## REPORT,

&c.

It is with feelings of deep and real pleasure that the Committee of this Society again meet the Friends of Missions at this Anniversary. They meet to congratulate them on the progress of the best of causes, and to excite recollections of past labours, only to connect them with successes which have already contributed in no small degree to increase the sum of human happiness, and to diffuse the light and the blessings of the Gospel; successes which carry with them interesting pledges of future triumphs and fill the mind with animating anticipations of the still more extensive establishment of the pure and peaceful reign of Christ in this hitherto dark and wretched world.

THE Committee are aware, and would never forget, that success is not the foundation of the obligation of Christians to persevere in the Missionary exertions. That duty rests upon the solemn mandate of their Lord; upon the trust devolved upon them, along with every privilege which Christianity has conferred; upon their personal love and gratitude to their Saviour; upon the tender and sympathizing charity, which is ever fed and nurtured by a religion of kindness and good will in every heart on which it exerts its influence.

As the end of the efforts to which those principles prompt, and to which they give the character of patient perseverance, the Committee contemplate their successes with joy, and commend them to the consideration of their friends and co-adjutors in this work. They are such as call for lively expressions of gratitude to God, the author of all success in the conversion of men to the knowledge and practice of his will, and encourage future exertions, by leaving the stamp and character of the divine blessing on the past. We weep not over the wastes of Zion, nor go about her palaces to mark their desolation and decay. The wastes of many generations are in repair. The sound of busy labour is heard around us, the foundations are carried out to comprehend the worshippers of our

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God in distant lauds, and the building rises and extends in conformity to the plans of the divine Architect. The days come, saith the Lord of Hosts, when the mountain of the Lord's house shall be established on the top of the mountains, and shall be exalted above the hills, and all nations shall flow unto it. And many people shall go and say, Come ye, and let us go up to the mountain of the Lord, to the house of the God of Israel; and he will teach us of his ways, and we will walk in his paths, for out of Zion shall go forth the law, and the word of the Lord from Jerusalem.

In hastening these great results, the Committee rejoice to hail as their fellow-labourers the numerous Societies which now bear the burden of the pagan world, and hasten by their zeal and by their prayers the preparations for its recovery and redemption; and highly as they value the labours of the Wesleyan Missionaries, and confidently as they can recommend them to the continued liberality of the religious public, they view them with additional satisfaction as parts of that great system of beneficent operation which in almost every direction in which sin and misery have spread, is tracing it through all its paths, every where applying the efficacious remedies provided in our divine religion,—every where seeking that which is lost, and leading to the folds of refuge “the sheep for whom their shepherd died.”

As a Committee of a Methodist Auxiliary Society, their report must principally respect the operations of their own missions, and of the Society, whose object has been to lend its aid to the furtherance of their benevolent objects. For the copious details which these Missions present, the Committee must refer to the Report of the Parent Society which is daily expected, in the mean time they cannot refrain from acknowledging that the accounts already received are animating, and calculated to excite new and deeper interests in an Institution, which in so energetic and successful a manner, is dispensing the blessings of the Christian faith to many thousands of our fellow men, and in those parts of the world which call for the greatest commiseration and help.

BOTH the Stations occupied by the Society, and the Missionaries engaged in the work, have been augmented during the year. The expenditure is in consequence greatly increased, but the Committee doubt not that the New-Brunswick District Society will cheerfully engage in new exertions to provide their share of this burden, and afford an example to other Districts of a zeal catching new ardour from the prospects which in so many directions present themselves, of communicating the Gospel to men perishing for want of it, and roused to acts of generous

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sacrifice by the consideration of the claims of those, who, however distant the bounds of their habitation are the children of our Father in Heaven; equally with ourselves the objects of the dying love of Christ, and who were commended by him, in the last act of his life upon earth, to the care and instruction of his Church.

FROM the liberal sums raised in the New-Brunswick District for Missionary purposes, we are warranted in the persuasion, (and it is one in which the Committee feel pleased in indulging,) that the duty of Christians to attempt the evangelization of the world is more generally acknowledged and that sympathy for the condition of the Heathen is more deeply felt.

It remains now only for the Committee to commend the interests of the Society to their successors in office, and to the support of the Public. The Wesleyan Missions, which it is its object to support, they conceive to have strong claims to share in that countenance which Christians of every denomination are now extending to every attempt to rescue the world from its darkness and misery. Happily, extensive as these Missions are, and many of them in Stations of great difficulty and hazard, no want of suitable Missionaries has been experienced; the work is capable of great extension, and in directions in which piety and humanity would wish it most to spread, among the Pagap Slaves of our own Colonies, and in the darkness of the East: the agency of education, the printing and circulation of the Scriptures, and above all, the grand means established and directed by God himself, for the conversion of men of the world, the preaching of the everlasting Gospel by faithful men, are all in application to accomplish those results, for which the good of all ages have sighed, and in the anticipation of which they have rejoiced: and nothing appears wanting but the continuance of the divine blessing, and the pecuniary aid of the Friends of Missions to carry the work into new successes and extending scenes of struggle and triumph. The Committee rely on both. The hearts of the people are made ready, and in this disposition, so evidently diffusing itself among Christians, the accomplishment of that prediction of Messiah cannot but be remarked, "And he shall live, and to him shall be given the gold of Sheba, prayer also shall be made for him continually, and daily shall he be praised." And the accomplishment of this prophecy is but the prelude to the fulfilment of one more lofty and comprehensive, and towards which all our hopes and wishes are bending:—"His name shall endure for ever, his name shall be continued as long as the sun, and men shall be blessed in him. All nations shall call him blessed."

Your Committee will now proceed to give such a view of the operations of the Parent Society, as the limits of this report will allow of.

“In almost every department, the operations of the Society have been favoured with success. Nearly three thousand Members have been added to the number previously enjoying the advantages of Christian communion; and the income, including the proceeds of the legacy bequeathed to the Society by the late Miss Houston, has amounted to more than £50,000.”

#### THE IRISH MISSION.

“For more than thirty years the Methodist Conference has employed able and zealous Missionaries amongst the lower, and more neglected and superstitious part of the population, who, by frequently preaching in the Irish language, and addressing the crowds assembled at fairs and markets, have been favoured with no inconsiderable success. At present twenty-four Missionaries are thus engaged.”

“SCHOOLS have also been established for the instruction of the children of the poor, under the direction of a general Superintendent. The number of Schools is twenty, containing, according to the last returns, one thousand four hundred chil-

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### MISSIONS ON THE CONTINENT OF EUROPE, AND IN THE MEDITERRANEAN.

"OUR Missions on the Continent of Europe are at STOCKHOLM and in FRANCE ; and in the Mediterranean, at GIBRALTAR, MALTA, the IONIAN ISLES, and ALEXANDRIA."

"THE Mission at STOCKHOLM, appears to be diffusing a happy influence both amongst the English residents and many of the Swedish inhabitants, to whom Mr. STEPHENS occasionally preaches in the Swedish language."

"IN FRANCE, especially in the South, the labours of the Missionaries are producing beneficial effects; and they are cordially co-operating with and encouraging the pious and faithful Protestant pastors of several of the French churches, who persevere in an uncompromising discharge of their ministerial duties, through evil report and good report, determining to know nothing but Jesus Christ, and him crucified."

"AT GIBRALTAR, the dreadful ravages of the pestilential disease, which raged with such fatal effects in this place for several months, deprived our Society of the valuable labours and ministry of Mr. BARBER, who fell a victim to his incessant and fearless performance of pastoral duties during that awful visitation. His death was lamented as a public loss ; and his memory will long be cherished by the surviving members of the Society and congregation who had been favoured with his ministry. Since the cessation of the disease Mr. STINSON has sailed for this Station, whose peculiar suitability for the Mission affords reason to hope that the bereaved Society will be encouraged and prospered."

"AT MALTA, Mr. KEELING continues to attend regularly to ministerial duties, and to promote, by personal instruction and the distribution of Tracts and Sermons, the unadulterated truths of Holy Scripture. In this important object, he is materially assisted by Dr. NAUDI, who has translated several Sermons into Italian and Maltese for distribution, and is at present engaged in translating the *New Testament*, with Mr. WESLEY's *Notes*, into *Maltese*; which language, with some slight

variation, is used not only in Malta, but also in the States of Barbary."

"AT ALEXANDRIA, in Egypt, an Arab School has been formed of about forty boys; and opportunities have been embraced of addressing the English residents, and of occasionally visiting the vessels lying in the harbour, and preaching to the officers and seamen."



### MISSIONS IN CEYLON AND CONTINENTAL INDIA.

"THE MISSIONS in CEYLON and CONTINENTAL INDIA are increasing in stability and usefulness, and present powerful claims to additional aid in order to render them more extensively and efficiently successful, and to enable the Missionaries to enter the new and widely extended field of usefulness which lies open before them."

"ALREADY the systems of *Brahminism* and *Budhism*, the dominant idolatries of Ceylon and Continental India, have partially yielded to the attacks of the Missionaries, and triumphs indicative of the ultimate success of the Gospel have been achieved. At COLOMBO, the English congregation has considerably increased, and leave has been given for the erection of a Chapel in the Fort; three of the young-men instructed in the *Wesleyan Institution* have been placed in situations of public usefulness: one of them as an Assistant Missionary, another as an Assistant Superintendent of Schools, and the third in some sphere of usefulness in the Tamul District. An edition of the *Cingalese Bible* is passing through the press, at the expense of the British and Foreign Bible Society."

"IN the different Schools under the direction of our Missionaries in CEYLON, there are about four thousand children. The number of Missionaries employed in CEYLON, including nine Assistant Missionaries, is twenty-one."

"IN CONTINENTAL INDIA, nine Missionaries are employed, including one Assistant Missionary; the number of children in the Schools is eight hundred and six."



### SOUTH SEA MISSIONS.

"THE MISSIONS in the distant and partially colonized islands of NEW HOLLAND and VAN DIEMEN'S LAND, continue to

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diffuse among the settlers the knowledge of the truths of the everlasting Gospel, which is "able to make them wise unto salvation, through faith which is in Christ Jesus."

"MR. SCHOFIELD has now resided for some time at the Penal Settlement at MACQUARIE HARBOUR, to which he was sent at the request of the Local Government, sanctioned by His Majesty's Government at home. His endeavours to instruct the convicts in the great principles and duties of religion and morality, have not been altogether in vain; a readiness to listen to those important truths which had been formerly neglected or despised, begins to mark the influence of his ministry among them: and some appear desirous of obtaining the renewing grace of the Holy Spirit, and of living agreeably to the will of God. A pressing request for a second Missionary to this station has been received from the same authority, to which the state of our funds has not yet allowed us to accede."

"THE MISSION IN NEW ZEALAND has been resumed; and since the death of the ambitious and blood-thirsty Chief, SHUNGHEE, has presented an appearance of tranquility and permanence."

"FROM THE TONGA ISLANDS the communications are of the most promising nature. Schools have been established in TONGA, at HIHIFO, and NUKUALOFA. The Chief, TUBO, who had met with considerable opposition from the other Chiefs for countenancing the Missionaries, and had been prevailed upon for a short time to withdraw from attending the religious services of the Christians, and even to close the place of worship, has not only permitted it to be re-opened, but attends the services as formerly, and is, at least, equally friendly. Most importunate requests have also been made to the Missionaries, by the Chiefs of VAVOU, the HABAI, and other islands, for Christian instructors, to whom they have promised to afford every facility for promoting the instruction of the natives under their control."

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#### MISSIONS IN SOUTHERN AFRICA.

"THE successful and extending Missions in SOUTHERN AFRICA are eminently calculated to inspire the hope that the period is rapidly advancing when the wandering and barbarous tribes of Africa shall bow to the sceptre of the Prince of Peace, and "violence no more be heard in their land, nor destruction within their borders." The number of Missionaries actually em-

ployed in these Missions is thirteen, besides two assistants. Three others have recently sailed for this department of the Missions."

"The stations in the district of ALBANY have proved highly successful, and the influence of the Missions is rapidly extending among the surrounding Heathen. The stations in Albany, comprising GRAHAM'S TOWN, SALEM, and SOMERSET, have two hundred and fifty-five Members united in Christian Society; and five Schools, in which five hundred and thirty-seven scholars are instructed, including eighty adults."

"A Missionary has also been recently appointed to reside with DAPA, a Mambookie Chief, the son of a European woman (probably an English woman) who had been wrecked off the coast, and afterwards united to one of the Chiefs. The troubles occasioned by the predatory attacks of CHAKA, a haughty and ambitious Chief, have driven DAPA from his residence; but the death of CHAKA, who has been assassinated by one of his own people, and the peaceable character of his successor, encourage the hope that not only DAPA will now return to his former residence, but that the whole country will rest from war."



#### MISSIONS IN WESTERN AFRICA.

"THE Stations in WESTERN AFRICA are *Sierra Leone* and *St. Mary's on the Gambia*. At *Sierra Leone* two Missionaries were regularly employed, till their labours were suspended by death. The Mission continues to prosper; and the Schools at *Congo* and *Portuguese Towns* have been aided by the kind contributions of several persons belonging to the Society of Friends. We have about one hundred and thirty persons in society; and about eighty scholars in the Schools."



#### WEST INDIAN MISSIONS.

"IN the West Indian Islands and Colonies, extensive and important success has, during the last year, attended the labours of the Missionaries in almost every department of Missionary zeal and enterprise. In the *ANTIGUA* district, one thousand two hundred and sixty members have been added to the Society since the last yearly returns, besides the number re-

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quired to replace the vacancies occasioned by death, removals, and other contingencies. In the *ST. VINCENT'S* district, there has been an addition of about three hundred members to the Societies; in *Bridge-Town, BARBADOES*, a larger and more commodious chapel has been erected than the one formerly destroyed, and, on the estates of *W. REECE, Esq.*, a small chapel, and a house for the residence of a Missionary, have been erected, principally at the expense of the esteemed proprietor, who is anxious to obtain constant instruction for the slaves on his estates. The colony of *DEMERARA*, containing a slave population of more than eighty thousand, continues to be favoured with the blessing of God upon the labours of the Missionaries; the total number of members of Society being two thousand seven hundred and forty-four: and although two thousand four hundred and forty-three are slaves, so great a spirit of liberality prevails, that the Mission there is entirely supported by the Society, except the passages and outfits of the Missionaries, and considerable sums have also been raised towards the erection of a new chapel at *Mahaica*; and the building of another is contemplated in *George-Town*, preparatory to the station being formed into a separate district."

"In *JAMAICA*, considerable opposition has been raised against the Missionaries, two of whom have been subjected to imprisonment, and other painful effects of a determination to prevent or restrict the progress of the Mission. These nefarious endeavours have, however, been overruled by the all-wise providence of God, so that the Missionaries have been honourably liberated, the magistrates who committed them to prison dismissed from their office, and the laws in their favour explicitly stated and defined by the highest legal authorities. Four hundred and seventeen members have been added to the Societies in the course of the year; and a general Sunday School Union of all the different circuits on the island has just been formed, which promises to be followed by the happiest effects. The station of *Belize*, in *HONDURAS BAY*, which had been deprived successively of the care of the Missionaries sent to occupy it, by their early and unexpected decease, has lately been re-occupied by *Mr. WEDLOCK*, from whom gratifying accounts have been received of the prospects of usefulness which are presented to the Christian Missionary; and of the pressing necessity which exists for additional help, to enable him to visit the residents in the interior."

"In *NEW PROVIDENCE*, it is highly satisfactory to learn, that the Honourable House of Assembly has voted two hundred pounds currency towards the erection of a new Chapel in *NASSAU*."

"From BERMUDA the official returns for the past year have not yet been received; but it is with pleasure the Committee have to state, that EDWARD FRASER, whose honourable liberation from slavery was noticed in our former Report, is now actively engaged as a Missionary in Dominica, where his zealous and able services will, we trust, be justly appreciated and cheerfully accepted."

"In HAYTI, or SAINT DOMINGO, we have a Society of about ninety Members. Mr. ST. DENIS BAUDUY continues to preach as frequently and publicly as the restrictive spirit of Roman Catholicism, the dominant religion of the island, will permit; and it may be noticed as a pleasing feature of the Mission, that less opposition is experienced than formerly."

#### MISSIONS IN BRITISH NORTH AMERICA.

"THE Missions in BRITISH NORTH AMERICA continue to diffuse a blessed influence among the inhabitants of the different districts in which they are established, and their success has been marked during the year by a considerable increase. The number of members in society in the districts of CANADA, NOVA-SCOTIA, and NEW-BRUNSWICK, is four thousand and ninety-one; the number of stations at present occupied twenty-six; and the number of Preachers employed, thirty-three. In the course of the year, Mr. STRONG has visited several parts of the New-Brunswick District, particularly MIRAMICHI\* and its vicinity, and received most pressing entreaties for Missionaries; and met with several affecting instances of persons who, in early life, had either themselves been members of our Society in Great Britain, or whose parents had been members, but who had been for many years destitute of all opportunity of attending the public ministry of the Word of God, and deeply lamented their destitution. The number of stations in NEW-FOUNDLAND is thirteen; the number of members, one thousand and fifty-four, and of Preachers employed, fourteen. At the earnest request of the residents of Cape-Breton, transmitted by the hands of ANDREW LE BROUG, Esq., the Committee have been induced to send an additional Preacher to the Nova-Scotia District, with a special designation to *Ship Harbour*, and have recently determined to appoint another to *Sydney* on the same island.

\* A Missionary appointed by the British Conference has proceeded to Miramichi, a neat and commodious chapel is in progress, and the most favourable openings for usefulness are presented.

“The loss of the valuable labourers, whose deaths are here recorded, has been deeply felt by the Society at home, as well as by the bereaved churches on the station to which they were appointed; but the success of their labours whilst spared, the triumph and peace of their last moments, and the courage and zeal which animate others to succeed them at the post of danger, are consolatory proofs of the co-operating influence and approbation of Him to whom the workmen and the work alike belong.

The number of Members in our Foreign Societies is 39,060, being an increase of 2,743. Of these 24,085 are slaves, and 6,910 free negroes and persons of colour, in the West Indian colonies.”
