DEARLY BRLOVED :

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It is with no ordinary degree of satisfaction and comfort, that we, your ministering servants for Jesus' sake, in Annual Conference Assembled, are enabled to address you in the accustomed Epistle

of congratulation and advice.

The past year has been one of peculiarly abundant goodness and mercy from the good hand of our God toward our beloved country, our neighbours, and ourselves. The toil of the husbandman being rewarded in the abundant productions of the soil, safely and timely secured in the garner—no pestilence or sickness to any extent being permitted to visit our clime,—and the prevalence of peace within our borders, denote the gracious regard and kind dealings of Providence.

The hand of death has been restrained, and in no instance among us as a body of Ministers, are we called to the painful duty of recording a case of decease among our brethren in the Ministry or of

defection from our ranks.

As a church we trust it may be truly said we have been kept in the unity of the spirit and bond of Peace, the comfort of which is enjoyed only by those who possess singleness of heart purity of intention, and oneness of design—Who "walk by the same rule and mind the same things"—But what fills us with increased comfort is the powerful manifestations of the Divine Presence in our religious

assemblies, and the seals to our Ministry with which it has pleased the great Head of the Church to crown our humble labours the past year. The effusions of the Holy Spirit have indeed been copious and refreshing, so that in many of our meetings scores of believers from blessed experience could sing together

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"Tis God with us we feel him ours"
"His fullness in our souls he pours."

while others were constrained to yield to the claims of dying love, and come forward to enrol themselves under the banner of the cross.

The increase in the number of members in our societies during the year amounts to 734, making the whole number of the Methodist Episcopal Church in Canada at the present time 5325.

Several comfortable Chapels have been erected, or are in progress of erection through the exertion of our friends, and our finances though far from being what they ought to be, are considerably en-

larged and improved.

We have the pleasure of saying that the proceedings of our present session of Conference have been characterized by harmony and love. Our multifarious conferential matters have been taken up, debated on, and disposed of, with calmness forbearance and expedition. Ten fellow labourers, mostly persons in the vigour of life, and of promising abilities, have been added to the itinerancy—called, we trust by the Lord of the Harvest to go forth into his Vineyard, within the rapidly extending field of our labours.

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There are several particulars upon the observance of which, depends in our opinion in a great measure the efficiency of our Ministry, and the prosperity of the work of God among us-towards which we now affectionately call your attention. In the first place a punctual and steady attendance upon all the institutions of the Church, commonly called means of Grace—as the Ministry of the word, the administration of the sacraments, public, family and private prayer, class meetings and love feasts-Secondly, a strict and conscientious observance of that excellent compendium of Christian duty comprised under the head of our "GENERAL RULES" with which every Methodist should furnish himself, and be familiar .- Thirdly, the maintainance of the doctrine and purity of the faith once delivered to the saints in the Holy Scriptures, which we hold to be the only as it is the sufficient Rule of our faith and practice, shunning as spurious every thing else presented to us as a revelation from Heaven claiming our assent or obedience, thus will be avoided the delusion and fanaticism into which too many even in this enlightened age, have unhappily fallen .-Fourthly, a ready and hearty co-operation with your fellow Christians of other denominations in every benevolent and moral enterprise, having for its object the glory of God and good of our fellow men-such as Rible, Missionary and Temperance Societies, and Sabbath Schools-thus will we best evince the soundness of our profession, as being of that "peculiar people zealous of good works"-

Lastly, we cannot but remind you of the necessity of system and effort relative to the finances of

our Church. We, as is well known repudiate every means of revenue to the Church, other than the voluntary contributions of the people; upon this voluntary system alone we depend and cannot but believe that, to whatever privations it either has or may subject us, it most effectually tends to preserve the purity and efficiency of the Ministry of the Gospel. Having no other resources we are the more emboldened to call upon our beloved friends for their liberal contributions .- We call not for charity in this matter; our claim to your support is founded on that just, plain, and apostolic axiom that they who preach the Gospel should live of the Gospel, and those who sow to you spiritual things should reap of your carnal things" and again "the labourer is worthy of his hire." Upon us who have relinquished our wordly avocations, and entered the Gos. pel field, devolves the work of serving you; upon you the DUTY of supporting us and ours with a competency of things necessary for this life. Thus will our respective duties and benefits the reciprocated, and all will work together for the edification of the body of Christ.

We would also remind you that much of the usefulness of our Ministry depends upon the intelligence of the preachers,—They "must study to show themselves approved workmen that need not to be ashamed, rightly dividing the word of truth."— Therefore we entreat that you will afford them every facility in your power for the cultivation of their minds, and the attainment of useful knowledge.

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"Finally brethren, whatsoever things are true, whatsoever things are honest, whatsoever things are

just, whatsoever things are pure, whatsoever things are lovely, whatsoever things are of good report; if there be any virtue, if there be any praise, think of these things,"

The vineyard of the Lord lies before us, and we are greatly encouraged to proceed with our work, earnestly soliciting your prayers that the word of the Lord may have free course and be glorified among us.

APPENDIX.

Minutes of the Second Annual Report of the Parent Missionary Society of the Methodist Episcopal Church, convened by appointment according to Article 11 of the Constitution, at Cummer's Chapel, Yonge Street, Sept. 7th 1840, at 7 o'clock P. M.

Meeting opened with singing and Prayer by the President Rev. John Reynolds, who also addressed the Meeting as to the object of this Society.

The following report was then read and adopt.

ed : -

REPORT.

Your Committee on presenting their Second Annual Report, beg leave to state for the information of the Society, that the field for missionary operation in this Province is so extensive, that it calls for vigorous activity on the part of our Church, Missionaries might be profitably employed by the Annual Conference, if the Society had sufficient funds for their support.

Men of piety and zeal are willing to engage in this glorious enterprise, being satisfied that it is the cause of God. The only reason therefore why

they are not employed is the want of funds.

The Macedonian cry "Come over and help us" has been heard, and shall our brethren and friends who have it in their power to lend assistance, withhold the aid so necessary to establish and perpetuate this arduous and absolutely important undertaking; we are fully persuaded that the philanthropic heart replies, No, your treasury shall be replenished.

Your Committee feel justified in stating, that information among our friends on this momentous subject is absolutely necessary, in order to direct their attention to this department of the Church, and the obligations they are under to God and their

fellow men.

We would therefore recommend Missionary Meet. ings to be held by all our Preachers, and branch Societies formed in every neighborhood where it is practicable, being fully persuaded that the members and friends of the Methodist Episcopal Church in Canada, are anxious to help forward this great

Your Committee have learned with pleasure that several Branch Societies have been formed in different places; but regret to state that only two of these Societies have reported to your Committee; viz: the Trafalgar and Esquesing branch Societies, both on the Nelson Circuit. These Societies have collected and paid into the hands of the Treasurer of this Society £12 3 11. - Your Committee have also received from the members of this Society, £4, making in all £16 3 11.

A Mission has been established at the Grand River, where a Missionary has labored part of the past year, for which he has received £12 10, out of what has been collected for this Society.

There remains in the Treasury a balance of £3 13 1½ unappropriated, to which will be added

the dividend of the Centenary fund.

Your Committee in closing this report would recommend the Society to encourage the Annual Conference to establish Missions among the Aborigines of our country, and destitute settlements among the whites as soon as practicable.

All of which is respectfully submitted.

2d. Moved by Rev. James Richardson, seconded Rev. Joseph H. Leonard, That as by Missionary labour Christianity was propagated at first among the Nations of the Earth, so it appears necessary for the further conquests of the Heathen, and dominion of Christ to encourage and employ as extensilvey as possible Missionaries of the Cross devoted exclusively to the work of the Ministry among the

Aborigines, and those destitute of the stated Minis-

try of the word.
