Dominion Notes.

OTTAWA, APRIL 16, 1877.

Dear Advocate.

There is no truer saying than the
hackneyed phrase that "History
repeats itself." Long years ago in the
of Congress, John Randolph of
Roanoke alluded to a Coalition that
had been formed between Henry Clay
of Kentucky and Roger Sherman of
Rhode Island. Clay, despite his great
and acknowledged genius, was a man
who enjoyed some of the principal
pleasures of life, and one of his graver
pleasures was in spending the weary
hours of night, in poring over the
"devil's picture books." This man
plumes himself of being a Democrat,
exclaimed the fastidious Randolph,
"when all the world knows that his
nearly companions are Queens, Kings,
and Knaves." Roger Sherman, on the
other hand, was almost a puritan in
morals, and a faithful descendant of
the Pilgrim fathers. That two such
men should have entered into a coalition
awakened the ire of Randolph, and
he branded the union as "a coalition
between a Puritan and a blackleg."

Could ever an expression have been
made that would better suit the pre-
sent administration, when we find that
monthling piece of political morality,
that elevater of public standards, the
Hon. Alex. Mackenzie, sitting down in
company with the promoter of copper
companies that "lead to bewilder
and dazzle to blind" the men who
invested in them on the strength of
the promise being an Honorable in
Canada, this man, who to advance
his party, scrupled not to bribe the
trusted servants of his political op-
ponents, and paid the price of their
treachery from the patronage he pos-
sessed in his official capacity. Truly
John Randolph's deduction, if wrong
at the time I was uttered, is appropos
to the times we live in in Canada.

Let us allude to one little transac-
tion that has lately been lighted up.
A Mr. Adam Oliver and other lead-
ing liberals of Ontario, with a fair
sprinkling of the M-Kellar family, a
few years since purchased a lot of
land on the Kamistiquia River, and
an old part of the Hudson Bay
Company called Port William." All
men wondered at the purchase, but
the party who purchased kept their
own counsel, and the people generally
appeared to think that patriotic mot-
ives alone had actuated them in their
selection of such a district. There
could appear no other reason to the
ordinary mind. Port William stood
on the river alone, yet on one side of
it could be found seven miles of un-
occupied lands, on the other side three
miles equally destitute of population,
for Government Reports had shown
that the Kamistiquia possessed ten
miles of navigable water. Still among
the knowing ones, there was a feel-
ing that such good Liberals would not
throw away their money for nothing,
and a few of them invested in the
same venture, not that they had any
insight into the future, but they had
confidence in the men who were en-
gaged in the scheme, knowing them
to be of the class who would scruple
at no means to accomplish their ends,
or benefit themselves. The result
proved that cunning is often a better
gift than intelligence. Every person
of intelligence was fully impressed
with the fact that Prince Arthur's
Landing was the place that nature in-
tended for a terminus to the Pacific
line, and accordingly men of intelli-
gence could not possibly see how un-
der any circumstances the Oliver fac-
tory could possibly recoup themselves
for the outlay. Even admitting that
Prince Arthur's Landing, with all its
natural advantages, was passed by,
still there remained on both sides of
the Oliver grant, ten miles of equally
desirable land should the Gov't desire
to place the terminus on the Kamisti-
quia, and these ten miles could be
bought at any time for one dollar an
acre. Still Oliver in the words of
Sneyke, "held the fort," and only a
few days since had the country leared
that he held it to some advantage,
for the Government passing by the
ten miles of available region have pur-
chased and paid fifty one thousand
seven hundred dollars to the liberal
partisans who, in concert with Oliver,
helped to "hold the fort." This re-
velation, added to the Anglin outrage
on the privileges of Parliament, shows
clearly that those men feel that the
country will rise up in judgment
against them at the next election, and
they are determined to supply them-
selves with the sinews of war to meet
the "big push" calls that will be
made ere the "pairty" can again attain
the Treasury benches. Mr. Mac-
kenzie's brother has profited by the
steel rails transaction, of that fact there
can be no doubt, even if the evidence
is not so clear. The fact is, that the
knowing helped him into the con-
tract by which the profit was made.
Mr. Anglin has made his "little pile,"
and Mackenzie, that stern denunciator
of all things that are of the earth,
earthly, has not one word to say
against the great and enormous out-
rage that has been perpetrated upon
the state which was passed expressly
to preserve inviolate the purity of
Parliament, and now the Truro and
Pictou Railroad Bill has been passed,
and that feeder and auxiliary of the

rate at 50cts, in order to enable a man

of Mr. Mackenzie's answer to Mr.
Mitchell, when he enquired whether
any further steps were to be
taken by the Gov't to improve the
navigation of the North West Branch
of the Miramichi during the present
season. The reply was curt, concise
and explicit—"No, we do not intend
to do anything in the matter. The
other question asked by the same
member was whether the Gov't in-
tended to continue the dredging at
the mouth of the Miramichi, for the
purpose of improving navigation of the
said River. The reply was equally
decisive, and the sharp negative show-
ed clearly that no "Northumbrian need
apply" to the people who now hold
the destinies of the country in their
hands. But Northumberland should
lay those grievances to heart, and
when the hour approaches, show that
he feels that her rights should be re-
spected, even should the member she
has returned be in opposition to the
Gov't of the day.

But coming back from the dark re-
cords of political iniquities, I shall
take a slight survey of the legislation
in which your member has been most
prominently placed. With the old
settling tenacity which distingu-
ished him when sitting on Gov't
benches, he seems to be one of the
few members that are ever in their
place. No matter what the ques-
tion, or whether it concerns the
legislation of New Brunswick or
Keewauwat, nothing seems to be able
to keep him from the chair where he
sits in the front benches. It seems to
be one of the peculiarities of his dis-
position, and although differing in
opinion with the Hon. the Minister,
that amusing individual he fastens
him to his post and seems al-
ways waiting for "something to turn
up," for "men may come and men
may go, but he sits on for ever."

And long may he continue to sit, for
few constituencies possess a repre-
sentative that is ever on the watch
for the welfare of his supporters and
willing to forego pleasure and accept
weariness as a matter of duty. Lately
he has been asking for a breakwater
for the protection of fishermen, to be
erected at Point Esquimaux, and has
called for all papers, petitions, and ap-
plications relating to that object. I
do not know anything about the merit
of the work he desires to advance, but
that he fought hard to accomplish his
end was evident. He has likewise
been engaged about an Island called
Portage at the mouth of the Miramichi
River, and desires to know how far
the Gov't has progressed in their ef-
forts to have it transferred from the
Admiralty (to whom it now seems to
belong) to the Dominion Gov't. These
are local points which I wish to
bring before your notice, and have
therefore mentioned them as they hap-
pened in the reported doings of the
House. I think the stand he took
on militia affairs will commend it-
self to every intelligent mind in the
Dominion. When the House went
into Supply on a little military item
of \$1,000,000 he spoke in no uncertain
terms as to his views of such an ex-
penditure being asked for at such a
season as the present, and having pre-
viously analyzed the accounts and in-
vestigated its items, he told the House
he was not prepared to pass any such
sum without an explanation of the re-
ason why the food only amounted to \$12
per head, whilst the cost of feed re-
ached the extravagant sum of \$19
per head. His remarks were pro-
posed to elicit attention by both
sides of the House, and although the
item eventually passed, it was not be-
cause attention had not been called
to its extravagant proportions.

The matter of transferring the Truro
and Pictou Railway still continues to
be combated by him at every stage of
its progress, and although the rank
and file will vote the bill through,
under the pressure of the Gov't whip,
still it will remain on record that Mr.
Mitchell fought this, the crowning in-
equity that has been passed in the
shape of a bill this session, at every
stage when it made its appearance,
and in future years when the Gov't
will be forced to purchase the line
back again, by virtue of a clause that
is incorporated in bill for its transfer,
should the Gov't desire it, we will
find an evidence of his foresight and
judgment in matters affecting the
common weal. On the Insolvent
Bill, although I differ somewhat in
opinion from his views, yet I must
allow that I accept one of his, to
which I before alluded, that fixing the

rate at 50cts, in order to enable a man
to get a discharge under the Act,
