Petrograd, via London, April 5—The following official statement concerning the progress of the war was given out here tonight: "Along the front, west of the Niemen river, yesterday our troops centinued to make successful progress at certain points. "In the Carpathians, during the night of April 3-4, and during the whole of the following day, in the region to the north of Bartfeld, there was flerce fighting' with artillery and the bayonet. We took twenty offi-cers, and more than twelve hundred soldiers prisoners, and captured two machine guns. At the same time we continued to make progress on the front between Mezolaborcz and Uzsok. In the course of the day we captured about twenty-five officers, and more than two thousand soltured about twenty-five officers, and more than two the

"Having occupied the railway station at Cisna (in the Carpathians the Galician side, about fifteen miles east of Lupkow), we captured gines and coaches, as well as a great stock of ammunition, and part of a provision train.

"There was desperate fighting Wednesday and Thursday near the village of Okna, to the north of Czernowitz (Bukowina), as a result of which we took more than a thousand prisoners whom the Austrians had
