With great rhetorical brilliancy he denounced the government's Scottish small land owners' bill. The rumor had gone forth that Lord Rosebery was to speak and the House was filled to listen to a Liberal Peer castigate a Liberal cabinet. Lord Rosebery declared that he wished the government well, but he ridiculed its efforts to legislate for Scotland. His complaint was that the Bill in question would "crofterize"


