

Geny tender, with Commander Ogilby, Flag Lieut. Cochrane, &c. The revision of the French Constitution is again talked off. Serious disturbances have occurred south of Lyons, but they have been suppressed.

Denmark and the Duchies.—The Cologne Gazette of the 10th has a telegraphic despatch from Athens of the 9th stating that some skirmishing took place on the previous day on the whole of the outposts. The left wing of the Holotheners, the 9th and 11th battalions of foot and the first regiment were driven back upon Studaratapel, but being reinforced by another detachment they advanced again and forced the Danes back upon the French. They eight captured Danes were brought to Rendsborough, and the wounded of the first regiment of the line in wagons.

Germany and Hungary.—A partial ratification of the treaty of peace has been exchanged at Berlin. Seventeen States of Germany approve of it. The Austrian government has issued a record of all those who were put to death by the Hungarians either by sentence of their court marshals or their tribunals in Hungary and Transylvania.

The Bordeaux papers bring an appalling account of the fatal termination of Lieut. Galo's balloon ascent, on horseback from the Hippodrome of Vincennes in the neighborhood of the city, on Sunday, Sept. 5. Lieut. Galo had succeeded in reaching the ground with his pony, when the people who came to assist him, misunderstanding his directions, after the pony was released, let go the ropes. The unfortunate ascendant, hanging on by his hands to a rope, was instantly caught up in the air with the balloon, which continued ascending for upwards of a mile. The next day a corpse was discovered in the direction which the balloon had taken which was identified as that of Lieutenant Galo.

English Papers Excluded from Rome.—The Roman Post Office has recommenced its rigorous exclusion of such foreign newspapers as express opinions unfavorable to the Papal Court, or to any of the branches of admiration. All the Democratic press of England, France, and Tuscany, has been long since prohibited; but though the Times, Gazzette, and the Journal des Debats have nominal free entrance, not a day passes but one of them is excluded. Remonstrances are made, and even now the journals addressed to resident diplomats to whom some courtesy was hitherto shown, are devoted to the same extremity.

Ireland.—The tent at the meeting of the Repeal Association on Monday was £3 and a few odd shillings. On Sunday about five hundred men assembled on the lands of Tyriskay within one mile of Arrisbeg, and there cut down eight acres of oats, and carried them away, without any one to obstruct them. The National Synod at Thomas has decided upon establishing a Roman Catholic University in Ireland, in opposition to the Government and Protestant establishment. Every ecclesiastic in Ireland will be called upon to pay an annual tax of one per cent on his income for its support; and a committee has been already named for carrying the project into effect. The Archbishop and Dr. Cantwell for Ulster; the Archbishop and Dr. Derry for Connaught; the Archbishop and Dr. Healy for Leinster; the Archbishop and Dr. O'Connell for Munster. These prelates are to associate with themselves as many priests, and a similar number of laymen are to be associated with both, to form a provisional committee for carrying the project into effect. Dr. Cantwell, it is said, estimates by a subscription of £11,000.

Switzerland.—Avalanche of Rocks.—On Sept. 3, a great storm was occasioned last night, at 2 1/2 o'clock, by the falling of the rocks at Felsberg. Nearly the entire population, roused from their beds by the fearful crash of the rocks almost an hour previous to their fall, had quitted the village, and stood on the plain beyond awaiting the awful catastrophe. The night was tolerably light; suddenly a tremendous crash was succeeded by thick clouds of dust, and large masses of rock were precipitated from the heights, apparently upon the village beneath. So fearful was the noise that all concluded that the village was buried, but on rushing to the spot the inhabitants found a huge wall of rocks up at a very extraordinary height of the village. About twenty of the blocks were as large as a small house, and innumerable others were of rather less dimensions. It is possible that these masses may stand for some time; but the danger is imminent, as they are piled immediately beneath the precipice.

Warriors to Speculators.—In June last, the Times carried the table with respect to California Gold Regions Association, which had been advertised in the London papers, with a list of directors whose addresses were given, if not omitted, fictitious. Nothing more was heard of the scheme for a time. But it now appears that the speculators are still in full activity, and that they must already have raised a considerable sum. The "California Gold Regions Association" has changed its name to the "Anglo-California Gold Mining and Drilling Company," and the Directors have designated an expedition of Cornish miners under Sir Henry Vere Huntley, R. N., with Governor of Prince Edward Island, to arrive in that country about the end of the present month. Some suspicious-looking reports from Mr. James Palmer, "an eminent engineer," are being circulated, with the hope of inducing people to apply to him. The writer of the City articles in the Times shews all credulous folk that every prospect of success is a mere bubble, and that the fact that not a single mine has yet been known where mines have continued to be worked, is a sufficient proof that the whole is a mere speculation, and that the result of their labor will be transmitted to the shareholders in a few months. Mr. Brown, who is known only as the published prospect

is that of Messrs. Spooner, Atwood & Company, who are made to figure as its bankers, and its firm, upon application being made to them, state that the company have no account with them, and have never had authority to use their names! PROTESTANT ADVANCE.—Our readers will remember that a few weeks ago, we published a long account of the wonderful revival in Ireland—about 600 Roman Catholics having at that time joined the Protestant Church. We thought, then, that the movement was principally confined to the lower classes. It is shown, however, that the following from the Dublin Missionary Herald, comprises the latest intelligence which we have received. May God carry on the blessed work! There is a movement among the Roman Catholic countrymen (the Irish) to an extent which, perhaps, few are aware of. We have been informed that among the students in our Protestant University, there are now converts from the Church of Rome, and we can name sixteen ministers of our Church who have been won to the service of Christ from the same apostate communion. It is also notorious that great numbers of the lower classes have openly come over from the ranks of Romanism, and that there is, generally speaking, among the Roman Catholic population, an unexampled desire to know the points of difference between the two Churches. The substance of the Roman Catholic are not stuck in their endeavors to arrest the progress of this movement, but they have wisely failed to themselves of the powerful agency of the press for that purpose. No article with the press papers which hitherto advocated their cause, they have ordered the Editors to discontinue, in order that the able editor might be placed in the most advantageous position for giving his services to the cause of Popery, while the agency of the press seemed most to call for them.—Western Evangelist.
