canada.

**MOST WORSHIPFUL SIR AND BRETHREN.**—The past year has been marked in Prince Edward District by an even and steady progress in Masonry, as will be shown by the Grand Lodge returns from the various Lodges in this District. Nothing

very remarkable has occurred amongst us, nor have I been called on to exercise the authority vested in me for any but the most agreeable and pleasant purposes.

I have received only two complaints during the year, one of which I gave my opinion and advice, and presume the matter must have been amicably arranged, as I have not since heard of it. The second complaint is still pending. Moira Lodge, No. 11, Belleville, through its W. Master and one of the members, complain that Mystic Lodge, No. 278, Roslin, are violating the Grand Lodge Constitution by making Masons within the jurisdiction of Moira Lodge; and also an irregularity in reference to a funeral, which occurred recently at Canifton, over which the brethren of Mystic Lodge presided. On visiting this Lodge (Mystic) I gave them my opinion and advice, and now think the matter will be satisfactorily and finally arranged. Or it may come up for adjudication at this Communication of Grand Lodge.

No other matters of any very great importance have come to my knowledge, except some questions of Masonic Jurisprudence, which, by the aid of the Digest, I was able to answer.

I have granted two dispensations during the year. One to Moira Lodge, No. 11, Belleville, for a Masonic conversazione in their hall; the second one to Mystic Lodge, No. 278, Roslin, to attend a Masonic picnic in aid of the Church of England.

Application has been made to me for dispensations for the formation of three new Lodges, one at Desoronto, one at Tamworth, and one at Colebrook, the papers of which are not yet completed.

I have much pleasure in reporting that I was requested by the Most Worshipful the Grand Master to lay the foundation stone of a new Canada Methodist Church, in the vicinity of Franck Lodge, but owing to the shortness of time the notices

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could not reach the various Lodges, and the Grand Lodge regalia could not be procured, as it was to be used by the Most Worshipful the Grand Master, at Simcoe, in two days after, (Sunday intervening); consequently the ceremonies could not be performed.

Owing to circumstances over which I had no control, I have not been able to visit as many of the Lodges as I could have wished. Many of the Lodges are working well, according to Grand Lodge Ritual, while others, especially among the young Masters, the work is badly done, owing to the want of the R——, which, I may be here permitted to say, should be supplied in some way to each Lodge as its property. There being now twenty-two Lodges in my District, with three others about being formed, in order to do justice to each Lodge by visiting it once, would require two months, or nearly that time, of constant labor to perform that work, which is too much for one man in one year. Each D. D. G. M., therefore, in my opinion, should have two years if he desires to do his work well.

Two brethren have been removed by death in my District during the year, Bro. S. McCoy, of Marmora Lodge, for whom I had the melancholy pleasure of performing the Masonic burial service. The other was Bro. Palmer, of Mystic Lodge, who was also buried with Masonic honors. These have been reported to me. Others no doubt have occurred, of which, however, I have had no report.

In conclusion, I heartily thank the brethren of my District for the honor they conferred on me in electing their D. D. G. M., and also for the fraternal greetings and uniform kindness shown me during my term of office, and which by me will not be soon forgotten.

It was my melancholy duty to assist at the interment of our late lamented M. W. P. G. M., Bro. T. D. Harington, at Prescott, on which occasion the principal officers of Grand Lodge were present.

I regret that I have not been able to visit as many of the Lodges as I could have wished. The District is a large one, the Lodges are scattered, many of them accessible only by

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driving long distances and the entire absence of winter roads during my year of office rendered the task almost an impossibility.

I am happy to say, however, that I have nothing but commendation for those which I have been able to reach.

In conclusion, I have to express my deep appreciation of the fraternal kindness extended to me by the Masters of Lodges and all the brethren with whom I have come in contact; my thanks are specially due to the R. W. the Grand Secretary for the prompt kindness with which he replied to my numerous communications and assisted me with his valued counsel.

### OTTAWA DISTRICT.

To the Most Worshipful the Grand Master, and Members of the Grand Lodge of Canada,

**MOST WORSHIPFUL SIR AND BRETHREN,**—In compliance with the requirements of the Constitution, I beg leave to present the following report:—

In the first place, I regret exceedingly to have to state, that, owing to the various calls on my time, the vast extent of this District, and its numerous Lodges, I have been quite unable to visit them all. But though this is the case, I have gathered sufficient reliable information to warrant me in saying that Masonry throughout my jurisdiction is in a tolerably flourishing condition, many of the Lodges being well attended and well worked, according to the prescribed ritual.

On the 28th, 29th and 30th of March last, I held a general Lodge of Instruction in the Ottawa Masonic Hall, which was

attended by a large, enthusiastic and highly interested number of brethren, nearly all the Lodges being represented, and over one hundred names appeared on the register as being present.

On the first evening the opening and closing of the 1st, 2nd and 3rd Degrees were well exemplified by W. Bros. F. H. W. Leggatt, Fidelity Lodge; A. Smale, Doric Lodge, and J. Kearns, of Builders' Lodge. On the second evening, the 1st and 2nd Degrees were very smoothly and ably worked by W. Bro. Dr. A. Rogers, of Civil Service Lodge, and W. Bro. C. Campbell, of Dalhousie Lodge. On the third evening, the 3rd Degree was worked and exemplified by R. W. Bro. S. Rogers, P. D. D. G. M., and I must state here that though R. W. Bro. Rogers deserved praise for the easy, fluent and confidential manner in which he performed his task, his working was sharply and very justly criticized. Brethren were there expecting to see and hear this sublime Degree illustrated according to the Grand Lodge working, and not according to a sort of hybrid ritual, which I venture to say has no existence in any Grand Lodge. With this exception the Lodge of Instruction was a great success. Every Brother seemed to take the liveliest interest in the proceedings, and all went away seemingly satisfied and benefited. On the third evening, the R. W. Bro. the Grand Secretary, J. J. Mason, honored us with his presence, and rendered me invaluable assistance in deciding the almost numberless points and questions that were raised by the brethren. I regret that through some misunderstanding the Most Worshipful the Grand Master was not invited in time to enable him to be present also.

During my term of office many applications have been made to me from Masters of Lodges to put them in possession of the working adopted and authorized by the Grand Lodge. And here let me say that this matter of ritual is one of very great importance, one with which Grand Lodge must shortly

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deal in some way. It seems to me the most effectual method of securing a uniformity of working would be to engage the services of a paid Lecturer whose duty it would be to visit and thoroughly instruct the various Lodges requiring it. Grand Lodge, with its ample funds, should have no difficulty in procuring such an officer.

During my term I have only been called upon to investigate two cases of Masonic complaint. One made by True Briton's Lodge, No. 14, Perth, against Clandeboye Lodge, No. 855, of the same place, the other by a member of Eureka Lodge, No. 248, Pakenham, against a member of St. John's Lodge, No. 68, Carleton Place, for grossly unmasonic conduct towards the former and a member of his family. I disposed of the first complaint in a manner which I think was just and should be satisfactory to both Lodges. The second complaint is yet under consideration, and, as my term of office is up, I shall relegate it to my successor.

With these exceptions I am happy to state that, so far as I know, peace and good-will towards each other and between the different Lodges reign throughout my borders.

Before closing I beg to return my warmest thanks to the brethren of the District for their uniform kindness and courtesy towards me on all occasions, and specially to R. W. Bro. Wm. Kerr, P. D. D. G. M., and V. W. Bro. Wm. Rea, for their assistance given me in settling the affairs of the late Corinthian Lodge. And as my term is now up, I bid them, as their D. D. G. M., a kindly farewell.

## REPORT OF THE BOARD ON WARRANTS.

R. W. Bro. Daniel Spry, President of the Board of General Purposes, presented and read the following

## REPORT :

At the last session of the Grand Lodge, a petition was received from the Ottawa Masonic Hall Committee, praying that the assets of Corinthian Lodge, No. 59, whose warrant had been surrendered to Grand Lodge, be handed over to them to liquidate some of the debts of the said Lodge. The Board at that time reported that the assets of that Lodge were not in the possession of Grand Lodge, and recommended that the consideration of the petition be deferred. Application is again made. The property having since been placed in the possession of Grand Lodge, the Board recommend that the petition be granted, and that all the property of Corinthian Lodge, No. 59, in the possession of Grand Lodge, with the exception of the warrant, jewels and books, be handed over to the Ottawa Masonic Hall Committee, on account of that Committee having been forced to liquidate some of the debts of the said Lodge.

At the last session of Grand Lodge, the contract for printing was awarded to G. C. Patterson & Co., the Grand Lodge reserving the right to cancel the agreement at any time that the work should be considered unsatisfactory by the Grand Master. Complaint is made that the work has been unsatisfactory. The Board, after enquiry, recommend that, owing to the unsatisfactory manner in which the work has been performed, the Grand Lodge cancel the agreement, and award the contract to J. B. Traves, of Port Hope, his being the next lowest tender.

Lodges in arrears for more than two years, have, in most cases, paid their indebtedness, and, in this connection, the Board recommend that Thorne Lodge, No. 281, Holland Landing, and Hiram Lodge, No. 342, Wolfe Island, be notified by the Grand Secretary to appear by their proper representatives at

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the next Annual Communication of Grand Lodge, to show cause why said Lodges should not be suspended.

The application of Tweed Lodge, No. 239, Tweed, for a remission of arrears of dues, has been considered. Grand Lodge has, of late years, refused to grant requests of this nature. Lodges which were in more straitened circumstances than this one, are, through the faithful and continued efforts of the officers, in a flourishing condition. The Board cannot recommend that the petition be granted, but trusts that within the next two years the Lodge will be able to pay off its indebtedness to Grand Lodge.

R. W. Bro. Long, W. M. of Wilson Lodge, No. 113, Waterford, represents that he mailed a letter containing \$21.00 to the Grand Secretary, in settlement of Lodge dues, as per return 27th Dec., 1881, and that said letter was stolen in the course of transmission. The Board are satisfied that the amount was remitted as stated, and recommend that the sum of \$21.00 be placed to the credit of the Lodge.

The Grand Master issued an order for \$122.91 on the Benevolent Fund of Grand Lodge, to cover a draft of £25 in favor of Humanitus Lodge, Vienna, Austria, to assist Masons who had suffered by the great fire in Vienna. Also, an order in favor of the Worshipful Master of Central Lodge, No. 110, Prescott, to cover the expenses connected with the funeral of our late M. W. Bro. T. D. Harington.

The Board approve of these exceptional grants, which are included in the amount reported as being expended in benevolence.

The Board have had under consideration the notification of the Finance Minister of the Dominion, that the Dominion stock held by Grand Lodge would be redeemed on the 30th September, 1882, and that there was no probability of the

issue of any other Government stock, and recommend that the funds of the Grand Lodge be deposited in the Savings' Branch of such Loan or Building Societies as may be approved of by a Committee composed of the Chairman of the Board of General Purposes, the Chairman of the Committee on Finance, and R. W. Bros. Saunders and Hungerford, until some permanent investment in City, County, or Township debentures, or other investment, can be made; said Committee to have power in such case to withdraw deposits and complete investments.

4. A list of brethren, widows and orphans, and of Local Boards of Relief, that now appear as applicants for aid for 1882, showing the grants made during 1879, 1880 and 1881, and the equalization made for the year 1882.

5. A synopsis of the whole, whereby is shown the number of the different parties who received aid since 1875, the annual average paid out to them, the aggregate of the equalization; as also the aggregate of the parties added to the list since 1879, and struck off therefrom since 1879, together with a classification of the causes why the same were struck off; the greater number of whom being those on whose behalf no application for aid has been made for three years and upwards, and are therefore considered as not requiring further aid.

The plan adopted by the Committee on Benevolence, of a revision, from time to time, of the various grants upon the list, has proved to be a necessary proceeding, inasmuch as frequent changes in the pecuniary condition of the grantees render such a revision as paramount duty devolving upon that Committee.

In view of the annual revenue of Grand Lodge, and the large increase of applications for relief from year to year, the Committee has not felt warranted to increase the scale of grants adopted in 1879, but has adhered to the same in the equalization for 1882.

In order to explain a possible misunderstanding as regards



the sums set down for the equalized annual grants, it may be stated that these are the sums to which parties as reported in the books of the Grand Lodge would be entitled to receive in case they made application for a renewal of grant; but the fact is that, in no one year, all those parties renew their application, and every year new applications are added, hence it follows that the actual total sum granted by Grand Lodge is a different sum, and up to the present a larger sum, than the aggregate of the equalization sum.

#### REPORT OF THE BOARD ON THE CONDITION OF MASONRY.

R. W. Bro. Daniel Spry, on behalf of the Board, presented and read the following

##### REPORT:

The Board of General Purposes having received the Annual Reports from the District Deputy Grand Masters of the St. Clair, London, Wilson, Huron, Wellington, Hamilton, Niagara, Toronto, Georgian, Ontario, Prince Edward, St. Lawrence and Ottawa Districts, and having carefully considered the same, beg to submit the following report on the Condition of Masonry:—

1. Your Board find with great satisfaction that, as Grand Lodge increases in years and prosperity, so the condition of Masonry within the jurisdiction increases in usefulness and in good-fellowship with each other.

2. Your Board observe with pleasure that the several Lodges for which Warrants were granted at last Annual Communication, have been regularly constituted, and their rooms, in many cases, elegantly furnished, properly consecrated and dedicated.

3. Your Board observe with pleasure and pride the dedication of the "Masonic Temple" of the city of London, Canada, which is a grand monument erected to Masonry by the liberality of the London brethren.

4. Several dispensations for establishing new Lodges have been granted, and in one case only, refused, this by the D. D. G. M. of the Wellington District, in which we found that the locality was not large enough to support a Lodge. Your Board would suggest to all District officers great care in recommending and establishing new Lodges in small localities.

5. Your Board observe with very great satisfaction that the M. W. the Grand Master has been permitted to visit so many of the Districts and Lodges throughout the jurisdiction during the past year. His presence amongst the brethren, "to judge with candor, and to admonish with friendship, and reprehend with mercy," gives them encouragement and assistance in carrying out the tenets of the Order.

6. Your Board find that only the D. D. G. Masters of London, Huron and Ottawa held Lodges of Instruction during the past year. This is to be regretted, as such meetings tend greatly to harmonize the working of the ritual, and better acquaintance and good-fellowship among the individual members throughout the Districts. It should be considered the duty of each D. D. G. M. to hold such District meetings, at least once in each year, which, if carried out, would render official visits to private Lodges unnecessary, and greatly improve the condition of Masonry.

7. Your Board also observe with pleasure that dispensa-

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tions have been issued by the Most Worshipful the Grand Master for brethren to appear clothed as Masons, and to participate in laying with Masonic ceremonies the foundation stones of churches and other public edifices throughout the jurisdiction, many of which ceremonies were personally presided over by the Grand Master, with credit to himself and honor to the Craft; other dispensations to attend divine service and festivals were granted. This laudable practice, as your Board in former years have recommended, cannot be too generally carried out. Its influence on the public and benefit to the members add to the social standing of the Craft.

8. Your Board deeply regret that it has pleased the Great Architect of the Universe to remove from this sublunary abode a number of brethren during the past Masonic year, and the most prominent among them, our late lamented and much loved Thomas Douglas Harington, Past Grand Master of this Grand Lodge, and one of our "Fathers in Masonry" in Canada; also, Right Worshipful Brothers Chauncey Bennett, P. D. D. G. M., Wilson District; J. M. Meakins, P. D. D. G. M., Hamilton District; R. W. Bro. A. S. Kirkpatrick, P. D. D. G. M., St. Lawrence District, and R. W. Bro. C. W. Paterson, Past Grand Chaplain, and would recommend that a memorial page be set apart in the proceedings of Grand Lodge to each one of the distinguished brethren.

## REPORT OF THE BOARD ON JURISPRUDENCE,

R. W. Bro. Daniel Spry, on behalf of the Board, presented and read the following

## REPORT:

The Board beg leave to present the following report on Jurisprudence:—

(1.) Bro. George R. Turner applies both personally and through his Lodge, Oriental Lodge, No. 181, Port Burwell, for a new certificate under the name of George Turner Redsell, it being alleged that such is his true name. Oriental Lodge apparently being satisfied of the truth of the allegation, the Board recommend that the precedents formerly laid down by Grand Lodge in such cases be followed in this case also, (see page 125 of Proceedings of Grand Lodge, 1881), and that an endorsement be made by the Grand Secretary on Bro. Turner's original certificate, sufficient to identify him as the person mentioned in the body of it, and that an entry be made in the books of Grand Lodge, and his own Lodge, showing such a change.

(2.) In the case of St. John's Lodge, 209a, and Bro. John Ferguson, St. John's Lodge, 209a, applied to the Grand Master for a ruling as to the position of Bro. Ferguson, he having applied to his Lodge for a Dimit, being in arrears to the amount of one dollar. He was afterwards suspended for two years dues, which had accrued after he had applied for his Dimit. Pending a decision by the Grand Master a compromise was effected, and the Brother's name, as a suspended member, was temporarily taken from the Report to the Grand Secretary, upon his consenting to pay the sum of one dollar, the amount of his arrears when he applied to withdraw from the Lodge. The Board concur in the ruling of the Grand Master, as follows, to wit: "That he is of opinion that as the Lodge had voluntarily consented to Bro. Ferguson's name being removed from the suspended list on payment of one

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dollar, the payment of that sum by Bro. Ferguson will entitle him to sever his connection with the Lodge, and to become an unaffiliated Mason in good standing." The Board would further say that where there is a conflict between the Constitution and By-laws, the Constitution must rule.

(8.) A letter from Bro. Wm. Peacock, asking to have his position defined, he being a Past Grand Senior Deacon of the Provincial Grand Lodge of North Munster, under the Grand Lodge of Ireland.

There is no provision in our Constitution allowing an officer of a sister Grand Lodge similar rank in this Grand Lodge; and in this case Bro. Peacock was merely an officer of a Provincial Grand Lodge, and would take no rank in the Grand Lodge of Ireland, but only in the province of which he had been elected or appointed an officer.

#### REPORT OF THE BOARD ON GRIEVANCES AND APPEALS.

R. W. Bro. Daniel Spry, on behalf of the Board, presented and read the following

##### REPORT :

The Board of General Purposes beg leave to report on the several matters submitted to them in the nature of Grievances and Appeals as follows:

They have received and examined the documents and evidence in the following cases and have heard the parties interested in each case in which they were present.

From the evidence and papers submitted in these cases the Board have arrived at the following conclusions :—

PEMBROKE LODGE, No. 128, vs. BRO. R. F. READ.	}	In June, 1878, Bro. R. F. Read was sus- pended by Pembroke Lodge, No. 128, for a violation of his O. B. as a M. M. and his expulsion is asked for by the Lodge.
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The delay appears to have been occasioned by the neglect of the Secretary and the removal of the Master from the jurisdiction.

After considering the evidence and papers submitted, the Board recommend that the Grand Secretary be instructed to summon Bro. R. F. Read to show cause at the next meeting of the Grand Lodge why he should not be expelled from the Craft.

PEMBROKE LODGE, No. 128. vs. BRO. THOS. A. FINDLAY.	}	In July, 1880, Bro. Thomas A. Findlay was suspended by Pembroke Lodge, No. 128, for embezzlement of the funds of the Lodge while Secretary, and his expulsion is asked for by the Lodge.
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After considering the evidence and papers submitted the Board recommend that the Grand Secretary be instructed to summon Bro. Thomas A. Findlay to attend the next annual communication of the Grand Lodge, and show cause why he should not be expelled from the Craft.

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In the matter of  
 W. BRO. J. BRASFORD  
 and  
 WELLAND LODGE, No. 86.  
 Niagara District for investigation. (See Proceedings 1881, p. 126.)

Last year this matter was referred to the D. D. G. M. of Niagara District for investigation. (See Proceedings 1881, p. 126.)

From his report it appears that the point to be settled is whether remission of dues is equivalent to payment under a by-law which provides that "any brother suspended for non-payment of dues shall not be permitted to rejoin his Lodge until all such back dues shall be paid."

The Board are of opinion that the remission of dues, when regularly done, is equivalent to payment.

With this in view, it is recommended that the D. D. G. M. of Niagara District be requested to make further enquiry into the matter of the remission of dues by Welland Lodge, in order to prevent the injustice which may arise by the remission of dues of brethren who are well able to pay.

MERRILL LODGE, No. 844,  
 vs.  
 NILESTOWN LODGE, No. 845.

Merrill Lodge, No. 844, Dorchester Station, complains that

Nilestown Lodge, No. 845, Nilestown, initiated one John Richardson, residing within the jurisdiction of Merrill Lodge, without consulting the latter Lodge. The information submitted being insufficient, the Board recommend that the matter be referred to the D. D. G. M. of the London District, for investigation, and that he be authorized to take such action thereon as the circumstances of the case may warrant.

BRO. JAMES SMITH,  
 vs.  
 St. GEORGE'S LODGE, No. 42.

In this matter Bro. James, Smith appeals against the action and decision of St. George's Lodge, No. 42, London, in dismissing

decision of St. George's Lodge, No. 42, London, in dismissing

a charge preferred by him against W. Bro. William Fleming, of the same Lodge. The papers indicate that the proceedings of the Lodge were quite regular. The Board accordingly recommend that the appeal be dismissed, as they see no reason to interfere with the discretionary power of the Lodge in refusing to proceed with the charge.

QUINTE LODGE, No. 241.

vs.

BRO. ALEXANDER BOULTON.

Quinte Lodge, No. 241, Shannonville, for un-Masonic conduct, with a recommendation to the Grand Lodge for expulsion. After fully considering the case, the Board confirm the suspension, but do not comply with the request for expulsion.

vs.

HARRISTON LODGE, No. 262.

Clifford Lodge, No. 315, in the matter of the initiation of one Robert Scott, by Harriston Lodge, No. 262, Clifford Lodge claiming that the candidate lives within their jurisdiction. The papers before the Board show that this is, in fact, an appeal against the decision of the Grand Master. Harriston Lodge at first believing that the candidate resided within the jurisdiction of Clifford Lodge, applied for a dispensation from the Grand Master, with the approval and recommendation of the D. D. G. M., asking permission to initiate the applicant. On the material submitted the Grand Master finds as follows: "On a careful perusal of the evidence produced, I am of the opinion the greater portion of the land upon which the candidate resides, as also the dwelling, being within the jurisdiction of the Harriston Lodge, I can see no necessity for a dispensation, as the Lodge can go on and initiate." The decision of the Grand Master was arrived at on the 30th November last, and a copy was ordered to be sent to each Lodge. The appeal of Clifford

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Lodge is dated June, 1882. On the facts set forth the Board recommend that the appeal be dismissed.

BRO. JESSE ELDRIDGE,  
vs.

BRO. JAMES SHIRTON.

Bro. Jesse Eldridge,  
of Walsingham Lodge,  
174, Port Rowan,

charged Bro. James Shirton, of Palmer Lodge, 372, Victoria, with grossly immoral conduct and a violation of his obligation as a Mason.

Bro. Shirton was tried by his Lodge on four distinct charges, and was acquitted. From this verdict of acquittal the complainant appealed to the D. D. G. M., who, after hearing the parties and taking some further evidence, reversed the verdict of the Lodge, found Bro. Shirton guilty, suspended him, and recommended him for expulsion.

It is recommended that the case be referred to the M. W. the Grand Master, with the request that he will appoint the President of the Board of General Purposes to fully investigate it, on the evidence already given, and any further evidence that may be procurable, and to report all the evidence, with his opinion thereon, at the next meeting of the Board.

In the matter of  
BRO. R. H. McCANN  
and  
KERR LODGE, No. 290.

In June, 1878, Bro.  
McCann was tried for,  
and convicted by the

Lodge of unmasonic conduct, and indefinitely suspended. He now appeals against the action of the Lodge; and after he had made his appeal he applied to the Lodge to reinstate him, expressing in his application his regret for having in any way given offence. He has forwarded a certificate, signed by a Presbyterian clergyman, several Justices of the Peace, two Reeves and some others, bearing testimony to his standing as a respectable man, of undoubted sobriety and general good character. The Lodge have refused to recom-

mend him for restoration. The Board are of opinion that the Lodge at the time they suspended him were justified in doing so, and therefore recommend that the appeal be dismissed; but would also recommend that a copy of the certificate of character above referred to be sent to the Lodge, with a request to give the application for restoration a careful re-consideration,

In the matter of  
 BRO. JACOB HOLMES  
 and  
 ARKONA LODGE, No. 307.

In June, 1881, the  
 appellant after trial  
 was convicted by the

Lodge of unmasonic conduct, in that he lived an immoral life, and suspended. He appealed to Grand Lodge at its last meeting against the action of the Lodge, and the case stood over to this meeting to obtain full information on the subject.

The Board has now received and examined the evidence, and statement of the appellant, and are of opinion that the charge was clearly proved and therefore recommend that the Appeal be dismissed.

BRO. S. MARTEL DAVIES,  
 against  
 W. BRO. JOHN MOORE, W. M. St.  
 James' Lodge, No. 74.

Bro. Davies com-  
 plains, in substance,  
 (1.) That W. Bro.  
 John Moore, at the

regular meeting of the Lodge, held on the 5th of December last, allowed the ballot to pass for two brethren who were applicants for affiliation, without proper notice having been given. (2.) That the complainant was at that time duly elected W. M. of the Lodge, but that the W. M. declared the vote a tie.

The facts are, shortly, as follows:—At a meeting of the Lodge, held on the 7th of November last, a P. M. presiding in the absence of the W. M., the ballot was passed for Bros. Burr and Dunn, applicants for affiliation, and declared in

their favor. In the notice for the required meeting of 5th December, notice was given that the ballot would be taken for the same brethren in these words, viz: "To ballot for Bros. Burr and Dunn, candidates for affiliation." On the 5th of December, the complainant was present and acted in his office of Junior Warden. At this meeting the W. M. declared the election of Bros. Burr and Dunn, on 7th November, void, because no notice had been given of the ballot. The ballot was afterwards passed on the application of said brethren for affiliation, and declared in their favor. No objection, so far as appears, was made by the complainant or any other brother against the said brethren being then balloted for.

After these brethren had thus been declared members of the Lodge, the election of officers was proceeded with. The ballot passed seven times for W. M., but resulted each time in a tie, being eleven votes each for the complainant and Bro. Dunn. The W. M. declared that there was no election of W. M., and applied for and obtained a dispensation from the M. W. the Grand Master to hold an election for W. M. on 27th December, and, if elected, to then instal him. At this meeting, W. Bro. Moore was re-elected W. M. Bro. Davies contends that Bros. Burr and Dunn were illegally elected members of the Lodge on the 7th of November and the 5th of December, respectively; that, not being members, they could not sit and vote on the affairs of the Lodge, and that, not being members, neither could hold the office of Worshipful Master; that, by virtue of the Junior Warden (the complainant) receiving eleven votes in a body of twenty members seven times in succession, for the office of W. M., he is the W. M. elect, and that the W. M. improperly declared on the 5th of December that there was no election. The complainant concludes by asking that he may be declared the W. M. elect.

As the W. M. declared the election of Bros. Burr and

Dunn as members of the Lodge, at the meeting of 7th Nov., void, there is no fault to find with his action in this respect.

The W. M. erred in allowing the ballot to pass on 5th Dec., for their election as members, inasmuch as the notice of meeting did not, as it should have done, specify the occupation, place of abode, the name and number of the Lodge they then respectively belonged to, or in which they respectively had been initiated, and recommend that he be reprimanded for having done so. But as the Brethren were elected and became *de facto* members at the meeting of 5th Dec., and no objection was then made by the complainant or any other brother, the Board are of opinion that the action of the Lodge in electing them should not be disturbed.

In regard to the complaint of Bro. Davies, that out of 20 members of the Lodge he had 11 votes, and was therefore elected W. M., the Board would say that as the election of W. M. is by ballot, and 22 votes were actually cast, namely, 11 for Bro. Davies and 11 for Bro. Dunn, it is not competent to enquire how the members voted, therefore the W. M. was correct in declaring that there was no election.

Under all the circumstances the Board recommend that the complaint be dismissed.

#### REPORT OF THE BOARD ON PROXIES.

R. W. Bro. Daniel Spry, on behalf of the Board, presented and read the following

##### REPORT :

The Board of General Purposes, to whom was referred the report of the Committee on Proxies at the last Annual Communication of Grand Lodge, beg to report, that, in their



opinion, the evils connected with the use of proxies could be obviated by insisting upon a strict observance by the Masters of Lodges of the provisions of the Constitution respecting proxies. This can best be done by requiring the District Deputy Grand Master to procure from each Lodge in his District, which appears to have given a proxy, a certified copy of the minutes of the meeting at which such proxy was granted, or, when convenient, personally to examine the books of the Lodge, to ascertain whether the proxy was properly granted. In the event of his finding that there has been any abuse or irregularity, he should be required to proceed against the offenders and secure their punishment, and he should be required to report that this duty of inspection has been duly performed by him. A circular, embodying these suggestions, if adopted, should be sent by the Grand Secretary, with the proxy, to the Master of each Lodge, with directions to read the same in open Lodge.

The Report of the Committee, referred to the Board, could hardly be adopted with safety, for, under its provisions, a delegate might be disfranchised by the neglect of the Secretary or the miscarriage of a letter.

The Board think that the suggestion already made, if adopted, will cure the abuses complained of.

It was moved by R. W. Bro. Daniel Spry, seconded by R. W. Bro. R. T. Walkem,

That the Report of the Board on Proxies be received and adopted.

It was moved, in amendment, by R. W. Bro. J. E. Harding, seconded by Bro. the Rev. David Armstrong,

That the Report of the Board on Proxies be amended by striking out the clause requiring the D. D. G. M. to enquire whether the Proxy has been properly granted by the Lodge.

The amendment was put to Grand Lodge, and declared lost.

The original resolution was then put to Grand Lodge, and was adopted.

### REPORT OF THE BOARD ON THE GRAND MASTER'S ADDRESS.

R. W. Bro. Daniel Spry, on behalf of the Board, presented and read the following

#### REPORT :

The Board of General Purposes have the honor to report upon the address of the Most Worshipful the Grand Master, as follows:—

They concur heartily in the suggestion that a respectful address should be presented by Grand Lodge to Her Majesty the Queen, congratulating her on her recent providential escape from assassination. Her Majesty is connected with the brethren by many strong ties, and is entitled to their particular love and respect as Masons. They recommend that a committee be appointed to prepare the address and forward it to its destination.

The Board are happy to learn of the continued progress and prosperity of the Craft in this Province during the past year. They regard this progress as an evidence that our principles are, happily, being understood and appreciated, and that our work is being well and faithfully done by the subordinate, as well as the superior officers of the Order.

The Board concur in the feelings and views to which the Most Worshipful the Grand Master has given expression in reference to the death of the late illustrious President of the neighboring Republic. They desire to express their earnest sympathy with their American brethren on that event, and the hope that no similar calamity may again cast a shadow of mourning over the land.

The Board observe with deep sorrow the list of brethren

who have been called away by the gavel of death during the past year. The summons has come to many who stood high in the Craft, and who have done much to advance the interests of Masonry. It will be the duty of Grand Lodge to see that provision is made for those bereaved ones, who are entitled to our sympathy and support.

The Grand Master's remarks on jurisprudence, the condition of Masonry, and certain grievances, have occupied the attention of the several committees to which those subjects are entrusted, and do not require further comment at our hands.

The Board desire to express their appreciation of the zeal and activity displayed by the Grand Master in the discharge of his duties, and their belief that his visits to the several Lodges will have a beneficial and stimulating effect.

The appointment of Foreign Representatives, contained in the report are recommended for approval.

The building which has lately been erected by the Masons of London, does credit not only to themselves, but the Craft generally, and the Board wish the promoters of the undertaking every success in the completion of their great work.

The Board approve of the action of the Most Worshipful the Grand Master in directing the payment, out of the funds of Grand Lodge, of the funeral expenses of our late M. W. Bro. Harington, and in contributing to the fund for the relief of distressed brethren in Vienna.

Other subjects of importance, referred to by the Grand Master, are worthy of serious consideration by Grand Lodge. The address is at once comprehensive and minute, and bears witness to the energy and industry of its Most Worshipful author.
